DENTAL PROBLEMS



Pups have 28 temporary or "milk teeth". Cats have 26. Pups develop permanent teeth the last of which will generally have erupted around 6–7 months. Adult dogs will have 42 permanent teeth each with a crown and root. Cats will have 30. Puppies will often be seen biting and chewing on anything; slippers, carpets, skirting boards! This behaviour is due in part to the "teething" process as seen in babies and with time this behaviour should disappear. Dental disease can affect up to 80% of dogs over 3 years of age.

Dental plaque can turn into tartar, a crust deposited on teeth, this can lead to bacteria increase in the mouth and will cause tooth decay and "halitosis" otherwise known as bad breath. Bad breath is not natural for your dog or cat. Your dog's general health is directly affected by its dental health. Bacteria from your pet's mouth can be absorbed into the blood stream causing possible heart and kidney problems. In cats, feline leukaemia virus can alter the defence mechanism and can cause a severe gingivitis. It is probably easier to detect dental problems in cats than in dogs.

Cats will behave as if they want to eat, will go to their dish but will not be able to eat! They will show salivation (dribbling), rubbing their face against objects and will loose considerable weight. As a general rule it is hard to detect pain from a dog and this is where a 6 month check-up in Maynooth Veterinary Clinic (01 6289467) or Clane Veterinary Clinic (045 982763) can be very productive in treating and preventing dental disease. Dental care can start early in a pups life by getting it accustomed to having its teeth cleaned. A soft toothbrush can be used with a pet toothpaste.

Feeding your dog and cat dry food can help prevent dental tartar developing. In many cases problems have advanced too far and a dental scaling is necessary for your dog or cat to reduce the plaque and dental bacteria. This entails an anaesthetic and the teeth are scaled and polished and sometimes extractions are necessary. In some of our older patients a pre-anaesthetic blood test is required to determine kidney and liver function.

Dental scaling is a procedure that dramatically improves the general health and well being of your pet!!





Community Council Notes

Festival/Event

A letter of thanks from the St. Vincent de Paul Maynooth for a donation of €1,000 from the sale of the Festival Calendar 2015 was read at the MCC monthly meeting. The Festival Committee attended the Bank of Ireland Expo in the Glenroyal on Saturday 11th June. This proved to be extremely worthwhile. The committee raised the profile of Maynooth Community Council, sold Taste of Maynooth Raffle Tickets, recruited volunteers and made contact with vendors who wished to take part in the Festival this year.

A report of the current planning for the festival was outlined to the council by Jacqui Farrell and Paul Daly. All events planned for the festival were nearing completion. A strong facebook drive for further volunteers will be organised. Transition year students were encouraged to get involved. This would be good for their CVs and a reference will be organised to indicate their participation in this community event.

There will be a vintage car display, Taste of Maynooth Raffle, Mind Body and Soul centre - our thanks to Maynooth Scouts for the use of their hall for this event. The Garden Competition is ready to go. Thanks to Maynooth Garden Centre for sponsoring the three category prizes which will be given for a small, medium and large garden. Closing date was Monday 20th June. A judging panel will call out and give notice beforehand.

Service person or Service Ambassador (Food and Drink trades) has already had a number of people signed up. Ambassadors will ask customers to buy a line for €1. On foot of the recent good news story in Bistro 53, 50% of funds raised will go to train guide dogs for children with special needs. This section of the Irish Guide Dogs Association receives little funding and is a very worthwhile cause.

Maynooth/Canet-en-Rousillon connections

Tom McMullon reported that two young girls from Canet-en-Rousillon have been working in the University Library and French Department over the last couple of weeks. Groups, organisations and individuals were strongly encouraged to make links with Canet. The beauty and festival atmosphere of Canet was well described.

Condolences

Tom McMullon extended condolences to Anne and Norman Birchall on the recent death of Norman's mother. It was noted that Norman very kindly replaced damaged plants as part of his contribution to Maynooth Tidy Towns.

John Kavanagh reported recent (Saturday 11th June) damage to planters and plants. A cast iron planter which was in the Pound was thrown into the river. It is very discouraging to see such behaviour. The recent work of of the tiered planters.

Three tubs have been placed in the doorway of the Maynooth Tidy Towns display window which has been used as a homeless sleeping spot.

There was a general discussion on the homeless situation in Maynooth. It has been established that some people sleeping on the streets are not in fact homeless. There are agencies to contact in the event of genuine homelessness such as the Community Welfare Officer, St. Vincent de Paul and the Citizens information Advice centre.

Concern was expressed about the dubious use of an almost derelict house at the entrance to Castlebridge. It was thought that the house should be demolished as it was a danger. The situation regarding begging was clarified. It is not illegal to beg, even beside a financial institution. The problem arises only if there is intimidation

Educate Together School

There was a power off day – a contribution towards the energy green flag. There was a Family Fair on the 19th June from 2-5pm. This was a big fundraiser, with talent competitions, craft and bouncy castles. 30th June saw the beginning of activity week.

The footpath from the traffic lights on the Celbridge Road to the school is to be completed which was very welcomed.

Road Safety Issues

The issue of children walking on the road and not using the footpath at Rail Park was raised. This is very dangerous and someone will be killed. The same experience was outlined by Rockfield residents. The speed van is most welcome and has made a difference. It was noted that the schools on the Celbridge road have a good delivery and pick up system and the Convent has improved but the Boys' National School is fraught with danger. More priority has to be given to buses. Bad parking, day long parking, children running all over is contributing to a chaotic situation.

The situation in Parson's Street regarding the new parking places was raised. The position of the central

the Tidy Towns was praised, especially the introduction median line is now off centre and the continuous white line was questioned. Individual parking places are not marked out. This has serious implications. Maynooth Community Council will send a letter to KCC.

> The presence of a bicycle chained to the lights on the Straffan Road was causing an obstruction and a danger. It was pointed out that the Litter Warden can be called upon to look after this.

The improvement in parking spaces in Maynooth with the introduction of paid parking was remarked. The problem remains for residents on the Back Lanes but it is hoped that this will be resolved.

Visitors to Maynooth Impressed

Keith McCrory reported that twelve people from the US visited Maynooth as part of a larger visit. They were given a tour of the town. They stated that it was the best part of their visit. They were impressed with how the town looked with the work of the Tidy Towns and the Restaurants and the University. It shows that all the work that goes on in the background is noticed.

Ancient East Trail and Maynooth

Jacqui Farrell reported that it was the intention of the Maynooth Festival Committee and MCC to work to see the realisation of Maynooth being included in the development of the Ancient East Trail. The popularity of the Castle particularly in the last year or so with increased foot fall during the Festival and the Fleadh has been a great boost.

Refuse and Litter

Bags of refuse were found in various places in Rockfield. Investigations are ongoing with the Litter Warden. It was noted that the recent changes in refuse charges could mean that there will be more rubbish dumped as people simply cannot afford to pay. Some companies have already increase their charges. MCC and Tidy Towns request that all Residents' Associations encourage youngsters to do a monthly clean up on their estates.

Editorial

While paying for waste disposal has been on the political agenda, the key issue for me, is the widely held opinion of decision makers that it is necessary to penalise people with extra charges to increase the level of recycling and to reduce the amount of waste that is going to landfill. Thinking about all the people that I know I have to say that the practice of maximising recycling and the use of waste composting and the careful disposal of other waste is now normal behaviour.

There will be always the few who do not behave in this way but you will find that they will be already paying high bin charges so they are unlikely to change habits with pay by weight as their waste collection company will have already bumped them up the charging bands and they are used to these level of charges. I currently pay by lift with my bins only going on an infrequent basis. I have still to monitor my account because in the past the bin lorry has lifted the bin twice on the same collection so the charges are doubled. Moving to pay by weight would have significantly increased my charges because of the flat maintenance charge that was proposed. I already regularly witness people putting their domestic waste into public litter bins and it is not always those that cannot afford to pay charges. We do not need to encourage others to adopt such a habit.

While on the subject of public litter bins, it is great news that Maynooth now has more pot belly compactors in the centre of the town. Hopefully they will be used instead of litter being thrown on the ground. Maynooth Tidy Towns do a great job in enhancing the town for the National Tidy Towns Competition. There are flowers everywhere and the beauty of these flowers is diminished with litter around them. Please support Tidy Towns by helping to keep Maynooth litter free this summer.

Pay Parking is bedding in and there are clearly increased numbers of people using the private car parks in the town. It seems strange that the pay parking prices are cheaper in Main Street than in other streets. It must be confusing for visitors in that the minimum charges vary depending on where you park, instead of a standard rate for the entire town.

Speaking about visitors my experience is that we have more tourists coming to Maynooth this year. I feel that I have met more tourists in the restaurants and the pubs. I know that we give visitors a good welcome when we meet them and it is great that our businesses are benefitting. You will know yourself that when you go elsewhere that you appreciate a welcome from the locals. While everyone is welcome to Maynooth, I would like to offer a very special welcome to visitors who come from Canet-en-Roussillon, the French town with which Maynooth has a twinning relationship. Only caveat we cannot guarantee the weather to anybody but our twinning partners can if you choose to go to Canet-en-Roussillon. Enjoy your holidays whatever you do this year.



Pre-qualification of Contractors Commences for Maynooth Education Campus - Stagg

Kildare North Labour Representative Emmet Stagg has welcomed the commencement of the Pre-qualification process for Contractors for the Re-Tendering of the Maynooth Education Campus.

Contractors have until July 19^{th} to indicate their interest in tendering for the construction of the two new Post Primary Schools and shared Sports Facility. The estimated value of the contract is $\in 30$ Million and the envisaged construction period is 24 months. Contractors who qualify under this process will be issued with invitations to tender for the contract on 9^{th} September.

Separately Officials from the Department of Education have met with Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board staff and the Design Team and the technical issues to be resolved from the previous tender were fully discussed and are in the process of being resolved by the Design Team. KWETB are also addressing the issues in relation to planning conditions with Kildare Co. Council.

It is envisaged that the technical issues and the planning condition issues will be resolved in tandem with the pre-qualification process to enable the re-tendering to commence proper on September 9th.

Mr. Stagg concluded by stating that whilst it was disappointing that we had to go through this retendering he was pleased that action was now being taken to get the project back on track.

Footpath from Rockfield to the Educate Together School to be Completed in August

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his Question:

"When will the footpath be extended from Rockfield to the Educate Together School on the Celbridge Road, Maynooth and will a cycle path be included?

Engineers Reply: "It is anticipated that this work will be completed in August this year. Unfortunately,

there is insufficient space for a cycle path."

The footpath will be 2m wide and will improve safety for the children going to the Educate Together School and the Gael Scoil This good news is a result of prolonged representations by Cllr. McGinley. John has also asked that the road markings at the pedestrian crossing be re-painted to make in more difficult for drivers to go through a red light.

Yellow Box Junction and Stop signs for Silken Vale in August

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD meeting on 8 June:

"That a solid white line and stop sign be painted on the road at the exit from Silken Vale to the Straffan Road, Maynooth, in the interest of public safety."

John got the flowing reply:

"This exit is being reworked as part of the north south corridor Phase 3 which is

planned to be carried out in August this year"
The engineer also told Cllr. McGinley that the yellow box junction will be painted at the same time.

Shrubbery to be Cut at the Speed Signs on the Newtown Road

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD meeting on 8 June:

"Can the Council cut the shrubbery that is blocking the 50km speed signs at the M4 bridge on the Newtown Road, Maynooth?"

The Engineer advised John that the shrubbery would be cut shortly as would the vegetation at all key junctions.

66 Bus Terminus Going Ahead at Nursing Home at Crinstown

The Director of Services advised Cllr. John McGinley at the Maynooth MD meeting on 8 June that Dublin Maynooth University Day Bus are proceeding with the extension of the 66 bus and Biodiversity Day

that the terminus would be at the new Nursing Home at Crinstown. Cllr. McGinley pointed out that both he and former Councillor Senan Griffin had proposed this location for the terminus over four years ago.

Hand Rail at Exit from Train Station to Bond Bridge

Cllr. McGinley asked representatives from Waterways Ireland at the Maynooth MD meeting on 8 June if they could put a hand rail at the exit from the Maynooth train station to Bond Bridge, in order to make it safer for pedestrians in wintry conditions. (Similar to the hand rails at the steps on the other side of the canal.)

They responded saying that they believed it is Iarnrod Eireann property, but, if it is their property that they will erect the rail.

Cllr. McGinley Calls for the Removal "central" broken white line at Parson Street.

Cllr. McGinley has asked for the "central" white line at Parson Street to be removed, as it is longer central since the Pay Parking line was put in place.

Cllr. McGinley asks Gardai to put a Stop to the Professional Begging in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley and other local Councillors raised this very serious issue at a meeting with the Garda Superintendent on 8 June. Unfortunately, the Superintendent said that there was very little that he could do unless there was harassment, assault, threatening or obstruction of another person. John pointed out that there is harassment and that he would expect the Gardai to take appropriate action to put an end to this professional begging.

Terminating a tenancy

Ouestion:

Our landlord phoned to ask us to leave the house we have rented for the last three years because he plans to sell the house. Do we have to accept this?

As you have been renting the house for three years, you have what is called a "Part 4 tenancy", which gives you certain rights. The landlord can only end your tenancy for certain specified reasons. An intention to sell the property within three months counts as a valid reason.

However, a phone call is not a valid form of notice. You must get a written notice of termination, signed and dated, stating the reason for termination and giving you the proper period of notice, which, in your case, as you have rented for three years, is 12 weeks (84 days).

When a landlord plans to sell the property, the notice of termination must include a statement that he intends to sell the property within three months after the tenancy ends. The Residential Tenancies Board (RTB) publishes sample notices of termination with the detailed information that is required in various situations. In the case of a planned sale, the wording of the required statement is: "The reason for the termination of the tenancy is due to the fact that the landlord intends to sell the dwelling, for full consideration, within three months after the termination of the tenancy".

Your landlord must also make a statutory declaration that he intends to enter into an enforceable agreement to sell his full interest in the house. (A statutory declaration is a solemn statement, which must be signed in the presence of someone who is authorised to witness statutory declarations - such as a practicing solicitor, a Peace Commissioner, a notary public or a Commissioner for Oaths.)

The RTB's sample notice of termination for a landlord planning to sell contains sample wording for this statutory declaration, which you should receive along with the notice of termination. If your landlord is found to have evicted you illegally, he may be required to pay you substantial damages.

Pregnant at work - health and safety leave Question:

I do night work regularly but I am expecting a baby in six months. Can I stop working at night while I am pregnant?

Answer:

Under the Safety, Health and Welfare at Work Act 2005, every employer is required to carry out a risk assessment for the workplace. This assessment should identify hazards in the workplace, assess the risks from such hazards and identify the steps to be taken to deal with any risks. Now that you are pregnant, your employer should carry out a separate risk assessment for you.

If there are particular risks to you during your pregnancy, these should be either removed or you

should be moved away from them. If neither of these options is possible, you should be given health required to publish anonymised versions of all of and safety leave from work, which may continue up to the beginning of your maternity leave (under the Maternity Protection Acts 1994 and 2004).

If a doctor certifies that night work is unsuitable for you during your pregnancy, you must be given alternative work or health and safety leave. Time spent on health and safety leave is treated as though you have been in employment, and this time can be used to accumulate annual leave entitlement. You are not entitled to leave for any public holidays that occur during health and safety leave. During health and safety leave, your employer must pay you your normal wages for the first 21 days (3 weeks), after which you may qualify for Health and Safety Benefit from the Department of Social Protection

When you return to work after maternity leave, if there is any risk to you because you have recently given birth or are breastfeeding, that risk should be removed. If this is not possible, you should be moved to alternative work. If it is not possible for you to be assigned alternative work, you should be given health and safety leave. If night work is certified by a doctor as being unsuitable after the birth, alternative work should be provided. If alternative work cannot be provided, you should be given health and safety leave.

Tax Appeals Commission Question:

What is the new Tax Appeals Commission?

The Finance (Tax Appeals) Act 2015 came into operation on 21 March 2016. This Act gives effect to a revised tax appeals process and established a new independent statutory Tax Appeals Commission (TAC), which replaces the former Office of the Appeal Commissioners.

The TAC adjudicates, hears and determines appeals against Revenue decisions concerning taxes and duties under the Finance (Tax Appeals) Act 2015, the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997 as amended and other related legislation. There are currently two Appeal Commissioners, appointed by the Minister for Finance for a period of seven years.

The main change to the tax appeals process is the requirement that all appeals (other than customs duties and Registration Tax "first-stage" appeals) are now made directly to the TAC and not to Revenue in the first instance.

The Appeal Commissioners have sole responsibility for accepting or refusing appeals, although Revenue can raise objections to appeals. If both parties agree, the Appeal Commissioners can make determinations based on written submissions (rather than a full hearing). However, you can insist on a hearing if you wish.

By default, all hearings are held in public. However, you can request that a hearing (or part of a hearing) be held in private. To improve the transparency of

the appeals process, the Appeal Commissioners are their determinations. Another significant change is that appeals can no longer be re-heard before a Circuit Court Judge. You can appeal to the High Court on a point of law, but not in relation to the

Cohabiting and social welfare payments **Ouestion:**

I have applied for a means-tested Jobseeker's Allowance but I was told that I'm not eligible because of my live-in partner's earnings. We live together but we are not married and we split our expenses equally. Why is this?

Answer:

The Department of Social Protection (DSP) treats married and unmarried couples in the same way when assessing entitlement to a means-tested social welfare payment. It assesses the total income of the household, rather than the circumstances of the individual claimant.

This means that if you are married, or are living with another person in an intimate and committed relationship, the means of your spouse or partner are also taken into account. This is the case even if only one of you is actually claiming a payment. The DSP uses detailed definitions and criteria to assess whether a couple are cohabiting and you can read these online at welfare.ie.

How the means of a couple are assessed differs slightly depending on the payment being applied for. For Blind Pension, State Pension (Non-Contributory) and Carer's Allowance, the DSP adds all of your means together and then halves them to get the assessable means for each one of you. For Jobseeker's Allowance, Disability Allowance, and Farm Assist, the DSP adds all your combined means together and then assesses them against the maximum household payment for your circumstances. If your spouse or partner is getting a social welfare payment in their own right, your means are taken to be half of the total means of yourself and your spouse or partner.

Sometimes a certain amount of income, or income from particular sources, is not taken into account. This is called an income disregard. For example, a certain amount of income from employment can be disregarded.

Minister Heightens Concerns Regarding Maynooth School Campus

Social Democrats TD for Kildare North Catherine Murphy has said she is deeply concerned about the Minister for Education and Skills, Richard Bruton's response to her on Thursday in the Dail when she raised this issue. Deputy Murphy and Bernard Durkan had both raised the issue during the Dáil Adjournment debate on Thursday evening when Minister Bruton replied that there would be a need to re-tender for the campus.

Catherine Murphy said:

"We had understood all along that there were some minor issues delaying the original tender so to have the Minister say that there is a need for an entirely new tender was a big surprise. There has been significant confusion about the progress of this vital development with different answers coming from the Department and the KWETB. It is now clear, based on the Minister's answer, the work will not proceed in the summer as anticipated; that the new tendering process will take considerable time and will provide for a phased development to meet the Sept 2018 critical date but raises other concerns about completion of the balance of the project and about the accommodation of students on what will still be a construction site."

Maynooth Campus Group Meets Minister for Education and Skills

Social Democrats TD Catherine Murphy joined the group campaigning for the Maynooth School Campus along with the other TDs for North Kildare in a meeting with Minister for Education Richard Bruton on Wednesday evening in Leinster House. The group met with the Minister following his reply to Deputy Murphy and Fine Gael's Bernard Durkan in the Dáil last week regarding the delays with the tendering process on the site. In that reply the Minister indicated that the original tender would not stand and there would need to be a new tendering process thereby ensuring a significant delay.

Following the meeting of the group and the Minister Catherine Murphy said:

"I had sought the schedule of the various elements of

the tendering process from the Minister in order to rebuild trust between the community and the department. The Minister presented the schedule and it is now expected that the tender will be awarded in early 2017 at the latest."

"It's far from ideal that building won't commence this summer but the emphasis now must be on ensuring there is no further slippage in the timeline for the building of these schools and I will continue to work with this group and the Minister to ensure no further delays.

North Kildare Swimming Pool Thwarted by Invalid Application

Social Democrats TD Catherine Murphy has had it confirmed to her in a reply form the Minister that the application for a swimming pool in North Kildare has been refused because the application was invalid.

Deputy Murphy, as part of a series of questions on Swimming Pool funding and allocations tabled by her over the past number of years, asked the Minister for Transport Tourism and Sport what counties had responded to a January 2016 request for expressions of interest and what counties, if any, were turned down. In his response the Minister confirmed that Kildare had been turned down because the application submitted by Kildare County Council was invalid.

Catherine Murphy said:

"It is very disappointing to see that after so much hard work by the community in trying to achieve funding for a vital community facility that Kildare County Council made a submission that did not comply with the requirements for funding. The submission made by KCC expressed interest in developing the swimming pool on the Maynooth campus which are not public grounds and therefore not eligible for funding under the scheme."

"The funding scheme does not allow for the development of a swimming pool facility on private land and the community has now missed the opportunity for the long-awaited pool for North Kildare during this round of applications and we have

no idea when the next round is likely to arise. The funding from this scheme would require matching funds from KCC and we need to have a discussion to see if this is possible. This will be a critical issue in determining whether or not we can have a successful application in the future."

Minister Must Ensure Bin Companies Don't Exploit Legislation

Social Democrats TD, Catherine Murphy, has highlighted the recent changes to legislation which will see the costs of waste collections skyrocket and has called on Minister Simon Coveney to urgently intervene to stop waste companies exploiting new bin charge rules.

Catherine Murphy said:

"I am concerned that some waste companies appear to be using the new waste charge rules to introduce significant increases in charges for certain customer categories. For example Thorntons – a refuse collection company operating in both Meath and Kildare are introducing a new "service fee" of $\[\in \]$ per week which will more than double standing charges from the current registration fee of $\[\in \]$ 50 per year – again these charges come in before any bins are actually

"New regulations to change to pay-by-weight were signed by then Minister, Alan Kelly, in January of this year. At the time he heralded it as a saving for 87% of customers. This is proving to be far from reality. Nothing has been done to prevent waste companies hiking up service charges so customers are being fleeced. When questioned in the Dáil last Wednesday, the Taoiseach said the spirit of the new legislation was designed to promote recycling and less waste however that it is direct contradiction to a standing charge being levied no matter what amount of waste you produce – in fact it discourages responsible recycling in many cases."

"The new Minister, Simon Coveney, must produce new regulations which strictly limit the amounts waste companies can charge for service charges. In advance of these, he should call the waste companies in and signal clearly to them that the level of charges is completely unacceptable."



Coaching will be provided by qualified Basketball Ireland coaches. One of the guest coaches will be Nabil Murad, who is coach of the Irish u16 boys team.



Top Food Safety Tips for Barbecues

Ensure your friends and neighbours go home with memories of a good time, not a tummy bug to remember you by. To make the most of your barbecue, here are some top food safety tips.



Before you start grilling

If this is your first time barbecuing this year, give your barbecue grill a thorough clean by scrubbing the metal rack with a suitable oven cleaner or a damp brush dipped in bicarbonate of soda. Remember to rinse it thoroughly with warm, soapy water afterwards.

Keep your cool

Food is away from your fridge for a longer period of time when cooking and eating outdoors which can lead to germs multiplying quickly. Keep perishable goods like salads and coleslaw in your fridge until you need them.

Before you start cooking

- Make sure frozen foods are fully thawed (preferably in the fridge on the bottom shelf; which may take overnight) before you start
- Keep foods you plan to cook properly chilled in the fridge or a cool box until needed.
- Light your barbecue well in advance for charcoal barbecues, the flames should have died down before you start cooking.



- Wash your hands before and after handling food.
- Remember to keep raw meat separate from cooked meat and salads.
- Always use separate utensils for handling raw and cooked meat when cooking.
- Never put cooked food on a dish that has been used for raw meat or poultry (unless it has been thoroughly washed in between.)

How to know its cooked

The big issue when barbecuing is making sure your food has been cooked thoroughly, all the way through. The outside may look cooked (and in some cases burnt), the inside can still be raw. When cooking meat that is minced or skewered such as burgers, sausages, kebabs and poultry make sure to turn it regularly and to move it around the barbecue to ensure it is cooked evenly on both sides then run this test:



- Is it piping hot all the way through?
- Is there no pink meat left?
- Do the juices run clear?

Steaks or whole meat joints of beef or lamb can be served rare as long as they are cooked on the outside as any harmful bacteria will be on the outside only, and not in the centre.

Using leftovers

If you have any leftovers from your barbecue, these should not be left outside where they could be in the sun and where insects and animals could get them. As with all leftovers, cover these foods and allow them to cool down in a cool place (your kitchen) before refrigerating within two hours of cooking and use within three days. If you're reheating leftovers, reheat them only once until pipping hot but if in doubt throw them out.

Fairness Is The Objective Of Fianna Fail Bill On Variable Mortgages

Fianna Fail's Bill on Mortgages, entitled 'Central Bank Variable Rate Mortgages Bill 2016', passed by the Dail recently, puts fairness of mortgage rates top of the Central Bank's agenda, according to Kildare North Deputy Frank O Rourke, after speaking in the Dail on the Bill during the week.

'As I said in my Dail contribution on the Bill, customers on typical variable rate mortgages are paying approximately \in 1,500 per year more than new bank customers and \in 6,000 more per year than people with a tracker mortgage for the same amount.'

"Indeed, some mortgage holders in this jurisdiction are paying up to nearly £4,000 a year more in interest than customers with comparable mortgages in Northern Ireland and other European countries. This is simply unfair."

'These high variable interest rates mortgages are a key issue in my constituency. The issue has been raised at my clinics in Celbridge, Leixlip, Maynooth, Clane, Prosperous, Naas and Kilcock over the past year. A mortgage is the single biggest financial commitment for many families, and people on these variable mortgages have felt the least benefit from the current low interest rate environment in Europe. Our Bill is designed to provide some relief to these families.'

'Our Bill gives the Central Bank the authority to put a cap on interest rates if banks are found objectively to be charging unreasonable variable mortgage rates. In our view, this policy initiative will go a long way to relieving this variable mortgage rate problem,' stated Deputy O'Rourke.

'The current approach adopted by the banks is simply unfair. The Fianna Fail Bill, which will mark a significant change in the relationship between banks and their customers, will put fairness at the heart of mortgage rate policy. It will give mortgage holders more protection against rip-off bank practices. Any financial benefit that families receive from reduced variable mortgage rates, will be much needed for other financial commitments that families have. Indeed, it will mean that there will be more money available for spending in the local economy, rather than artificially improving bank profits,' concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Government Will Consider O'Rourke Proposal To Extend Child Benefit For The 18 - 19 Year Olds

The Government is considering a proposal put forward in the Dail by Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, in connection with extending child benefit to 18 and 19 year olds who are in full time education.

At the moment, when a child in full time education reaches the age of 18, they lose their entitlement to Child Benefit. However, as many families know, the costs associated with keeping children in full time education continues and there is a gap in the supports available for families for the 18-19 year age bracket that are in secondary school education. 'The cost of extending child benefit to 18 year olds in second level education is estimated at €62.5 million' stated Deputy O'Rourke. 'Last week, by way of oral parliamentary question, I asked the Minister for Social Protection to review the age criteria under the Child Benefit Scheme and asked him to link this payment to children who are still in full time education.'

'Nowadays, given the 6 year duration of secondary school, many pupils are now aged 18 and 19 when sitting the leaving certificate.'

'Child Benefit is an important source of income for families and we must support families that are keeping their children in education.'

'The Minister has said that he would consider my proposal. I have raised the issue with our Social Protection spokesperson, Willie O'Dea TD, and I intend on bringing forward a private members motion to ensure that my proposal is kept on the Government's agenda.' concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Comprehensive Strategy for Home Care needed says Deputy O' Rourke

A comprehensive strategy for Home Care is needed if we are to provide a sustainable home care structure for the future according to Kildare North Deputy Frank O Rourke following a meeting with a number of families in Leixlip and Clane that required home care for their elderly parents.

'As Ireland's population grows, the provision of quality home care is one of Ireland's greatest challenges. The whole Home care industry is unregulated and has experienced huge growth in the last number of years, with a significant increase in the number of people working in the sector.' Stated Deputy O'Rourke 'To-date, I understand that there are over 40,000 people employed in the home care sector nationally, which includes the HSE, private sector and not for profit organisations'.

'Some sources indicate that there will be an increase of 54% in the number of people over 65 over the period 2011 to 2025 with in excess of 320,000 additional older people who may require care services.'

'In the cases where there is a significant dependency, residential care is undoubtedly the most appropriate option for people. However, I believe that there is a significant number of people currently in a nursing home, who with the right support, could be cared for in their own homes. Most people, where possible prefer to be cared for in their own home.'

'In my view, it is clear from the reply that I received from the Minister for Enterprise, Jobs and Innovation that the Government has little or no strategy or policies in place for Home carers, as reflected by his answer to my parliamentary question when he stated that 'The rate of pay and conditions of employment of staff who are employed by care providers is a matter for these providers.' This reply reflects lack of Government interest in the sector.'

'In the last week alone, at my clinics in Leixlip and Clane, I see the need for a comprehensive strategy for this home care industry. We need to encourage more employees into this sector, seek to expand the not for profit organisations sector, develop the Live-in care and encourage more training and development for people working in this sector.' Stated Deputy O'Rourke. 'This is a growth industry, but, by its very nature is a much personalised service to enable our older people be cared for with dignity in their own homes. Indeed, by providing more home care packages, it will relieve the pressure on the residential home care sector.' 'We need a strategy to cater for the growing demand for home care packages.' Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Maynooth Schools Group Report

On Tuesday 24th May a delegation from the Maynooth Schools definitive about the timeline provided. The Department says in Group met with Kildare North TD's to discuses the Department this regard that issues that occur in one stage must be resolved of Education & Skills briefing document for their new minister Mr Richard Bruton TD and the delay in the building of the new Maynooth post primary schools. Catherine Murphy TD read an email she received from the Dept. of Education & Skills on the 23rd of May.

"As the Deputy may be aware, the project in question has been devolved for delivery to Kildare & Wicklow Education and Training Board (KWETB). The project has been tendered by the KWETB and an assessment of the Tender Report is at an advanced stage in the Department. In this regard, the Department recently sought clarifications from KWETB on aspects of the Tender Report and these are awaited. When these have been received and evaluated the Department will be in direct contact with KWETB with regard to the next steps for the project."

The Deputies agreed to seek clarification on the issues.

During the Dail adjournment debate on Thursday 26th May, Deputies Catherine Murphy and Bernard Durkan asked questions concerning the development of the new Maynooth post primary schools. In his reply The Minister of Education & Skills Richard Bruton TD announced his department's decision • to advise the Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board to now re-tender the project and stated;

"The specific issues of concern include; an unexplained cost overrun; the absence of an acceptable schedule of proposed reductions both to address this cost overrun and to meet the approved budget; the inclusion of an additional 700 sq.m of floor space; the exclusion in the tender documents of significant additional works relating to planning permission conditions. Indeed, the extent of these works has not been fleshed out with the local authority which, in and of itself, is a planning condition. It is also a planning condition that the new schools cannot open until these works are carried out. The cost • of the works involved are substantial and unquantified"

On Sunday 29th May the Maynooth Schools Group met to discuss the Ministers statement. On Monday 30th May the group met with the local TDs to access the situation. The TD's arranged a meeting with the Minister Richard Bruton for Wednesday 1st June. At the meeting on June 1st, the Minister and his officials detailed the re-tendering process. It was also agreed that the KWETB would make a monthly progress report to the Maynooth Schools Group. (see below)

The Department has provided an indicative timeline for the delivery of the project. It is working closely with KWETB to assist it in achieving this timeline. However, the Department warns that, as with any school building project, unforeseen issues can and do arise as projects move through the various stages involved in bringing them to site. This being the case, neither the Department nor KWETB can be precise or

before moving to the succeeding stage.

Where issues arise, this would have the effect of pushing the timeline out somewhat. The Department has also advised that all of the technical issues, including planning permission issues that were identified by the Department with the previous tender competition, must be resolved before the re-tender for construction can issue (start of September milestone). The approach being taken by KWETB is to resolve these issues

in tandem with a pre-qualification process for contractors. This course of action is expected to save time. Work by KWETB is well underway on both the pre-qualification exercise and on resolving the issues referred to.

Current indicative timeframe for the delivery of the project

- Contractor pre-qualification/financial robustness process - E-Tender Advert - Mid-June 2016
- Return of pre-qualification documentation End July
- Assessment of pre-qualification documentation End August 2016
- Issue of construction Tender to pre-qualified contractors (usually 10 contractors) - Start of September 2016
- Tender return Mid October 2016
- Tender evaluation Mid November 2016
- Appeals period End November 2016
- Letter of intent to apparently successful contractor -**Beginning December 2016**
- Contractors compliance with bond/tax/insurance etc. -Mid - December 2016
- Contractors letter of acceptance End December 2016
- On site Early 2017
- **Contract period 24 months**

Subject to any commercially sensitive matters, KWETB has committed to providing the Maynooth Schools Group with a monthly update on how the project is proceeding.

Locations for the perfect picnic

Donadea Forest Park, Donadea, Co. Kildare.

The Park is a designated National Heritage Park Area. It is a mixed woodland about 60% broadleaf (beech and ash) and 40% conifer (Norway spruce) covering over 240 hectares. 
Castletown House and Parklands, Celbridge, Co. Kildare.

July Gardening

July is a time when you can sit back and enjoy the fruits of your labour in the garden. While there are still ongoing tasks to perform in the garden your main concern will be assuring an ample supply of water for your plants. Try to do your watering during the morning hours so that the leaves have time to dry out before the sun hits them.

Flowers

Regular watering and feeding is needed with liquid feed every two weeks or even every week to keep the plants going after the first flush of flowers.

Remove seed heads of flowers that self-sow, such as foxgloves and libertia if this is not wanted as these can self-sow around the garden.

Seeds of perennial flowers such as lupins, mallows and foxgloves could be sown now for flowering next year. Geranium cuttings can be made in late July to start plants for indoor blooming in the winter months and for setting into the garden next spring.



Containers & Hanging Baskets



Container gardening is one of the greatest ways to add colour around our homes. Water is key. Since container plantings and hanging baskets are above ground, their roots dry out much faster than if they were planted.

Never, let your soil become "bone" dry. When your soil dries to the point of being almost dry, water thoroughly. You know you watered correctly when some drains out the bottom of the pot. Plants are like people...they love

food. The contained roots of these plants will not have the benefit of water trickling in from all sides, as they would if planted in open ground, instead they live and die based on the amount of water dropped onto their limited soil surface. You will be repaid with loads of flowers and foliage if before watering you also dilute some liquid feed in your watering can, ensuring that your container plants are both fed and watered in one go.

The Vegetable Garden

During dry spells in the vegetable garden you should take the opportunity to hoe off weeds, dry weather is the key, because if done in wet weather, the weeds are liable to re-root. Not got a hoe, well a sharpened spade angled towards the ground will tide you over. If you've sown a veg garden you will be reaping the rewards about now by harvesting spinach, peas, carrots and salads. If



you're grinding your teeth reading this at the fact that you missed out on sowing any of these earlier in the season, put those gripes away now as you can still sow loads during the month of July. How about spring cabbage (harvesting in spring), carrots, turnips, chicory, fennel, and autumn/winter salads such as lamb's lettuce and rocket.

Lawns



Keep up regular mowing and feed the grass if growth is poor or the colour is light. Select a feed containing weed killer granules as well to ensure the grass thickens and smothers weeds. Use high-nitrogen lawn fertilizer during a wet spell but make sure more rain is on the way. If weeds have built up in the last few years, apply a lawn weedkiller during a fine spell when growth is active. Most lawns need weed control every three years or so as weeds

re-establish from seeds in the ground. Towards the end of July continue mowing regularly but not too tightly. Keep the edges neat around beds and borders.

Houseplants

If you have plants growing in a conservatory or sunroom don't forget to ventilate them daily by opening a window or two. You may not venture into the conservatory during the day, but your poor plants will have to put up with its hothouse like conditions each time the sun is out. Houseplants are growing freely at this time of year and should not be allowed to dry out, watering in late evening will also avoid the risk of leaf scorch on hot days.

In the garden more grows, than the gardener sows!



Picnic Recipes



What better way to enjoy the sunshine than to fill a picnic basket and head out of doors. The beauty of a picnic is that everything is prepared in advance so that by the time it comes to eating all you have to worry about is sitting back and tucking in.

Pizza Muffins

Ingredients:

- 300g self raising flour
- 80g butter, melted
 - 1 egg
- 150g low fat natural yoghurt
- 150ml low fat milk
- 1 tsp dried oregano or mixed Italian herbs
- 1 and half cups of strong grated cheddar cheese, low fat brand if preferred
- 150g lean ham, diced
- 6 spring onions, finely chopped
- 150g chopped sundried or sunblush tomatoes

Method

Preheat the oven to 200°C /400°F/Gas 6. Line a 12 hole muffin tin with paper cases for big muffins or two trays for mini muffins.

Mix the butter, egg, yoghurt, milk and oregano together.

Sieve in the flour and barely mix. Stir in 1 cup of the cheese, ham, spring onions and tomatoes. Don't overmix, leave the mixture quite lumpy.

Spoon into the paper cases and sprinkle the remaining cheese on top of each muffin. Bake for about 20 minutes until baked through and firm.

Quiche

Ingredients:

Pastry

- 125g/4oz cream plain flour
- 50g/2oz margarine
 - 4 tblsp cold water

Filling

- 2 rashers (chopped)
- 1 small onion (thinly sliced)
- 50g/2oz grated cheddar cheese
- 1 tomato (sliced)
- 2 eggs
- 150ml/½pint of cold milk
- Freshly ground pepper

Method

Preheat oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas 5. Lightly grease a 24cm/9" flan dish. Sieve flour into a bowl. Coarsely rub in the margarine. Add sufficient water to give a soft but not sticky dough.

Lightly roll the pastry on a floured board, then roll it out and use to line the flan dish. Spread the rashers, onion and cheese on the base and arrange the tomato slices on top. Beat the eggs, milk and pepper together and pour over the filling in the flan dish. Bake for about 30 minutes until filling is "set" and golden brown

Coconut Macaroons


Ingredients:

- 1 Tin Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 250g desiccated coconut
 - 2 egg whites
- Pinch of salt

Topping (if you wish)

- 50g/2oz chocolate
- 25g/1oz margarine

Method:



Melt the chocolate and margarine in the microwave and combine with a spoon. When macaroons are cold drizzle over the melted chocolate.

After a protracted winter, summer is finally here! Well the summer movie season is here anyway and with it comes the usual sequels, prequels, remakes, adaptations and spinoffs. There is just about something for everyone.

Recently, we have seen the release of blockbuster sequels like X-Men: Apocalypse, Captain America: Civil War and Independence Day: Resurgence. This kind of fare is designed specifically to attract families into darkened cinemas on long summer days. Inevitably with sequels the law of diminishing returns can kick in. However Captain America and an Independence Day revival, worthy of the 2001 classic, are proving the exception to the rule. To help you navigate your way through the many offerings, here is a select preview of the summer movie highlights coming your way.



Absolutely Fabulous: The Movie is the long awaited film adaptation of the cult British sit-com. Directed by Mandie Fletcher, comic duo Jennifer Saunders and Joanna Lumley will reprise their roles as Eddie and her constantly inebriated best friend Patsy. After the pair accidentally kill (yes kill!) Kate Moss, they flee to the French Rivera. Absolutely Fabulous: The Movie boasts the most cameo appearances in the history of film as more than sixty celebrities will perform on screen. Expect to see the likes of Jerry Hall, Stella McCartney, Lulu, Joan Collins, Rebel Wilson, Emma Bunton, Dawn French, Kathy Burke and Graham Norton strutting their stuff.

Female leads continue to dominate in the eagerly anticipated reworking of paranormal comedy classic - Ghostbusters. When the trailer for director Paul Feig's reboot premiered on YouTube last March, it generated much negativity with three-quarters of a million people giving it the thumbs down. However, unlike most remakes, it dares to do something different. This gender flipping remake of the hugely popular 1984 blockbuster features some of the funniest actresses on screen today. Melissa McCarthy and Kristen Wigg (Bridesmaids, Spy) bravely take on the comic mantel of legends Dan Aykroyd and Bill Murray as they join forces to fight off ectoplasm-spewing modern spooks. This 2016 Ghostbusters has a lot to live up to but with Paul Feig at the helm, it might just deliver the goods.



Based on the children's book by Roald Dahl, **The BFG** is a fantasy adventure film directed by Steven Spielberg. It stars ten-year old Ruby Barnhill who befriends the Big Friendly

Giant, a 24-foot tall man played by **Bridge of Spies** Oscar winner Mark Rylance. Through the course of the film, the little girl and the Giant embark on the adventure of a lifetime. Spielberg's film was well received at the **Cannes Film Festival** and word of mouth seems to indicate that **The BFG** will be another children's classic in the mode of **E.T**. With the exceptionally talented Rylance on board and the gifted Spielberg returning to family film territory, **The BFG** could just be the big hit of this summer season.



In Star Trek Beyond, the latest film in the classic Sci-Fi franchise, the crew find themselves stranded on a hostile planet. Captain Kirk (Chris Pine), Spock (Zachary Quinto) and the rest of the Enterprise face an alien threat. This all sounds very familiar. The previous Star Trek: Into Darkness proved a disappointing entry in the series. However with a new director on board this time – action expert Justin Lin replaces J.J. Abrams in the Captain's seat – this might just provide the fresh impetus that the franchise badly needs. Actor/comedian Simon Pegg (Mission Impossible) co-wrote the script so the signs are looking good for an entertaining and enjoyable Trekkie experience.

The Bourne Supremacy and The Bourne Ultimatum director Paul Greengrass is back with Matt Damon for a new entry to this superior spy series. Matt Damon has always been a very watchable actor and in the early Bourne films he was exceptionally good. In the latest film offering, Jason Bourne, Damon's amnesiac spy is beginning to remember more things about his dark past. He is thrown into a whole new modern political context. With the great Tommy Lee Jones and Vincent Cassell joining Damon in the cast, pencil this in as the must-see action flick of the year.




Other films to look out for include a rehash of **The Legend of Tarzan**. Swedish actor Alexander Skarsgard discards his clothes and bangs his impressive chest to take on the role of the iconic tree-swinging hero. In support, Christopher Waltz chews the scenery as a villainous Belgian military officer. **Nine Lives** sees Christopher Walken turning Kevin Spacey's businessman into a cat in order to teach him a lesson about being a better father! The combined acting talent of Spacey and Walken should make this a popular comedy hit.

The **Galway Film Fleadh** is one of Ireland's leading and most exciting film festivals. It is a week-long event held in July each year and welcomes a diverse range of filmmaking from around the world. The Festival, in its 28th year, will kick off the programme of events on 5th July in the beautiful City Town


Hall. The **Fleadh** will host over 90 films and premieres over the course of the week.

The Festival has pulled off quite a coup with the world premiere of **The Siege of Jadotville**. Based on the celebrated book by Irish journalist Declan Power, it recounts the immensely brave stand taken by Irish soldiers at Jadotville while serving with the UN Force in 1960s Congo. The film stars Jamie Dornan as Commandant Pat Quinlan, the man who marshalled his 150-strong battalion during a tense stand-off with 3000 French and Belgian mercenaries. **The Siege of Jadotville** depicts a story of great heroism against impossible odds. Guillaume Canet, Jason O'Mara and Mark Strong make up the supporting cast. The film will feature on Netflix later this year.



Jadotville leads a strong line-up of Irish cinema at the Festival this year. Highlights include Bobby Sands: 66 Days an acclaimed documentary on the hunger striker, and Kit Ryan's Property of the State, a study of the notorious murderer Brendan O'Donnell. Guests at the Festival include director Jim Sheridan, actress Ruth Negga and screenwriter Kirsten Smith. It promises to be an impressive calendar of events.

It is certainly the year of Northern Irish actor Jamie Dornan. He is currently filming the sequels to **Fifty Shades of Grey** in Vancouver and Paris. Two of his other films **Anthropoid** and **The Ninth Life of Louis Drax** will have cinema releases worldwide in coming months.



Dornan co-stars with the excellent Cillian Murphy (Peaky Blinders) in Anthropoid. Directed by Sean Ellis, it is based on the true-life story of 'Operation Anthropoid'. Murphy and Dornan portray the Czechoslovakian operatives who took part in an assassination attempt on the main architect behind the 'Final Solution', Reinhard Heydrich. Anthropoid will have its premiere at the Karlovy Vary Film Festival in Prague in July. In the autumn, Dornan will return as Paul Spector in the third and final instalment of the acclaimed BBC/RTÉ series - The Fall


