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
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Exercise and Play for your Dog

Henry Ford once said of exercise "if you are well you don't need it and if you are sick you shouldn't do it"! Today we tend to take a more holistic view of exercise.

Play and exercise for your dog are very important both for their good health and as an ideal way to help socialise them. Lack of



exercise can result in behavioural problems such as digging, chewing, over excitability and general unruliness. Walking your dog is a great way to relax and get some exercise for yourself. If you are starting to walk your new puppy please ensure that he has completed his course of vaccinations at least one week before you take him out in public. Before you reach this stage you can introduce him to short spells of lead work in your garden. Place your puppy on a lead and with small treats or a favourite toy, encourage him to follow you. This early training is an ideal way to get your puppy to interact with you and also gives you an opportunity to show that you are the leader and the one who controls the activity.

It is very important to consider how much exercise your dog needs. The important factors are:

• Age – young dogs require much more exercise than older ones.

• Breed – toy breeds will require less exercise than working breeds who can sustain long periods of activity. One of my own dogs, a retriever, will swim for long periods and will then look for a walk as if she has done no exercise.

Health - if your dog has a known health problem, for example a heart

condition, this has to be allowed for in his exercise programme.

It is quite common when a dog is presented at Maynooth Veterinary Clinic for the owner to say that he is not willing to exercise as he used to. This can sometimes be the early signs of arthritis but many other conditions have to be considered as well.

• Diet – we have seen cases where dogs are losing weight due to over exercise and an insufficient diet. It is very important that your dog's energy requirements are provided in his diet. At Maynooth Veterinary Clinic, Newtown Grove, we are very happy to advise on this matter.

• Routine – your dog should be exercised every day. Some dogs will require a morning and evening walk. It is helpful to vary the route and activity that you take them on as this provides stimulation and helps them to socialise. It is now clear that your dogs exercise requirements are very much an individual matter that need some thought. It is important that the type of play and exercise that you engage your dog in is controlled by you. A dog that becomes over excited is difficult to control and it is unwise to let him think that he is the one who is in charge. Games such as "chase" can be great fun but you have to consider whether you are interfering with other peoples recreational enjoyment.

Exercise and play for your dog should be an enjoyable and beneficial activity for both dog and owner. As humans we are all guilty of letting it lapse occasionally but hopefully this article will prompt us to address this matter.

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

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Community Council Notes

Notes from Maynooth Community Council Meeting of Monday 12th October 2015 held in Maynooth Community Space at 8pm.

St. Patrick's Day and St. Patrick's Foundation Breakfast - Proposed plans for 2016

Keith McCrory addressed the meeting and requested support from Maynooth Community Council for an idea to include the St. Patrick's Foundation involvement in St. Patrick's Day. Naoise O Cearúil (St. Patrick's Day Parade) and Keith are working together on a plan. The idea is to try to create a venue near where the Parade ends. Carton House has been a fantastic venue in the past but it would be more apt to have the venue near the parade for 2016.

It was proposed to have:

- A (8.30-9.45am) in a marquee in the Carton Retail Car Park
- An international lunch celebrating different cultures Irish and Northern Irish in 2016
- Various activities would be included family fun activities and community groups would be involved
- It would finish off at 6pm with a concert.

It would be a partnership between the Maynooth Community Council, The Parade Committee and St. Patrick's Foundation representatives. There was some discussion around funding, grants and charges. Some aspects of the day would be ticketed with a mind to affordability. Maynooth Community Council supported the proposal - planning to proceed.

TLC Christmas Programme

Events - New developments

A proposal: To form a sub-committee for the development of Events and Arts in Maynooth Town. The proposal was put forward by Jacqueline Farrell (MCC). "The purpose of this committee will be to create a network of local artists, crafts people, musicians, dance and drama groups, and showcase our local talent to its best at year round events ... "

The proposal was welcomed and endorsed by MCC.

Festivals Committee

Paul Daly outlined the proposed new calendar that will be coming out for Christmas. The calendar is a collection of Maynooth photographs that were submitted during the Maynooth Summer Festival for an online exhibition. Proceeds will go to Maynooth Vincent de Paul. There will be a Christmas Fair on 5/6 December in Maynooth Castle. It is proposed to have 25-35 crafts people from the Maynooth community. This is to showcase Maynooth talents and to encourage people to shop locally.

A calendar of events will be devised which will showcase all that is going on such as the Maynooth Festival, Christmas Fair, St. Patrick's Day Parade and more. This was especially welcomed as various groups run fundraising events throughout the year resulting in overlapping of dates. A calendar would ensure that each event would garner as much support as possible at a given time.

These initiatives were warmly welcomed and encouraged by the membership. Volunteers will be needed to see it all through. It was also proposed that the Maynooth Students' Union Newsletter include the calendar of events if not on the first page then page three.

Andrew McMullon steps down as Festival chairman

Andrew McMullon informed the meeting that he was stepping down as chair of the festival committee due to work commitments. Andrew was chair for the last fifteen years. Thanks were expressed to Andrew on his hard work with the committee down through the years and that only for him the festival may have folded. He got it through every year. His commitment, good humour and patience stood him in good stead and he had been a great support to new members who came on board the festival committee. Andrew nominated Paul Daly to take over as Festival Chairman which was agreed. There was a round of applause.

Local Matters Tidy Towns

Congratulations to Maynooth Tidy Towns on achieving a now taken on more students and teachers. silver reward for the town of Maynooth. They are delighted with the progress that the group have made with two bronze in 2013 and 2014 respectively and the silver in 2015. Thanks was expressed to all who helped - the Sunday morning, Saturday and Wednesday volunteers, Maynooth Community Council Festival Committee, Fleadh Committee, the business community, and the local area engineer. Marian McCauley was also thanked for her work on collecting for recycling. Oil Pollution in the Joan Slade River was reported to the local Engineer - in hand.

Maynooth Senior Citizens Golden Jubilee celebrations were a great success. Over 200 people attended. There was an ecumenical service and the launch of their book to mark the event in the Scouts Hall followed by refreshments in the Glenroyal. The presence of the Circus in the Harbour Field did not deter the celebrations!

A Tea Dance was held on Sunday 18 October. The Tony Smith Walk will take place on 22 November. Cards and tickets will be available in the coming week. The annual Sale of Work will take place on the 15 November in the Aula Maxima, Maynooth University.

Know Your Rights

Free legal advice

Question

I need legal advice on separating from my husband but I can't afford to go to a solicitor. Where can I get help?

Answer

Free Legal Advice Centres (FLAC) is an organisation that promotes equal access to justice for all. You can access basic, confidential and free legal advice across all areas of law in a network of centres around Ireland. These are usually located in the local Citizens Information Centre. Some are drop-in clinics, where you will be seen on a first-come, first-served basis. Other clinics are by appointment only, and you will have to call in advance to book a place.

When you visit a FLAC clinic you should bring along any relevant documentation or correspondence. You will meet a volunteer lawyer – either a solicitor or a barrister. You can ask a question on any area of law. However if you have already consulted a solicitor about the same matter, the volunteer adviser cannot offer guidance on that issue.

Your volunteer adviser will help you to establish whether there is a legal solution to your problem, explain what options are open to you and direct you to further assistance where appropriate.

Volunteer advisers cannot provide legal representation, which means they cannot take a case for you or go to court on your behalf. They also cannot refer you to a lawyer in private practice, so you should contact the Law Society for a list of solicitors in your area or for a particular area of law.

If you have a low income, you may be eligible for legal assistance from the State on a civil matter. The Legal Aid Board is responsible for the provision of civil legal aid and advice. Your FLAC adviser can help to establish this and you may then go to your local law centre to apply for civil legal aid. You will then have to undergo a means test and a merits test.

For criminal matters, there is a separate State criminal legal aid scheme, operated through the courts and administered by the Legal Aid Board.

Funding for college

Question

I'm unemployed and thinking about going to college. What funding is available for this?

Answer

Most undergraduate students attending publicly funded third-level courses for the first time will qualify for the Free Fees Initiative. You must meet criteria as regards residence, nationality and immigration status, as well as course requirements. If you qualify for free fees you do not have to pay tuition fees. There is a separate Student Contribution, which you pay to the college.

The student grant is the main financial support for students. The grant can cover all or part of your fees (if they are not already covered), the Student Contribution and provide some maintenance. To qualify for a grant, you and your course must meet certain criteria and you must pass a means test.

The Back to Education Allowance is available to people who have been getting certain social welfare payments for a set period of time before starting their course. You cannot get a Back to Education Allowance and the maintenance portion of a student grant at the same time. If you are eligible for both, you should find out which would be of more benefit to you.

The Free Fees Initiative, the student grant and the Back to Education Allowance all have rules regarding progression from previous studies. However, there are exceptions. If you intend to start a course at a level you have studied before, you should check out whether the rules on progression apply to your situation. If you do not qualify for the Free Fees Initiative or the student grant you should find out whether Springboard can help you to return to education. Springboard provides free higher education courses for people who are unemployed.

If you have to pay tuition fees and a Student Contribution, you may qualify for tax relief. You can find out more about sources of funding, including the Student Assistance Fund for students experiencing financial hardship, on studentfinance.ie.

Noisy neighbours

Question

Our new neighbours often have noisy parties and keep our children awake at nights. We don't want to call the Gardaí but what else can we do?

Answer

Noise nuisance can be a really difficult problem, especially if your family's sleep is disturbed. The Gardaí may ask someone to lower the noise coming from a dwelling but they do not have the power to enter a dwelling with the intention of simply asking someone to lower the noise.

There is a useful leaflet published by the Free Legal Advice Centres (FLAC), which covers issues (including noise) that arise between neighbours. FLAC recommends that you should first talk to your neighbours about the noise and explain how it is affecting your family. Keep a note of these discussions. You can also keep a noise diary, noting type of noise, time, date and duration and its effects on your family.

If this doesn't work, you can write to your neighbours, giving details of the noise and its effects. You may wish to suggest mediation and/or legal action if the matter cannot be resolved. Keep copies of all correspondence.

If the neighbours are tenants and you don't get a satisfactory response from them, you can complain to the landlord – whether this is a private landlord, a local authority or a housing association.

Private tenants have an obligation not to engage in antisocial behaviour, which includes persistent noise that interferes with the peaceful occupation of other dwellings. You may complain to the Private Residential Tenancies Board (PRTB) if the landlord fails to enforce this obligation.

Tenants of local authority housing are also obliged to avoid any nuisance (including noise) to the occupiers of any other dwelling. If the noise persists, the tenants are in breach of their tenancy agreement and the local authority can take steps to enforce the terms of the agreement.

If the noise continues to be a problem, you can complain to the District Court about it. You must then serve notice on your noisy neighbours, using the Environmental Protection Agency Act 1992 - noise form of notice. If the court finds in your favour, it can order your neighbours to take measures to prevent or limit the noise.

Definition of refugee

Question

I'm not very clear on the difference between an asylum seeker and a refugee. Can you explain?

Answer

The term refugee is commonly used to describe several categories of people. These categories of people may have different legal statuses and, as a result, they may have varying rights and obligations. The 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees (often called the Geneva Convention) is the key legal document in defining who is a refugee, their rights and the legal obligations of states.

A refugee in Irish law is someone who "owing to a wellfounded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group or political opinion, is outside the country of his or her nationality and is unable or, owing to such fear, unwilling to avail himself or herself of the protection of that country..." (Section 2 of the Refugee Act 1996 which mirrors Article 1 of the Geneva Convention).

• An asylum seeker is a person who seeks to be recognised as a refugee.

• A convention refugee is a person who has been granted refugee status under the terms of the Geneva Convention.

• A programme refugee is a person who has been invited to Ireland under a Government decision in response to a humanitarian request, usually from the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

You can read updates on resettlement and relocation programmes on the Department of Justice and Equality's website, justice.ie.

Someone who is applying to be recognised as a refugee may also make an application for subsidiary protection. A person eligible for subsidiary protection is someone who does not qualify as a refugee but who would face a real risk of suffering serious harm if they returned to their country of origin. A person who does not fully meet the requirements of the definition of refugee may be granted leave to remain in the State for humanitarian or other compelling reasons. Leave to remain may also be granted to people who have been refused a declaration as a refugee and are not eligible for subsidiary protection.

Maynooth Pay Parking By-Laws

Cllr. McGinley again demanded at the Maynooth Municipal District (MD) meeting of the Council on 15 October that the Parking By-Laws for Maynooth be implemented without any further delay.

He pointed out that as the proposed Water Works on the Back Lane would not start until June 2016, that the rest of the pay parking should commence now. The new Director of Services, Niall Morrissey, told Cllr. McGinley that he would examine how long the Water Works in the Back Lane would take and that he would get back to John in a few days.

Traffic Management Plan for Maynooth

Cllr. McGinley was advised at the Maynooth MD meeting on 15 October that "The tender documents for the procurement process are being reviewed at present and the project is expected to be tendered shortly."

Straffan Road/ Meadowbrook Link Road Junction

Cllr. John McGinley sent the following E mail to Councils Roads Senior Executive Engineer on 15 October:

"Re: Hayfield Site Opposite ESSO on Straffan Road, Maynooth, Planning Ref: 08/2174

Condition 42 of Planning calls for the provision of traffic signals at the Straffan Road/Meadowbrook Link Road junction—co-ordinated by way of SCOOT system—prior to the opening of the development.

I am concerned that the development will be opened without the traffic signals in place. And if this happens there will be total chaos at the junction (it is bad enough at present)

Can you please let me know what steps are being taken to ensure that the signals are in place before the development opens."

John got the following reply:

"A traffic management plan/analysis is in the process of being carried out on this section of the Straffan Road from the Meadowbrook junction to the motorway including all junctions.

A Consultant should be appointed shortly for this work and this plan/analysis is being managed by the KCC Traffic Management Section.

The Senior Engineer requested that this plan/analysis be carried out before any traffic lights are installed at the Meadowbrook junction."

As this Traffic Management Plan covers the whole of Maynooth, and will take a considerable length of time, Cllr. McGinley has asked that the section from the Meadowbrook Link Road to the M4 be carried out and signed off on first so that the lights (or preferably a roundabout) can be put in place.

Cllr. McGinley Seeks Information on the Number of Social and Affordable Houses Transferred to the Council Recently in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Question for answer at the Maynooth MD Meeting on 15 October: "How many social and affordable houses have been transferred to the council from the new housing estates that have been built or are under construction in Moyglare Hall, Newtown Hall, Griffin Rath, Castlepark and Hayfield, Maynooth?"

John was give the following reply:

A number of other units have been negotiated or are under negotiation in the relevant areas." Cllr. McGinley stated that the reply made for very depressing reading as by Law the following number of houses should have been transferred to the Council:

This means that the Council are losing out on 65 Social and 97 Affordable houses in Maynooth alone. John pointed out that as the housing provision was the biggest issue countrywide at present that it was unforgivable that the Council did not ensure that it got the maximum number of houses provided for by Law. Stating "negotiations are still underway" is not good enough as Castlepark and Griffin Rath have been completed and Newtown Hall and Moyglare Hall are close to completion.

Maynooth Town North South Corridor Improvements for Cyclists, Pedestrians and vulnerable Road Users up for Approval Ecllowing Public Computation the Demographic Period

Following Public Consultation the Planners Report on the Submissions Received was presented to Councillors for approval at the Maynooth MD Meeting on 15 October

Cllr. John McGinley proposed that the proposal to remove the right turning lanes at Old Greenfield, Silken Vale and the Train Station be removed as it made no sense and would lead to traffic build ups to the traffic signals at The Square. It looks as if John's proposal will be beaten as it looks as if only one of the other eight Councillors will support him. A decision on the Plan has been deferred to the next Meeting on 11 November.

If you agree that the right turning lanes should remain Cllr. McGinley strongly recommends that you make your views known to the other eight Councillors before a decision is made on 11 November.

Cllr. McGinley Asks for the Footpath at Celbridge Road/Rail Park to be Widened

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD Meeting on 15 October:

"That the footpath at the Celbridge Road/Straffan Road Junction, at the Rail Park side, be widened as it is too narrow to facilitate the volume of pedestrian traffic using it."

John got the following reply:

"The Municipal District Office will cut the vegetation back as close as possible but there are private property boundaries at the back of the path which limit the available width of the footpath."

John asked the Area Engineer to discuss the issue with the adjoining properties to see if a solution could be found.

Cllr. McGinley Asks for Safety Improvements on Newtown Road, Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Question for answer at the Maynooth MD Meeting on 15 October: "Can the council erect a flashing 'Your Speed' sign between the M4 bridge and the 50km/h signs on the Newtown Road (Rathcoffey Road) in order to help slow down traffic?"

John got the following reply:

"The Municipal District Office has agreed to erect speed radar at this location to evaluate the current characteristics of this road."

John pointed out that the 50km/hr speed limit was being ignored and the significant incline down from the M4 bridge was a factor. Also, one of the signs is covered by shrubbery. John further stated that the Newtown Road was highly pedestrianised and that as the cost of the "Your Speed" sign was only €3,000, the Council should proceed with its installation.

Cllr. McGinley Asks for Safety Improvements at The Walk, Movglare Hall

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD Meeting on 15 October:

"That the developer of Moyglare Hall, Maynooth, be asked to landscape the central area of The Walk, in order to provide a public amenity and in the interests of public safety, now that the council and An Bord Pleanála have refused permission for buildings here.

"There is no requirement in the original planning permission to provide a public amenity in this location and consequently the Planning Authority cannot require the developer to landscape the central area of The Walk as requested. However, the Council will contact the developer and request any health and safety issues in this area to be addressed as a matter of urgency."

John agreed that there was no requirement under Planning to do as he requested but, he felt that if the Council wrote to the Developer suggesting that he landscape this very rough central area that the Developer might take action.

17% Fall in Live Register Figures for Maynooth and 20% Fall for Newbridge - Stagg

Deputy Emmet Stagg has welcomed the fall in the Live Register Figures published this week which show a 17% fall in the Live Register Figures for Maynooth Labour Exchange and a 20% fall in the Live Register Figures for Newbridge Labour Exchange when compared with September 2011.

Overall stated Deputy Stagg the Live Register for Co. Kildare has fallen from 18,084 in September 2011, to 15,011 in September, 2015, a 17% decrease. The further fall confirms the downward trend in unemployment stated Deputy Stagg but we cannot be complacent as unemployment is still far too high. Exiting the bailout and economic recovery will only be meaningful for people when they see real improvements in their lives and the most important way to achieve that is by creating more jobs which is the clear focus of the Government. Labour is committed to reaching Full Employment by 2018.

The Government stated Deputy Stagg through its Action Plan on Jobs is committed to creating 40,000 additional jobs in 2015 and getting the Unemployment Rate below 9% from a high of 15.1% three years ago. We can deliver on this commitment given the fact that between January 2012 and September 2015 the numbers employed in the State rose from 1,825,000 to 1,958,700.

Cllr. Ó Cearúil criticises Maynooth M.D. Budget Allocation outstanding issues that Maynooth Cycling Group have Cathaoirleach of the Maynooth Municipal District, Cllr. Naoise Ó Cearúil has voiced his frustration at the disproportionate funding received by the Maynooth M.D. for 2016. The relevant gross expenditure for 2016 in the Maynooth Area will be €491,572, this is in comparison to Celbridge/Leixlip with €578,529 and Naas with €677,007.

Ó Cearúil noted how the Maynooth area is the largest geographical area in the county with these funds to be divided between communities from Maynooth as far as Derrinturn.

"How Celbridge/Leixlip can recieve €80,000 more than Maynooth is beyond me considering they cater for two towns and Ardclough. In this area we have Maynooth, Kilcock, Clane, Prosperous, Derrinturn, Donadea, Johnstownbridge, Broadford and the surrounding areas. This will limit us councillors in the Maynooth area in terms of projects to undertake in 2016.", stated Ó Cearúil. One example of the inequality in the budget is €6,050 in grants being allocated to Tidy Towns in the Maynooth MD but €26,950 in the Naas MD.

Cllr. Ó Cearúil over-ruled in attempt at addressing issues at Carton Avenue

Cllr. Naoise Ó Cearúil was over-ruled by his fellow councillors in an attempt to have the curb surrounding the Carton Avenue entrance moved back a metre. Cllr. Ó Cearúil argued that by moving the curb back, there would be room for cars to move off to the left from the Dunboyne Road.

Maynooth North-South Corridor

A decision on the Maynooth North-South Corridor has been postponed until the November meeting of the Maynooth Municipal District. Both Cllr. Ó Cearúil and Cllr. McGinley highlighted that they are opposed to the removal of the right turning lanes on the Straffan Road. This followed submissions from many residents. There are still some

raised.

Yellow Box outside St. Mary's R.C. Church to be repainted Following a motion by councillor Ó Cearúil, the yellow box outside Maynooth Parish Church will be re-painted. The Area Engineer will also meet Cllr. Ó Cearúil at the site to see the possibility of extending the box. Mass-goers are currently finding it difficult to exit the church grounds. Works on the Dunboyne Road footpaths have started Improvement works have commenced on the footpaths on the Dunboyne road after major improvements to the Moyglare Road footpaths.

Cllr. James LAWLESS - Kildare North Updates

As your Kildare North general election candidate, I have been working around Maynooth over recent months and engaging with different individuals and groups, in close

collaboration with my local colleague Cllr Naoise Ó Cearúil. Please feel free to contact me if I may be of assistance on any matter.

I enclose below some queries that have been raised with me and responses:

1) Footpath repairs on the old Dunboyne road. A number of residents in Castlepark and Pebble Hill had raised the condition of the footpath into the town. This is decayed and can be difficult to navigate with buggies etc. I am pleased to report that after discussions with the local engineering office I can confirm these footpaths are scheduled for repair in the upcoming weeks.

2) Recycling Centre in North Kildare; Residents have raised with me a concern that there was no recycling centre in the north of the county. I have raised this with the environment section and expressions of interest were recently invited for suitable sites in the north county area. While the formal consultation has now concluded, if anyone has ideas or suggestions for suitable sites please contact me.

3) Traffic Management at Straffan Road junction. I am aware of the frustration and concern of residents using the Straffan road / Meadowbrook Link Road junction and the difficulties exiting onto that road at busy times. The engineering office has advised that discussions are ongoing with the NRA due to the proximity of that junction to the M4 ramps but that a design is in progress. I have stressed that this junction must be tackled as a priority issue.

Broadband access for Newtown Residents must be a priority says Cllr. O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fail General Election candidate. Cllr Frank O'Rourke, has called on the Department of Communication and the Minister for Communications, to have broadband access for Newtown and surrounding areas a priority for this Department.

'In recent days, I have met with many residents in Newtown and surrounding areas in Kildare, who are very concerned about the poor broadband connectivity in the area.'

At a time when we are trying to encourage people to work from home, to encourage and nurture small businesses, support exiting businesses and ensure that people have reliable access to broadband, we see that little or no progress has been made to provide a Broadband service for Newtown and surrounding areas. Kildare is home to world class IT companies and it beggars belief that homes and businesses within a couple of miles of these companies have little or no broadband access.'

'I am currently working with Eircom, on what is known as the next generation access, in replacing the existing copper based telecommunications network and upgrade it to a fibre optic system in the Maynooth Celbridge area. Once this is completed, these areas will have access to significantly enhanced telecommunications services.' Stated Cllr O'Rourke

'Areas like Newtown needs to be prioritised for getting quality high speed broadband, and I am calling on the Minister to deliver on his promise to deliver this quality high-speed broadband access for areas like Newtown and other areas in Kildare.' Concluded Cllr O'Rourke who pledged to keep the pressure on the Government to deliver quality broadband access for Newtown and other areas in Kildare.

FF calls for expanded civilian recruitment with Gardaí Civilians should be posted to garda stations to carry out administrative work

Fianna Fáil has called for an expansion of the civilian recruitment programme within An Garda Síochána to free up gardaí for community duties. According to Kildare North General Election Candidate, Cllr Frank O'Rourke,

sustained cuts to garda resources have left many gardaí who should be on the beat stuck in garda stations filling out paper work. Cllr O'Rourke explained, "The gardaí are currently overburdened with paperwork and administrative duties. Given the huge reduction in garda numbers over the past 5 years, it is a shame that our highly qualified gardaí are often stuck to their desks doing basic work that could be carried out by clerical staff. "The reality is that gardaí in every community across the country are being expected to do a lot more with a lot less resources. We should be utilising their skills and training, by ensuring that they are out and about in the community preventing

and investigating crime. It is a complete waste to have them stuck indoors stamping forms and answering the phone.

"I am calling on the Minister for Justice Frances Fitzgerald and the Garda Commissioner Nóirín O'Sullivan to consider posting civilian employees to garda stations to carry out basic clerical work and allow gardaí to get away from desk work. This could include answering phones and processing forms relating to motor tax, social welfare payments, electoral register changes and passport renewals. It would allow our highly trained gardaí to get out into the community and do the job that they were trained to do. "It is crucial that these clerical staff would not be seen as a replacement for qualified gardaí. Rather, this system must be used in tandem with an accelerated garda recruitment process. Garda numbers have fallen to dangerously low levels. In my own county of Kildare, there is now just 1 garda for every 650 people. There is no doubt that the cuts to garda resources have had a direct impact on crime levels. We need more gardaí and we need a better system to ensure that our trained professionals are not wasted on basic paperwork.'

New figures reveal 22% jump in housing waiting lists in Kildare - O'Rourke

FOI request by FF reveals a surge in number of people needing housing - Govt using outdated figures that mask the true extent of housing crisis

New figures obtained by Cllr Frank O'Rourke have revealed a surge of 22% in the social housing waiting list in

Kildare in less than two years. Cllr O'Rourke General Election Candidate for Kildare North made the revelation following a Freedom of Information request made by Fianna Fáil to Kildare County Council to obtain the most up to date figures for the social housing waiting list in the county.

The figures returned reveal that the Government has grossly underplayed the extent of the housing crisis. "The official government figure states that there are 5,454 people on the housing waiting list in Kildare. However data revealed to Fianna Fáil shows that this has jumped by 22% to over 6,668 households" said Cllr O'Rourke. "These figures are truly shocking. Minister Kelly claims that he has the housing crisis under control. However these figures reveal that the crisis is far worse than we imagined. The government is significantly understating the extent of the crisis, using figures that are actually two years out of date. The government has to start facing up to the reality of the housing emergency. Up until the end of 2014 it only built 1,252 new units nationally, compared to 15,000 units built between 2007-2010. This is the primary cause of this emergency. I have been fighting for greater investment in housing in Kildare to tackle this crisis head on Unfortunately the Government has not been proactive on this issue and has allowed a major crisis to emerge as a result.

"The most worrying aspect is the fact that the housing crisis is accelerating year on year. The figures we have obtained clearly show this. However despite this the Government is seemingly more interested in prioritising tax cuts for the rich rather than investing in housing and public services. "We have to start getting to grips with it by building homes that families want to live in. Fianna Fáil is proposing a new national housing roadmap to build 150,000 new homes by 2021 including 45,000 social housing units. I am urging the Government to give strong consideration to our fully costed plans," said Cllr O'Rourke.

Maynooth University student wins 2015 Wesley Cocker Award

Award recognises contribution in chemistry relevant to Irish industry

Alice Blumlein has been awarded the 2015 Wesley Cocker Prize from the Society of Chemical Industry, All Ireland Group. Professor Cocker was instrumental in establishing the Irish Section of the

Society of Chemical Industry in 1947. The award, named in his honour, is given to the best paper or patent by a student on a topic of relevance to industrial chemistry.

Blumlein, who won the award for her work on tough protein gels, explained: "A bigel is composed of two discrete interpenetrating networks, with both networks contributing to the mechanical properties of the bigel. My research describes, for the first time, an all-protein bigel with properties of both parent gels. This hydrogel may have applications that include drug delivery and cell scaffolds or as a biomimetic."

The research was conducted in the Soft Matter research group in the Maynooth University Department of Chemistry under the supervision of Dr Jennifer McManus. The project was funded by a Maynooth University Teaching Fellowship to Alice Blumlein and an SFI Stokes Lectureship to Dr McManus.

Home Security

<u>Christmas Holidays</u>

Christmas holidays are a special time when families and friends come together to celebrate the season. It is also the time of year where families and friends are most generous and practice the tradition of gift giving. It should be a joyous and happy time for all of us. Unfortunately for us, home burglars view the holiday season a little differently. For them, it is a time of opportunity to burglarize your home for cash, credit cards, and all the new gifts of small electronics, computers, jewellery, and easily sold valuables.

Here are a few tips of what they look for when shopping for a house to burglarize. These tips will help you enjoy the holidays without incident.
Burglars look for an easy entry with good escape routes. Don't openly display your Christmas tree and gifts in the front window so it's easily visible from the street. It's too tempting for them to smash the window and grab the wrapped packages.

Burglars look for occupancy cues like outdoor lights burning 24 hours a day, piled up newspapers, or advertising flyers hanging on the door knob. Use an inexpensive light timer when you are away and ask a neighbour to keep the front of your home clean of papers and debris.
Burglars know to look for the hidden door key near the front entrance. Don't hide spare keys under rocks, in flowerpots, or above door ledges. Instead give the spare key to a trusted neighbour.
Burglars prefer to enter through unlocked doors or windows. Sliding windows that are not secure can be seen from distance. One holiday problem

can occur when exterior Christmas light extension cords are run inside through a window and prevent it from being secured. Hire an electrician to install an inexpensive exterior outlet for your holiday lights.

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• Don't post your family name on your mailbox or on you house. A burglar can call directory assistance to get your telephone number and call your home while in front of your house to confirm that you are away.

• Don't leave descriptive telephone answering machine messages like, "You've reached the Wilson's...we're away skiing for the Christmas holidays...please leave a message." Burglars love to hear that they have plenty of time to break in and completely ransack your home.

• After Christmas day, don't pile up empty gift boxes from your new computer, DVD player, or stereo receiver on the street for the bin man. Burglars appreciate knowing that you have expensive gifts inside for them to steal. Break them down or cut them up to conceal the items better. After a lucrative burglary, the chances of being burglarized again are increased to steal the new replacement products.

• Last, but not least, fortify your home by installing solid core doors, heavy duty locks, longer screws in the lock strike plates and door hinges, and install secondary security devices on all accessible sliding windows.

Distraction burglary

Distraction burglary is any crime where a falsehood, trick or distraction is used to gain access to a property to commit burglary. Victims of distraction burglary can suffer terribly both emotionally and physically.

Violence is increasingly being used by offenders

against the elderly in order to gain entry to their homes and steal their property. Unfortunately, some victims suffer a decline in health and even die as a result of the trauma caused.

Did you know ...?


The average age of a victim of distraction burglary is 81-years-old.

Crime prevention advice - Distraction burglary: If you're not sure who is at your door, don't open it. Check the identity of the caller by calling the company they are purporting to be from i.e. gas, electricity, water, police. Use the telephone numbers listed in your local directory or provided independently by your service provider – Do not use any telephone numbers provided by the caller – they may be bogus.

Telephone a neighbour or friend nearby to come along and check out the caller before you open the door to them. Some areas in the country have "Neighbourhood Watch Schemes" you can sign up to. Check with your local police to find out if there is one in your area. Don't keep large quantities of cash at home; put it in the bank where it is safe. Keep doors locked and windows secure at all times. Ensure that if you do let somebody in to your home, that you close the door behind them – distraction burglars often work in teams, where one will distract you whilst others sneak in through the insecure door.

If somebody asks for your help – needs to make a telephone call, lost a ball in your garden, needs a drink or pen and paper for example, refer them to a younger neighbour or assist them through a closed door. Alternatively, call a friend or neighbour to come and assist.

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Twas the night before Christmas, when all through the house not a creature was stirring not even a mouse'

Some families like the tried and tested Christmas recipes that have been handed down through generations, but I like to try something different each year and so I came across some recipes in a very old cookery book by Nell Heaton (courtesy of Mr Tom McMullon) called

THE COMPLETE HOSTESS. I hope you try them and enjoy.

PLUMP PUDDING

- 1/2 lb stale breadcrumbs
- 1/2 pint scalded milk
- 6oz brown sugar
- 5 eggs
- 1/2 lb raisins
- 4 oz chopped walnuts
- 2 oz sultanas
- 1/4 lb grated carrot
- 1/2 lb grated suet
- 1/4 pint brandy
- 1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/3 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon finely grated lemon peel
- 1/3 teaspoon ground mace
- 1 1/2 teaspoons of salt

Soak the breadcrumbs in milk for an hour, add sugar, beaten egg yolk, raisins, currants, sultanas, lemon peel, walnuts and mixed peel. Add the suet and beat up by hand, using a wooden spoon. Add brandy, spices and salt. Add the stiffly whisked whites of eggs. Turn into a buttered bowl and steam for 6 hours. Unmould and serve garnished with a sprig of holly, surround with burning brandy.

CHRISTMAS CAKE

• 1 lb butter

- 1 lb sugar
- 3 teaspoons coffee essence
- Grated rind of one lemon
- 8 eggs
- 1 lb sultanas
- 2 lbs currants
- 1/2 lb candied peel
- 1/2 lb glace cherries
- 2 oz ground almonds
- 2 heaped teaspoons cocoa
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 2 1/2 fluid ozs brandy
- 2 tablespoons sherry
- 1 1/2 lb plain flour
- A large pinch of salt

Mix all the fruits together except the cherries. Soak in the sherry overnight. Sieve the flour, salt, cocoa and spice and beat the eggs. Cream the butter thoroughly, add the sugar and cream again, adding the coffee essence. Add the well beaten eggs by degrees with plenty of beating between each addition. Mix in a third of the sieved flour lightly. Mix in the fruit, add the cherries and lastly gradually add the remaining sifted flour. Put the mixture into an 11 inch cake tin which has been previously lined. Place the cake in a very moderate oven and bake for about 5 hours. Pour brandy over warm cake. When cool wrap in greaseproof paper and store in an airtight tin.

ALMOND ICING

Mix together 1/2 lb ground almonds and 1/2 lb caster sugar. To this mixture add 1 egg, 2-3 drops of almond essence, 1 teaspoon of lemon juice and 1 teaspoon of sherry. Whisk all together to bind and roll into clingfilm. Leave in the fridge for a couple of hours before use.



The Benefits of Houseplants



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The days are short and the weather is turning frosty and cold, which means winter has arrived. When the frost hits, it's difficult to do much outdoor gardening, and we tend to close our windows tight to keep all the warm air in. That's good for staying warm, but bad for air quality. This month, we'll take a look at how people can make their living environment healthier and more stress-free with houseplants.

Houseplants have become an increasing area of scientific study, and people are becoming more aware of the many benefits of including plants in both personal and office spaces. NASA first began research into houseplants and their ability to purify the air in 1989. The space agency has a vested interest in determining how houseplants can benefit indoor environments as improving air quality is a critical

issue in space stations. NASA's clean air study was a catalyst for further research into the benefits of houseplants.

These studies have shown that houseplants have a variety of quantifiable benefits. Modern building practices may be making buildings more efficient, but it comes at a cost. The rooms in which we live and work are now more tightly sealed than ever before, which leads to the air inside being up to 10 times more polluted than the air outside. This results in greater exposure to chemicals emitted from building

materials and the air we exhale. There has been a rise in office workers suffering from asthma, headaches, sinus problems, allergies, and poor concentration, and the phenomenon has been linked to poor indoor air quality. This is called Sick Building Syndrome, where people experience acute health problems from spending time in a building with poor air quality.



The air in homes and offices contains many chemicals that are released as byproducts of industrial building supplies, cleaning agents, office equipment, and other sources. The most common chemicals include benzene, formaldehyde, trichloroethylene, xylene, and ammonia, and exposure to all of these is linked to adverse health effects in humans.

Formaldehyde is extensively used in modern industry and is found in almost all paper products, including toilet tissue and paper towels, as well as synthetic fabrics, particle board, and plywood. Trichloroethylene is found in inks, paints, lacquers, varnishes, adhesives, and paint remover/stripper. Benzene is used to make plastics, resins, synthetic fibres, rubber, dyes, detergents, and pesticides. Ammonia is found in most window and household cleaning products as well as floor finishing. Xylene is found in printing products, rubbers, paints, leather, tobacco smoke, and vehicle exhaust.



These chemicals and their byproducts are impossible to avoid indoors. However, NASA's clean air research has determined that we can reduce our exposure to these harmful chemicals with houseplants, as they filter the air and break down chemicals in it. Rooms with a plant in them also have 50-60% less airborne mould spores and bacteria. This probably explains why offices that incorporate plants into the décor show a proven reduction in employee sick days. A Berkley

study revealed that 40 percent of all sick days are related to poor indoor air quality. Multiple studies show that using plants in interior spaces decreases the incidence of flu, colds, sore throats and coughs by 30%.

Plants also benefit us psychologically. Houseplants have proven to reduce stress and tension and improve mood. Working in view of a plant increases memory retention by 20%, and offices with plants demonstrate increased employee productivity and accuracy. They also improve healing – research has shown that hospital patients given houseplants while recovering from surgery have lower blood-pressure, report less pain and anxiety, and recover faster. Visual exposure to plants reduces blood pressure and lessens stress in just five minutes.

NASA research suggests having at least one plant per 100 square feet of home or office space. Next month we'll take a more detailed look at how to care for houseplants and which ones are best at purifying the air.

TECHNOLOGY CORNER TIPS, TRICKS, AND WHAT'S NEW IN THE WORLD OF TECH

Long before the advent of television, broadcast radio has been bringing people together to listen to news, stories, and discussions. People can find great pleasure listening to the radio in the background while doing other tasks, and it's a handy source of information. In the Internet age, a new medium for communication is causing many in the radio business to reconsider some of the established practices and preconceptions about audiences, consumption, production, and distribution. The most popular form of audio entertainment is no longer the radio but the podcast, and it is opening up a new world of possibilities.



Once an obscure method of spreading information, podcasts have become a recognised medium for distributing audio content. Podcast is a portmanteau of the words "pod" – from iPod – and "broadcast". Despite the etymology, Apple did not invent the word (or the medium) – the term was first coined in 2004 by a journalist for The Guardian. At the time, iPods were the definitive choice for listening to portable audio files, though an Apple product is not required to listen to them.

Podcasts are a converged medium that brings together audio, the Internet, and the portable media player (though you can also listen to them on your computer). It's a form of digital media consisting of serial audio episodes that can be subscribed to and downloaded or streamed over the Internet. These audio files contain everything from music to comedy to fictional narratives, though the format is frequently that of a talk radio show.

There are many benefits to podcasts: the medium contains something for every interest and listener, they can be downloaded or streamed onto a variety of devices to be enjoyed whenever and wherever you like, and almost every podcast is completely free. Their accessibility, portability, and variety has turned them into one of the most popular forms of media. Podcasting contrasts with webcasting (Internet streaming) in that webcasting generally isn't designed for offline listening to user-selected content.

You can find a stunning array of new and interesting content from the Internet for free, whether you are interested in cars, cooking, technology, sports, science, history, comedy, selfimprovement, art, or any topic you've ever wanted to know more about. You can listen to what you want, when you want, and how you want. You can find shows to listen to on your phone, tablet, or computer every day. You can wake up and automatically have new shows ready to listen to while you commute to work.

The podcast experience opens up a whole new world of entertainment, creativity, and learning to people. It offers free, original, and interesting content and provides an amazing way to share information across the Internet. No single person or corporation owns the technology; it is free to listen to and create content, which departs from the traditional model of "gate-kept" media and production tools.

Anyone can create their own radio-style show and broadcast it to the world in very little time and at very little cost. All that's required is a computer, a mic, and the Internet. In this sense, it is very much a horizontal media form: producers are consumers, and consumers become producers and engage in conversations with each other. It has levelled the playing field and allows people to share their passions and interests in creative new formats. Because of this, it contains personality and variety that is lacking in conglomerate, pre-programmed media.

As there is no financial or professional barrier to creating podcasts, everyone from individuals who want to share their interests to public radio professionals are making them.

However, just because podcasts are free and open to public creation does not mean that they lack quality. Most podcasts are made by people who are very passionate about their subject, and that passion carriers across to the listener. Clubs and organisations can post their discussions. People obsessed with fountain pens or cameras or mycology are making programmes for other people who share their interests. Writers are creating serialised novels, and some stand-up comedians have gone from relatively unknown to huge Internet successes through their podcasts. In addition, many major media outlets are also now offering podcasts.

Most podcasts are also commercial-free. Because the production cost is so low, podcasters don't require public sponsorship to operate. Those that do incorporate advertising generally do so in a way far less intrusive than what we find in radio or television.

No two podcasts are the same, and there is something for everyone with this exciting and growing medium.

How to find and listen to podcasts

Enjoying podcasts is easy, and you are in control of the audio experience. You can pause, rewind, repeat episodes, change the playback speed, and transfer, store, or delete them at your convenience. It's up to you where and how you want to listen to them. Any Internet-enabled device can play podcasts, though as their name suggests, they lend themselves well to listening to them on the go with a mobile device.

On computers, listening to a podcast is as simple as clicking on the file in a web browser and letting it play. There are many ways to get podcasts on your mobile device, and if you don't have a smartphone (or iPod Touch), the easiest way to do that is through iTunes. Just navigate to the Podcast tab of the iTunes Store, browse, download, and put them onto your audio player.

Probably the most popular way to find and listen to podcasts is using a dedicated podcast app on a smartphone. This software is often referred to as a podcatcher or podcast aggregator. These apps let you explore, subscribe to, download, and listen to programs, all in one place. Apple iPhones have a Podcasts app that comes standard on the current iOS. Originally a rather poor and buggy offering, Apple has recently improved it in order to keep up with the strong competition from other independent apps. Android users also have many options for finding and enjoying podcasts. We will discuss some of the most popular apps on the following page

On a computer you can either download episodes or stream them online. Some podcast apps require that you download each episode onto your device, whereas other apps give you a choice to either download episodes or stream them. This can be handy if you don't have a lot of free space or want to avoid cluttering your device, but keep in mind your data allowance if you are not connected to wifi. Podcasts tend to be bigger than music files as they are often longer, so they take up a bit more space on mobile device. If you listen to podcasts often, you will want to regularly delete older episodes to free up space.



You can either listen to shows individually, or if you find a podcast that you really enjoy, you can subscribe to it so that all new episodes and updates are automatically downloaded. That

removes much of the hassle of acquiring new shows or keeping up with a release schedule. This ease and convenience of this automatic delivery is powerful, and it is one of the things that sets podcasts apart. You can unsubscribe or stop receiving updates at any time.

The Best Podcast Apps

Podcasting apps, also known as podcatchers, do more than just play your podcasts. The best-in-class examples automatically download and sort the newest episodes of your subscribed podcasts, help manage your subscriptions, and can also include a variety of other features. Here is a collection of some of the most popular podcasting apps for iOS and Android devices.

Podcasts (iOS, free)

Apple's own app is a standard feature on iOS devices, and it is a decent option for people new to podcasts. It's an easy to use client that allows users to search for and subscribe to individual podcasts from inside the app, and you can view podcast charts from the iTunes Store. There's also a useful "My Stations"

feature, which allows you to create playlists of shows. You can also use Siri to play episodes from the app. However, it can be a little slow, and the UI is bland. It covers the basics and offers reasonable functionality.

Overcast (iOS, limited free or €4.99 unlimited)



Overcast is one of the top new podcatchers. Its strengths are numerous, and there's little to criticise about it. It provides solid basics like episode downloads, notifications of new releases, offline play, and podcast discovery. In addition, Voice Boost normalises the sound levels of speech, automatically boosting quiet voices and lowering loud ones. Smart Speed automatically cuts away at gaps and silence in the podcast, speeding up play without distorting audio. Some of Overcast's features are locked or limited in the free tier, which can be unlocked with a \notin 4.99 in-app purchase.

Castro (iOS, €3.99)

Unlike other podcatchers, Castro's primary virtue is its simplicity and ease of use. It's a good app for people who don't listen to many podcasts or have a small capacity device. This podcatcher isn't cluttered with too many complex features, but that's not to say Castro is bare bones. It includes dynamic storage management, automatic episode downloads and episode streaming, but it's the clean design and interface that are the main selling points.

Instacast (iOS, free with in-app purchases)

The latest incarnation of this app, Instacast 5, sports a redesigned media player with easy swipe access to an episode's chapters, a Night mode that can be toggled or set to automatically trigger based on time of day, keyword search tools and more have been added to an already feature-packed podcast app. The core of the app is free, with Night Mode and Text Search available as in-app purchases.

iCatcher (iOS, €2.99)

iCatcher! features many configurable settings, tweaks and features. Users can subscribe to and download their favourite podcasts from within the app, with Wi-Fi and cellular download options available, as well as background and multiepisode downloads. The player can accommodate variable playback speeds, a sleep timer, multi touch controls, quick jump/back buttons and more. If you like customising your player, iCatcher! is definitely worth a look.

Downcast (iOS, €2.99)

Downcast is a critically-acclaimed podcast app with good reason. A robust online search for podcast subscriptions, autodownloading and the ability to import and export OMPL podcast feeds help you ensure your podcasts stay up-to-date. A highly customisable playlist maker lets you selectively build your playlists on the go, while numerous playback options (such as episode streaming, variable speed playback, video podcast support and more) allow you to play your content however you like.

Player FM (Android, free)

Phyter PM (Autors, Ince) Originally a browser-based podcatcher, Player FM has since branched out with its own Android app. It offers users powerful podcast discovery tools as well as solid playback, subscription, and management features. Users can search for podcasts based on broad topics and sub-topics, or subscribe to individual shows, download episodes for offline play, and set the app to automatically delete played episodes in order to make space for new downloads. Playback options include variable play speed, sleep timers and even the ability to launch episodes from Android Wear smartwatches.

Pocket Casts (Android and iOS, €3.99)



Pocket Casts is a cross-platform app that makes it easy to jump between devices, and the web player allows you to listen on your computer as well. It showcases subscribed podcasts in tile format. A smart playlisting feature helps you sort and categorise your downloaded content for easy listening. Pocket Casts also includes video podcast support, auto-downloading, and automatic cleanup of downloaded episodes to save storage space. Other helpful playback features include quick skip forward and back buttons with configurable time intervals, a sleen timer, and Android widgets.

DoggCatcher (Android, €3.44)

Ideal for power users, DoggCatcher is filled with a huge amount of functions including advanced search, variable playback speeds, auto-downloading, feed customization, autocleanup, UI customisation, and even the ability to run episode diagnostics and send logs to the developer. This is a powerful app, and constant updates keep it on the edge.

Beyondpod (Android, free 7 day trial, €7.65 purchase)

With numerous power features and advanced categorisation, file management, and search functions, Beyondpod is great for those dealing with a lot of podcasts and consuming a broad spectrum of content. Navigating content as it plays is also easy as playback options are placed in one spot within the app's UI. Fine grained download settings give users control of how much the app downloads in the background. It's pricey but may be worth it if you're a heavy podcast user, and the free trial is a nice touch that allows you to test before you buy.

Stitcher (Android, free)

Stitcher may be mostly known as an Internet radio service, but it's also a great podcast service. You can browse and add all of your favourite podcasts, then "stitch" them together into stations for listening in the order you want. You can also keep up with breaking and daily news through a variety of top news programs to mix it up from your normal weekly podcasts. It's still sticking to its older-style of design that doesn't quite look as modern as Pocket Casts and Player FM do, but it's functional and familiar with a lot of features for a free app.

You can find podcasts on any topic you could imagine, so search whatever interests catch your fancy. To get you started, here is a small selection of some of the best and most popular podcasts available now.

Stuff You Should Know

Let's face it – there are a lot of things that we should know but don't quite have time to research. Who has the time to google everything? Far better to absorb it while exercising, commuting, or cooking from this conversational and highly entertaining podcast by howstuffworks.com. On SYSK, a rotating pro-am panel discusses everything from How Bitcoin Works to How Ocean Currents Work in what feels like the world's most well-informed pub conversation.

Little Atoms

Pamper your brain with books, ideas, the arts, politics and whatever else comes up in an engaging, irreverent and unashamedly intellectual podcast. The lo-fi production values compound the impression of rubbing leather-padded jacket elbows with a splendidly down-at-heel slice of the intelligentsia.

The Bugle

Billing itself as an "audio newspaper for a visual world", this satirical news show co-hosted by Andy Zaltzman (in London) and John Oliver (in New York) has been going strong since 2007. The comedy duo deadpan their way through current affairs in this brilliantly rambling "newspaper for the ears".

The Pod Delusion

This cheerfully sceptical "podcast about interesting things" looks at the world from a fiercely rationalist perspective. It's a partner of the British Humanist Association. Each episode takes a leisurely but eye-opening look at issues as varied as the iffy history of Assassin's Creed, Greece's Golden Dawn, and the non-human civil rights of captive killer whales. It'll give you hope that the world isn't really vanishing down a wormhole of superstition and make you feel about 50% smarter.

Pop Culture Happy Hour

America's state-funded National Public Radio has got a grip on movies, music and the Internet that's beyond broadcasters. In this weekly roundtable, pundits dig into the thinking person's entertainment story of the week, be it Mad Men, Downton Abbey or the shambolic VMAs.

Kermode and Mayo's Film Review

Led by two of the finest and most likeable communicators in radio, the podcast version of Mark Kermode's and Simon Mayo's weekly 5 Live show is an unalloyed pleasure. For the uninitiated, it involves verbose, terrifically expressive movie reviews, down-to-earth questioning of said reviews, listener correspondence, good-natured bickering, interviews, and regular appearances by actors.

Radio Lab

This oblique documentary series Radiolab, from New York's public station WNYC, riffs on a big subject like colour, time or numbers until it become a sound experience in its own right. Hard facts collide with a playful sonic approach and the effect is like a dream where you learn things. Episodes have focused in on everything from human attempts to communicate with dolphins (Hello) to the social experiments being undertaken at Facebook (The Trust Engineers).



The Football Ramble

Hosted by a quartet of exuberant, knowledgeable and quickwitted football fans – including the Absolute radio presenter Pete Donaldson and the stand-up comic Jim Campbell – this long-running series provides a weekly fix of global soccer news, analysis and banter. It manages the rare feat of being both funny and informative.



The Thrilling Adventure Hour

These brilliant episodes offer a spot-on recreation of old-time US radio drama from the 1930s and 40s that both sends up these corny, wholesome wireless serials and also shows real affection for a homespun era before irony ruined everything. Fake serials including Sparks Nevada, Marshal On Mars, Amelia Earheart, Fearless Flier and Down in Moonshine Holler are rendered with songs, wisecracks and handmade sound effects before a live audience in Hollywood.

WTF with Marc Maron

This high-intensity interview podcast is about as far as you can imagine from a chummy little chat between showbusiness insiders. Having paid his dues both in performance and his personal life, LA-based stand-up comic Marc Maron persuades a stellar line-up to come round to his garage (yes, his garage) and open up in ways that conventional media seldom sees. Robin Williams, Edgar Wright, and Josh Homme have been among the guests in an interview series unlike any other.

99% Invisible

You know that an item of design is good if you barely notice it – hence the name of this reliably mind-boggling exploration of product design, architecture, fashion technology and any and everything designed for KALW in San Francisco. Roman Mars's bite-sized show (15-30 minutes) is as vivid as you could wish, exploring everything from DIY spacesuits to the aesthetic of Looney Tunes cartoons.

Oxford Biography

The thing with history is they keep making more of it. Fill in the blanks with this admirably straightforward series of capsule life stories from the Oxford Dictionary of National Biography. Each episode gives without judgment or bias an account of one Briton's life, researched by professional historians. There are 180 available and their span is boggling, taking in everyone from Lord Haw-Haw to Freddie Mercury.

The Naked Scientists

Created and co-presented by a Cambridge-based virologist called Dr Chris Smith, this whip-smart, long-running podcast manages to convey big scientific ideas and breakthroughs with clarity, wit, and a refreshing lack of jargon.



Here Be Monsters

This describes itself as "a podcast exploring the dark corners of the human mind." Although episodes vary in format, with documentary-style investigations into topics such as placenta eating, cricket noises, depression and crows. The show really shines when single subjects take over the mic, talking about hairy travel escapades, personal demons and experiences with the ineffable or unknown.

This American Life

Don't let the name put off Irish listeners. One of the mostloved podcasts of them all, WBEZ Chicago's podcast has a more or less permanent spot on iTunes' Top 10 Podcasts, and it is well deserved. In each episode, host Mr Ira Glass takes listeners through a series of stories, many about real people, on a particular theme such as, "superpowers" or "poultry". It's charming, unexpected, often weird, but always heartwarming.

Community Involvement & Planning / Rannpháirtíocht an Phobail & Pleanáil:

Many thanks for your entry in this year's Tidy Towns Competition. Congratulations Maynooth on being Ireland's Best Kept Town! Titanic news indeed. Well done.

Thank you for a most complete entry. This was however a little weighty and there was material which could have been reduced or omitted altogether. The adjudicator is aware of how much work goes into assembling entries as good as this so your pardon is sought for any critical comments thereupon. However, it is recommended that you reduce the volume in next year's entry. This is in order to ensure that no important information is overlooked - hidden by unnecessary materials. All that said, your entry was very clear and well-illustrated.

Your overall structure as a group is demonstrably good. You very obviously engage well with your community. You use traditional means as well such as the Maynooth Newsletter, County newspapers and radio. The adjudicator loved the idea of business cards great! However, the sandwich boards at work sites are hard to beat. You gave a long list of organisations that support you and your work. The adjudicator learned a lot from your entry form in this category - including the University's Fair Trade status and that you have a Transition Movement group in Maynooth. This makes for a very active and dynamic town. You are without doubt plugged in to the next generation who'll be coming up to take over from us. You've a most comprehensive entry on your work with schools, colleges and even the university.

Built Environment and Streetscape / An Timpeallacht Thógtha agus Sráid-dreacha:

Thank you for a very clear and well-illustrated submission here also. The adjudicator was grateful for the brief introduction to the history of your beautiful town. There have been some substantial and positive changes to your Built Environment & Streetscape. Thank you for the photos - including 'before and after' pictures that are most useful - of your work. Your drawing up of a plan speaks well of your organisation. You have some very common sense proposals that would be readily achieved.

You have a bright and lively commercial streetscape. Shop fronts that caught the eye included: Permanent TSB, Brady's Pub, Oak Alley, The Avenue, Siopa Milseáin, and Bistro 53. Also, Uí Neill's, the Coffee Lounge Brady's Property Partners could look better. The Roost Bar will be in need of painting soon. The adjudicator admired the use of an empty shop for Tidy Towns display but this could be done much better. Manor Mills Shopping centre was well kept. Could the Kilcullen Road side windows be made to look brighter and more cheerful? They are so dark and forbidding. Nearby, what's the little derelict building beside the Catholic Church? It's in poor repair although it has been painted previously.

The Castle is gorgeous and today was the first day that the adjudicator had time to properly look around. It's good to read that you are taking a role in the fate of Buckley's - a lovely old house. Could the Vet's sign be removed, please? It has no place on such a building. The lovely new benches in front of the Carton Avenue entrance were gratefully used.

Landscaping and Open Spaces / Tírdhreachú agus Spásanna Oscailte:

Again, you've set out your achievements and plans really clearly in your submission. It's very interesting for the adjudicator to get such good levels of detail on the various projects - including the dreaded bottom line! You aim to consolidate your efforts and that is to be applauded. It's great to read of collaborations such as that with the University, the shopping centre and Kildare County Council. Well done on your assessment and plans on the Japanese knotweed. Please let us know how initiatives such as the Blacklion Site go ('before and after' pictures please!).

Court House Square looked sharp and busy on adjudication day and the trees here were admired. The great work in front of Carton Avenue entrance was much appreciated. The adjudicator was struck by the high numbers of walkers and other visitors here on this morning. The 'heartland' of your town - the University entrance and castle looked so well (and also very busy!). The shopping centre played its part by the display of some super hanging baskets and the hugely long troughs of flowers. It may be argued that bedding plants are not resource-efficient and this is something you may wish to revisit in your plans. Nearby there are beautifully symmetric round beds at the junction of Kilcullen Road and Mill Street. There was also great work done at the grotto of the RC Church. Nice consistent planting was noted in the planters on the lampposts throughout the town.

Wildlife, Habitats and Natural Amenities / Fiadhúlra, Gnáthóga agus Taitneamhachtaí Nádúrtha:

A nicely wide-ranging submission was received from you for this category. This included practical conservation work, interpretation, management and maintenance as well as planning. All good. However, you have included works completed in 2013 so please don't mention prior work unless it is absolutely relevant to this year's or ongoing projects. Be sure now that the people/organisations you cite are actively involved. You have a good grasp of the tasks at hand and where your priorities lie. You also include plans for cycling, the current use of the canal for sports and angling. Very good. You've not mentioned the canal's national designation as a Natural Heritage Area. You should. Overall your plans are 'bang-on' and well thought through.

Your new bug hotels were admired. The Mill Wheel and turf stack looked great. Keep us updated on your projects with volunteers, residents and groups such as the IWT.

Sustainable Waste and Resource Management / Bainistiú Acmhainní agus Dramhaíola Inbhuanaithe:

Your status as a University Town really gives you opportunities for partnership that would be rarely enjoyed elsewhere. The Green Campus project, for example is a great initiative. You have a coordinated approach in terms of working with the schools. Green Waste has been a priority for us it seems and its good to read of community composting initiatives. The shop local project is definitely worth supporting. You list a number of measures that this adjudicator hasn't vet seen in other towns - e.g. Electric Car charging points, lower wattage lights along with brighter road markings and of course, the Green Campus project. You could explore more measures such as 2nd hand books for college students and benefits to charities. You are doing very well in this category and the adjudicator advises you to stay on this track. Well done.

Tidiness and Litter Control / Slachtmhaireacht agus Rialú Bruscair:

The adjudicator was impressed with the detail supplied by you on your approach to the very many aspects of this category. You certainly have a lot to do but as your recent accolade proves - you are well up to the task. Co -operation is key and this you have achieved with community, businesses, educational institutes and local authority. There are some issues that will never 'go away' or be ultimately solved. However, you have a plan and you have demonstrably effective systems in place and that is what attracts points in this category. Litter is an issue for Maynooth. This is so throughout your commercial areas and onto your hinterlands. Cigarette butts make up a substantial proportion of the litter noted but chewing-gum wasn't far behind. The painting of junction boxes creates wonderful colour on otherwise drab surfaces. The bottle banks were in good condition. Some graffiti was noted on Doctor's Lane. The lettering on the Tree of Liberty Stone is once again in need of painting. The signage at the entrance to the girls' school adjacent rather spoils the nice stone piers here. There is an empty sign pole at the corner of Convent Lane and Main Street. The railings opposite the castle are in need of painting soon. The benches in front of Bank of Ireland and opposite are in need of painting. There is a damaged stop sign at Kelly's Lane and an empty sign pole beside the Garda Station.

Residential Streets & Housing Areas / Sráideanna Cónaithe & Ceantair Tithíochta:

Your Two-Route approach is understood and makes perfect sense. This again is a category in which

progress depends upon co-operation. Your role is clearly understood, it appears. You give numerous examples of focused efforts, taking into account last year's adjudicator's comments and this is to be applauded. Once again, work in this category will never be 'complete' - but: if you continue to encourage, cajole and work alongside your residents, your workload will diminish in a linear fashion. Your plans are sound. The adjudicator was most taken with the Advice Line for residents. Some graffiti was seen in Meadowview in predictable places such as junction boxes. There was some litter here as well. Beaufield generally looked well. Some overuse of herbicide on path edges was seen. The beautiful mature trees here

were admired.


Approach Roads, Streets & Lanes / Bóithre Isteach, Sráideanna & Lánaí:

Again, a clear submission in this final category. This showed focus and a good degree of detail. What impressed this adjudicator most however was the clear evidence of your interaction with local authority, businesses and planning. Your entry on the proposed walk/cycleway and your submission on the Court House Square being cases in point. You have your eyes on problem areas and a plan to tackle these. Well done. The Straffan Road roundabout was admired for its contemporary design. It was great to be in a town with so many clear, good quality cycle lanes and to see so many people using them. Could the on-street bike lanes be better marked? Newtown Road has both bike lanes and good quality road surfaces. Perhaps car-parking should be more controlled on Parson Street. The stone name signs were much admired. The Historical Walking Tour is excellent. The information boards at Carton Avenue are first class. The walk along the river at the shopping centre is a really nice surprise.

Concluding Remarks:

A really enjoyable first visit to Maynooth was had. It was great to see the results of your work on the ground. You are now in the upper echelons of the competition and great things could be ahead. Good luck!

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FILM/DVD MONTHLY BY BERNIE CLAXTON FILM REVIEW: MACBETH (2015) STARRING: MICHAEL FASSBENDER & MARION COTILLARD

Shakespeare's Scottish play, *Macheth* has had its fair share of adaptations via stage, television and screen in the last 400 years. Directors as diverse as Orson Welles, Roman Polanski and Akira Kurosawa have all imprinted their unique stamp on the classic text. The latest director to tackle the Bard's verse is Australian director, Justin Kurzel. Though still firmly rooted in its 11th- century period setting, Kurzel has given Shakespeare's story and protagonists a slight tweak and modern sensibility. Premiered at the Cannes film Festival, this new take on an oh-so-familiar tale of feudal ambition, murder and madness is especially potent and visceral.



Macbeth is probably the greatest and grimmest of the Shakespearean tragedies. With its leaner text, remarkable characters, and rigorous plotting, it lends itself, particularly well, to cinematic expression. Kurzel takes full advantage of the visual emphasis in his inspired re-imagining of *Macbeth*.

We start not with the 'hurly-burly' of the prophetic witches but with a haunting scene of death. The Thane of Glamis, Macbeth (Michael Fassbender) and his lady wife (Marion Cotillard) oversee the bleak funeral ritual of their young son. It's a heart-wrenching moment and the Macbeths' visible pain and suffering is indelibly etched across their ashen faces. It is also an eerie wordless scene-setter not included in Shakespeare's play but hinted at indirectly. This frozen moment in time provides the tragic impetus for what is to follow.



Soon we are thrust into bloody mayhem and carnage as Macbeth and his boy-soldiers take on the enemies of their Scottish King, Duncan (David Thewlis). The latter's callow youth is emphasised by the fear etched on their pale faces and shivering limbs before the ensuing battle. Macbeth, the warrior-noble, is exceptionally brave and steely on the field of battle and savagely sees off all comers. Kurzel's first battle sequence is a striking piece of cinema. Making vivid use of slow-motion and freeze-frame techniques serves to accentuate every blow and ferocious action of the desperate battle. After the guttural war cry, body parts are hacked, sliced, pierced and eviscerated in a vicious and bloody fashion. Summary justice predominates in this barren environment. A dog greedily licks the wounds of the slaughtered. The black muddy, stripy war paint on the soldiers' faces might be Braveheartinspired but the stylistic choices of Kurzel nods towards searing CGI epics like 300.



There is a surreal moment when Fassbender's Macbeth seems suspended in time, mid-carnage, noticing 'the weird sisters' (curiously un-witch-like in appearance) on the heath. Is he hallucinating? Apparently not as, soon afterwards, the nobleman and his comrade-inarms Banquo (Paddy Considine) are privy to the mysterious witches' soothsaying. Macbeth will become Thane of Cawdor and then king. Banquo is fated to be the father of kings.

When Macbeth returns to his wife with his fortuitous

news, her only response is to encourage her husband in the traitorous act of regicide. In an electric scene between the two, Cotillard's pent-up Lady Macbeth uses her sexuality to assuage any nagging doubts on Macbeth's part - 'screw your courage to the sticking place.'



Fassbender's Macbeth soon puts the lie to his wife's fear that he may be 'too full o' the milk of human kindness/to catch the nearest way'. He proves his mettle in particularly gruesome fashion, as King Duncan's deathbed stabbing is horrifically graphic. As in the opening battle sequence, Kurzel's camera does not shy away from the wholesale butchery. The pivotal scene of Duncan's brutal despatch, a guest in the Macbeths' home, violates all the rules of kinship and *Xenia* (hospitality). Macbeth does not stop there, though, as he soon outstrips his wife in his lust for blood. 'Blood will have blood'.

In this way, Kurzel's screen version of *Macbeth* gives due warning from the outset. It will be as harsh, desolate and unforgiving as the austere and chilly vistas of the Scottish landscape. The film was actually shot, for the most part on the exposed beautiful Hebridean Island of Skye. This is a *Macbeth* of mud, guts, mist, flames and blood. As framed by Kurzel's cinematographer Adam Arkapaw (who worked on the excellent first series of *True Detective*), 11th- century Scotland is re-imagined as a semi-mythical kingdom of blood-red skies, marshland and wind-swept rugged ridges.

Kurzel attempts to pare back the Shakespearean verse without sacrificing the essential integrity of the original. Screenwriters (Jacob Koscoff, Todd Louiso and Michael Lesslie) rearrange and revise crucial segments from the play. Dialogue is cut and the visual impact is heightened giving this *Macbeth* a lyrical flourish and style.

Any production of *Macbeth* is only as good as its central players. In Michael Fassbender and Marion Cotillard, we have one of the sexiest and most powerful screen couplings ever. Fassbender's battleweary Macbeth is a haunted man lacerated and unhinged by demons, guilt and misplaced ambition. It's an electrifyingly earthy performance by the Irish actor, who enacts the part of a man tortured in equal measure by the loss of his child and by the mental scars of combat. Racked by corrosive grief and self-doubt, murderous ambition fills the aching void. His gradual paranoid descent into madness and his own personal hell is something to behold. This is illustrated to striking effect in the metaphorical final red-filtered

battle sequence.



Through the filter of modern psychology, Macbeth – in Kurzel's interpretation - is a victim of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. The director has asserted he 'wasn't interested in Macbeth wanting to be powerful but rather in wanting to run away from something'. The spectre of death informs every act and consequence. This is no more evident than in the famous Banquet scene, when Macbeth, in his delirium, conjures up

visions of his murdered friend, Banquo. Fassbender delivers his lines with frightening intensity and we need little convincing that here, indeed, is a man whose mind is 'full of scorpions'.



The French actress, Marion Cotillard is a force to be reckoned with. Her Oscar-winning turn as Edith Piaf in La Vie en Rose marked her out as an actress of immense ability. As with her 'little bird', Cotillard brings equal layers of vulnerability, empathy and tenacity to the role of Lady Macbeth. Spurred on by gnawing grief, she eventually shares in her husband's madness if not his continued killing spree. This Lady Macbeth doesn't feel as scheming as in previous incarnations. Cotillard more than holds her own against Fassbender's impassioned performance. Her speeches in aching close-up magnifies her devastating power as an actress. Lady Macbeth's guilt is handled with a brooding intensity which banishes all sense of theatricality. Cotillard's famous sleep-walking soliloquy, visualised in a glacial snow-flaked chapel setting, is especially shattering in its emotional impact.



Kurzel's lens often zones in to give us extreme closeups of both the actors' eloquent faces. Intimacy is very much a part of this film. With such expressive faces on show, the viewer is able to read the thoughts and feelings of the actors far better than the spoken word. Even in spoken dialogue, the emphasis is naturalistic, quiet and intimate with no shouting to the rafters as in theatrical productions. Each word, each line is subtly dialled down to cinematic effect. The Macbeths are the medieval damaged couple par excellence. In a modern setting they would be receiving lots of therapy!

The supporting cast are equally impressive: Paddy Considine's Banquo is quietly effective as the betrayed noble man; Sean Harris's Macduff is wonderfully vengeful; As Malcolm, Jack Reynor epitomises the troubled heir to Duncan's crown.



The film is eerily populated with ghosts and children (sometimes at the same time). Macbeth receives the knife ('Is this a dagger which I see before me') that kills Duncan from the spectre of a boy-soldier slain in battle. Lady Macbeth recites her 'To bed' speech to her dead child. Children are frequently the victims of random cruelty in this universe. Macbeth slays his enemy's - Macduff - wife and children in a most barbarous fashion. His action in this is terribly heinous in that it chillingly echoes the funeral pyre of his dead child at the outset.

Justin Kurzel's new vison for this age-old tale of execution and insanity is remarkable for its use of wintry palettes, jagged photography, distinctive redsaturated battle visuals, a mournful strings-infused dirge of a score by Jed Kurzel, and a succinct poetic script. Above all, Macbeth's charismatic leading stars, Fassbender and Cotillard, make *Macbeth* the must-see film experience of 2015. They imbue their roles with complexity and surprising humanity, combining intense sexual chemistry and powerful acting to magical effect. *All Hail Macbeth*.
