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HEREDITARY DEFECTS

Choosing a pup can be a difficult job. Firstly, the basic requirements are correct confirmation and temperament.

<u>Correct confirmation</u> - the bones, joints, muscles and their interaction

<u>Temperament</u> - can be inherited or develop as result of environment. Each breed has it's individual temperament, nervousness, bad habits and unpredictability.

The following are a few examples of hereditary defects.

Hereditary Blindness or Progressive Retinal Atrophy

This is a condition caused by a recessive gene. Both parents must be "carriers" of the gene for blindness for this condition to materialise. So this defect has to be inherited from both parents. This is a progressive condition with sight deteriorating over a long period.

Deafness

Recently at a Clinic, a 5 month old Boxer pup was presented to me. The owners noticed that the pup was following the older dog around the garden and would respond dramatically to light stimuli. The pup was taking no notice of sudden noises. After a few days of observation they suspected deafness. This condition is complete and incurable and is caused by a recessive gene.

Entropion and Ectropion

These are two conditions commonly seen in our Clinics. Entropion is a condition where the upper or lower eyelids are inverted (turned in). This causes irritation as the eyelashes brush off the cornea (eyeball). Left untreated it can cause eye ulceration and finally blindness. Ectropion is eversion of the eyelids (turned out). Both of these conditions can be corrected surgically.

Cleft Palate




This defect is found in new born of all species. This condition arises as a result of failure of tissues of the palate to close in the mid line. The cause can be genetic but also can be as a result of viral infections. The signs can be seen in puppy stage with milk dripping from the newborn as it attempts to suckle.

Milk is returned through the nose with froth. Puppies are unlikely to survive without surgical intervention and even then quality of life is not great.

Hip Dysplasia

This hereditary condition can be seen as partial or complete dislocation of the hip joint. The normal hip is a ball and socket joint with the ball of the head of the femur (the big bone of the thigh) fitting closely into the deep socket of the pelvis, the acetabulum. The acetabulum is connected to the head of the femur by a powerful ligament. In hip dysplasia the socket becomes shallow and the head of the femur

flattens so the joint is more mobile resulting in instability of the joint. The head of the femur can slip in and out of the socket quite easily. Puppies around 5-6 months of age with this condition show signs of instability of the hind legs with their gait beginning to sway and roll quite visible from behind. Pups spend a lot of time lying

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Editorial

We would like to wish luck to all the children who will be back to school by the time we go to print. We hope that Maynooth enjoyed the Festival as well. Tá súil againn go bhain daoine sult as an Fhéile thar an deireadh seachtaine deireanach de Sheachtain na hOidhreachta.

After the tragic death of Savita Halappanavar we have another case of a nonnational woman involved in an awful litany of tragic events. In this case the unnamed woman has survived, and of course her premature baby has also survived. Ireland has hit the headlines all over the world again for the way in which this case evolved. There seems to be no end to these stories, as soon as one ends another begins.

There are many questions to be answered as to how this woman arrived at the point where she was eventually offered a Caesarean section to deliver her 26 week old foetus. One can only wonder about what awaits these two people and how their future will develop. The enquiry may tell us more but the tragedy calls into question the efficacy of the very recent Protection of Life during Pregnancy Act (1913) and whether it should be revisited already. Some have been calling for the repeal of the eighth amendment to the Constitution that was brought in 1983.

A quick reminder: it came in during the Fine Gael/Labour coalition but it was emerged first under the previous administration of Fianna Fáil. It was passed by 67% voting in favour to 33% voting against. But Ireland has changed a lot since then and one cannot but wonder what would happen if this were proposed now? None of the issues of mother and baby homes, abuse in society in general or the position of the Church in society had emerged then. The mistrust of authority had not developed in 1983 and most people still trusted the ruling class in whatever form. What divisive issues would such a campaign engender? Do people have the stomach for such a debate again? After all the revelations and hardships of the last 10 years in particular? It does raise the perennial question again of how decisions are made in Ireland, who makes them and what is their agenda? This entire

debacle indicates an inability to make a clear decision and the question must be asked if this is institutional or is it something inherently indecisive in Irish people? "I will not make a decision in case I'm wrong."

But this story was quickly overtaken by two other stories: the possible victim of the infamous Ebola virus in Donegal but even more so by the death of ex-Taoiseach, Albert Reynolds, on Thursday morning (21st August) and this took over the media for days afterwards.

We would like to express our condolences to the family of ex-Taoiseach Reynolds and he will be given a state funeral as befits such a man. There was an outpouring of grief and of love from people of all political hues to the media on hearing of his death. Radio programmes were inundated with messages of support and condolences. Many features were mentioned including his family loyalty, constant tea-drinking and his hard-working ethic. But had he been somewhat overshadowed and under-estimated as Taoiseach and leader of Fianna Fáil because of those surrounding him such as Charles Haughey and most recently B. Ahern? He did not have the colourful history of either of these two men: he was a self-made successful and wealthy businessman who had many ventures behind him. His commitment to solving the violence on the island was unequivocal and he was a dedicated County and Western fan. That might not endear him to everyone but his love of the 'one page' attitude to business would be very popular today. Derided in the past, this has become the mantra for today. It was seen as anti-intellectual but now the 'one page' approach is seen as bringing the issue now to basics. A PhD student is expected to reduce a 600 page thesis to 250 words - not an easy task but achievable.

Finally, we would like to take this opportunity to welcome the new students, the First Years, to Maynooth and to the University and also to the returning students. Cllr. McGinley Calls for the Implementation of the Maynooth Parking By-Laws

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Maynooth Municipal District of the Council:

"That the Parking By-Laws for Maynooth, which were adopted on 23 December 2013, be implemented irrespective of what happens with the private car park adjacent to the public car park."

Cllr. McGinley Calls for Reduced Train Fares Between Kilcock and Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Maynooth Municipal District of the Council:

"That representatives of Iarnrod Eireann be called to a Maynooth MD meeting to address the outrageously expensive rail fare from Kilcock to Maynooth and also to deal with litter (dozens of glass and plastic bottles and an overflowing bin on 25/7/14) at the track at Kilcock Station."

The train fare between Kilcock and Maynooth is €5.70, whereas it is €4.35 between Maynooth and Dublin

KWETB (formerly VEC) Appeal Schools Decision to An Bord Pleanala

Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board (formerly the VEC) has appealed the Condition of a Special financial contribution of €726,480 (interestingly the Roads Section of the Council wanted this to be €1.946M) in the granting of Planning Permission by the Council for two new schools on the Moyglare Road. The appeal was submitted to An Board Pleanala on 21 July and it asks that this condition be removed. The Council in imposing the condition stated that it was "in respect of the purchase of additional land and the provision of a footpath and cycle infrastructure improvements on the Moyglare Road between the proposed school and the town centre" It is worth noting that the Planner recommended Refusal of Planning Permission and he was overruled by the Acting Chief Executive of the Council.

Planning Permission Sought for 112 houses at Dunboyne Road

Masons Homes has sought Planning Permission for 112 houses (Ref: 14/637) on the Dunboyne Road in the field beyond Castlepark on 28/7/14. They have 40 x 2 storey, 4 beds and 72 x 2 storey semi-detached, 3 or 4 beds. The application seeks permission to remove the bad bend on the road and to extend the public footpath from Castlepark to the roundabout at Blacklion Road.

Planning Permission Sought for 44 houses Next to O'Neill Park

A Planning Application was made on 1/8/14 by L.F. Properties for 44, semi-detached houses in the field to the east of O'Neil Park. It is Planning Ref: 14/660. They propose to re-align the existing road to exit on the Dublin Road.

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Maynooth Local History Group Present Talk By Mattt Kennedy on the First World War

A talk, including a Power-Point presentation on a little researched aspect of the First World War was given by Matt Kennedy of the Maynooth Local History Group on Tuesday 12th August in the Glenroyal Hotel. The talk focused on the passive easygoing and at times compassionate interaction between British and German soldiers on the Western Front during World War One.

Matt explained that throughout the four years of war it was not unusual for British and German soldiers to regularly hold shouted conversations and engage in good humoured banter across noman's-land. In one particular case, a British officer having discovered that his opposite number in the German trench had worked in a London restaurant prior to the war would regularly call to his now enemy by shouting, 'waiter' to which the German would reply 'coming sir'.

Unofficial ceasefires between the opposing sides were also commonplace. More details of such truces are only coming to light in recent years, as more letters and diary's from men who served on the front are been discovered. One of the more notable occasions when both sides laid down their arms and met in no-man's-land was on Christmas Day1914. The truce, which in some sectors lasted until the first week in January saw German and British soldier's emerge from their trenches to exchange greetings and presents. In one incident an officer in the Gordon-Highlanders, in a letter to his wife wrote that his men were given free haircuts and a shave while sitting in no-man's-land by Germans who had been barbers in England prior to the war.

Also included in the talk were examples of the compassion soldiers from both sides showed to each other, when in the midst of battle unofficial truces were arranged in order to pick up the wounded. For instance, after a particular bloody hand to hand battle in no-man's-land a Captain Roe of the Irish Fusiliers organised a ceasefire with his German counterpart that lasted four hours. Roe noted, 'as the casualties that littered the battle-field were moved to their respective trenches, not a word passed between the British and German soldiers. Once the work of recovering the dead and wounded was completed, officers from both sides saluted each other before returning to their respective trenches, after which the war resumed'. British high command was not always in favour of such humanitarian endeavours. A Colonel Hall of the Middlesex regiment recorded one such incident in which he was ordered by his headquarters to fire on German stretcher-bearers during an unofficial truce. However, he also recorded that his troops on the front line refused to shoot at the unarmed Germans.

Matt also took a brief look at the cause of the war, and the military campaign that took place across Belgium and North Eastern France from August to November 1914, which eventually stagnated into trench warfare along a 750 kilometre front.

A lively discussion on various aspects of the war, including the number of soldiers killed, including about 50,000 from Ireland concluded the talk.

Maynooth's IBAL Results not Reflecting "Best Kept Town's 2014" Outcome

Recent IBAL surveys have seen Maynooth's cleanliness deteriorate and it has now lost its "Clean to European norms" status. The approach roads were moderately littered and this very much set the tone for the majority of the sites surveyed. However, there were no seriously littered sites. With a little extra care and attention The Main Street and the Recycle Facility at Aldi could easily be top ranking sites. Tesco, St. Mary's National School and Maynooth College North Campus were all in very good order.

Approach from West: Grade B. There was definite litter presence along this old approach into Maynooth. As well as a wide variety of food related litter there was some plastic.

Approach from Dublin: Grade B. The road surface / signage / markings were in good order but the site was let down by all manner of litter.

Tesco: Grade A. (on the left on approach road from Dublin). This is an extensive site which has been very well presented and maintained – a complete absence of litter throughout.

Maynooth Railway Station: Grade B. Much of the litter at this site was in the car park – the interior was better served by litter bins and generally cleaner.

Main Street: Grade B. The most prevalent form of litter along the main street was fast food wrappers with lesser amounts of coffee cups, plastic bottles, sweet wrappers and plastic bags. These items of litter took away from an otherwise nicely presented Main street with wide paving and ornamentl trees.

Recycle Facility at Aldi: Grade B. With a little extra effort this recycle facility could easily get the top litter grade – some loose items of litter on the ground took away from a clean and well presented facility.

The Pound: Grade B. (parallel to Main Street). This was a somewhat littered site – cigarette butts were particularly obvious with other food items to a lesser degree.

Maynooth College North Campus: Grade A. High standards of previous IBAL Anti-Litter surveys have been maintained – this was an excellent site, not just clear of litter but very nicely presented and maintained.

St. Mary's National School: Grade A. The areas of the school visible from the gate and the area immediately outside the school grounds were in very good order and clear of litter.

Maynooth to Kilcock Road: Grade B. A site littered with sweet papers, plastic bottles, plastic bags, fast food wrappers and cans very much in evidence.

Maynooth: Joint 31st out of 40 towns / cities surveyed. Moderately Littered.

Minister of State Kathleen Lynch was Unaware that Disability Services Would Have Their Funding Cut

Independent TD Catherine Murphy has highlighted the recent cuts in funding to twenty six agencies that deal specifically with disability services, and in particular, the fact that these sudden cuts were implemented without the prior knowledge of Minister of State at the Department of Health – with a particular brief on disability, Kathleen Lynch.

During a debate on the Private Members Motion regarding Disability Services that was tabled by Independent TD Finian McGrath, Deputy Murphy asked Minister Lynch if she was consulted about the cuts to such vital disability services prior to them being implemented, to which the Minister responded that she had not been consulted.

Deputy Murphy, speaking during the debate said: "I do not know if the Minister of State knew these supports would be lost. Was she even consulted about it? I would have thought that would have been critical in terms of the delivery of a broad range of advocacy and support services through those organisations which, in turn, can generate quite a lot of voluntary activity. The Minister of State might say whether she was consulted in her contribution. If she was not consulted, will she give a commitment to talk to the Minister for the Environment, Community and Local Government, Deputy Alan Kelly, who is a member of her party, with a view to reversing those cuts because it is not a question of appealing them as they should not have happened in the first place?"

Responding, Minister Lynch told the Dáil: "I was not involved in the decision on funding but I had already committed to speak to the Department of the Environment, Community and Local Government to see what could be done. I do not promise anything. I do not do that, but I will definitely take up the matter with the Department...and it is important that such issues would be examined."

Anglo Tapes Add Insult to Injury

Independent TD Catherine Murphy said today that the latest release of Anglo Tapes is particularly galling in the context of a PQ reply received by her this week from Minister for Finance Michael Noonan in which he says that the massive debt burden needs no further review.

Deputy Murphy drew attention to the €5 billion in bank debt that will be bled from our economy over the next 11 years and simply destroyed, under an agreement entered into by this Government. €500 million will be destroyed in 2014 and this destruction of funds currently in circulation, will continue on an escalating scale until the total €5 billion is destroyed by 2025.

"In these tapes, Drumm and Bowe talk about giving the Board the 'ladybird' version. Well maybe Minister Noonan needs a ladybird version so he can understand that our debt burden is not in fact dealt with and rather, it is an ever increasing burden that is simply unsustainable."

"The confusion resulting from all these creative accounting exercises is what this Government relies on. They would have us convinced that they've dealt with the promissory notes and that they have wiped off €30 billion of debt when it is simply not the truth. Over the next 11 years we will take a total of €25 billion that is currently in circulation in this economy and we will destroy it. Not repay it to anyone, just

actually physically, destroy it. This was confirmed in the Minister's PQ reply to me."

"The Ballyhea Says No Group, along with some members of the Dáil Technical Group are campaigning not to have this money destroyed but rather to allow it stay in our economy thus negating the need for savage cuts to vital social services. To put it in context, €00 million will be destroyed this year alone, that same €00 million could go a long way towards stemming the budget overruns in the Department of health."

To ask the Minister for Finance further to Parliamentary Questions Nos 63 and 64 of 3 July 2014, his intention regarding the proceeds of the sale of the €5 billion of floating rate notes and €3.46 billion of Government fixed coupon bonds acquired by the Central Bank of Ireland last year; the portion that will be destroyed and to what specific schedule; the portion that will be redirected toward supplementing Government income and to what schedule; the total projected cost of the bonds, including all interest/coupons/final maturity payments; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

REPLY.

Subsequent to the liquidation of IBRC the Central Bank acquired €25bn of Floating Rate Notes (FRNs) and €3.46bn of Government Fixed Coupon 2025 bonds. The Bank undertook to sell the combined portfolio of the FRNs and the fixed rate bond as soon as possible provided the conditions of financial stability permit. The Bank also indicated that, as a minimum, it will make sales in accordance with the following schedule: to end 2014 (€0.5 billion), 2015-2018 (€0.5 billion per annum), 2019-2023 (€1 billion per annum), and 2024 on (€2 billion per annum until all bonds are sold). The Bank's recent Annual Report notes that sales have been made from this combined portfolio, with the Bank selling €350mn of its holdings of the Government 2025 Fixed Rate Bond in 2013 The timing of the sales is a matter for the Central Bank which may elect to sell bonds at a particular time if it feels that this is the best course of action, for example, in order to take advantage of favourable market

The Central Bank of Ireland is independent in the exercise of its functions. The issue of proceeds from the disposals and its impact on profit distribution is a matter for the Central Bank of Ireland and the Department of Finance has no role in those matters.

I have been advised by the NTMA that total cash interest payable on the floating rate bonds in 2013 was €38 million. Following last month's rate reset in respect of the December 2014 interest payment, total cash interest payable in 2014 is presently expected to be just over €50 million. The increase in interest payable in 2014 compared to 2013 largely reflects the fact that a full year's interest is payable this year. Interest payable on the floating rate bonds is currently projected to increase in the coming years, consistent with the projected increase in the six-month Euribor interest rate as the interest margins on the floating rate bonds are fixed. The interest margin averages 2.63% across the eight issues.

The Central Bank provides the Department of Finance with an estimate of expected surplus income to be paid to the Central Fund on a regular basis. This estimate will continue to form part of the Government's overall budgetary strategy. However, the level of detail on the composition of its profits provided by the Central Bank of Ireland to the Department is not sufficiently granular to enable the Department to estimate the impact on those profits of the timing of specific bond disposals undertaken by the CBI.

Question

To ask the Minister for Finance if, in relation to the €25 billion of floating rate notes and €3.46 billion of Government fixed coupon 2025 bonds acquired by the Central Bank of Ireland, if he will ask the ECB or Commission for a review of the economic efficacy that destruction of proceeds from the sale of said bonds would have in view of the fact that they form such a major portion of legacy bank debt, that this money is already in circulation, that such destruction would simply take this sum out of circulation; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

REPLY.

Under the original Promissory Note arrangement, the Government was scheduled to make annual payments of €.1 billion thereby putting significant upward pressure on the amounts to be funded from the market. Following a long period of negotiation the notes were replaced in February 2013 with a portfolio of Irish Government bonds which consists of three tranches of €2 billion each maturing after 25, 28 and 30 years, three tranches of €3 billion each maturing after 32, 34 and 36 years and two tranches of € billion each maturing after 38 and 40 years. The provision of these long-term non-amortising Government bonds to replace the amortising Promissory Notes has therefore had significant benefits from a market perspective as it ensures that there will be much less issuance of Irish Government bonds into the market over the next decade and beyond than would otherwise have been

The market continues to react positively to the restructuring and we have recently seen further reduction of the 10 year bond yields to 2.3%, far lower than had been the case before the State entered the EU/IMF programme and thus enabling the State to substantially reduce their cost of borrowings.

The Promissory Note transaction has delivered real savings to the Irish State and I do not consider it necessary to request the ECB or Comission to conduct a review of the matter.

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
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


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September, Not January, is the Best Time for a Fresh Start.

If you have a fruit or vegetable patch, you will be busy harvesting. It is

time to get out and start planting spring-flowering bulbs. Dig up remaining potatoes before the slugs damage them. Start reducing the frequency of watering houseplants. Clean out cold frames and greenhouses so they are ready for use in the autumn. Cover leafy vegetable crops with netting. Perennials that are dying should now be cut back. Clear dead leaves straight away as they can be a source of disease. Mow your lawn less



often and raise the height of the mower because grass growth will be slowing down. Also if you want help your lawn over the winter, you can apply an autumn lawn feed - high in potassium.



Sow sweet peas in cold frame or the greenhouse for early summer blooms next year. Also you sowed any spring-flowering biennials such as viola, foxglove or wallflowers earlier in the summer, they will now need to be planted out. The soil temperature is still warm so it's a good time to plant new perennials. Don't forget your hanging baskets - keep watering and feeding them and

deadheading. This will ensure that they will last a bit longer. When all the flowering is finished - replant with winter heathers and trailing ivies. Not forgetting to plant some spring-flowers bulbs in there too.

Wait till after the first of the frosts before lifting the tubers of dahlias and rhizomes of cannas. Late -flowering tall perennials - such as asters, may need to be tied up to stop from being blown over. To kill off any perennial weeds apply a product that contains glyphosate - this will ensure that the roots are killed as well as top growth. Remember to cover the plants with plastic first. Don't forget to check chrysanthemums for signs of white rust.





You can now plant and move shrubs and trees. Shrubs planted now will have the whole winter to settle in. Climbing roses can be pruned when they have finished flowering. Cut side-shoots from the main branches leaving a couple of buds. Thoroughly soak drought plants especially plants that are new.

Cover the surface of ponds with netting to stop falling debris landing in the pond as this can encourage growth of algae and weeds, which in turn could eventually harm the fish by reducing oxygen levels. Top up water levels when necessary. Remove blanket and duckweed. Any dead leaves should be removed as soon as they appear on waterlilies. Don't forget to check



submerged oxygenating plants because they can build up fast and may even crowd the pond.



In the age of water meters, it might be a good idea to install a water butt to collect water from your downpipe. This water could be used in the garden as well as other things. Clean and store away any garden furniture as soon as you are finished using them.

1 Mince Mix - Lots of Choices

Beef & Noodles

Ingredients

450g\11b dried egg noodles

2 tbsp sesame oil

2 tbsp groundnut oil

1 onion, finely chopped

650g\1½ fresh beef mince 1" piece fresh ginger, thinly sliced

1 fresh red chilli, deseeded and thinly sliced

11/2 tsp Chinese five-spice powder

2 carrots, thinly sliced

3oz mangetout



Serves 6

1 red pepper, deseeded and diced 6oz fresh beansprouts

Method

Cook the noodles as per packet instructions, then drain and refresh under cold running water. Tip them into a bowl, add 1 tbsp of the sesame oil and toss to coat. Heat a wok over a medium heat, then add the groundnut oil, when the oil is hot add the onion. Cook until softened. Add the beef and cook for 3-5 mins, until evenly browned. Stir in the ginger, chilli and five-spice powder and cook, stirring constantly for 1min. Then add the carrots, red pepper and mangetout. Stir-fry for a further 4 mins. Add the beansprouts, the remaining sesame oil and the noodles and stirfry for 2 mins. Serve immediately.

Meaty Macaroni Cheese

Ingredients

2 tbsp olive oil

1 onion, chopped 1 garlic clove, finely chopped

11/2 lb fresh beef mince

7oz canned sweetcorn, drained

14oz canned chopped tomatoes

1 tsp dried mixed herbs 11/2 oz butter

500ml milk

70oz cheddar cheese, grated





8oz dried macaroni 11/2 oz plain flour 1 tsp Dijon mustard Salt and pepper

Method

Heat the oil in a saucepan. Add the onion and garlic and cook over a low heat, stirring occasionally, for 5 mins, until softened. Add the beef, increase the heat to medium and cook for 8 - 10mins, until lightly browned. Stir in the sweetcorn, tomatoes and mixed herbs and season to taste with salt and pepper. Reduce the heat, cover and simmer, stirring occasionally for 25 - 30mins. Bring a large saucepan of salted water to the boil. Add the macaroni, return to the boil and cook for 10mins, until tender but still firm to the bite. Preheat the grill. Melt the butter in a separate saucepan. Sprinkle in the flour and cook, stirring constantly, for 2 mins. Remove the pan from the heat and gradually stir in the milk, a little at a time. Return the pan to the heat and bring to the boil, stirring constantly. Reduce the heat and simmer the sauce, stirring constantly for 5 mins, until thickened and smooth. Remove the pan from the heat and stir in the mustard and 51/2 oz of the cheese. Stir well until the cheese has melted. Drain the macaroni and tip into the cheese sauce, mix well. Spoon the beef mixture into a baking dish, then cover with the macaroni mixture. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese and cook under the preheated grill for 4 - 5 mins until the top is golden and bubbling. Serve immediately.

Beef with Garlic Potatoes

Ingredients

1½lb potatoes

3 tbsp olive oil

1 onion, chopped

1½lb fresh beef mince 8oz carrots, chopped

4 tomatoes, peeled and chopped

1 tsp cornflour

300ml hot beef stock

1 tbsp chopped fresh parsley and sage

Salt and pepper

3 garlic cloves, finely chopped

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C\350°F\Gas Mark 4. Parboil the potatoes for 15 mins, then drain and leave to cool. Heat 1 tbsp of the oil in a large saucepan. Add the onion and cook over a low heat, stirring occasionally, for 5 mins, until softened. Add the beef, increase the heat to medium and cook, stirring frequently for 8 - 10 mins until browned. Add the carrots and tomatoes. Stir the cornflour into the stock. Then stir the mixture into the pan. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Stir in the parsley and sage. Then bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 5 mins. Cut the potatoes into slices. Mix together the garlic and the remaining oil and season to taste with salt and pepper. Transfer the beef to an ovenproof dish and arrange the potato slices on preheated oven for top. Brush the garlic-flavoured oil over them and bake in the 30 - 35 mins, until the topping is golden brown. Serve immediately.







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

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

Pictured above at their annual St Patrick's Day Performance is the Maynooth Craobh of Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann – Irish Musicians Association – which was founded in 2012. Since 1951, Comhaltas have been spreading the gospel of traditional Irish music all over the world, setting up over 400 community-based branches, including 5 in Kildare.

Many consider Comhaltas to be one of Ireland's most successful cultural groups, having trained generations of Irish to study, perform, promote and preserve that central element of traditional Irish culture, namely its music. Tens of thousands of youngsters have learned to play music on traditional instruments, while over two million people attend the sessions, concerts, festivals and workshops sponsored by Comhaltas annually.

Comhaltas in Maynooth

The local branch was founded in August 2012 by a group of Maynooth musicians, who had close ties to the central Craobh Chualann Branch in Monkstown. "We saw the success of the branches in Leixlip and Kilcock, and thought there must be scope for a branch also in Maynooth", says Seán Treacy, Cisteóir of CCE Mhaigh Nuad. The hunch proved a good one, and 18 months later, there are now 130 active members.

While festivals, concerts and sessions mark the outward popularity of Comhaltas, many say the enduring legacy of CCE is its educational programs. It is the stated goal of Comhaltas, Maynooth "to bring traditional Irish music, song and dance into as many homes as possible in the North-Kildare area."

To this end, classes are held in the Post Primary School in Maynooth on Wednesdays 19:00 – 21:40 in a range of instruments - Accordion, Banjo, Bodhrán, Concertina, Fiddle, Flute, Guitar, Tin Whistle and also Comhrá as Gaeilge, to those who would like to brush up on their Irish.

The classes are grouped according to ability rather than age, so they are often mixed age. Children are in the majority, but there is a significant proportion of adult participants. These include:

Parents who are learning an instrument alongside their children. People with a background in other musical styles, who are looking to discover traditional music.

Students in Maynooth looking for a distraction from their studies :-) Individuals with no musical background looking to "give it a lash".

The class teachers have an array of competition and performance experience behind them and several have the Comhaltas Teacher Training Diploma Courses. Class tunes are synchronised, meaning branch musicians work off a set of common tunes that enables regular sessions that are enjoyed by young and old.

There is a branch session in McMahon's Pub every Wednesday evening from 10, and junior sessions are held upstairs in McMahon's approximately once a month in an environment suitable for all ages. All ability levels are catered for at these sessions.

CCE was formed in 1951 in Mullingar, County Westmeath by traditional musicians from the Pipers Club in Dublin and other Gaelic culture advocates from around Ireland. They sought to improve the standing of traditional Irish music, dance and language in Ireland, which had suffered due to a general cultural and economic stagnation on the island, and from the emergence of popular culture and mass media; a world in which Irish music had not really found a foothold.

The first Fleadh Cheoil (festival of music) organized by Comhaltas in May 1951 was poorly attended, but it helped set in motion a renewed interest in Irish music. Today the Fleadh is one of Ireland's most popular events: the one held in Derry in 2013, in honour of that city's status as European capital of culture, drew 430,000 people. In the early years, the Comhaltas movement was complemented by men like Ciaran MacMathuna of Radio Éireann, who recorded unknown musicians in rural areas, treasures which would have been lost in a purely oral tradition. Sean O Riada, composer and arranger, was another who laid the foundations for the revival of Irish music in the 60s,

Before long, every county in Ireland had a Comhaltas branch, while in Britain and Scotland chapters formed in Liverpool, London and Glasgow, and other places with large Irish communities. Eventually that enthusiasm spread around the globe, and today branches of Comhaltas flourish in Japan, Australia, and Argentina and in several European countries.

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


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Know Your Rights

Importing a car Question

I'm living in Ireland but I want to buy a secondhand car in the UK. What steps do I have to take when I bring the car to Ireland?

Answer

Within seven days of bringing the car to Ireland you must make an appointment to bring the car to your local National Car Testing Service (NCTS) centre in order to register it and pay Vehicle Registration Tax (VRT). See ncts.ie to book an appointment and for details of the documents you need to bring with you.

The car will be examined at the NCTS centre and the details will be used by Revenue to assess the amount of VRT payable, based on the value of the car. Revenue provides an online VRT Calculator that you can use to get an estimate of how much you will have to pay, see revenue.ie. You pay the VRT to the NCTS. You must complete the registration process within 30 days of the vehicle's arrival in Ireland.

You will get a receipt for the VRT paid, showing the new registration number for your car. You must display this number on your car within three days. You can buy registration number plates at the NCTS centre or at a motor factors. You will also get Form RF100, which you will need when you pay motor tax. To pay motor tax, you will also need to insure the car and have your insurance details. You can pay motor tax online at motortax.ie or at the Motor Taxation Office of your local authority.

After you have paid the motor tax, the Vehicle Registration Certificate will be issued to you by the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport. If the car is four years old or more it must also undergo the National Car Test immediately.

Student grant appeals Ouestion

I've applied for a student grant to start a college course this year but I didn't get the grant I was expecting. What can I do?

Answer

Applications for the Student Grant Scheme are processed by Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI). If you are not happy with the outcome of your application, you can ask SUSI to review the decision if there has been a change in your circumstances or if you think your household income wasn't assessed correctly. You can also request a review if you think you should get a special rate of grant or you think there was an error in assessing the distance between your home and college (which affects whether you get an adjacent or non-adjacent rate).

You can request a review by sending an email to support@susi.ie, making sure to put 'Review Request' in the subject line along with your application number.

You can also make an appeal to SUSI if you are

not happy with your final grant decision or if you request a review and are not satisfied with the outcome. You must make the appeal within 30 days of the final grant decision.

Complete the appeal form, available at susi.ie, explaining why you think SUSI applied the rules incorrectly. The Appeal Officer will notify you of the outcome within 30 days.

If your appeal is turned down you can submit a further appeal to the independent Student Grants Appeals Board, outlining why you believe the scheme has not been interpreted correctly in your case. When you get the written decision of the SUSI Appeal Officer it will include information on how to submit an appeal to the Student Grants Appeals Board.

The Board has 60 days to decide on your appeal and will write to you to let you know its decision. An appeal of this decision on a specific point of law is possible under the Student Support Act 2011, which says that such an appeal can be made to the High Court.

After-School Child Care Scheme Ouestion

I'm unemployed and want to get back to work but my son is in primary school, which makes it difficult to be available all day for work or training. Can I get help with childcare for afterschool hours?

Answe

If you go on an employment support scheme, go back to work or increase the number of days you work, you may be able to avail of the After-School Child Care Scheme. The scheme provides subsidised after-school childcare places with local childcare providers and is for primary school children aged 4 to 13.

To qualify for the scheme you must be getting Jobseeker's Allowance, Jobseeker's Benefit or One-Parent Family Payment, or be on an employment support programme, for at least three months.

If you get a place, you can get after-school childcare for up to five days a week at a daily rate of € per child. The scheme includes a pick-up service. You can get up to 52 weeks of childcare while you remain eligible for the scheme. If you use the scheme during the school year, you can also get up to 10 weeks'

full-time childcare during the holidays.

You can apply and get more information at your local Intreo centre or social welfare office. You can apply up to 26 weeks after you start your new job, take up additional employment or start your employment support scheme.

The scheme is not available to Community Employment scheme participants who can apply for the CE Childcare Programme instead.

For vocational training with an Education and

Training Board, the Childcare Education and Training Support Programme offers subsidised childcare.

If you don't qualify for these schemes you may be eligible for the Community Childcare Subvention Programme, which offers childcare at a reduced cost to parents who are disadvantaged or in training, education or low paid work.

Maternity Benefit

Question

I was employed when I had my first child and got Maternity Benefit. I'm currently expecting my second child but I'm now self-employed – am I still entitled to Maternity Benefit?

Answer

Maternity Benefit is paid to women who are on maternity leave from work and are covered by social insurance (PRSI). This includes Class S social insurance which is paid by people who are insurably self-employed. In this case you need to have one of the following:

- 52 weeks' PRSI contributions paid at Class S in the relevant tax year. For example, if you are going on maternity leave in 2014, the relevant tax year is 2012. Or
- 52 weeks' PRSI contributions paid at Class S in the tax year immediately before the relevant tax year. Or
- 52 weeks' PRSI contributions paid at Class S in the tax year immediately following the relevant tax year.

If you do not meet these conditions, you may be able to use your PRSI contributions from your former employment to qualify.

PRSI Class S contributions for a particular year are not awarded until you have paid the tax due for that year. Your income tax and PRSI liabilities (primarily for the relevant tax year) must be paid to qualify for Maternity Benefit.

Note that if you earn less than €5,000 in a tax year then you are not insurably self-employed. But even if you are not sure if you have enough earnings, you should always apply for Maternity Benefit to check whether you qualify.

If you apply before you go on maternity leave but don't have enough earnings, you may qualify to have Maternity Benefit paid retrospectively if your earnings exceed the €5,000 threshold when you return to work.

You should apply at least 12 weeks before you intend to go on maternity leave.

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

Fury as planning permission is granted against wishes of local residents

Residents of Moyglare, Maynooth are furious after Kildare County Council grants planning permission for large apartment block and vehicular access point on the Movglare Road.

A public meeting was organised by Cllr. Naoise Ó Cearúil following the granting of planning permission for application 14/73 in Moyglare, Maynooth. Over sixty residents of Moyglare attended the meeting in Maynooth GAA club where they voiced both anger and fear. The planning application in question includes a large apartment block in The Walk, Moyglare Hall, additional housing and a vehicular access point on the Movglare Road. There was no objection to the additional housing, however there are serious reservations about the new apartment block.

Over forty people objected to Kildare County Council granting planning permission and steps are now being taken for an appeal to An Bord Pleanála. The majority of objections highlighted HP6 of the Maynooth Local Area Plan 2013 as a reason for objecting. HP6 highlights how apartment blocks are not to be built outside the town centre environs. The new apartment block is approximately 1.5 kilometres from the town centre. Speaking at the meeting, one resident of The Walk, Moyglare Hall stated, "This will have a huge impact on my family. To be honest I will have to move house if this happens. I have a very sick child and if this monstrosity is built outside my house it will drive us out".

Marie Costelloe of the Moyglare Road, where a vehicle access point is to be located said, "If this goes through I will have people driving towards my house, looking in and shining lights into my bedroom at night. I've been living here for twenty five years and I never anticipated anything like this. I never had a problem with a pedestrian entrance, which is only fair, but all of a sudden there are going to be cars going up and down there".

Residents of the Moyglare Road were taken completely unaware by the addition of a vehicle access point. The planning application located on the proposed entrance never stated that the area would be transferred to vehicular access.

Fred Clarke of Moyglare Hall also commented by saying, "We never had any objection to additional housing, our issue is with a large apartment block, comprising of three shops and a crèche that will

eliminate all green area. Add to this that there will be balconies on the new apartments looking into our bedrooms and you can see why we are upset. They are also creating a rat run in the estate with this new entrance, there are speeding problems here as it is. We wouldn't have bought our houses here if we knew this was coming down the line".

Cllr. Ó Cearúil said, "I have been inundated with calls from many of you and it is clear the stress and upset this decision is causing. I organised this meeting as a facilitator and to clarify some of your concerns. It does cause food for thought that apartment blocks 8, 9 and 10 were ruled out due to HP6, but apartment block 5 was granted permission. To my knowledge nobody had any objections to apartment blocks 8, 9 and 10, all of the concerns relate to number 5."

Three separate appeals have now been submitted to An Bord Pleanála and the residents are now awaiting the outcome.

Gaza is an area 10 km by 40 km with 1.8 million people living there, the indiscriminate bombing is done to achieve the murder and the slaughter of innocent civilians. "

"Ireland has to play its part in leading a campaign to secure worldwide imposition of sanctions, including arms, against Israel until such time as Israel withdraws to pre-1967 borders. There should be an immediate lifting of the blockade of Gaza."

"The situation in the region has been allowed to escalate without a real concerted effort from the International community. Ireland has been complicit in this; with the Government deciding to abstain from a UN vote to establish a commission of inquiry into human rights violations in Gaza and condemning Israel for violations of international law. This decision was wrong and does not reflect the view of the Irish people.

"The Government's silence on the issue leads to complicity with the Israeli state, however the Irish people's voice, heard loud and clear here today and at other demonstrations is unambiguous.

- We will not support the oppression we once faced.
- We will not stay silent while thousands are murdered

We will not give up until justice is brought to our Palestinian brothers and sisters.'



MAYNOOTH SOLIDARITY WITH GAZA DEMONSTRATION

It was truly heartening to see over 120 people at Maynooth's solidarity with Gaza demo on Tuesday evening 5th August, especially considering it was held during one of the ceasefires.

We've all had our hearts broken with the graphic images on our TV screens and the scenes for those of us on Social Media are just more horrific than words can say. The Al Jazeera clip of UN Official Christopher Gunness weeping after the deliberate Israeli targeting of a UN shelter, killing four sleeping children would break the heart of a stone

All the more upsetting considering that we're not talking about an out of control gang of marauding testosterone fuelled lads on the back of open vans driving through remote communities. We are talking about the Israeli government who like to assume the role of a legitimate, respectable democracy.

The similarities between the Palestinian struggle and our own struggle here in Ireland and the "to hell or to Connaught" likenesses of land-grabbing, evictions and state murder are all reasons why we in Ireland empathise so much with people of Gaza.

I made the point on the evening to point out that to criticize the barbarity of Israel's collective punishment does not make you anti-Semitic. We all know that the Jewish community carry the scars from the holocaust but if we are to learn anything from that disgraceful time in our recent history, it is to never stay silent and to never be afraid to call out the barbarity of attempted genocide when we see it.

The cries of anti-Semitism coming from the team of Social Media hacks the Israeli government sprang into action, are a shame to the lost lives and to the genocide of their foreparents. They are a disgrace to the decent Jewish community speaking out against the apartheid

and racist actions of the Israeli state

As I write the current ceasefire is holding and this is of course welcome but the Palestinian people have been here too many times before. We know we cannot rely on our shamefully silent government after the despicable decision of our UN ambassador to abstain in the recent UN commission of enquiry vote on Gazan massacre. Neither can we rely on the international community to ensure that this peace has justice at its

We must also get active ourselves and it is for this reason among others, that we were emboldened to have representatives from Trócaire attend the demonstration. Emmet Sheerin from Trócaire's office here in Maynooth outlined how we can make a difference by boycotting Israeli goods. We know here in Ireland how successful the boycott of South African goods was during their apartheid regime and seeing as we invented the word no better place on earth to get the Boycott Israel campaign started than right here in Ireland.

WATER CHARGES LOOMING

September is the last month that we can enjoy the fruits of our generous rainfall without being charged through the nose for it. The myths regarding Irish Water have long been dispelled. We now know that if consumption is reduced that water charges will have to increase!

But by now we know water charges have nothing to do with conserving water. This is part of a greater agenda. The IMF call it "structural adjustment" and it is a condition of their loans. Privatisation of utilities and state companies and tax cuts and write-offs for corporations are now the order of the day.

It took rigorous questioning from Mary Lou McDonald and others at the Public Accounts Committee to uncover the waste that is involved in the setting up of Irish Water. But as we know we were hardly likely to get at the facts when companies associated with media moguls are profiting from installing the very meters for which we're being asked to pay.

The €100 million write-off of Sitesery's "unsustainable debt" to facilitate the purchase by Denis O'Brien so that his subsidiary Sierra (who carried out most of Maynooth's water meter installations) can install the very water meters we're going to be billed for was never going to be highlighted while he hires and fires.

Make sure you and your family experience a few nice deep bubble baths this month of September and wash

every piece of linen in the house. Water charges start in October 2014 and with showers working out at 25c for water consumption alone and toilet flushes equating to 5c a flush budgeting is going to be increasingly tough on families, particularly those with adult children.

Irish Water, or pull on the green jersey agus abair é as Gaeilge, Uisce Éireann, refused to come into Kildare County Council last month to take councillors questions. Such arrogance is seldom outmatched but outmatched it is. Remember that it was the continued mismanagement of our country by a reckless Fianna Fáil party followed lamentably by a downright callous Fine Gael led government that has caused this hardship. Charlatans the lot of them.

BACK TO SCHOOL & MAYNOOTH SECONDARY SCHOOL/S

The end of the summer means starting school for some and back to school for the rest of our children. With the news that the planning permission for the Maynooth education campus has been granted and the children starting secondary school in the present cramped building of Maynooth Post Primary these state of the art plans are very welcome. TIPS, TRICKS, AND WHAT'S NEW IN THE WORLD OF TECH

Digital Lock Picking: The Technology of Thieves' Tools?

Do you know where all of your keys are right now? A new app for mobile phones may leave you wondering if you really know the answer to that question.

KeyMe is an iPhone app that allows users to photograph their keys and upload them to the company's servers. Thanks to 3-D printing technology, you can then order copies of your keys online to be delivered in the post or in the US, walk to a nearby kiosk and print your own copy. The company uses a range of novelty designs to appeal to its userbase – keys can be cut with a variety of colours, shapes and designs. However, KeyMe seems to promote itself mainly as a security app, an usual claim given that it gives anyone the ability to photograph someone's keys and print their own physical copies.

The tagline of KeyMe is 'Copy Keys. Solve Lockouts.' What no one is saying, though, is that it isn't necessarily your own house that you are locked out of. It advertises that you can copy keys in 30 seconds, and if you are ever locked out and have forgotten to take a picture of your key, you can just have a roommate or relative take a picture of their copy and share it with you on the app. Again, the unspoken leap of logic remains — what is to prevent someone else from taking a picture of your key and making their own copy?

Andy Greenberg of Wired Magazine recently exposed the security flaws of apps like this, using





KeyMe to 'break into' his neighbour's flat. KeyMe and similar apps, such as the American KeysDuplicated and the Belgian Keysave, have become increasingly popular in the past year. Websites and news programs have increased their praise over the summer as KeyMe has begun expanding their market. This led Andy Greenberg to perform his experiment for Wired as few have been willing to address the elephant in the room: are apps like this a burglar's dream come true?

KeyMe has a page on its website dedicated to reassuring people about how seriously they take security and that only the key's owner can photograph and copy keys, but Greenberg proved that many of these claims were bogus. When his neighbour tossed his keys downstairs for Greenberg to let himself in, he had no trouble ducking into the stairwell and quickly taking a picture of the keys without his neighbour's knowledge. An hour later, after visiting a KeyMe kiosk, Greenberg used the 3-D printer to print his own copy of the key, and the next morning he surprised his neighbour by walking into his flat.

Greenberg, of course, was illustrating a point rather than being malicious or seeking to break into his neighbour's flat, but the point was well made. He only had the keys for a minute, but that was all he needed. Despite KeyMe's claims that keys must be removed from a keychain and carefully modelled to be scanned, he was able to get a workable photograph without removing the key while hiding in a stairwell. The photographic and scanning capability of modern phones, combined with current 3-D printing technology, has reached the point where even the fine mechanics of creating keys can be put into the hands of people who know nothing about key-cutting.

Leaving your keys unattended has always carried some risk, and the proliferation of 3-D printers and laser cutters has opened up a whole new world of security problems for people who want to keep their doors locked. In 2009, a group of researchers in Virginia created a project called SNEAKEY. Their goal was to analyse the security and privacy of physical keys and the ease of unauthorised duplication of them using digital imaging technology. Using only modest imaging technology and standard computer visual algorithms, they created a prototype for teleduplicating keys and were able to reproduce keys that they photographed from nearly 200 feet away.

Lock experts warn that you might want to reconsider hanging your keys from your belt or leaving them on your desk or at your table in the restaurant. Jos Weyers, a Dutch lock picking and security expert, says that people often don't realise how vulnerable their keys are, especially given how quickly technology has advanced. He cites an example where the New York Post published photographs of New York elevator and subway system keys in an article that, ironically, discussed the dangers of letting someone make unauthorised copies of the keys. A locksmith in New York had been selling copies of various master keys to New York City on eBay that granted access to subway gates, firehouses, traffic relays, the World Trade Center site, government elevators, and a variety of other important public access points. This practice was technically legal due to loopholes in the law, though he has since stopped after talking to the city

fire marshal.

However, for Weyers, the interesting part of this example was not the specifics of the case but that in an article discussing how dangerous it is to give the public access to important keys, the Post published photographs that would allow anyone to make copies of them using modern digital technology and 3-D printing. The Post quickly removed the photographs from their online article, but not before they had spread across the internet. In a similar situation, a news broadcast showed a close up image of a "universal gas pump key" in a story detailing how thieves could use this to install card skimmers into the machines at petrol station pumps. They failed to realise they were providing people with everything they needed to make their own. Weyers views these as examples of how available technology has outstripped people's awareness of the security risks it poses.



Weyers sees lock picking and computer hacking as very similar activities, and technology is further intertwining computers and physical locks. As both an IT security expert and a lock expert, he can see security concerns from both angles. He is a member of Toool, The Open Organisation of Lock pickers, a group of Dutch hackers and expert safe crackers. Most of the club members also work in IT security, and they recognise how apps like KeyMe and other computer technologies are starting to change the world of lock picking and security. While Weyers and other members of Toool have spent years practicing their skills, it is becoming easier for anyone to use technology to replace mastery.


This new technology offers many exciting and useful possibilities, but Weyers and other security experts suggest using some caution in this increasingly digitised world. While most people know better than to leave their keys lying around in public, they might not realise that letting their keys be photographed has become equally as risky. KeyMe and similar apps are not designed to be thieves' tools, of course, but that won't stop people from using them as such. KeyMe currently does not have any Irish kiosks, but they are planning to begin international expansion this year.

CLASSIC FILM REVIVAL: SOME LIKE IT HOT DIRECTOR: BILLY WILDER STARRING MARILYN MONROE, TONY CURTIS &JACK LEMMON



Mrs Brown's Boys D'Movie is not the first film to feature an unholy alliance between cross-dressing characters and gangsters. Billy Wilder had that premise nailed down in his black and white classic, Some Like It Hot in 1959. This iconic and hugely popular film was voted by the American Film Institute in 2000 as the greatest American comedy of the 20th Century.

Wilder's film opens in a wintry Prohibition-era Chicago. The local hood, Spats Colombo (George Raft) is engaged in a battle of wills with his arch-enemy Detective Mulligan (Pat O'Brien). Enter Tony Curtis and Jack Lemmon who play two down-at-heel musicians (Joe and Jerry) working in Spats' illegal speakeasy. Soon, they are reluctant witnesses to the summary execution of rival gang members by George Raft's hoods.

Escaping a barrage of bullets and The Valentine's Day Massacre by the skin of their teeth (their musical instruments are not so lucky!), the rattled musicians hotfoot it out of town. Here's where the fun begins! Curtis and Lemmon swap their male attire for more feminine apparel to join an all-girl jazz band on route to sunny Florida. Joe and Jerry are transformed into the decidedly unfeminine Josephine and Daphne! Enter into this equation one Marilyn Monroe as Sugar Kane (ukulele player, singer and gin-connoisseur) and the scene is well and truly set for explosive complications, major farce and mayhem.

What starts off as ostensibly a gangster movie quickly veers off into subversive and anarchic territory in the hands of Billy Wilder. The director's gender-bending, cross-dressing and farcical film was certainly ahead of its time. Some Like It Hot dallies with issues of hidden, misleading, confused and false identities: in this universe men dress up as women, men court other men and everyone (including the gangsters) seems to be engaging in some kind of subterfuge. Not surprisingly, Some Like It Hot was considered risqué in its day with Wider piling on the double entendres with scant regard to the

Somebody once said in relation to Marilyn Monroe that the camera 'loved' her. Well, this is especially true of her star-turn in Some Like It Hot. She was never more alluring than in her role as the kooky, free-spirited and lovable Sugar Kane. Her introductory scene is played to maximum effect. We see Monroe through Curtis' and Lemmon's eyes. As she sashays along the platform of a train station, the two men (in female guise) are dumbstruck in their admiration of this beauty. Even the sudden blast of smoke from the steam engine seems to bark approval! Lemmon's character, in particular, wonders how she does it – 'Look at that! Look how she moves! That's just like Jell-O on springs!'

The filming of **Some Like It Hot** seemed to be one of those occasions when all the right elements fell into place at the right time to produce a comic masterpiece. However, the shooting of the film had a chequered history. Behind the scenes, the troubled Marilyn was repeatedly late on set and continually fluffed her lines. Several takes added to the increasing irritation of her co-stars (Tony Curtis asserted that 'kissing Marilyn was like kissing

Hitler!') and Billy Wilder himself.

her scenes. All her musical solos bristle with kinetic energy, charm and bluesy sadness.

Monroe is matched in her fantastic performance by two stand-out performances from Curtis and Lemmon. Tony Curtis is a revelation in the roles of Joe/Josephine. The actor was not renowned for his comic ability when he landed the role of the womanising saxophone-playing musician. However, he carries off the part with some assurance and comic aplomb. He is equally at home bantering with Lemmon's frenetic Jerry/Daphne or romancing Monroe in his third identity as a Shell Oil millionaire. Their love scenes are quite intense for the

The real star, though, of **Some Like It Hot** is Jack Lemmon. Unlike Curtis who found the drag aspect to his role daunting, Lemmon took to the cross-dressing



shenanigans like a duck to water! He fully embraced his feminine side and is clearly having a whale of a time. Jerry/Daphne soon attracts the attention of the hands-on millionaire, Osgood (a very funny Joe E. Brown). Daphne and Osgood's interplay involve some of the most hilarious moments in film history. This leads to all sorts of complications for Lemmon's character as he begins to buy into the Judicrousness of his situation!

The extent of his delusion is revealed half way through the film in some heated and hilarious exchanges with his buddy Joe. For Lemmon's Daphne accepts a proposal of marriage from the lecherous Osgood and fully intends going through with it! In answer to Curtis's retort – 'Why would a guy wanna marry a guy!'—Lemmon quips back 'Security!'

Lemmon is wickedly funny in the role of Daphne. He employs some priceless facial expressions and biting comments (taking acute pleasure in the taunting of Curtis as he pursues the sexy Sugar Kane) to produce a truly memorable character. After 55 years, Some Like It Hot has lost none of its freshness, charm, wit and fun due in large measure to a word-perfect script by Wilder, wondrous comic timing and brilliant performances by its all-star cast. A film for all ages and times.

The prestigious Galway Film Fleadh which highlights the best in Irish and International cinema was held in July. Film buffs and people in the industry thronged to the beautiful Town Hall theatre for a feast of celluloid magic. The outstanding film of the Fleadh was definitely One Million Dubliners. The Big Films making their way to a cinema near you include: The Grand Seduction (Brendan Gleeson); A Most Wanted Man (starring the late Philip Seymour Hoffman); Dracula Untold; Before I Go To Sleep (Colin Firth & Nicole Kidman); the final instalments of The Hobbit and The Hunger Games.


