

The Maynooth 1916 Commemoration Ceremony Easter Monday











With the 100th anniversary of the Easter Rising just two years away, an event took place on Monday 21st April to commemorate the "Maynooth 15". On Easter Monday evening 1916 the "Maynooth 15" took leave from Buckley's shop in the Main St. and marched towards the College gates where they received a blessing from the College President, they then proceeded along the Royal Canal into Dublin, where they fought in the Rebellion. When they eventually reached the G.P.O., Padraig Pearse greeted them by saying "Your actions in marching from Kildare, even if you do no more in the Rebellion, will gain you a place in history".

In honour of these men of 1916 the proceedings began with a parade from the College gates to the Town Square, led by the St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band. Fifteen members of the 8th Kildare Scout Troop marched to represent the "Maynooth 15". Also marching on the day were members of the Organisation of national Ex-Service Men and Women. On arrival at the Square there was a wreath laying ceremony. Fr. John Nevin a native of Maynooth blessed the wreath. An officer from the Irish Defence Forces read the proclamation of the Irish Republic. A one minute silence was observed followed by the sounding of the Last Post. To conclude proceedings the National Flag was hoisted to full mast, followed by the playing of the National Anthem.

There was a display of the Irish Military Vehicles Group on the Square and the Irish Volunteers, Dublin Brigade and the Collins 22 Society exhibited 1916 memorabilia upstairs in Brady's Clockhouse. There was a wonderful Children's art display upstairs in Brady's with an outstanding piece of art from Saoirse Grehan, aged 9.

A great day was had by all who attended and of course the favourable weather conditions added to the sense of ceremony. The Maynooth 1916 Centenary Committee hope that this will become an annual event.












THE GERIATRIC PET

All dogs will age differently. Large breeds Great Danes, St. Bernards etc. will age quicker than smaller terrier, poodle type breeds. So an 8 year old St Bernard is considered a lot older than a Jack Russell terrier of the same age. Larger breed dogs may require Veterinary treatment earlier for geriatric problems.



A lot of Clients come in and tell us my dog is going deaf. He cannot hear normal sounds or the door bell. This may be a natural ageing process or due to the presence of ear polyps or an ear infection. Other Clients will tell us of instances of their dog standing aimlessly in the corner of a room barking at nothing! Or a cat that is wandering in and out constantly looking for

food! These symptoms could be a sign of dementia or be a sign of an underlying medical condition which if diagnosed early may be treatable.

You may notice your elderly dog or cat drooling from its mouth with bad breath. This is a sign of bad dental hygiene which generally goes unnoticed by owners and can be easily treated giving an improved quality of life for your pet.

As dogs age they may suffer heart weakness and panting after bouts of exercise, some coughing and maybe even fainting. As this condition advances you may notice a swelling of the abdomen this is caused by retaining fluid called dropsy. Draining of this fluid will only give temporary relief as this condition will

quickly return. These dogs and cats if diagnosed earlier can be

successfully treated with medication giving your pet a longer and happier life expectancy. Cardiomyopathy is a condition which causes enlargement of the heart and is seen in older large breeds of dogs mainly males. Your dogs heart deteriorates rapidly and he becomes anorexic and lethargic. This condition is fatal!

Older cats and dogs drinking excessively and urinating frequently could have an underlying kidney problem. 10% of cats over the age of 10 years will have some form of kidney disease, so early intervention is vital.




As dogs and cats age their nutrient

requirements change and this should be reflected in their diet. Some older dogs begin to loose their muscle mass and become stiffer, have difficulty settling at night and getting up in the morning. We have diets for the elderly dogs in Maynooth and Clane Clinics designed to give natural nutrients and amino acids to keep their joints supple and moving.





# **Editorial**

The Newsletter would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to two local figures who have recently announced their retirement from organising the St Patrick's Day Parade. They are John McGinley and Willie Saults. John McGinley in particular has been synonymous with the parade for the past 30 years and has been at every single one, with two exceptions, once when it was cancelled during the Foot and Mouth breakout and second when, as Mayor of Kildare, he was at the New York parade. Their contribution to the organisation of the parade, on the months leading up to it, but even more on the day itself, cannot be estimated. We would like to thank them for their incredible hard work in putting the stand together, organising the floats at Greenfield. There are many others who also help out on the day as stewards but John has been the quiet force behind the whole event for all this time. The Community Council is looking for people to become involved in the organisation. It is the biggest event in the town during the year, it brings hundreds of people onto the streets and fills the pubs and restaurants. Hopefully, this will continue.

The visit of President Higgins and his wife Sabina, to the UK and the Queen was an unmitigated success. The usual pomp and ceremony of the royalty was wheeled out in style and Michael D and Sabina seemed perfectly comfortable with it all. 'Historic' was the word used over and over again and it was. However, one wonders what the leaders of 1916 would make of our newly-found friendship with the 'old enemy' after all their sacrifices. What was more 'historic' was the fact that Martin McGuinness was there also and that changes more than the President's presence. It will be remembered in the future as another step to Ireland's growth to a fully-grown state – something that can take a very long time for colonial countries.

The Government's problems have been growing over the weeks, with the local and European elections looming, there are ministers being attacked and under siege all over the place. Water taxes, education, free GP care for children under 6, all areas of contention. The issue of paying for water has been on and off the political agenda for decades. The next wars may very well be fought for water so it is an important issue for the world's population and not just this little island. There are a number of problems involved in the water system in Ireland, it has had no upgrade for at least a hundred years and there is over 40% of the water leaking from the system. This has to be remedied but without investment this cannot be carried out, the neglect has finally caught up with us. Other problems include areas where the water is undrinkable, should they have to pay for water that they cannot drink? But we are the only country in Europe where we don't pay for water and in most of those countries they cannot or do not drink their tap water, they buy water and there is lot of water bought in Ireland over the last number of decades as well.

There is the accusation against this Government already that they are disconnected from the people and the organisations who oppose them. There are protests about the water taxes but the protests of teachers and doctors against ministers Quinn and White are less visible but a lot more important. Decisions seem to be made without much consultation or thought. The megaphone directed at Ruairí Quinn was probably a step too far and the

behaviour of the teachers was not exactly a good example to students. The silence of the GPs when Alex White spoke to them in our local Carton House was more polite but also contains inherent dangers. Is the Government in danger of a break up? If so what or who could replace it? Not a comfortable vista for some facing the future. Perhaps it is a warning again to those in power not to become divorced from reality, not to become arrogant and removed. Not to make decisions without consultation. These are lessons for all in power.

It is heartening also so see young faces interesting in standing for the various parties and groups. We know they cannot all win but we would urge people to go out and vote. Like independence, the right to vote was hard fought for and we owe it to ourselves to get up and to vote in both the local and European elections. Many of the more important decisions are made in Europe now and it is important that we are involved in that process.

Finally, last month marked the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the complicated and landmark case of the so-called 'Kerry babies' – the saga of Joanne Hayes. The newspapers of Easter Sunday, 22<sup>nd</sup> April 1984, carried the gruesome story of dead babies, not a sight welcomed by the maternity hospitals of the time, some banned the newspapers from the wards where women were nursing tiny newborns or mourning tragic losses. What emerged however was a catalogue of events that was part of waking complacent Ireland up to the way women were viewed and treated. All this happened just after the Abortion Referendum, contraception was still difficult to get, the Magdalen Laundries still existed quietly and the description 'unmarried mother' was still the norm. The detectives involved were the elite, the murder squad. It was 5 years after the Pope visited Ireland but this was the beginning of the end of supposed holy, Catholic Ireland. There were many demonstrations by locals and women's rights groups in support of Joanne and the local people supported her throughout.

The theories of what happened at the time were quite bizarre and there was a tribunal established to find out why the entire family made statements admitting a murder that did not happen. The actions of the Gardaí at the time were questioned and Joanne's sex life was dissected in public. We would hope that such a scenario would not happen now.

#### INTRODUCTION

In Leinster Senior College the percentage of students who acquired honours in both Higher and Ordinary level have achieved more success than the average in terms of results. # Comhaltas Ceoltoirí Éireann - Maynooth

Pictured at their annual St Patrick's Day Performance is the Maynooth Craobh of Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann – Irish Musicians Association – which was founded in 2012. Since 1951, Comhaltas have been spreading the gospel of traditional Irish music all over the world, setting up over 400 community-based branches, including 6 in Kildare. Many consider Comhaltas to be one of Ireland's most successful cultural groups, having trained generations of Irish to study, perform, promote and preserve that central element of traditional Irish culture, namely its music. Tens of thousands of youngsters have learned to play music on traditional instruments, while over two million people attend the sessions, concerts, festivals and workshops sponsored by Comhaltas annually.

#### Comhaltas in Maynooth

The local branch was founded in August 2012 by a group of Maynooth musicians, who had close ties to the central Craobh Chúlainn Branch in Monkstown. "We saw the success of the branches in Leixlip and Kilcock, and though there must be scope for a branch also in Maynooth", says Seán Treacy, Cisteóir of CCE Mhaigh Nuad. The hunch proved a good one, and 18 months later, there are now 200 active members.

While festivals, concerts and sessions mark the outward popularity of Comhaltas, many say the enduring legacy of CCE is its educational programs. It is the stated goal of Comhaltas, Maynooth "to bring traditional Irish music, song and dance into as many homes as possible in the North-Kildare area."

To this end classes, are held in the Post Primary School in Maynooth on Wednesdays 19:00 – 21:40 in a range of instruments - Accordion, Banjo, Bodhrán, Concertina, Fiddle, Flute, Guitar, Tin Whistle and also Comhrá as Gaeilge, to those who would like to brush up on their Irish. The classes are grouped according to ability rather than age, so they are often mixed age. Children are in the majority, but there is a significant proportion of adult participants. These include:

Parents who are learning an instrument alongside their children.

People with a background in other musical styles, who are looking to discover traditional music.

Students in Maynooth looking for a distraction from their studies :-)

Individuals with no musical background looking to "give it a lash".

The class teachers have an array of competition and performance experience behind them and several have the Comhaltas Teacher Training Diploma Courses. Class tunes are synchronised, meaning branch musicians work off a set of common tunes that enables regular sessions that are enjoyed by young and old.

There is a branch session in McMahon's Pub every Wednesday evening from 10, and junior session are held upstairs in McMahon's approx once a month in an environment suitable for all ages. All ability levels are catered for at these sessions

#### Comhaltas - The Early Years

CCE was formed in 1951 in Mullingar, County Westmeath by traditional musicians from the Pipers Club in Dublin and other Gaelic culture advocates from around Ireland. They sought to improve the standing of traditional Irish music, dance and language in Ireland, which had suffered due to a general cultural and economic stagnation on the island, and from the emergence of popular culture and mass media; a world in which Irish music had not really found a foothold.

The first Fleadh Cheoil (festival of music) organized by Comhaltas in May 1951 was poorly attended, but it helped set in motion a renewed interest in Irish music. Today the Fleadh is one of Ireland's most popular events: the one held in Derry last August, in honour of that city's status as European capital of culture, drew 430,000 people.

In the early years, the Comhaltas movement was complemented by men like Ciaran MacMathuna of Radio Éireann, who recorded unknown musicians in rural areas, treasures which would have been lost in a purely oral tradition. Sean O Riada, composer and arranger, was another who laid the foundations for the revival of Irish music in the 60s, applying arrangements and ensembles from jazz and classical music to traditional music.

Before long, every county in Ireland had a Comhaltas branch, while in Britain and Scotland chapters formed in Liverpool, London and Glasgow, and other places with large Irish communities. Eventually that enthusiasm spread around the globe, and today branches of Comhaltas flourish in Japan, Australia, and Argentina and in several European countries.

Irish traditional music has centuries-old roots and has drawn influences from African, European and American traditions – it is now available for you to tap into right here in Maynooth, you're very welcome any time to informally drop in to check out either the lessons or the session. 

# **Know Your Rights**

# Self-employed people and Jobseeker's Allowance

#### Ouestion

My small business is not doing well at present so my income has dropped substantially. Am I entitled to any social welfare payment?

#### Answer

If the amount of work you are getting from selfemployment has reduced so much that it no longer provides a sufficient income, you may qualify for Jobseeker's Allowance. You must meet all the conditions to qualify for this payment, including a means test, but you do not need to close your business or stop working as a self-employed person.

The earnings from your business will be assessed in the means test. The assessment must reflect the income that you may reasonably be expected to get from your business over the next 12 months. Income for the last 12 months will be taken as a guide, but the means test will also allow for any factors that are likely to vary. You should be prepared to discuss these factors when you are being assessed for the payment.

Your earnings over the 12 months are assessed as your gross income minus work-related expenses. Your expected annual earnings from self-employment are divided by 52 to find your weekly means from self-employment.

Usually, you will be asked for your receipts and payments or audited accounts for the current and previous year. For example, if you apply for Jobseeker's Allowance in May 2014, you will be asked for your receipts and payments from January 2014 to May 2014 and for 2013. However, in certain cases you may be required to show audited accounts for the last two or more years.

You may qualify for Supplementary Welfare Allowance while you are waiting to be assessed for Jobseeker's Allowance or if a decision is made that you don't qualify for Jobseeker's Allowance.

The website selfemployed supports ie has further information on the services and entitlements available.

#### Anti-bullying policies and training

#### Question

Our son is moving to secondary school soon and we're concerned that he might be bullied. Is there any advice available?

#### Answer

The Department of Education and Skills requires an anti-bullying policy to be part of the written code of behaviour in all schools. Each school must publish its anti-bullying policy on its website and give it to the parents' association. The policy must include clear procedures for investigating, recording and dealing with instances of bullying. The school principal must report regularly to the Board of Management and the Board must carry out an annual review of the policy and its implementation.

The National Parents Council Primary (NPC-P) and National Parents Council Post Primary (NPC-PP) have jointly developed a programme of anti-bullying training for parents of school pupils. The programme is funded by the Department of Education and Skills under the Anti-Bullying Action Plan. Each session runs for two hours and is provided free of charge.

The nationwide training sessions have been developed

specifically for parents, so they are not suitable for children. They aim to enable parents to support their children regarding issues of bullying. The sessions also inform parents about the Anti Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post Primary Schools, which are available on the Department's website education.ie.

You can find out where and when these training sessions are available from the websites of the two parent councils npc.ie (primary) and npcpp.ie (post-primary). The two councils have also developed an information leaflet for parents and you can access this on each of their websites as well.

Your son may find the website watchyourspace.ie useful if he has concerns about possible bullying.

The Office for Internet Safety and others have developed a booklet to increase awareness of all aspects of cyberbullying, including how to identify it and how to prevent it – available at internetsafety.ie.

#### Serving on a jury

#### Question

I've recently been called for jury service and I'd be happy to do it, but I'm not sure who can serve on a jury. At the age of 65 am I too old?

#### Answer

There is no upper age limit for eligibility for jury service, but at age 65 or over you can be excused as of right if you do not wish to serve.

There are several other categories of people who can be excused as of right, including members of the Dáil and Seanad, ministers of religion, doctors, nurses, midwives, teachers etc. You can also be excused as of right if you have served on a jury within the last three years or have been excused by a judge at the end of a previous period of jury service.

It is an offence to fail to attend for jury service without reasonable excuse.

Every Irish or British citizen in Ireland who is aged 18 or over and who is on the Register of Dáil Electors is eligible to serve on a jury, except for:

- People who are involved in any way with the administration of justice and
- People who are unable to read or who have a longterm impairment so that it is not practicable for them to serve on a jury.

You cannot serve on a jury if:

- You are not an Irish or British citizen
- You have been convicted of a serious offence in Ireland
- You have ever been sentenced to five years or more in prison or
- Within the last ten years, you have been sentenced to three months in prison.

#### Vaccinations when travelling abroad

#### Question

We are planning a round-the-world trip later this year. Should we think about getting vaccinations?

#### Answer

You should consider getting vaccinations if you are travelling outside of Western Europe, North America, Australia, and New Zealand. Health risks vary from country to country, so you will need to get advice about this well before you travel – ask your family doctor, the Health Service Executive (HSE) or your travel agent.

You will also find relevant information on the World Health Organization Country List. The HSE website has information on the different types of vaccines, such as those for cholera or tuberculosis – hse.ie.

Travel vaccinations are not covered by the medical card so you will have to pay the full cost for them.

Start the process of vaccination in good time before you travel. Some vaccines take time to become effective, so give yourself at least 8 weeks for full protection.

An early start is particularly important if you plan to travel with children. The BCG vaccination against tuberculosis (TB), for example, should be given at least 3 months before your child travels.

Some countries require you to have certain vaccinations and you will need to show an International Certificate of Vaccination in order to gain access to these countries. Other vaccinations are recommended and you can decide yourself whether to get them.

If you feel unwell on your return to Ireland, you should see a doctor as soon as possible. Give full details of the countries you visited.

#### RECIPE IDEAS FOR FAMILY GATHERINGS

#### **Lemon Lime Bars**

32 servings

#### **Ingredients**

2 cups all-purpose flour

2 tablespoons cornstarch

3/4 cup butter, cut up

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

1/3 cup lemon juice

1/3 cup lime juice

Sifted icing sugar (optional)



- \* 1/4 teaspoon salt
- \* 4 eggs, lightly beaten
- \* 1/3 cup half-and-half
- \* 1 teaspoon finely shredded lemon peel
- \* 1 teaspoon finely shredded lime peel
- \* 1 drop green food colouring
- \* Thin strips of lemon and lime peel (optional)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease a 13x9x2-inch baking pan. Line pan with parchment and set aside. In a large bowl combine the 2 cups flour, the 1/2 cup icing sugar, the cornstarch and salt. Using a blender, cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs (mixture will look dry). Press firmly into bottom of prepared pan. Bake 15 minutes (crust will look dry). In a medium mixing bowl whisk together the eggs, granulated sugar, half-and-half and 3 Tbsp. flour; divide in two bowls. In one bowl add lemon peel and lemon juice; in the other bowl lime peel, lime juice and green food colouring into other half. Pour the lemon filling over hot crust; bake 10 to 12 minutes or until set. Tip: Be sure to pour the lemon filling over the crust immediately after you take it out the oven. This will ensure that lemon layer sets. Carefully pour lime filling over lemon filling; bake 10 to 12 minutes more or until set. Cool completely in pan on a wire rack. Use paper to lift uncut bars from pan. Cut into bars. Sift over icing sugar. Top with lemon and lime peel, if desired. Refrigerate to store.

#### Strawberry Brownie Kabobs 24 kabobs

#### Ingredients

- 1 box brownie mix
- 2 16-oz packages of large strawberries
- 1 bag marshmallows
- 2 squares of cooking chocolate
- Wooden skewers, cut in half

#### Method

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and spray mini muffin tins with non-stick spray. Prepare the brownie batter according to the package's instructions and divide batter among muffin tins. Bake for 15-20 minutes, or until cake tester comes out clean. Allow brownies to cool in the pan for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Clean, dry, and cut the strawberries so both ends are flat (I just liked the look of them this way). Layer the strawberries, brownies, and marshmallows on the skewers and lay them out on a wax paper-lined cookie sheet. Melt the chocolate in a microwave-safe bowl in 30 second intervals until completely melted. Transfer to a piping bag or ziploc bag with the corner snipped off and drizzle each kabob. Transfer to the fridge to allow the chocolate to set and until ready to serve.

\* 2 teaspoons chilli powder

\* 1/4 cup shredded Mexican cheese

\* 1 plum tomato, finely diced

\* 1/2 avocado, finely diced

\* 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt \* 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

\* salt and pepper

#### **Mini Taco Bites**

#### Ingredients

2 tablespoons butter, melted

1/4 teaspoon garlic salt

1/4 teaspoon chilli powder

1 package (10-inch) flour tortillas

1 pound lean ground beef

1/4 cup diced onion

1 teaspoon cumin

1/4 teaspoon oregano

1 (8-ounce) tomato sauce

1/3 cup refried beans

1/2 cup finely shredded lettuce

1 tablespoon finely diced red onion

cilantro for garnish

#### Method

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Mix together melted butter, garlic salt, and ¼ teaspoon chilli powder. Cut tortillas with a 3-inch biscuit cutter or cookie cutter. You should get 3-4 circles per tortilla. Stack tortillas, wrap in a moist paper towel, and microwave for 20 seconds to soften. Brush both sides of tortilla circles with butter mixture and press into cups of a mini muffin pan making the shape of the muffin cup. Bake for 15-18 mins. Cool in pan 5 mins and then remove to wire rack to cool completely. In a large nonstick pan over medium-high heat, cook ground beef, breaking it up with a wooden spoon. When most of the pink is gone add onion. Cook 2 more mins. Add chilli powder, cumin, and cayenne pepper. Stir for 30 seconds and then add tomato sauce. Simmer until thickens and then season to taste with salt and pepper. Place refried beans and cheese in a small microwave safe bowl. Heat 30 seconds and stir. If cheese is not fully melted, heat until cheese melts. Place a small amount of bean mixture on bottom of each taco shell. Top with small spoonful of meat mixture. Sprinkle with lettuce, tomato, red onion, avocado, and cilantro. Add small dollop of sour cream.



# **May Gardening**

This is the month when gardeners will be taking advantage of the longer days. Watch out for late frosts. Protect tender plants. Earth up potatoes and plant any that you have left. Collect rain water and remove all weeds as soon as they appear. Open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days. Not forgetting to check for nesting birds before clipping any hedges. Mow lawns weekly. Apply a liquid fertiliser to spring bulbs after they have flowered, to encourage good flowering next year, and help prevent daffodil blindness. Keep a watch on pests. Aphids can multiply rapidly during mild spells. Remove early infestations.





Remove spent blooms on tulips, daffodils and other spring flowering bulbs. Install plant supports for peonies, delphiniums and other tall plants. Snapdragons and allysum can also be planted. Divide overgrown winter iris and order later flowering varieties for mid-summer planting if you haven't already done so. Don't forget to continue to feed bulbs after blooms fade. Soil around stargazer lilies should always be kept moist and mulched during growing period. Later in the summer a thorough drying will do them good. Harden off summer bedding plants in early May. Don't put outside if there still is a threat of frost. Plant lily-of-the-valley or other flowering bulbs around the trunks of your trees to enhance its natural beauty.





If you want to grow your own spring bedding for next year, many common choices are wallflowers, pansies and bellis perennis. They need to be planted between now and July so they will flower next spring. Winter bedding plants for the following winter can also be sown now till July. Divide clumps of herbaceous perennials that you want to propagate. Divide primulas after flowering, planting them in a back bed until they are ready for planting out again in the autumn. Divide hostas as they come into growth. Sweet peas training and tying in to their supports to encourage them to climb and have a good display. Pinch out the leading shoots on plants such as chrysanthemum and helianthus to encourage bushy plants. Liquid feed plants in containers every two to four weeks.





Prune overcrowded, dead or diseased stems of your clematis once it has finished flowering. Remove any reverted green shoots on hardy variegated evergreens preventing reversion taking over. Tie in climbing and rambling roses as close to the horizontal as you can. This will restrict sap flow causing more side-shoots to grow along the length of stem. This will produce more flowers. Twining climbers such as honeysuckle and clematis need regular tying in and twining around their supports. Make sure newly planted trees and shrubs don't dry out. Also loosen any tree ties that are digging into the bark as soon as you can.





Plant tomatoes, peppers and melons after all the danger of frost is gone and the soil is warm. Don't forget to plant tomatoes in a different spot each year to reduce fungus disease problems. Broccoli and cauliflower can be planted now in early May. Sow beet seeds an inch deep. Later you can thin them to one strong plant in each position. For faster germination of seeds, mix them with a wallpaper paste in a plastic bag. Then squeeze the mixture out of the bag into small holes in moist soil for planting. Pile earth up around your potato plants now. Mulch raspberry and black currant bushes with well rotted manure or compost. Making sure that you first water the soil around the area until it is quite moist.





Also not forgetting the pond, new plants can still be sown this month. To contain vigorous specimens why not plant them in aquatic baskets. Top the surface with gravel so that the fish won't stir up the compost. Avoid introducing goldfish to wildlife ponds as they will eat frogspawn and upset the natural balance already there. Remove blanket weed by twirling around a rough stick. Skim off floating weeds such as duckweed with a net. Please leave weeds on the edge of the pond for at least 24 hours to let any trapped creatures to return to the water before adding to the compost heap.

# North-South Cycle Route Corridor Study for Maynooth

As a result of Cllr. McGinley's motion the Area Engineer expects to be bringing Draft proposals for this much needed Cycle Corridor from Moyglare Hall to the Maynooth Business Campus before the Area Committee in mid May. The Area Engineer is the Project Engineer for the Scheme.

## Extensive Footpath and Cyclepath Works for Straffan Road Later This Year

Cllr. John McGinley has been pressing the Council to carry out improvements to footpaths and cyclepaths on the Straffan Road for some time. The Area Engineer has now confirmed to John that they have plans to get funding from the National Transport Authority (NTA) for extensive footpath and cyclepath works on the Straffan Road later this year.

#### Illegal Parking in Maynooth

Cllr. McGinley got the following update on his motion:

"The committee requested that a letter issue to the Naas Traffic Corps seeking increased enforcement of the red phase of traffic lights in Maynooth as drivers are increasingly ignoring the lights and are failing to stop. This letter was issued as requested. The chief superintendent has referred the matter to the superintendent in Leixlip for attention. The area engineer reports that the Gardai have been patrolling Maynooth regularly and have been issuing parking tickets."

# **Cllr. McGinley Calls for 3 Ton Limit Sign to be Reercted at Convent Lane Entrance**

Cllr. McGinley has asked the Area Engineer to re-erect the missing "3 Ton Limit" sign at the Main Street/ Convent Lane junction. It is now needed more than ever with the narrowing of the roadway a the junction. The 3 ton limit sign is still in place at the other end of the Dunboyne Road at the roundabout at Carton wall.

#### Cllr. McGinley Asks the Area Engineer to Address the Problem of the Maxol Hoarding Blocking the Traffic Signals

Cllr. John McGinley has asked the Area Engineer to address the problem of the new hoarding at Maxol blocking the traffic signals for motorists coming in the Celbridge Road to the Straffan Road. It is particularly hazardous for visitors who don't know that there are traffic signals ahead. It also blocks the view of pedestrians waiting to cross at the zebra crossing.

# Cllr. McGinley Calls for Safety Measures from Main Street into Doctors Lane

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"That the council examine the feasibility of putting a footpath from the Avenue Cafe as far into Doctors Lane as possible in the interest of public safety."

John got the following reply from the Area Engineer:

"The upcoming Part 8 consultation on the North/South corridor cycle route includes for a review of this junction and this suggestion can be reviewed at that time."

The Area Engineer advised Cllr. McGinley that the first Draft of the proposals should be ready by mid May

# **Cllr. McGinley Calls for a New Fire Station for Maynooth**

Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Celbridge Area Committee of the Council:

"That a proper location be identified for a new Maynooth Fire Station as a matter of urgency as the existing location is highly unsuitable and the state of the existing station is very poor."

John got the following reply:

"The area office reports that the relocation of the fire station is a matter for the fire service. However, there are certain elements of the north/south corridor plan for Maynooth which may improve access for the fire service to the road network in Maynooth. The chief fire officer reports that funding for fire stations is provided by the Department of the Environment and that there is currently no budget available for fire station capital projects including the purchase of sites. The selection of a future site will require the consideration of many different factors including proximity to risks, access and egress and a location proximal to where fire fighters live. It is accepted that the current site is not suitable and that facilities need to be upgraded but, given the absence of funding, there is no short term solution."

Clir. McGinley rejected the reply and stated that the condition of the station defies Health & Safety regulations for the staff. John stated that everyone knows that the Fire Station is in the worst possible location and that it was a great pity that the NRA scuppered the proposed new site opposite ESSO on the Straffan Road three years ago. John proposed that the Chief Fire Officer and the NRA be invited to the next Area Meeting to discuss this serious issue. John's proposal was agreed.

#### **Update on Dublin Bus Extensions**

Derry O'Leary from Dublin Bus attended the Area Meeting on 21 March to address Councillors Ouestions.

He would not entertain the proposal from Cllrs. Griffin & McGinley that the turning point for the 66 should be over the M4 at the nursing home site entrance.

He said that there were no safety issues at the Parsons Hall location even when it was pointed that the Council only gave Planning Permission for Parsons Hall if the exit/entrance was through Ashleigh Grove.

He said that Dublin Bus don't need traffic signals at the Straffan Road/Meadowbrook Link Road junction.

In relation to the 67 extension to Moyglare Hall he stated that they would have liked to have the turning point in Moyglare Hall. However, the schools offer of a site provides a great opportunity and the sooner it is available the better as far as he is concerned.

#### Enhanced Pedestrian /Cycle Crossing on Kilcock Road From North to South NUIM Campus

This project went on public display two years ago and

was approved by Kildare County Council at the March meeting. The works comprise the provision of a 10m wide pedestrian/cycle crossing located on a 40m long raised table. There will be a plaza on the northern side similar to that at the new library. It will be fully funded by NUIM

#### Taxi Regulation Office of An Garda Siochana Attends Area Meeting

Two representatives from An Garda Siochana attended the Area Meeting on 21 March to address Councillors Ouestions.

Cllr. McGinley pointed out that the "cherry picking" by Dublin Taxis was very unfair to the two local hackney businesses as their livelihood was at stake. John further pointed out that these Dublin taxis were a serious hazard as they blocked footpaths, cycle paths and indeed the roadway when people were exiting the night clubs

The two representatives agreed to address these issues as far as they could.

#### NRA Agrees to Remove Litter from the M4 Slip Road on Straffan Road

As a result of Cllr. McGinley's motion the NRA have agreed to remove the litter from the M4 slip road.

#### Jobs Boost for Leixlip Welcomed Intel Announcement is 'Fantastic News' for Leixlip and Kildare

Catherine Murphy, Independent TD for Kildare North, today warmly welcomed the announcement that Intel is expanding its operations in Leixlip significantly.

"There has been widespread anticipation of this announcement – Leixlip is my hometown, and nobody in the vicinity could have failed to notice the premiums being placed on housing rental prices and indeed car parking. # Garda Code of Conduct Was Never Enforced

Independent TD Catherine Murphy today drew attention to the Code of Conduct relating to Data Protection within An Garda Síochána, which although drafted and published on their website, was never formally enacted by the Minister for Justice or his predecessor.

The Code was agreed between the Data Protection Commissioner Billy Hawkes and the then Garda Commissioner, Noel Conroy. However, for the Code to be legally enforceable, according to section 13(3)(i) of the 1988 Data Protection Act, it must be laid before the Dáil and despite the apparently lengthy and detailed process in creating and publishing the code, it appears it was never laid. I have conducted extensive searches through the annals of Dáil Éireann —with the assistance of the Oireachtas Library & Research Service and can find no evidence of it ever having being laid. This effectively renders the code a soft guideline as opposed to one that carries the weight of full and proper sanctions.

"We have to ask why both this Minister for Justice and his predecessor never laid this document before the Dáil. Surely a Code of Conduct relating to such a vital matter as Data Protection should have been given priority in order to avoid the type of situation we now find ourselves in. Not only that, but the time, effort, and, I must assume, financial costs that went into the drafting and publishing of this code seem to have been wasted given that it has a limited legal basis."

"It would appear that the Data Protection
Commissioner made repeated efforts to secure
compliance but to no avail. There is also the concern
that there are other records out there, in various
formats, that are also not in compliance – what about
these? We are potentially looking at a tsunami of noncompliant records coming to light and the subsequent
chaos that this could cause to our legal system."

# Housing Needs Report Highlights the Need for Strategic Thinking

Commenting on today's report from the Housing Agency, which projects that a minimum of 80,000 new

units will have to be built to support the population over the next 5 years, Independent TD for Kildare North, Catherine Murphy, drew attention to the plight of commuter and satellite towns.

"When people hear 'urban need' they tend to think of the main city centres but consider areas like North Kildare where 2 big projects are underway – Intel in Leixlip and the Kerry Group in Naas. The area is under enormous pressure to sustain a huge population increase that continues to rise. Rental costs have soared and this is pushing many families into homelessness. Kildare is the fourth most populated County in Ireland; more populated than Limerick City and County but it doesn't have a City. Similar arguments exist for areas like Meath and parts of Wicklow."

"The housing waiting list in Kildare County Council is amongst the highest in the country, further adding to the pressure on rental prices and demand for new builds. Recent reports on the Government's new 'Construction 20/20' strategy have concerned me. It appears that in the rush to start building again, we are neglecting to take note of the lessons from the past. We need to look at strategic ways of increasing the housing provision that won't leave us battling another legacy of poor planning practices. We have got to focus on balancing regional development and housing must be considered in this context. Services and infrastructure must accompany housing development to ensure we create sustainable, functioning, communities that work long-term."

"Let's start looking at completing the unfinished estates; let's begin building the second and third phases of many half -finished developments, let's draw down funds from the Strategic Investment Fund to allow Housing Associations to begin building thereby alleviating the housing crisis whilst simultaneously creating construction jobs."

#### Minister's Assertion Regarding Housing Crisis is Misleading

Independent TD Catherine Murphy today challenged Finance Minister Michael Noonan's assertion that NAMA holds the key to the housing shortage. The Minister recently claimed that NAMA is likely to be the answer to the housing shortage and that it will be used as a form of development agency in order to produce up to 25,000 homes over the next five years.

"Putting all our eggs into one basket is a recipe for disaster. While it is true that NAMA may be in a position to provide some housing units in some very specific locations, it is not the case that these units will magically fix the current crisis we have in housing and to suggest otherwise is to mislead people. This solution to this crisis must be strategic, multi-agency and targeted. We need to address this crisis in various ways including new building developments for social housing, making funding- which can be leveraged from non-national sources including the European Investment Bank- available to housing associations, strengthening legislation in relation to the private rental sector in this country in order make long-term renting a more attractive option and we need the banks to start lending again to those people who can sustain a mortgage. I encounter people on a regular basis who are paying more in rent than they would on a mortgage but they just cannot secure a mortgage from the banks" "Housing is not just a bricks and mortar issue- we have to look at building communities that are sustainable, not just throwing houses up wherever land is available. We have to stop viewing housing as a commodity rather than an integral part of a functioning

society."

#### Allow Ballot Papers to Reflect Reality

Independent TD Catherine Murphy used her contribution in today's Dáil debate on the Electoral (Amendment) No 2 Bill to call on the Minister to allow for the inclusion of the word 'Independent' on the ballot paper.

Under current legislation, an Independent candidate is not allowed to use the word Independent –instead he or she is forced to have the term 'Non-Party' on the ballot paper or else choose to leave it blank, neither of which is ideal according to Deputy Murphy.

"The ballot paper should reflect the reality of the candidate's standing. Imagine for example, a party candidate not being allowed to have the name of their party included on the ballot paper – it would be unfair and misleading, the same is true for Independent Candidates. Candidates are under extreme pressure to ensure that the information they include on the ballot paper is accurate and factual yet they are not allowed to include one of the most important facts about themselves – namely that they are an Independent candidate."

"Given that only 2% of the population are registered members of a political party, and considering the fact that our constitution makes absolutely no reference to party politics, it seems grossly unfair that a person who makes the choice to run as an Independent candidate cannot include the word Independent – a true and accurate reflection of their candidature – on the ballot paper. I would call on the Minister to rectify this unfair practice and I have tabled an amendment to the Bill which would allow for this change to be effected."Minister's Presentation of Social Welfare Figures Misrepresents the Reality

Responding to figures released from the Department of Social Welfare today which claim to have identified savings of €32 million in 2013 as a result of social welfare reviews, Independent TD for Kildare North, Catherine Murphy cautioned people not to assume that the bulk of these savings were as a result of fraud detection

According to Deputy Murphy, the figures are being presented in such a way as to lead people to believe that there is widespread fraud within the Social Welfare system and this is simply not the case.

"I would be as in favour as anyone of ensuring that where fraud does exist within the system it is detected and stopped immediately however in reality, very little of these savings will have come from fraud detections yet the Minister insists on giving the impression that the inspections uncovered widespread fraud. Instead you will find that many of these cases were denied payment for a specific period of time because the Department implemented harsh criteria which would have resulted in people losing their payment for a period of time. Many of these payments would have been reinstated on foot of an appeal and in the meantime a huge amount of both administrative time and resources are wasted."

"Yet again the language of government is intended to mislead and confuse. The Government chooses to present these figures in a way that is less than an honest reflection of the reality behind the figures in order to suit their message. It is vital that people understand the way in which language is being manipulated by this Government so that they look beyond the headline and actually scrutinise the claims being made by various Government Departments."

# AMBULANCE SHORTFALL FOR NORTH KILDARE

Naoise has been contacted by numerous members of the Dublin Fire Service and Ambulance and Kildare Ambulance Service.

"I have been informed that even though the ambulance problem may seem like a Dublin problem, it is a severe problem for Kildare also. This is mostly due to the lack of staff in Dublin and that ambulances from Maynooth and the North Kildare Area will be stationed for the most part in Dublin due to the shortcomings in service to the city stripping north Kildare of services.

Many people are aware of the lack of an ambulance service in Maynooth on Thursdays but the issue is far greater than this. Ambulances are regularly taken away from Kildare to cover staff shortages.

With these further revelations coming to light, I am shocked and angered that the people of Kildare may suffer due to the shortfall in funding and staff in Dublin."

#### Ó Cearúil hosts Meeting for Local Businesses

Last Wednesday, local election candidate Naoise 6 Cearúil (FF) hosted a meeting for local businesses. The meeting was held in the Glenroyal Hotel and was attended by over 30 Businesses from Maynooth and the surrounding areas.

Dara Calleary T.D, Fianna Fáil Spokeperson on Jobs addressed the meeting on supports and grants available to local businesses. He stated that the Government was not doing enough to protect small to medium enterprises and that they were finding it tough at the moment.

Naoise ó Cearúil then spoke on his ambitions for local businesses if elected to Kildare County Council. He stated that "It is Local Businesses that are supplying jobs in these tough times. The only way for our local economy to improve is by ensuring the success of local employers". He also stated that he will lobby for more site visits from Enterprise Ireland and the IDA if elected.

Speaking at the meeting, Declan Kennedy from Brady's Clockhouse, said that "The rates are killing business in the town centre. It's far more profitable to set up in a business campus where rates are cheaper and there is an abundance of parking", he continued, "If things don't improve we will end up with a town centre devoid of small shops"

Rob Kennedy from the Avenue Restaurant highlighted the issue with the new upgrade at the entrance to Carton Avenue. He said "As Naoise has highlighted, the curb comes out too far. It is impractical for drivers of all vehicles, small and large. There was an accident within a week of the project completion. It has also added to the traffic problems."

Other issues brought up were Pay Parking in Maynooth, Traffic Congestion and Litter. In his closing remarks Deputy Calleary said, "You have an excellent candidate in Naoise, he will advocate on your behalf and will ensure that businesses in the town are listened to and consulted. I'm asking you to give Naoise your support for the next 6 weeks and you will have his for the next 5 years, that sounds like a good deal to me."

#### Ó Cearúil Launches Shop Local Saturday

On Saturday the 19th of April people are encouraged to shop in their local stores to give a boost to the local

economy. This is an Ógra Fianna Fáil initiative, Naoise is a committee member and organiser of the event.

Ó Cearúil stated, "We all know that our local shops are at the heart of our communities and we must ensure their success as a community. I would encourage everybody to try their best on Saturdays to do most of their shopping in local businesses. This might be your local butcher, baker or clothes shop."

#### Blind Bend between Beaufields and Woodlands

There is major concern over the crossing between Beaufields and Woodlands in Newtown.

The fence surrounding Beaufields creates a blind spot for pedestrians and is a hazard.

I noticed that the council have placed a red box on the road in an attempt to address the problem.

Naoise is looking to have the fencing and hedging surrounding Beaufields moved back to address the problem.

#### Issues with Moyglare Hall Estate

Residents of Moygalre Hall have been in contact with Naoise regarding proposed planning in the estate. Naoise has been advising and assisting the residents in finding an appropriate solution to the issue.

#### News for Older members of our community

I have been helping older people in applying for the "Warmer Home Scheme" which is available from the SEAI. This scheme assesses the home and insulates it to ensure that it is not losing heat. This covers attic insulation, window and door upgrades.

There is also the "Mobility Aid Grant" from the County Council which covers hand rails in the house and also a low level showers

#### A BRIEF HISTORY

Peter Nevin - Maynooth Local History Group

#### ST MARY'S ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH

St. Mary's was dedicated on the 14th of June 1840. It was a great occasion with 2000 people reported to have attended despite a seating capacity of 600. Many more thronged the streets as the celebrated Apostle of Temperance – Fr. Theobald Matthew, who preached at the ceremony, arrived at the market place near the Courthouse. The Archbishop of Dublin Daniel Murray presided at the dedication and the Parish Priest at the time Fr. John Cainen who was instrumental in having the Church built, led the ceremony.

The Church was the third to be built since the Reformation and succeeded a Church in Pound Street, currently housing St. Mary's Brass and Reed Band. The first was constructed in the area of Leinster cottages, long since demolished, but distant memories of some more senior residents remember stories of a cemetery in the area.

The new Church was a major enlargement to cater for Maynooth's increasing population in response to developments in the early 19th century. The Royal Canal had started operations, a new bridge over the Lyreen (William's Bridge) facilitated traffic and enterprise, including new milling and brewing operations, St Patrick's College was flourishing and Carton estates demanded a lot of labour.


St. Mary's appearance in 1840, which was described as "purely Gothic" must have looked somewhat dull. It was 22 years later that the façade was enhanced with the addition of cut stone and bell tower (as seen today) on the design and supervision JJ McCarthy, one of Irelands most celebrated architects of the 19th century. His other designs in Maynooth included the College Chapel and spire and the senior infirmary.

Further additions and improvements include the following;

- Austrian Oak Altar was installed by Canon O'Rourke P.P., who succeeded John Cainen. in 1869
- Canon O'Rourke was also responsible for the installation of a full piped organ (15 stops) in 1882. The Nettlefold family overhauled this massive instrument in the early 20th century. Sadly to state, this organ was removed in favour on an electric instrument in the 1950's
- Canon Hunt P.P succeeded O'Rourke in 1887 and during his period as Parish Priest, had side Altars added in similar style to the main Altar and mahogany altar rails
- The stained glass window over the south transept was installed 1940 on the occasion of the centenary and translates as follow"To our Lord Jesus Christ, Eucharistic King,

The Clergy and People of Maynooth with grateful hearts presented (this window) on the occasion of the 100th year since the blessing of the Parish Church". Dated 18th July 1940

In recent years the Church has been weather sealed and redecorated with the one of the finer additions being the Celtic styled impressions of the four Evangelists, on the centre ceiling.



#### ST. MARY'S CHURCH OF IRELAND

The historic Church of St. Mary's, nestled opposite the ruins of Fitzgerald castle of Maynooth, has undergone many changes since it was originally built as a private chapel for the Fitzgerald family during the Norman times.

As centuries passed, it fell into ruins during times of political upheaval and was restored during times of prosperity. As a result, today's Church is a mosaic pieced together from earlier structures, both sacred and secular.

After the Norman invasion, the ancestors of the Kildare Geraldines built a great castle on their manor in Maynooth, and in 1248 the Fitzgerald baron was licensed to maintain a Chaplain for his castle. The tower now standing at the west belongs to the 15th century, and the back wall of the church wall represents the last fragment of the medieval curtain-wall which surrounded the castle keep.

In 1521, Garret Og, the 9th Earl of Kildare, incorporated the castle chapel into a Chancery and College of St. Mary's. When the castle was captured during the rebellion of Silken Thomas, the land belonging to the Fitzgeralds was forfeited to the Crown and for a brief period the College became known as "King's College of Maynooth" before being dissolved in 1538, like all other religious houses under King Henry the VIII.

The present building stood in ruins until 1632 when it was restored as an Anglican Chapel for the 16th Earl of Kildare. However, upon his death in 1656, the castle itself was abandoned and fell into yet another state of decay.

With the return of the Fitzgerald family to Maynooth in the 18th century, the 1st Duke of Leinster restored and extended the castle and Chapel in 1770 and donated it as a replacement for the ruined Church of Ireland in Laraghbryan (the unusual wooden east window of St. Mary's was taken from that Church in Laraghbryan. At the same time, the remnants of the Fitzgerald council chambers were demolished and the medieval stone carvings over the windows were restored and incorporated into the present day Church).

Two further restorations in 1828 and 1859 of what is now the Parish Church of St. Mary's Maynooth is a testimony of the Dukes of Leinster. Between 1821 and 1875, the old tower was used as a mausoleum for the Fitzgerald family. The coffins of the 3rd Duke of Leinster and seven relatives, along with Rev. Blacker, are still housed in the tower.

The last restoration occurred from 1993-1998, and its present state of simplicity is due to the time, efforts and fundraising activities of the Church's parishioners and serves now as a place of worship, prayer and praise.



#### Maynooth Students Cycle for Charity raise over €00,000 for Prader Willi Syndrome

250 Cyclists and another 100 volunteers departed NUI Maynooth's Student Union at dawn on the morning of Friday 28 March to cycle the 400km round trip from Maynooth to Galway, raising much needed funds for the Prader Willi Syndrome Association of Ireland.

The group, Maynooth Students for Charity, are taking part in the annual Galway Cycle for the 27th time. The event has raised in excess of 1 million euro for good causes such as Jack and Jill Children's Foundation, Headstrong and Cystic Fibrosis Association of Ireland.



This year's cycle has already raised €10,000 is in aid of Prader Willi Syndrome Association of Ireland. Prader Willi Syndrome is a rare genetic disorder that affects approximately 100 people in Ireland. It is characterised by a chronic feeling of hunger, low muscle tone and delayed development amongst infants and children. In fact it is so rare that parents often need to educate doctors and other medical professionals about it.

There is a distinct lack of appropriate information available to both parents and medical professionals and the Galway Cycle is hoping to raise greater awareness of the condition, funding information packs for new parents and all those who work with people with Prader Willi. PWSAI was established and is run by the parents and families of people with Prader Willi Syndrome on a voluntary basis.

- Donadea Forest Martin was a part of the campaign that successfully prevented the sale of Donadea Forest. People Before Profit oppose the privatisation of our natural resources.

#### SAVE OUR AMBULANCE!

Since September 2012, no emergency ambulance has operated from the Maynooth ambulance base on a Thursday between the hours of 7am and 7pm. In March of this year, the Irish Times highlighted the death of Wayne McQuillan in Drogheda. Wayne died after waiting 40 minutes for an ambulance to arrive from Ardee. An ambulance in the locality was not available. How long before this occurs in our community?

- Martin, along with others, instigated a campaign 18 months ago to restore our ambulance service. The campaign has to date collected 2,500 signatures in opposition to the cuts.
- We are stepping up the pressure in the runup to the local elections, under the tagline: "Austerity Kills - Save Our Ambulance"?.
- Picketing every Thursday to highlight the issue, look out for us in around the county!
- We held a very successful protest in Maynooth on Saturday April 5th.

Martin, if elected, pledges to use his mandate to make the restoration of the ambulance service on Thursdays his number one priority.

#### NO TO WATER CHARGES

From January 2015, the government wants you to pay around €300 per year for water, when you already pay for water through general taxation.

Our demands:

- Abolish Irish Water, saving hundreds of millions on the installation of meters and consultants' fees.
- Invest in fixing leaking pipes, 28% of water is lost in Kildare every year.
- Invest in proper water conservation methods, like retrofitting of dual flushes, grey-water systems and water butts.

Proper investment in conservation of water will save us money, aid long-term economic growth, and protect the environment. People Before Profit will support a campaign of popular resistance to water charges.

#### LOCAL & NATIONAL HOUSING CRISIS

Due to increased student numbers in NUI Maynooth and the expansion at Intel, North Kildare is in the midst of its own housing crisis. Like in Dublin, rents are rising dramatically, accommodation shortages persist, thousands are in mortgage distress, and over 5,000 people are on the social housing list in Kildare.

#### We demand:

- Increase rent allowance caps and introduce rent controls. These are common in many EU countries, including Germany.
- An emergency programme to build desperately needed social housing. NUI Maynooth must also invest in providing affordable accommodation to students.
- Write down mortgages for those in genuine distress.

#### MAYNOOTH SCHOOLS ISSUE

Martin fully supports the Maynooth Schools Group's "One Community – One School" Campaign. We oppose Ruairi

Quinn and the Dept. of Education's plan to have two separate schools built on the same Moyglare Road site.

#### Our stance on this issue:

- The proposed new post-primary school buildings on the Moyglare Road should be one school, a Junior/Senior model with one identity and one management structure. No distinctions should be made between children attending post-primary in Maynooth.
- Provision for education through Irish (up to Leaving Cert) must be included in this one school.
- Recent developments suggest that delays to the proposed planning permission may mean it is 2017 before the new buildings open. This is unacceptable. Maynooth Post-Primary's current condition makes it unsuitable for the expected increase in student numbers over the next few years.

It is clear the vast majority of the community supports "One Community – One School", with 500 parents attending a

public meeting on this issue some months back. It is important that pressure on the Dept. of Education is maintained, through the medium of popular resistance, to ensure that the aims of the campaign are fulfilled.

#### WHY ARE WE PAYING PROPERTY TAX?

If you paid Local Property Tax (LPT) you might be wondering exactly what it is you're paying for:


- Fine Gael & Labour told us that the LPT would go into funding local services, administered by Kildare County Council (KCC). This has not happened. In fact the first tranche of the LPT has gone into the setting up of Irish Water.
- There are numerous unfinished or poorly maintained estates across North Kildare. Issues affecting these estates include lighting failures, pyrite, sewage and other utility issues, and lack of maintenance of communal areas.
- Public roads are in appalling states of disrepair across North Kildare.

#### Solutions:

- Abolish the Property Tax. It's not paying for local services - that's what general taxation is for.
- KCC must take responsibility for all estates where developers are bankrupt or not maintaining the estate.
- Investment in proactive road repairs. KCC's policy of emergency repairs only is completely inadequate.

# RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATIONS AND PROPERTY TAX

During the course of canvassing estates in Maynooth for the forthcoming Local Elections on 23rd May I was invited by some residents to sit in on their Residents' Association meeting as an observer and to listen to their concerns. I gladly attended, and will do so at any other Residents' Association meeting at their request. I heard how difficult the Residents' Associations are finding it to get cash-strapped residents to pay subscriptions towards the up-keep of their estates whilst also paying a Property Tax and Household Tax on their family home.

One resident on a road within the estate told me that Kildare County Council has refused to take his street into its charge. Residents of this road are forced to negotiate disintegrating footpaths and replace street lighting out of their own pockets while Kildare County Council cites unfinished business with the original builder. They are still required, indeed bullied, into paying Property Taxes for services they do not receive.

How many times have we heard the Minister for the Environment, Community and Local Government, Phil Hogan promise that Household and Property Taxes would be "ring-fenced" for local areas?. It has since transpired that funds were redirected to establish Irish Water, and helped pay for the installation of those shiny new water-meters outside your home.

On this subject, while I've been canvassing around Maynooth I've lost count of the amount of people who are angry that their footpaths are broken, their estates are in a general state of disrepair and the money that was meant to cover local services and supposedly improve their local areas has instead been confiscated to dig up their footpaths for water meters to allow the implementation of domestic water metering and charging of water.

With local councils having the power to increase or reduce the local Property Tax by plus or minus 15% I promise, that if elected, I will vote for the

reduction. I will also, in accordance with Sinn Féin party policy, seek to abolish this unfair tax when in government. If government is serious about reducing the tax burden on ordinary families they should scrap this unfair tax and the impending Water Tax.

#### MAYNOOTH AMBULANCE PROTEST

Don't get sick on Thursdays!

Due to austerity cut-backs, there is no ambulance service on Thursdays from the Maynooth Ambulance base between 7a.m and 7p.m. On 6th April I, along with other local activists held a protest in Maynooth Square to highlight this potentially disastrous situation. We instigated this campaign group to restore this vital ambulance service.

Following on from the recent Prime Time Special investigative programme, Minister for Health Dr James Reilly was questioned in the Oireachtas. Minister Reilly refused to acknowledge the grief of the families who have already lost loved ones as a result of delays in the emergency ambulances around the country. He even went so far as to say he's improving the service. Although how, in the name of God, cutting ambulance hours can improve the service remains unanswered. "More with Less", how are you!.

As a doctor James Reilly really ought to know that if hospitals are the heart of our health system, then the ambulance personnel and the service they deliver are its arteries. Their pay has been cut and their work load has been increased with many of these highly-trained professionals working longer hours under much more stressful conditions. As a result of the cut backs most ambulance personnel are driving increased mileage that could possibly be deemed illegal were they working in the haulage industry.

You may have noticed "Austerity Kills - Save Our Ambulance" posters in and around Maynooth. I am aware that the presence of these posters may be an affront to the eyes of some people, drawing attention as they do to an inconvenient truth. During the course of my activism on this issue I had the privilege of meeting a brave fire officer. This fire officer was on duty on the night of the horrific Stardust fire in Artane in Dublin, in 1981. He recalled that it was a very quiet night on duty that evening, when suddenly all hell broke loose. The rest unfortunately, is an indelible part of our history. This is the very basis of our emergency services. We won't know when we, or our loved ones might need an ambulance but when we do, time is usually of the essence. Please be aware that I will vigorously continue to highlight this issue until the service is restored.






