


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Great Food Served 7 Days



Dogs and cats are what they eat! Dogs on a healthy diet have good coats, good energy and good digestion. Pets and human requirements are totally different. A good quality food is a balanced diet containing all the nutrient and vitamin requirement.

There are six groups:

- Proteins Help maintain bones, tissues, muscle, hair and nails
- Fats Main source of energy for dogs. Required for healthy skin, coat and other tissues
- Carbohydrates Along with proteins and fats they are a major nutrient in foods and a source of energy. They include sugars and fibers.
- Vitamins and Minerals

• Fatty Acids – essential and non-essential variety. Essential fatty acids have to be supplied in the diet. Dogs on a low quality diet may not have sufficient omega 3 and 6 unsaturated fatty acids which have a positive affect on the quality of the coat, skin and immune system.

Fresh clean water should always be available.

Feeding Requirement

Nutrition plays a vital role in your pets development from puppy/kitten stage to adult and senior. When your puppy arrives in your home it is important that it does not miss a meal so keeping it on whatever diet the Breeder had it on is important. If you wish to switch to some other brand of food, add small quantities of the new food to his original food, increasing the portions of the new food until pup is weaned off his old diet. From 3 - 6 months, feed 3 meals daily. At 6 months 2 meals is sufficient. Fresh water is always vital to aid digestion and help to regulate body temperature. From 1 year on you can feed your dog once a day, generally in the evening. or you could feed this meal in two equal portions, morning and evening. This can help in two ways. It can help to prevent boredom and digestive problems. Bigger dogs generally swallow their food down quickly and this can cause colic and bloat which can be fatal! So feeding twice daily can reduce this risk.


Smaller dogs reach their maturity quicker than larger breeds. Large breeds of dogs can suffer bone abnormalities and this risk can be increased by over feeding puppies at an early stage. Also all reputable diets are formulated with sufficient vitamins and minerals so feeding supplements can be ill advised.

August is the time of year, when we look forward to the coming terms in 2016 and into 2017. The Craobh is entering into its fifth year and is going from strength to strength. The playing of our members is developing at an incredible rate and from tentative beginnings a couple of short years ago, they're now delighted to strut their stuff at any opportunity.

Saturday 13th saw the Craobh perform at the sponsored cycle for Mark Nugent. We were privileged to contribute to this worthy cause, which was very successful from a fund-raising perspective, but was a manifestation of the esteem in which Mark is held by the community in Maynooth and also the wider cycling and GAA fraternity.

A fantastic 2 hours of music was served up by the Craobh in collaboration with many of the "veteran" players of the Newtown Inn session, held on Thursdays.

The annual Fleadh Cheoil na hÉireann was held this year in Ennis from 14th to 21st Aug and many musicians from North Kildare headed for the competitions, the street music and the sessions held in every free, dry corner of the town. A Tree-loving Family's Legacy

On a recent visit to the Botanic Gardens we saw a beautiful poster of trees and were informed that they were growing in Kilmacurragh. This was the first we had heard of this magnificent arboretum. Located in east Co. Wicklow, between Kilbride and Rathdrum, Kilmacurragh is now part of the National Botanic Gardens of Ireland. Without a car, the place is hard to reach but is well worth the effort.

Kilmacurragh has been inhabited since the seventh century when St. Mochorog established a hermitage there. An Abbey was then built on the site and was used as a resting place by pilgrims on their way to Glendalough. It survived until the dissolution of the monasteries in the sixteenth century and then, in the seventeenth century, Thomas Acton was reportedly given the land instead of wages for services to Oliver Cromwell. His son, also named Thomas, tore down the Abbey in 1697 and, using its materials, erected one of the first unfortified mansions of the time. Sir William Robinson, who designed the Royal Hospital in Kilmainham, was the architect. It was during this period that the house was enhanced by a formal Dutch-style landscape with canals, great avenues and a forty-acre Deer Park, which was popular in those days. A pond, originally used to provide the monks with carp, was also improved.

Trees continued to play an important part in the family's life when, in 1736, a two-mile long beech avenue was planted to celebrate the marriage of Thomas' son William to Jane Parsons of Birr Castle. William and Jane's eldest son, Thomas, who inherited the estate, purchased rare and exotic trees with money obtained by selling timber from his woodlands. In 1818, Thomas's son, William, married his cousin Caroline Walker, who had a passion for flowers and wildlife, which she passed on to her children.

The gardens were transformed when William and Caroline's son, yet another Thomas, and his sister,

Janet, took over the estate in 1854. Both were keen travellers and frequently went on plant hunting expeditions, even trekking by pony through California's Yosemite Valley. They also had connections with botanic gardens and nurseries around the world. Common yews were planted along what had been 'The Monks' Walk' but, unfortunately, many of these are now infected with a disease for which there is no suitable cure. A Boardwalk lined with crimson-flowered rhododendrons was created. This was wide enough for two women in crinolines accompanied by two men to stroll down. On our visit, the blooms had disappeared but we were told that as the colourful petals fall to the ground, they create what appears to be a floral carpet.

The Actons' friendship with Dr. David Moore, curator of what was then the Royal Botanic Gardens in Glasnevin, and, later, with the next curator, his son Frederick Moore, provided them with advice and a supply of wild-sourced material. David Moore had tried unsuccessfully to grow many of his southern hemisphere conifers in Glasnevin but found that they flourished in Kilmacurragh's mild, moist climate and acidic brown earth. It was thanks to David that Sir Joseph Hooker, the renowned British botanist and Charles Darwin's closest friend, gave his specimens from the Sikkim Himalayas to Kilmaccuragh, where they formed the most complete collection of rhododendrons in Europe.

Thomas kept detailed records of his plants' successes, many of these being cultivated outdoors for the first time in the British Isles. He died in 1908 without an heir. With the subsequent deaths of his two male successors, and many of Kilmacurragh's gardeners during World War1, as well as death duties imposed on the family, the financial pressures forced the Actons to leave. The land and house were then leased for use as a hotel. In 1933, on the death of Isabel, wife of the last Acton brother, Major Reginald, killed in Ypres in 1916, their son, Charles inherited the estate. Charles' passion was music and

he became The Irish Times' music critic in 1955. During this period the gardens became extremely neglected and, in 1974, the Land Commission acquired Kilmacurragh. In 1978 restoration work began on the house but, unfortunately, two accidental fires destroyed much of its roof and interior. From an original area of over five thousand acres, fifty-two acres of the old demesne officially became part of the National Botanic Gardens of Ireland in 1996.

Today the gardens, which have trees so rare that they may be some of the only examples growing in Europe, are divided into three areas: Chinese, where we saw a specimen like the original tea tree from China; Himalayan, which has many varieties of the wild-origin rhododendrons discovered by Victorian plant hunters, and a Chilean area. In the latter we saw the Chilean laurel, one of many Champion Trees that Kilmacurragh owns; 'Champion Trees' are the tallest, oldest or biggest in Ireland. Our guide told us, this laurel is 'a very handsome tree' and asked us to smell some fallen golden leaves, which had a lovely scent. We also saw a recently discovered conifer from Australia, which was thought to be extinct and was only identified from fossils of its leaves.

Other attractions include a wildflower meadow with over ninety different species and a forty-five metre double herbaceous border. Here we saw massive Himalayan lilies, which were raised from seeds and have enormous white trumpets that only last for eight days. There are also two metre high echium plants with cylindrical shaped blue flowers. The latter are now getting rare in their native Canary Islands.

It is hoped that, one day, Kilmacurragh's house will be re-roofed to give additional space for functions. In the meantime, President Higgins and his wife, Sabina, opened new tearooms last May. This building has been named the Acton Café in memory of the family who had such a great love for trees.

Editorial

With the evenings closing in we are more aware that we are in the latter part of the year. Of course for many of us September is the start of the year, of course I mean the academic year. The provision of ten more classrooms on the existing site is raising some concerns about the timescale for the delivery of the two new schools. I know that a number of parents who need post-primary places in the next couple of years are thinking about post-primary options elsewhere because of the delay with these schools. Parents need to keep the pressure on to ensure that these new schools are delivered as soon as possible.

Aside from formal education there are a wealth of less formal lifelong learning courses and you should check out the Kildare Wicklow Education and Training Board for courses in Maynooth and adjoining towns. There are a limited number of courses also available in Maynooth University covering a range of areas of education. If you want social activities you should check out the details of many such activities in the diary section of this newspaper. And of course my "hobby horse" you do worse than look into joining many of the local community groups in Maynooth.

Speaking of community groups, the recent fund raising cycle event for the Mark Nugent Fund was yet another example of many community groups coming together to support a good cause. I will not mention individual groups because I run the risk of leaving somebody out, but it was clear that there is massive goodwill in our community. Of course the Nugent and Nevin families are well known in Maynooth but I expect that even they were very surprised with the support.

The fundraising event in August for Mark Nugent was a cycling event and it consequently brought out almost every cyclist in Maynooth, it is a pity that Kildare County Council does not recognise the need to improve dedicated cycling infrastructure in Maynooth. One new example of this failure is the fact that the new footpath from the Rockfield Estate to the Maynooth Educate Together National School on the Celbridge Road does not cater for cyclists. Both Educate Together and the Gaelscoil schools are on their permanent sites and we should encourage cycling to school. The exclusion of full cycling facilities here is a missed opportunity.

Lastly September has always had a celebration in Irish history with the harvest being celebrated in ancient times. In recent years a number of events have taken place in September to celebrate different things. One of the best known was Arthur's Day by Guinness but this was owned by the marketing people so was a failure and was discontinued. Culture Night is on Friday night September 15th and is being celebrated throughout the country. Many events are planned for Maynooth including a number in Maynooth University. Cllr. McGinley Condemns the Governments Proposal on Sending Planning Applications for Housing Estates Directly to An Bord Pleanala Cllr. McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the July meeting of Kildare County Council:

"That this Council condemns the Governments proposal that planning applications for housing estates of more than 100 houses would go straight to An Bord Pleanala."

In proposing the Motion Cllr. McGinley made the following points: "All Planning Applications for housing estates in Kildare go to the Council for approval at present. The Governments proposal means that all Planning Applications for estates of more than 100 houses would go directly to An Bord Pleanala.

Planning Applications with Kildare County Council can be viewed on the Councils web site. This is not the case with An Bord Pleanala, which will make it very difficult for the public to view plans.

Planning is not to blame for the housing crisis. This proposed measure of the Government wrongly suggests that planning delays at local authority level were the reason for the housing crisis.

It is ridiculous to say that the 8-12 week period for council approval of planning permission is the cause of 100,000 shortfall in housing needs. The Government is seeking to fulfil the wishes of the mandarins in the Department of Housing and Local Government who are directly responsible for delays of years, not weeks, in delivering housing and who exercise more power in an incompetent and arrogant fashion.

It will further erode what little powers are left with local government as well as tightening the screw yet again on public participation in the planning process.

It will be very bad for proper planning as County Development Plans and Local Area Plans will be ignored. Land would not even need to be zoned for housing for such a proposal to be considered, and even approved, by An Bord Pleanala.

The Irish Planning Institute has opposed the proposal as has the Irish Times in an Editorial".

At the meeting the Council's Senior Planner said that he was against the Governments proposal as it would be very bad for proper planning.

The Council agreed to write to the Minister outlining our views on the governments proposal.

The Kildare and Wicklow Educational and Training Board (KWETB) has applied for Planning Permission for a 2 storey pre-fab of 10 classrooms at Maynooth Post Primary School on 4 August.

13 Contractors Express Interest in Maynooth Education Campus Construction

Kildare North Labour Representative Emmet Stagg has welcomed the fact that 13 Contractors have expressed their interest in tendering for the construction of the Maynooth Education Campus by the closing date of July 19th.

Mr. Stagg said the Maynooth Education Campus Project involves the construction of two new Post Primary Schools and a Shared Sports Facility at an estimated value of €30 Million and the envisaged construction period is 24 months.

I'm working part-time on a low wage. Do I qualify for any social welfare payments?

Answer

It depends on your personal circumstances. Many people work part time before taking up full-time employment. If you are working part time you can, in some cases, keep or apply for a partial social welfare payment, or you may qualify for additional supports.

If you work over 38 hours in a fortnight and you have children you may be able to claim Family Income Supplement (FIS). FIS is a weekly tax-free payment for people on low pay. You may be able to claim a jobseeker's payment for the days you are not working. You can work part-time for up to 3 days a week and claim a reduced Jobseeker's Benefit or Jobseeker's Allowance payment. You may qualify for the Part-time Job Incentive Scheme if you were getting Jobseeker's Allowance and find part-time work for less than 24 hours per week.

However, one of the main conditions for getting a jobseeker's payment is that you must be available for and actively seeking work. This means that you must continue to look for work on the days you are unemployed. You must also be unemployed for at least 4 days out of 7 consecutive days.

If you return to work after a period of unemployment, you may qualify for the Back to Work Family Dividend (BTWFD) which aims to help families move from social welfare into employment. The BTWFD and FIS can be paid together and the BTWFD is not taken into account in the means test for FIS. If you are parenting alone and getting a One-Parent Family Payment, you are allowed to earn a certain amount each week and keep your payment. In some cases, people getting disability payments can do some work and keep a social welfare payment.

GP services with medical card Question

I have a medical card but my doctor has recently charged me for a medical certificate and for a blood test? Should I have to pay for these or should they be covered by the medical card?

Answer

Doctors provide services to medical card holders under the General Medical Scheme (GMS). This means that they have a contract for these services with the Health Service Executive (HSE). The services provided include consultations with patients and necessary treatments that would normally be provided by a general practitioner (GP). GPs also provide prescriptions for drugs, medicines and appliances as required.

Not all GP services are covered under the agreement. For example, if you need a medical report for a driving licence application you may be charged. You may also be charged for medical certificates for absence from work. If you need a medical report to apply for a social welfare payment, the Department of Social Protection may cover the fee.

If you have a medical card or a GP visit card and you need a blood test to diagnose or monitor a condition, this should be provided free of charge. If you have been charged for a blood test by your doctor, you can complain to the HSE. The HSE deals with these complaints on a case by case basis and will arrange for a refund, where appropriate. You make a complaint by contacting your Local Health Office.

Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance

Question

What is the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance?`

nswer

The Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance (BSCFA) helps you meet the cost of uniforms and footwear for children going to school. You must be getting a social welfare payment or taking part in a training, employment or adult education scheme. In general, you must be getting an Increase for a Qualified Child with your payment.

Your children must be aged between 4 and 22 on or before 30 September 2016. If they are aged between 18 and 22, they must be in fulltime second-level education in a recognised school or college. Also, your total family income must be below a certain level for your family size. The allowance is €100 for eligible children aged between 4 and 11 and €200 for those aged between 12 and 22.

The scheme is open from 1 June to 30 September 2016. The Department of Social Protection pays BSCFA automatically to many customers. This means that they do not have to apply for the payment. If you qualify automatically, you should receive a letter stating when and how your Allowance will be paid.

If you do not get an automatic payment you must apply for the Allowance. If any of your children are aged 18 or over, you must apply for the Allowance for them and supply evidence that they are in second-level education (even if automatic payments have issued for other children in the family).

You can get application forms in all local social welfare offices and Intreo centres, and on the Department's website, welfare.ie. When a decision has been made on your application, you will get a letter informing you of this and whether a payment has been awarded. If your application has been successful, you will also be told when and where you can collect the payment. If the Allowance is refused, you can ask for a review of the decision.

The National Flag

Question

What are the rules around using the national flag. Is it true that you can't write on it?

Answer

The National Flag of Ireland is often referred to as the tricolour and consists of three colours – green, white and orange. It was adopted as the flag of the Irish Free State in 1922. It was formally confirmed as the National Flag in the 1937 Constitution:

"The national flag is the tricolour of green, white and orange."


Article 7: Bunreacht na hÉireann.

As part of the 1916 commemorations, the national flag was presented to every primary and post-primary school in the State. Along with the flag, schools received a copy of the 1916 Proclamation as Gaeilge and in English, and a booklet detailing the guidelines for respecting the flag.

These guidelines are issued by the Department of the Taoiseach and give extensive information about when the flag can be flown and how it should be used. For example, no other flag or pennant should be flown above it when it is being flown in Ireland. Care must also be taken not to let the flag touch the ground or become entangled with trees.

The flag should never be defaced by placing slogans, logos, lettering or pictures of any kind on it, for example, at sporting events and it should not be draped on cars, trains, boats or other modes of transport. It should not be carried flat, except when used to drape a coffin. The rules also say the national flag should be replaced if it has become worn or frayed, as it is no longer fit for display in a respectful manner. The same principles apply if the flag is reproduced in printed or electronic format.

However, these guidelines are not statutory guidelines. In other words, there are no laws setting out the rules around use of the flag. This means that there are no penalties for anyone who does not follow the guidelines.

Public Transport a key to alleviate **Maynooth Student Accommodation** pressure - O'Rourke presses for Naas -**Maynooth Orbital Bus Route**

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O Rourke, has highlighted how public transport can alleviate the pressure of student accommodation in Maynooth by opening up adjoining towns, through public transport, to the rent a room scheme. This can be achieved by providing the Bus Service linking Naas to Maynooth via Rathcoffey and Clane, which I have campaigned for over the last number of months.

'In recent months, I have campaigned for the provision of Bus Service linking Naas to Maynooth via Clane and Rathcoffey, which would provide connectivity between these commuter towns and become part of the catchment area for students seeking accommodation, particularly under the rent a room scheme, which also brings benefits for home owners in these areas.'

'The National Transport Authority has confirmed to me that they are now considering providing an orbital bus route serving Naas, Clane, Rathcoffey, Maynooth and Blanchardstown. Following meetings that I have had with constituents in Maynooth, Clane, Rathcoffey and Naas, I have submitted a large number of signatures supporting this proposed service.'

'This service would connect these commuter towns, provide access to NUI Maynooth, better access to Naas, Clane and Blanchardstown Hospitals and I believe increase the student accommodation capacity.'

'As I have highlighted before, linking Naas, Clane Rathcoffey Maynooth and Blanchardstown would address one of the missing public transport services. Naas, Clane, Maynooth and Blanchardstown are all key employment towns, four towns are key retail centres, Maynooth has a University and three of the towns have hospitals. Public Transport is not just about linking commuter towns to Dublin, although important, connecting these commuters towns, as we have now in place between Celbridge, Leixlip and Maynooth, is also important.' stated Deputy O'Rourke. 'In recent months, following representations that I made earlier this year, new morning Kilcock Dublin Bus Eireann services have been introduced, at 6.30am and 8.00am, a location is now proposed for a park and ride facility for bus commuters in Kilcock, and improved Dublin Bus services for Celbridge commuters, on the

Kildare set to receive €380k under Town and Renewal Scheme says O'Rourke

Kildare North Fianna Fail TD Frank O Rourke has said that Kildare should benefit to the tune of €380k from the recently announced Town and Village Renewal Scheme by the Rural Affairs Minister Heather Humphreys. 'The Town and Village Renewal Scheme which the Minister announced last week aims to revitalise up to 200 towns and villages across the country. Funding will be released to Local Authorities once projects are approved by the Department of Arts, Heritage, Regional, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs. The maximum grant for any single project is €100,000.

Fit for purpose Career Guidance essential for future economic growth says O Rourke

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, has called on the Government to consider a proposal put forward by some interested parties that a specialist careers advisory service, to supplement the exiting school provision in the secondary school cycle, should be put in place.

'The Education Act (1998) states that career guidance is a universal entitlement in the secondary school cycle. I believe that there are a number of weaknesses in the current approach to career guidance which include; the almost sole focus on access to third level education with a lack of information on other options available for students, which may be more suitable for the students and necessary for our country."

'For those that do not want to go to Third Level Education, but are more interested, or have greater aptitude, for Apprenticeships, the State, together with other stakeholders, should be more proactive in providing guidance to students who wish to pursue these options.'


'The Department of Education and Science should work with businesses, community and voluntary organisations and other stakeholders, to develop a specialist careers advisory service to supplement the existing school provision approach. A short one-to-one coaching sessions for all second level students each year is one example of what could be provided, effectively providing a continuous and an holistic approach to career guidance.'

'It is critical to prepare young people for life beyond the classroom and ensure that young people, with their parents, are making informed education and career

decisions, with a variety of options being considered.' 'Having external input into career guidance at secondary schools, in my view, will provide better outcomes for all concerned, and have a skills match for the ever changing labour market. More importantly, it increases the options that are available for students and will assist young people in reflecting on their ambitions, interests and abilities

'It is important that apprenticeships are treated with the parity of esteem as compared with higher education options, so that we encourage people to pursue careers based on apprenticeships, skills that a growing economy will always need.'



The Suzuki Approach

The Suzuki Method of Music education was founded by Shinichi Suzuki over half a century ago. Born in Japan in 1898, he studied violin in Berlin where he was befriended by Albert Einstein (who was a keen amateur violinist). However, it was on being asked to teach some very young children that Suzuki began to reformulate ideas on the best method of education.

The resulting approach, now called Suzuki Method, has many different facets behind one very simple and straightforward idea. It is based on the commonplace but quite remarkable feat all our children achieve within their first few years of life: the ability to speak their mother-tongue. Suzuki's belief is that if you apply the same principles of language development to musical education you will get the same happy result.

His method is therefore based on (1) Starting a child as young as is practicable, (2) Placing great emphasis on listening to music, (3) Daily practice and repetition and, perhaps most importantly, (4) Parents and children working together, guided by a trained teacher.

Suzuki places great importance on the education of the whole child.

"My aim in teaching the violin is to give children a sense of joy in experiencing one of the most beautiful and spiritually enriching things we have in the world, which is music. I do not wish to turn all my students into professional musicians - but to use music to develop their sensitivity as human beings. Music can open a child's heart, and give him a finer appreciation of life".

Maynooth Basketball Camp a Big Success

There was a capacity attendance at the Maynooth basketball summer camp from 8th to 11th August. Forty children aged 6 to 10 attended the academy camp where children were introduced to the main skills of basketball over a four day period. Many of the children were new to basketball and the improvement in their abilities and self-confidence was striking.

A further 37 older children, aged 11 to 16 years, had the opportunity to improve their existing skills in the development camp. Here they got expert tuition from some of Ireland's top underage coaches, including Nabil Murad, coach of the u16 boys national team, Erin Bracken, assistant coach of the u18 girls team, Jimmy Clarke, coach of Liffey Celtics, the All Ireland u14 Club Champions, and Eoghan Kiernan, current Irish u20 international.

Jim Walsh, Camp Director, said he was very impressed with the way the children picked up new skills. 'Each coach worked with a small group of 10 children. This allowed the coaches to tailor their skills teaching to the abilities of the children. It was a case of total immersion in basketball over the four days, which is a great way to learn the sport.'

The camp was organised by Maynooth Basketball Academy and Kilcock Basketball Club. Further initiatives to promote basketball are planned, including an academy for younger children commencing in September.


Who Benefits from High Quality Cycle Facilities?

Everyone benefits from high quality cycle facilities. These pictures from the Netherlands show high quality cycle facilities attracting a wide cross-section of the population. This same wide cross-section is starting to appear in London with the opening of the high quality superhighways. For the first time, parents feel subjectively safe in cycling with young children and mobility scooters and skaters have started to appear without causing conflict with pedestrians.

It must not be forgotten that pedestrians too gain from high quality cycle facilities. Cyclists have a safe place to cycle away from pedestrians. Shopkeepers benefit if people do not have the expense of a second car. Finally motorists benefit - if people have the option of short trips by bicycle, the roads would be freed up for those who have no choice but to travel by car. This is our vision for Maynooth.



September Gardening

Autumn has started to creep in. It is now time to get ready for the start of the next season. Autumn is one of the best planting seasons as the roots of new plants will have time to establish before the onset of winter.

Flowers

Buy spring bulbs and plant them as soon as possible, the fresher they are going into the ground, the better they will flower. Take cuttings of tender plants such as geraniums, marguerites, fuchsias and argyranthemums to carry over winter. Conditions are usually ideal with heat in the soil and adequate moisture to encourage rooting immediately. Continue feeding and watering baskets and other containers on a regular basis.



Shrubs & Roses

Shrub roses and ramblers could now be pruned by removing some of the shoots that flowered. Roses that were pruned after flowering and were given some rose fertilizer will be showing a new crop of late buds and flowers - these can even flower into early winter if there is no frost. Evergreen shrubs could be moved now if they need to be given more space. Finish clipping hedges as soon as possible, all kinds of hedge can be clipped at this time and they will stay neat longer if clipped



now. Prepare ground for planting trees and shrubs, including hedging, if not already done. The planting itself can take place now for evergreens or in two months for bare-root deciduous trees, or planting can be delayed until spring if the weather is wet and the ground becomes sodden. Do not plant until spring in an exposed area as the young trees will be damaged by strong winds before they get a chance to get established. Check that trees recently planted are properly staked and stake any old shrubs that appear top-heavy. Check on wall trained climbers that their support is solid.

Fruit & Vegetables

If you have a fruit or vegetable patch, you will be busy harvesting. It is time to get out and start planting spring-flowering bulbs. Dig up remaining potatoes before the slugs damage them. Plant spring cabbage into ground vacated by early potatoes. No fertilizer is needed because the potatoes would have been adequately fed. This



ground is also usually nice and open after potatoes – just the conditions that spring cabbage needs to make some growth before winter. Clean out cold frames and greenhouses so they are ready for use in the autumn. Cover leafy vegetable crops with netting.

Making Potpourri from the Garden



Potpourri allows you to bring not only some of the flowers, leaves and pods inside with you, you can bring some of the scents of the season. It's not hard to make your own potpourri. Look for flowers that hold onto their colour and still look good when dry, like geraniums, lavender, peonies, and roses. Add in interesting seed pods, like sweetgum and rose hips. Pinecones make a nice chunky addition. For more colour, include berries like beautyberry and holly.

You can include leaves, but they tend to fall apart quickly when dried. Look for thicker leaves, like leather-leaf viburnum and the lacy leaves of scented geraniums. Dried citrus peel an dried apple slices add fragrance and nice texture. For extra scent add some essential oils. No matter how you make your potpourri, do not use metal bowls or utensils. These can react with your ingredients and alter the fragrance. Glass, ceramic and wood are the safest materials. Plastic is fine too, but the scent will linger in it for weeks. A quick and easy way to mix up a batch of potpourri is to add a few drops of essential oil to your fixative, cover and set it aside for 3 - 5 days, so that the scent is completely infused. Then add your dry ingredients and stir everything together. Cover again and allow to steep for about 1 month. Check it occasionally, to make sure the scent is strong enough for you. If not, add more oil.

Healthy Recipes

Healthy food need not be boring. A healthy diet low in fat and salt and high in fruit and vegetables is a significant factor in reducing the risk of heart disease.

Watermelon and Feta Salad with Lime Ingredients: 1kg/2lbs 4oz watermel



1kg/2lbs 4oz watermelon, in medium sized chunks, peeled 2 tbsps pumpkin seeds 1 tbsp fræze dried green or regular peppercorps

Serves 4

tbsp freeze-dried green or regular peppercorns
120g/4½ oz. feta cheese
limes, rind and juice
tbsps olive oil

Method:

Toast the pumpkin seeds in an oven until lightly coloured. Crack the peppercorns gently between your fingers or with the flat of a knife. Chop the feta into small cubes and place in a bowl with the watermelon and the pumpkin seeds. Add lime rind and juice and olive oil to the bowl and toss gently. Pile a mound of the salad onto four plates. Scatter some peppercorns over each mound. Squeeze a little more lime juice over, if desired. Serve chilled or at room temperature

Pan Seared Scallops with White Wine

Ingredients:

16 large king scallops, trimmed 120ml dry white wine 120ml white fish stock 1 stem fresh lemongrass, chopped 20g/1oz chives, chopped 1 tsp olive oil

Method

Sear the scallops on both sides in a little olive oil in a very hot pan. Remove from the pan and keep warm. Add the white wine and lemongrass to the pan and reduce by half. Add the fish stock and again reduce by half. Return the scallops to the pan for 2 - 3 minutes until cooked. Add in chopped chives and serve.

One Crust Fruit Pie

Ingredients:

Shortcut pastry

175g/6oz. plain and wholemeal mixed flour 80g/3oz. polyunsaturated margarine, at room temperature Cold water

Filling

 $675g/1/_{2}$ lb prepared fruit (rhubarb, gooseberries, raspberries) 50g/2oz. caster sugar **Glaze**

1 small egg white

- 1 tbsp sugar
- Method:

Make up the pastry by sieving the flour into a large mixing bowl, then rubbing the fats into it lightly. When the mixture reaches the crumb stage, sprinkle in enough cold water to bring it together to a smooth dough that leaves the bowl clean. Give it a little light knead to bring it fully together, then place the pastry in a polythene bag in the fridge for 30 minutes. Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6. Roll the pastry out on a flat surface to a round of approximately 12 inches, as you roll, give it quarter-turns so that it ends up as round as you can make it. Now carefully roll the pastry round the rolling pin and transfer it to the centre of the lightly greased baking sheets. Pile the prepared fruit in the centre of the pastry, sprinkling it with sugar as you go. Then turn in the edges of the pastry; if any breaks, patch it back on again. Brush the surface with egg white and sprinkle sugar over pastry. Bake in oven for 35 minutes or until the crust is golden brown. Serve with a little Greek yogurt or light cream.

Guidelines for healthy cooking

- * Use herbs and spices rather than salt to flavour food. Many people watch their salt intake because of raised blood pressure.
- * Use little or no oil when making a healthy low fat dish. All oils are 100% fat, even olive oil so use a maximum of 2 tablespoons of pure vegetable oil for 4 portions.
- Serve dressings and sauces on the side. Use low fat cooking methods steam, grill, poach, microwave, oven bake, stir fry or roast without fat or oil.

FILM/DVD MONTHLY BY BERNIE CLAXTON JASON BOURNE Starring: Matt Damon, Alicia Vikander & Tommy Lee Jones

Jason Bourne is a wanted man. Its nine years since the rogue CIA assassin tore up the big screen in *The Bourne Ultimatum*. Paul Greengrass (director of *Supremacy (2004)* and *Ultimatum* (2007) is back to spearhead the fifth instalment in the spy-thriller franchise. *Jason Bourne brings* the title character into a post-Snowden era and one where social media has taken on a pervasive and disturbing influence.

After a spectacular ending to *The Bourne Ultimatum*, our favourite amnesiac anti-hero is back seeking answers. Albeit he's 'off the grid' and earning a dirty living (was it ever clean) as a bare-knuckle fighter for hire on the Albanian border.



An older, grizzled Bourne (Matt Damon) has most of his memory back but lacks the final piece in the jigsaw puzzle that saw his father implicated in murky CIA dealings. Bourne's former ally Nicky Parsons (Julia Stiles) turns up out of the blue with hacked information on CIA skulduggery and vital information about his past. The agent is reluctantly dragged back from his selfimposed obscurity.



This triggers a devious game of cat-and-mouse. Creepy CIA Director Robert Dewey (Tommy Lee Jones) and uber-cool cyber analyst Heather Lee (Alicia Vikander) are soon hot on their renegade operative's trail. They enlist sophisticated state of the art surveillance technology to track Bourne. Throw a ruthless nameless assassin (Vincent Cassel) into the mix and the viewer is guaranteed numerous action sequences

The *Bourne* films have always sold the idea that they are better and grittier than *Bond*. Greengrass's background as a documentary-maker (*World in A ction*) and his dramatization of the real events of *Bloody Sunday* have given him a reputation for gritty realism.



Jason Bourne is basically a two hour chase movie. In almost every scene Bourne is either pursuing or being pursued. Any rare moments of introspection in the film

involve Bourne's jarring flashback memories of what happened to his father. Bourne like the film itself is essentially monosyllabic. Damon utters a mere handful of lines throughout the course of the film. If you're interested in snappy dialogue and scenery-chewing villains, this is not the film for you.

Like the previous *Bourne* outings, the emphasis is firmly on spectacular gravity-defying, explosive set-pieces. Greengrass shows his command of deafening, frenetically edited action sequences. The director cowrote the film with his regular editor Christopher Rouse. As with *Mission Impossible: Rogue Nation*, Greengrass's film hops from one city to the next for its tale of violent intrigue and double-dealing.



The action is relentless from Bourne's signature rapidfire hand -to-hand combat, to high-speed car and motorcycle chases. The highlights include a chaotic chase through an anti-austerity march in the streets of Athens and a blistering showdown finale in Las Vegas. This being a Greengrass film, be prepared for lots of shaky, hand-held camerawork that shifts between sterile control rooms and crowded areas.

People of a nervous disposition may want to stay home. And make no mistake, with Greengrass's style of filmmaking – you come out of it literally gasping for breath! The problem with this whole approach is that while *Jason Bourne* replicates scenes, action and twists from previous films in the series, it doesn't essentially add anything new.



The plot is rather bland and threadbare. Greengrass's jittery, jolting camerawork and whiplash editing seems to be masking the fact that not very much is actually happening onscreen. When we are not being assaulted by Greengrass's camera, his characters spend a lot of time either frowning at computer screens or walking endlessly!



On the plus side Matt Damon is compelling as ever as the restless, conflicted ex-CIA killing machine. His boyish good looks have matured into something harder and grittier. His face looks weathered, lived in and haunted as befits his character's story through four films. He's still every inch the action hero, although showing signs of vulnerability in spots. There is a humanity to Bourne not evident in the other characters in the film. His speech may be sparse but his body language is expressive, displaying violence and sadness in equal measure.



The supporting cast go through their paces. Veteran actor Tommy-Lee Jones is predictably chilling as the calculating and devious CIA head, Dewey. The potential usurper to his crown comes in the form of Alicia Vikander's steely ambitious cyber analyst who believes the renegade Bourne can be brought back into the fold. However, the Swedish actress's obvious youth and beauty is a distraction to believability in this role.



Vincent Cassel's CIA 'asset' exudes the chill factor in his portrayal of Bourne's counterpart in the killing stakes. Aaron Kalloor (Riz Ahmed) is the Zuckerbergstyle guru running a social media organisation called 'Deep Dream' which may be in colluding with Tommy Lee Jones in sinsister data mining and breaches of privacy.

Greengrass's fifth entry in the Bourne franchise is a dour disappointment overall. What was once innovative has become pedestrian in this rendering. It's one-dimensional filmmaking. The near relentless actions sequences are expertly executed but at saturation point for most of *Jason Bourne*. The film itself is swamped in cyber pyrotechnics and the characters, apart from Damon's Bourne, do not engage the interest to any real degree. By contrast the *Bond* films succeed because they appeal to the human factor and, more importantly they entertain. **Rating: 3/5**
