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Pets and Children



At Maynooth Veterinary Clinic, Newtown Grove, we see many couples who have a pet and who are in the happy situation of expecting their first child. They are often quite anxious about how their dog will react to their baby's arrival. This feeling is both natural and sensible. We are often asked for our advice and this month's article outlines the approach we take:

It is quite common for a pet to be an established member of a household prior to the birth of the first child. The excitement and expectation of the newborn baby is often mixed with anxiety relating to possible problems that may result with the family pet. Preparation and planning are necessary in order to promote a smooth transition. It is impossible to generalise how your pet may react to this new situation but the following article is intended to give some guidance.

Has your pet been previously introduced to babies or toddlers and if so how has your pet behaved? If there has been any evidence or suggestion of aggression take this very seriously and consult your vet who should be able to help. In certain circumstances he may consider it prudent to refer you to a professional animal behaviourist. If your dog has shown no adverse reactions to infants this is a tremendous start but never take his continued good behaviour for granted. Be positive and reward his good behaviour towards infants with a treat or a period of play. This helps him to associate children with positive thoughts. Basic obedience skills such as "sit", "stay", "leave" etc should be practised and reinforced where necessary before the arrival of your baby. It is good practise to introduce your dog to items associated with the pending newborns arrival – prams, carrycots etc. Some people have found it to be very effective to play recordings of babies crying, laughing etc. You will have many months to prepare for the wonderful arrival of your new baby.



Use this time wisely and include your pet's needs in adapting to the new household environment.

When your dog appears to be comfortable with the household changes preceding the arrival of your baby, it can be useful to expose him in a very controlled manner, to another infant. Perhaps a relative or friend with a baby would help with this – while under very strict supervision, including having the dog on a lead restraint in the hands of the owner, the baby can be carried into the room while the dog is talked to and kept calm at the other end of the room. The initial period of socialisation should be kept very short and gradually increased. At no stage should you assume that all is well and leave your dog in a situation where he can make contact with the baby or upset it. Your dog should never be given access to the baby's room without the owner being there and being in full command.

You do not want your pet to regard your baby negatively. This can often happen by accident if the dog associates the presence of the baby with confinement, lack of attention or other negative experiences. In the presence of another family member have your dog in the room with you sometimes when your baby is being fed. Have the other person talk and play with the dog at this time - this promotes positive associative thinking in the dogs mind. If you are bringing your baby out for a walk try to bring your dog with you – again the dog associates the positive benefits of the walk with your baby. All of the time you are imprinting in your dog's mind that good things are associated with your baby.

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Editorial

The Magdalene laundries report must be welcomed but for decades these women, like children who were locked away and/or abused, tried to speak but nobody listened. While the apology from the Taoiseach on behalf of the State is also to be welcomed it was a pity that it took so long. The issue of the Promissory Notes probably overshadowed the Magdalene Report but it was obvious that the Taoiseach was somewhat wrong-footed in his original reaction. It was a very heartfelt apology and his feelings were clear as he drew a depressing picture of Ireland at the time. Although the hard attitudes shown by people in that period, parents threatening children with the laundry, might have softened today, there is still a core of hardness in many Irish people. This can be seen most clearly in the attitude to depression, to mental illness in general and to suicide. This along with bullying is one of the biggest problems that modern Irish society needs to address. The tragic deaths of some high profile people in the past number of months is a clear indication of this.

This culture of attempted whistle-blowing has not changed. Even today, institutions may make mistakes but they are very slow to admit this and to put things right. The moves by Ruairí Quinn on bullying and the way in which it occurs in cyberspace is also good but until institutionalized bullying is dealt with what hope is there? If bullying is endemic amongst adults what can we expect from young people.

The finding of Richard III in a car park in England has sparked a huge amount of interest in archaeology. He is to be reburied in Leicester cathedral apparently. Young children are fascinated by such stories – even in Ireland. It is difficult to understand why the education system still does not cover the early literature and history of Ireland. This deficit means that Irish people do not really know much about their early history, mythology and legends apart from scraps that they learn in national school. There might be a better sense of identity in the country if people learned more about themselves. It is all very well to talk about the Gathering and/or promoting tourism; until Irish people themselves appreciate our heritage it is ridiculous to expect others to appreciate it. Selling culture or heritage to tourists for the sake of income will not work if those in the industry do not have a proper understanding of their importance. There is little or nothing being done at various levels within the education system to address this lack of information. The Departments of Early Irish in most universities tend to be overly academic with little more than a nod in the way of cultural heritage. Guides and heritage workers need to be educated if the tourism industry is to thrive. It is known that between 50-60% of tourists come to Ireland for heritage. But there is more to be seen than the Book of Kells or Newgrange and they certainly do not visit so that they can fly by archaeological sites on shiny new motorways. On a brighter note, the latest musical in the Post-Primary School shows what dedicated teachers and past pupils can achieve when working with talented young people. The competition to be on stage is huge and we would like to take this opportunity to congratulate everyone involved. They are a credit to their parents, their town, community and teachers.

The Taoiseach also mentioned that Ireland in the 30s, 40 and 50s thought itself to be a Christian and good place. We know so differently now. We are good at deluding ourselves, we refer to early Christian Ireland as 'the island of saints and scholars' as if we were a haven of peace in war torn Europe. While there were undoubtedly saints or saintly figures as well as scholars writing great manuscripts like the Book of Kells, Ireland was at least as war torn as any other country of the time. Recent archaeological excavations of pre-Viking burial sites show the extraordinary levels of

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Question

What are the new driving licence fees?

Answer

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- Three-year driving licence costs €5
- One-year driving licence costs €5
- Learner permit costs €5

Motorists over the age of 70 can get their driving licence renewed for free.

Exchanging a driving licence, for example, to add a new category, costs €5 from 12 January 2013.

The driving licence or learner permit now takes the form of a card similar to a credit card.

You can get an application form for a driving licence from your local motor tax office or you can download it from rsa.ie.

Redundancy payments:

Question

I have been working for a company for four years and I am facing the prospect of redundancy in 2013. How do I calculate what I might be entitled to if this happens?

Answer

The Redundancy Payments Scheme provides for the compensation of workers for the loss of their jobs by reason of redundancy. It is the responsibility of the employer to pay a statutory redundancy payment to all eligible employees. This is a minimum entitlement and in some cases employers may pay more. An employer who pays statutory redundancy payments to employees is no longer entitled to a rebate from the State when the date of dismissal is on or after 1 January 2013.

To qualify for a statutory redundancy payment, you must have at least two years' continuous service; be in employment which is insurable under the Social Welfare Acts; be over the age of 16; and have been made redundant as a result of a genuine redundancy situation, meaning that the job no longer exists and you are not replaced.

If eligible under the Redundancy Payments Acts, you are entitled to two weeks' statutory redundancy payment for every year of service, plus an extra week. Your redundancy payment is paid in a lump sum and is based on your weekly pay subject to a ceiling of €600 per week. *Pay* refers to your current normal weekly pay including average regular overtime and benefits-in-kind, but before tax and PRSI deductions - your *gross pay*. The statutory redundancy payment is tax-free.

There is an online redundancy calculator to help you work out the payment at welfare.ie.

Medical card means test:

Question

I think I may be eligible for a medical card. I have some savings - will the HSE take this into account in assessing my application?

Answer

When assessing your savings, the HSE disregards the

first €6,000 of savings and property for a single person and €7,000 in the case of a couple. Your family home is not taken into account. If you have savings or investments above this amount they are assessed either by taking into account the actual rate of interest received or the HSE will apply a 'notional rate of return' to your savings.

If you wish to have the actual rate of interest used you must provide a certificate of the interest paid on in the last full calendar year - from the institution(s) in which the savings are held.

The HSE will use whichever measure is best for you.

Notional assessment of interest

Capital	Weekly means assessed
First €36,000 (single), €72,000 (couple)	Nil
Next €10,000	€1 per €1,000
Next €10,000	€2 per €1,000
Balance	€4 per €1,000

The assessment makes provision for fixed-term savings where the interest is only applied at the end of a fixed period. If you choose, interest will only be taken into account on the date the investment matures. If you wish, the HSE can apply the notional rate instead.

Consumer rights:

Question

I bought a clock in the sales, but it has turned out to be faulty. What should I do about this?

Answer

When you buy goods, you enter into a contract with the seller. As a general rule, the seller can either repair or replace the item. Alternatively, they can refund the cost of the item. You may also have extra protection if you have a [guarantee or warranty](#) from the manufacturer. You should return the faulty item to the seller as soon as possible and explain the problem. Some shops display "No Refunds/No Exchanges" notices, particularly during the sales, but this does not take away your rights if the goods are faulty.

It is important to remember that if you caused the fault, the seller is under no obligation to offer you any type of compensation.

The shop is entitled to request proof of purchase, but this doesn't necessarily have to be the shop receipt. If you are not satisfied with the seller's response, you may be able to take a claim to the Small Claims Court. Free Second Level Maths Support at NUI Maynooth

The Mathematics Support Centre (MSC) in the National University of Ireland Maynooth (NUIM) continues its provision of free drop-in maths support for local secondary schools. This service is supported by the Department of Mathematics and Statistics, and the Admissions and Access Offices in NUIM.

It is available to students, from first year to leaving certificate regardless of level. These sessions will run on Monday evenings from 6-8pm in Rye Hall, North Campus of NUIM. THE MAYNOOTH EDUCATE TOGETHER SCHOOL RAISES FUNDS FOR THE TEACCH UNIT

The Educate Together staff are running a table quiz upstairs in Brady's in Maynooth on Thursday 21st March to raise funds to purchase some much needed equipment. The quiz is from 8.30 to 10.30 and the entry fee is 20 euro per table of four and everyone is welcome to participate to support this worthy cause and maybe win the top prize one hundred euro. Educate Together is a school based on the Maynooth/Celbridge Road and situated across from the Gaelscoil. **There is a mainstream school and also a unit dedicated to the education of children with autistic spectrum disorders.** One of the main aims of the staff in this unit is to create a positive and educational environment for children with autism and aspergers' and other related behavioural conditions. There is a very warm, welcoming and inclusive atmosphere at Educate Together and all of the friendly teaching staff are very approachable and ready to explain what it is they aim to achieve. Libby Conroy, who has a number of years experience working in the **special education and is currently studying for a PostGraduate diploma in Autism** explains how they endeavour to make learning a fun, enjoyable and educational experience for the children.

As she says that TEACCH or Teaching and Education of Autistic and Communication Challenged Children is an approach they use to help to generate an inclusively aware programme which is designed to meet the particular requirements of each student.

Autistic children experience sensory problems such as hyposensitivity and hypersensitivity. Hyposensitivity is when a child is under-sensitive to stimuli and has trouble processing information through their senses. Hypersensitivity is when a child's sensory awareness is too acute.

Hypersensitivity includes such features as hypertactility; this is when a child's sense of touch is heightened. One reaction of hypertactility is that a child may hate to be touched or hugged. Even a gentle touch can feel uncomfortable and even painful to a hypersensitive child and can result in a "melt down". Another aspect of this condition is hypersensitive hearing. This is when even the slightest noise becomes amplified to such an extent that it is scary and uncomfortable to the particular child. Sudden sounds terrify them and in some cases they may make their own repetitive sounds, like humming, to try and block out the sounds around them. As Libby notes that, "a child may have no filter for the sounds around them; the sound of a train could be like a thunderstorm in their ears, or a breeze could be like a painful scratch on their skin". These are just some features of autism and by using such methods as Applied Behavioural Analysis (A.B.A), and TEACCH Libby and **teacher Catriona Finlay** and their colleagues create a quality educational environment for each and every one of the twelve children at this school. The approach to teaching and learning is very structured: each child learns at a different pace. The pace of the learning process can be different for individual children and in some instances a lesson may need to be repeated a number of times, but they have excellent retention when it has been learned. This takes extensive patience and individual awareness by the staff for the student's particular needs, but they say, though it can be challenging, it is very rewarding.

While autism and its variety of symptoms can mean that the learning process can be a challenging progression for the child, with the right environment and attention to detail that child can develop and contribute very positive services within the community

Temple Grandin, who was diagnosed with autism at a very early age, is a recognised and celebrated author and professor at Colorado State University. She is a doctor of animal science and behaviour and was listed in the *Time 100* list of the most influential people in the world. It is because of the early diagnosis and applied strategies that people such as Temple learn to live happy and fruitful lives. But this takes quite a bit of effort and patience from the children's parents, their teachers and the people who inhabit their world. One method to improve and enhance the learning experience and potential for children with autism is Colourful Semantics. This is a visual and tactile learning aid whereby the child learns to associate picture/flash cards with their surroundings and learns to understand and communicate what they see. Once again this takes extensive patience and understanding on behalf of not only the parents, but also the teachers for it to be as effective as possible. But such lesson plans require the material, equipment and tools with which to carry them through. It is hoped that there a good response from the public to support the Table Quiz and thereby help with the fundraising to maintain and update very necessary materials and equipment for what is a wonderful and positive resource in our community..

The actual colour of St. Patrick is blue. Green became associated with St. Patrick's Day during the 19th century. Green, in Irish legends, was worn by fairies & immortals & also by people to encourage their crops to grow.

St. Patrick did not actually drive snakes out of Ireland, the snakes represent the pagans that he converted to Christianity

The very first St. Patrick's Day parade was not in Ireland, it was in Boston in 1737.

The phrase, "Drowning the Shamrock" is from the custom of floating the shamrock on the top of whiskey before drinking it. If you keep the custom, then you will have a prosperous year.

On March 17th it is usually said that there are two types of people in this world, the Irish and those who want to be Irish.

The New York's St. Patrick's Day parade is the longest running civilian parade in the world.

According to the Guinness Book of World Records, the highest number of leaves found on a clover is 14.

St. Patrick's Day is considered to be the luckiest day to get married.

The shamrock which was also called the "seamroy" by the Celts, was a sacred plant in ancient Ireland because it symbolized the rebirth of Spring. According to legend, St. Patrick used the shamrock to explain the Christian doctrine of the Trinity to the Irish.

A Good Day for Ireland - Stagg

The deal to tear up the infamous Anglo Promissory Notes has been welcomed by Deputy Emmet Stagg who described the outcome as a Good Day for Ireland.

This deal, stated Deputy Stagg, is a massive step by this Government in putting Ireland in a fairer and more sustainable financial position, accelerating our path back to Economic Recovery. Instead of an exorbitant short term high interest overdraft, Ireland has changed the promissory note into a cheaper long term interest only loan, with repayment of Capital pushed back to the years 2038 to 2053.

Over the next decade, Ireland will have to borrow €20 Billion less, which will significantly improve both our debt position and our reputation internationally. It is yet another piece of the jigsaw which will enable us to exit the Troika deal at the end of the year and help us to generate jobs and return to growth.

In addition the deal will reduce our Budget Deficit by €1 Billion per annum which will help us in achieving the reduction in our Budget Deficits required under the Troika Deal.

The next step in addressing Ireland's legacy Bank Debt was to push for recapitalisation of banks directly by the European Stability Mechanism, as agreed by European Heads of State last June. This is dependent on the establishment of a European Banking Union.

In conclusion, Deputy Stagg stated that the ongoing work at renegotiating the bad deals done by the previous Government and in rebuilding our reputation internationally would be hoped, build confidence at Home and Abroad, thus assisting us to gain sustained Economic Growth in the future.

Cllr. McGinley Objects to the Proposal to Close the M4 Junction on the Straffan Road:

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the January meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"That the National Roads Authority (NRA), be advised that we are totally opposed to the replacement of the M4 motorway junction on the Straffan Road with a new junction west of Maynooth."

John was given the following response:

"The NRA has stated that they have no plans to replace this junction."

Cllr. McGinley stated that the NRA had sent a similar reply to his colleague Deputy Emmet Stagg and they also stated that the issue should be addressed to the Council.

Cllr. McGinley and Cllr. Griffin asked that the Council examine a Planning File for the area adjacent to the bridge to see what correspondence there was from the NRA objecting to the Planning application.

Cllr. McGinley Expresses His Outrage that the Council Has Lost the €60,000 allocated for Safety at the Girl's School at Convent Lane:

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the January meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"That an update be given on the revised design scheme for the approved €60,000 for safety improvements outside the Girl's School, Convent Lane, Maynooth."

John was given the following response:

"The allocation in 2012 was subject to completion of consultation and the design process. As these processes were not completed in 2012 the funding for this scheme was lost and must be reapplied for in 2013."

Cllr. McGinley stated that the funding was approved in May 2012 and that it was beyond belief that the Council could not design 230m of footpath in 8 months. He further stated that it was unforgivable that any money should be lost in these difficult times.

Cllr. McGinley Asks that the Public Lights at The Square be repaired:

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the January meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"That the top covers on the triple public light at The Square, Maynooth, be replaced before irreparable damage is caused to the unit and that the two faulty "runway" lights be repaired."

John was given the following response:

"These issues will be investigated and the Council's public lighting maintenance contractor, Airtricity, will repair the fault as soon as possible."

Cllr. McGinley Asks That the Developer of Carton Square be Written to Asking Him to Repair the Ramps on Dunboyne Road:

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the January meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"That the developer of Carton Square, Maynooth, Glenmoy Developments, be asked to repair the two traffic calming ramps that were installed on the Dunboyne Road as a result of condition 32 of planning application 03/2084."

John was given the following response:

"Building Control Section has confirmed that Carton Square has not been taken in charge by the council and a management company is in place in the estate. Contact details for the management company are as follows: Carton Square Property Management Company Limited, Moyglen, Dowdstown, Maynooth, Co.Kildare."

John pointed out that the response did not address the motion as the ramps have nothing whatsoever to do with the Management Company as they are on the public road. He again asked the Council to write to the developer to get the ramps repaired.

Cllr. McGinley Demands Action on Litter on Main Street

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following question for the consideration of the January meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"What response has there been from the food take-aways in Maynooth to the letter sent to them as a result of my motion to the November area committee meeting?"

John was given the following response:

"Each of the food take-aways were issued with a letter requesting that arrangements be made by them to deal with litter particularly in the early hours. The letter was

hand delivered by the litter warden who explained the difficulties facing Kildare County Council and Tidy Towns groups in respect of litter in the town. There has been a positive response from a number of outlets and further enquiries are being made. Also the director of services in environment is meeting with the Tidy Towns Group shortly to review litter issues etc. The director of services in transportation is reviewing street sweeping arrangements to establish if efficiencies can be identified in this area also."

Update on Bus Route 66 Extension to Rathcoffey Road:

Cllr. McGinley got the following to his motion at the January Area Meeting of the Council:

"The NTA have been in discussions with Dublin Bus and Kildare County Council regarding extending the route and funding the appropriate "bus friendly" infrastructure. The members will be informed as soon as these discussions have been concluded."

The Director of Services advised Cllr. McGinley that she expected the discussions to be concluded shortly.

Cllr. McGinley Asks that Accumulated Rubbish and Foul Water Problem at Buckleys Lane be Dealt With:

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the February meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"That Londis at Main Street/Buckleys Lane, Maynooth, be asked to remove the accumulated rubbish that they have dumped behind Maynooth Barbers at Buckleys Lane and that whoever is responsible for the foul water coming from behind the Maynooth Barbers onto Buckleys Lane and Main Street be asked to put a stop to it forthwith."

Cllr. McGinley Asks the Council to Resume Emergency Roadworks at Night Time:

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the February meeting of the Council:

"That the decision of Management to longer undertake emergency roadworks at night time be reversed."

Cllr. McGinley Seeks Update on the Taking in Charge of Housing Estates in Maynooth

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following question for the consideration of the February meeting of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"What is the current position with the Taking in Charge of the following Housing Estates In Maynooth:

Cllr. McGinley Seeks Pothole Repairs:

Cllr. McGinley has asked the Council to repair the following potholes:

John has been advised that these will be taken care of in the week beginning 18 February.

Stagg to Seek meeting with Burton over Rent Supplement Rates in North Kildare

Deputy Emmet Stagg is to seek a meeting with Minister for Social Protection Joan Burton T.D. over the fact that Rent Supplements in Co. Wicklow are paid in two different bands, depending on where you live, whilst in Co. Kildare no difference is taken into account with higher rents for properties in the towns of Maynooth, Leixlip, Celbridge and Kilcock in the North of the County compared to Athy and Kildare Town further South.

In Wicklow the following Maximum Monthly Rent Supplements are paid as follows:

	Bray, Greystones & Delgany	Rest of Co. Wicklow
Single Person (Self Contained)	€460	€440
Single Person (Shared)	€275	€240
Couples (Self Contained)	€625	€525
Couples (Shared)	€300	€290
Couples & Lone Parents with 1 Child	€725	€625
Couples & Lone Parents with 2 Children	€800	€670
Couples and Lone Parents with 3 or more children.	€850	€740

Deputy Stagg stated that he had been arguing for some time that a separate Rent Supplement should operate in North Kildare given the close proximity to Dublin and the strong demand for rental property given the location of Intel, Hewlett Packard and Maynooth University in the area. Indeed in the Naas, Kill, Sallins and Clane areas a similar case could also be made.

If this can be done for Wicklow, I can't see why it cannot be done in Co. Kildare and I will be making that point to Minister Burton stated Deputy Stagg. A couple with 3 or more children will receive Rent Supplement of €850 per month in Bray whilst in Maynooth or Celbridge the maximum they can receive is €790 per month. In effect to ensure they do not become homeless people are now agreeing two Lease agreements in North Kildare, one with the landlord which is the economic rent and another to show to the Department of Social Protection to ensure they qualify for Rent Supplement. They are putting themselves into a poverty trap in doing so.

In conclusion Deputy Stagg stated that he would make his views known to the Minister again in the near future.

Climate Bill Vital If We Are to Make Progress

Any successful emissions-reduction plan "must be target-specific"

Catherine Murphy, Independent TD for North Kildare, has welcomed the tabling of her Climate Change & Energy Security Bill 2012 for second stage debate on Friday the 8th of February.

"This Bill, which I introduced in May last year, lays out a very clear target-specific approach to tackling our emissions, an approach I feel is absolutely essential if we are to be serious about meeting our 2020 obligations. We must also take full advantage of the transition needed to turn Ireland into a truly energy-secure island, one where a domestic renewable industry can create thousands of jobs.

"Since the publishing of this bill, we have been told repeatedly by Government that their own much-promised climate legislation is imminent. We had been expecting publication by December last at the latest. Unfortunately, we are still no closer to seeing any legislative proposals from the Minister for the Environment.

"We cannot underestimate the importance of this issue, not least because of the ongoing and worsening impact of changes in global climate, but also because of the opportunities we can seize in making the transition to a low-carbon economy.

Rent Supplement System is Unfair and Misleading

'Government Deputies Must Step up to the Plate'

Catherine Murphy TD (Ind, N. Kildare) today highlighted a series of responses to questions posed by her to the Minister for Social Welfare, Joan Burton in relation to the controversial Rent Supplement Scheme. These responses, say deputy Murphy, highlight the inequality and ineptness of the current system and its ill-advised structure.

"Data issued to me from the Minister's office show that Kildare ranks third nationally, behind only Dublin and Cork, when it comes to numbers receiving rent supplement. This clearly shows the massive housing crisis in Kildare, where demand far exceeds supply and yet the rent limits set by the Minister are completely irreconcilable with the market rents for the County, particularly the main population centres in North Kildare."

"It now transpires that while Minister Burton was steadfastly refusing to consider nuanced variations to the scheme in relation to the North Kildare situation, she had allowed for such a variance within a specified area of County Wicklow, where the limits set for Bray, Greystones and Delgany are higher than those set for the rest of the County on the basis that they are within the Dublin commuter belt. This is precisely what is needed for North Kildare, where rental prices are on a par with those in Dublin yet the limits set for Kildare lag far behind those set for the nearby Dublin region."

"Of the four TD's elected by the people of North Kildare, three of those candidates sit on the Government benches and I now call on those three Government deputies to lobby their Minister on behalf of those constituents who elected them. The housing situation in North Kildare is at crisis point and it's high time the government deputies for the area rowed in behind my campaign to remedy that situation."

Independent TD Catherine Murphy has voiced her concerns at weekend reports that some local authorities plan on charging residents of estates built by now-bankrupt developers for the outstanding development contributions owed on the sites.

Deputy Murphy questioned Minister of State for Housing Jan O'Sullivan in the Dáil Chamber on Tuesday night about the reports and asked the Minister to clarify the position for homeowners about where the liability lies. It is Deputy Murphy's assertion that Local Authorities frequently allowed, and continue to allow, developers to pay development levies in increments-an arrangement that by-passes the homeowner and is not a public process. If what is occurring in Wicklow should become the norm, the first thing that is needed is the immediate cessation of incremental payments and a more robust certification process applied.

The move by Wicklow County Council to seek unpaid development levies from homeowners "would be grossly out of line with planning legislation and set a very dangerous precedent for the many thousands of homeowners living in unfinished estates and estates with a bankrupt developer" according to Deputy Murphy.

Speaking after the debate, Deputy Murphy indicated that the Minister's answer was inadequate and she believes that the Minister should be instructing Local Authorities as to the correct legal approach.

"The suggestion that those who purchase a house should have co-responsibility with the developer to comply with planning permission is ludicrous. Are homeowners going to be liable for all aspects of planning permission compliance, will they be required to ensure a Bond remains in place or ensure the roads and paths are constructed in accordance with the planning permission, are they to be asked to oversee the laying of underground services?"

"The Government must clarify this issue without further delay."

Housing Adaptation Grants for Disabled & Elderly Must not be based on Postcode

Discrepancies Amongst Local Authorities Must be Addressed in Any Review of the Scheme.

Independent TD Catherine Murphy has highlighted the discrepancies in the system of home adaptation grants awarded to elderly and disabled people through their local authorities.

In a response to a parliamentary question posed by Deputy Murphy, The Minister of State in the Department of Environment, Community and Local Government Jan O'Sullivan confirmed that she is undertaking a review of the various grant measures and also provided a breakdown of figures for the grant across all local authorities.

"A simple glance at the figures for each local authority is enough to ascertain that some local authorities are in greater need than others, as evidenced by the fact that some overspent on their budget while others came nowhere near reaching their allowance. Each authority has to find 20% of the grant costs from their own resources if they are to avail of the matching 80% from the exchequer. Local Authorities that do not have this 20% available are unable to provide maximum grant assistance."

"An urgent review is necessary to ensure the system is redesigned in a way that eliminates post code as a basis for grant assistance and instead focuses on actual need. However this review must not be lengthy process; as we speak people are living in dangerous conditions or are unable to come home from hospital etc. because their home has not had the adaptations required for them to live safely in their homes. This cannot be allowed to continue."

Inflation will Save us? Not According to the Experts

Minister Noonan's Assertion that Inflation Will Lessen the Debt Burden Must be Challenged.

Independent TD Catherine Murphy has highlighted the 'Crystal Ball' type economics perpetuated by Minister for Finance Michael Noonan with his insistence that inflation into the future will ensure that the debt burden becomes less of a problem as our wage levels increase.

Quoting from an article by former IMF head of Mission for Ireland, Ashoka Mody, Deputy Murphy said "we are treating the present as if the bubble growth from 2000 to 2007 will return. She also noted that in the same article Robert Gordon, of North Western University, is quoted as finding, that the rate of technological progress has slowed sharply, and that the rise in standards of living (at least in the world's rich countries) is thus set to decelerate."

"All this talk of how inflation will save us and how our wages will be so high in 2038 that we will comfortably manage the debt is crystal ball stuff-except this crystal ball seems to only predict outcomes that favour Government policy rather than reality."

Speaking during the debate in last night's Dáil sitting, Deputy Murphy also questioned the relevance of the national parliament debating the decision after the deal had been done and indicated that there was very little media or public interest in the debate because it is effectively irrelevant.

"The debts of private banks have no place on the shoulders of Irish people and while this deal may have some short term advantages, they are outweighed by the long term pain we will bear as a result. We needed to share this debt burden with our European partners-not with our children and grandchildren."

Distraction burglary

Don't give out your personal information over the phone, and never buy anything over the phone. Always request the caller to send you information in the mail. Oftentimes, if the offer isn't legitimate to begin with, the caller will tell you the offer is only good for that moment over the phone. No offer is worth that risk. Even if you receive information in the mail, take it to someone you trust, so that together you can evaluate it and decide how much of a risk or scam it might be. Have someone call and/or come by to check on you on a regular basis. There are even some services available, companies who specialize in calling to check on the elderly. Just make sure someone always knows where you are and how you are doing.

Carry a mobile phone with you, especially when out on long trips. Have this means of emergency contact, should you have car trouble or run into some suspicious looking person.

Don't pick up hitchhikers. We hear the admonition quite often in today's time, but many elders may still believe that life is the same as it was in the days of their youth. At one time, hitching a ride was the only way a person could travel, and picking up a stranger was little danger to the driver. But times have changed so dramatically. Don't take any chances. Let that person find another ride. Or, if you see someone who appears to be stranded with car trouble, drive on by and stop at the nearest phone - in a populated and well-lit area - and call for help for him or her.

Shred all of your documents before tossing them into the bin. Sifting through rubbish is a full time activity for many crooks. Just imagine what information you may be unknowingly giving them in the seemingly harmless papers you discard. Do strangers need to know your social security number, bank account number, phone number, or any other personal or private information? Even a harmless letter you wrote, then re-wrote, to a friend or loved one, can give a stranger just enough information to deceive you into letting them into your life. What do most of us do with discarded personal letters that we have re-written? They usually end up in the bin, crumpled, yet intact.

Don't allow strangers into your home. If you are expecting a repairman or some delivery, have someone you know and trust be there with you. Also, don't leave your valuables lying out in plain site, even if you have someone there with you. It would be very easy for a dishonest person to check out your home and be quite tempted by the site of a purse, wallet, or jewelry casually lying about. Don't give them the chance to see what you have. Put temptation out of their reach.

Have some outside activities to keep yourself active and alert. Take a class, join an exercise group, or learn a new skill. You might even want to consider taking a self-defense class or some other lesson that could help you navigate your elder years. Don't let yourself stagnate and become isolated and alone. Bring others into your lives, those friends and family you trust. Take part in a neighbourhood watch program. Just make sure you know the neighbours who will be watching your own house! Get to know your neighbours. Cultivate new friends and learn to rely and trust one another. Watch out for each other, and don't be afraid to get involved. If you see a crime taking place next door, all you have to do is pick up your phone and call for help.

Distraction burglary is any crime where a falsehood, trick or distraction is used to gain access to a property to commit burglary. Victims of distraction burglary can suffer terribly both emotionally and physically.

Violence is increasingly being used by offenders against the elderly in order to gain entry to their homes and steal their property. Unfortunately, some victims suffer a decline in health and even die as a result of the trauma caused.

Did you know...?

The average age of a victim of distraction burglary is 81-years-old.

Crime prevention advice - Distraction burglary:

If you're not sure who is at your door, don't open it.

Check the identity of the caller by calling the company they are purporting to be from i.e. gas, electricity, water, police. Use the telephone numbers listed in your local directory or provided independently by your service provider – Do not use any telephone numbers provided by the caller – they may be bogus.

Telephone a neighbour or friend nearby to come along and check out the caller before you open the door to them. Some areas in the country have “nominated neighbour schemes” you can sign up to. Check with your local police to find out if there is one in your area.

Many service providers provide password schemes, sign up to these. When unannounced callers knock at your door they should know the password if they are genuine.

Don't keep large quantities of cash at home; put it in the bank where it is safe.

Keep doors locked and windows secure at all times.

Ensure that if you do let somebody in to your home, that you close the door behind them – distraction burglars often work in teams, where one will distract you whilst others sneak in through the insecure door.

If somebody asks for your help – needs to make a telephone call, lost a ball in your garden, needs a drink or pen and paper for example, refer them to a younger neighbour or assist them through a closed door. Alternatively, call a friend or neighbour to come and assist.

Not sure? Don't open the door!



MARCH GARDENING

Spring is in the air so it's a busy time for the gardener. Lots of things to get started. Before you get started make sure your stored garden tools & outdoor furniture are rust free. If they are not, you need to remove any surface rust with steel wool and paint with rust inhibitive paint. Check containers, see if they need watering. Don't forget to turn the compost pile.



Fertilize shrubs & trees if this wasn't done in February. Trees which bleed such as Birch & Maple should be pruned until after their leaves are fully developed. Repair damaged areas of the lawn. De-thatch, rake or aerate. Apply Dolomite Lime to sweeten the soil if needed. If moss is a problem, use a combination fertilizer & moss killer. Over-seeding can be done as the last step after fertilizing. Fruit trees & grapes vines should

be pruned this month. Apples & other fruit will be larger & have better flavour if the trees have been pruned so each branch has good exposure to sunlight & are well spaced up & down & around a central trunk.

If weeds occur in bulb beds do not remove by cultivation. Pull them by hand so that the bulbs & roots will not be disturbed. Buy some new perennials for your flower border. Roses can be pruned this month also & start spraying roses for black spot. Sow seeds for summer flowering annuals indoors. Plant tender bulbs & tubers such as Gladioli, Lilies & Dahlias. You may continue planting additional bulbs every two weeks until June to ensure a continuous source of bloom. Plant Primroses & Pansies.



Pinch off tips of Sweet Pea seedlings & Mums, when they are 4 inches tall. Continue to deadhead winter-flowering pansies & other winter bedding. Pansies will carry on into the spring & even to early summer, if attended to frequently. Plant Snowdrops in the green to brighten up your winter garden next year. Prune early-flowering Clematis once their flowers have finished & summer-flowering Clematis before they start into active growth. Divide & transplant summer blooming perennials & fertilize established ones as soon as new growth appears. Prune Winter Jasmine after flowering & cut Honeysuckle back to 3 ft. Keep an eye out for Aphids (spray with water) & Cutworms (Cutworm Dust).

Plan your vegetable garden on a sheet of paper. Remember to rotate the vegetables in the garden to reduce insect & disease problems. Prepare the vegetable garden by adding well-rotted manure, peat moss or compost for building compost humus in the soil. Egg Plant, Brussels Sprouts, Cauliflower, Celery, Leeks, Onions, Early Potatoes & Radish seeds may be planted in the garden mid month. Spinach, Chard, Cabbage & other hardy vegetables can be planted late in the month. Plant Strawberries, Blueberries, Current, Loganberries, Boysenberries, Grapes & Fruit trees. Also you can plant Tomatoes, Lettuce & other vegetables from seed.



Clean out all your bird houses now. Repair any fencing, arbors or trellises. Check plants under the eaves of the house & under tall evergreens to see if they have enough moisture. Frosts can be deadly, so keep vulnerable plants protected. March winds are also notorious so check exposed plants are well-supported. As you clear the debris from your garden beds, use a rake to break up old matted mulch so rain can reach the roots. The piles you've raked will be a great start to this season's compost pile.

Remove netting from the pond. Start feeding fish & using the pond fountain, remove pond heaters if you have one. If your pond has frozen over, melt a small area of ice with hot water to release any build up of gases that could harm the fish. DO NOT BREAK THE ICE - THE SHOCK WAVE CREATED MAY KILL POND LIFE. Open the greenhouse or conservatory doors & vents on warm days.



Re-pot Orchids & other houseplants before they start into active growth again. Bring bags of compost in to the greenhouse to warm up for a week or two before you start sowing. March is a good time to note areas of poor drainage. If there are pools of water in your yard that do not drain, fill in the low spot or scoop out a channel for the water to drain away.

Serves 8

Pistachio Pudding Parfaits

Ingredients

1 packet (8 oz) cream cheese, softened
1 cup of sugar
1 1/2 cups of whipped cream
1 packet (3-4oz) instant pistachio pudding mix
10 pecan shortbread cookies, coarsely crushed

Method

In a small bowl, beat cream cheese & sugar. Fold in whipping cream. Set aside. Prepare pudding according to packet. Spoon 1 tbsp cookie crumbs into each of the eight parfait glasses. (You can use any tall glass). Top with half of the pudding & whipped cream mixture. Repeat layers. Top with remaining cookie crumbs. Chill until serving.



Shamrock Cookies

Ingredients

3/4 cup butter
1/4 teaspoon peppermint extract or vanilla
2 cups self mixing flour
3/4 cup sugar
Green food colouring
Green coloured sugar

Method

- In a large bowl beat butter with an electric mixer on medium speed until softened. Add sugar & salt & beat until fluffy. Add the egg, peppermint extract or vanilla, & a few drops of green food colouring. Beat mixture well. Divide dough into 3 equal parts. Shape each part into a roll about 1 inch thick & about 8 inches long. Roll each in green coloured sugar. Wrap rolls in plastic wrap. Chill in fridge for at least 2 hrs or up to 1 week.
- Unwrap rolls. Slice crosswise so the slices are 1/4 inch thick. To shape each shamrock, place 3 slices of dough with sides touching in a shamrock shape on grease proof paper. Cut a stem, from a fourth slice & attach to the shamrock. Gently push the slices together so each leaflet curves in slightly. Bake in oven 350°F oven for 8 minutes or until edges are light brown. Lift the cookies onto a cooling rack.

Serves 32



Shamrock Milkshake Cupcakes

Ingredients

4 egg whites
1/4 cup of green crème de menthe - or
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup butter
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 cups self raising flour
1/4 cup milk, 1 tsp mint extract, green colouring
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup buttermilk or sour milk
1 1/2 cups of sugar
1 recipe white chocolate frosting

Serves 20-22



Method

- Allow egg whites to stand at room temperature for 30mins. Meanwhile, line 2 1/2 inch muffin cups with bun cases. In a medium bowl stir together flour, baking powder, baking soda & salt. In measuring jug combine the buttermilk & the crème de menthe/mint extract. Set aside.
- Preheat oven to 350°F. In a large mixing bowl beat butter till soft. Add sugar, a little at a time, mixing well until all the sugar is gone. Add the flour & buttermilk mixture to the butter & sugar, mixing slowly until all the mixture is used.
- Spoon batter into prepared muffin cups, filling each about 3/4 full. Use the back of a spoon to smooth out batter in cups. Bake for 15-18 mins or until tops spring back when lightly touched. Cool cupcakes on wire rack for 5 mins. Remove cupcakes from muffin cups. Cool completely on wire rack.
- Divide white chocolate frosting between two bowls. Tint one portion with green food colouring. Spoon each frosting into a pastry bag fitted with a large star tip. Pipe white & green frostings onto tops of cupcakes in shape of shamrock.

Chocolate Stout Shake

Ingredients

1/4 cup chocolate stout beer or stout beer
1/2 cup prepared chocolate fudge ice cream topping
1/2 gallon vanilla bean ice cream
1 cup milk
6 purchased chocolate & nut covered pretzel rods

3 Servings



Method

- In a small pot heat beer & chocolate topping until warm & combined. Cool slightly.
- Meanwhile, in a blender combine ice cream & milk, half at a time. Cover & blend until combined. Divide ice cream mixture among 3 glasses. Drizzle with chocolate sauce & serve with chocolate covered pretzel rods.

Copcat McDonalds Shamrock Shake
