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Maynooth Strike Gold "Again" in National Tidy Towns Awards 2017

Maynooth Tidy Towns won Gold again at The National Tidy Towns Awards in The Helix Theatre, DCU for 2017.

We are absolutely delighted and thrilled with this win especially as we are in a different category this year and most importantly we increased our points this year to 323 up from 316 in 2016. We were competing with the likes of Naas, Leixlip, Newbridge, Celbridge and many other towns in Category G all over Ireland. Most of these Towns would be large tourist towns with bigger budgets than Maynooth.



Maynooth GAA Coaching has begun for the new season.


This is a great opportunity for kids to get involved in a team sport, to keep fit, to make



A New Book on: Irish-Soviet Diplomatic and Friendship Relations 1917-1991 by Michael Quinn



Michael Quinn was a member of the Connolly Youth Movement in the 1970s, and Youth Officer of the County Kildare Constituency Council of the Labour Party in the 1980s. He was the founding Chair of the Maynooth Local History Group, and of the James Connolly Memorial Initiative. The Initiative commissioned the sculptor, the late Eamonn O'Doherty, to erect the memorial to James Connolly in

adaption and expansion of that thesis. He works as a Finance Administrator in the community and voluntary sector, and is a member of SIPTU.

Update on the Provision of Traffic Signals for the Straffan Road/Meadowbrook Link Road Junction

Cllr. John McGinley got the following update from the Council's Senior Executive Engineer on 5 September: "The Engineer for the Developer has confirmed to me recently that the traffic lights on the Straffan Road Maynooth should be installed shortly by the Developer. I have requested the programme of works, the traffic management plan and the name of the Contractor from the Engineer.

I will update you on this information as soon as I get it."

Update on Improving Safety at Maynooth Playground

Cllr. John McGinley was given the following update on his motion at the MD meeting on 13 September: Temporary CCTV will be installed for 2/3 months to see how they will work. The Council are seeking volunteers to open and close the Playground. Refurbishment of the Playground will take place in October.

Planting to be Carried out at Bond Bridge Embankment:

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his Motion at the Maynooth MD meeting on 13 September: "When will the council plant shrubs and trees on the west embankment at Bond Bridge as requested by residents? The Council replied as follows:

"The work will be carried out as part of the 2018 tree planting programme which will take place between January and March."

Cllr. McGinley Seeks Traffic Calming for Newtown Road:

Cllr. John McGinley got the following reply to his Motion at the Maynooth MD meeting on 13 September

"When will the council install a traffic calming ramp at the Bond Bridge end of Newtown Road, Maynooth, as requested by residents?

The Council gave the following highly unsatisfactory reply: "We have no plans to construct a ramp on this section of road."

John asked the Engineer to re-consider the issue as pedestrians cross the road where the footpath narrows at the entrance to the Health Board houses.

As KCC won't put a footpath on the northern side of the road a ramp is needed in the interest of public safety. John also highlighted the fact that a large volume of pedestrians use the footpath.

Cllr. McGinley demands that any Surplus from Maynooth Pay Parking Must be Ring-fenced for Use in Maynooth Town:

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD meeting on 13 September: "That any surplus funds from pay parking in Maynooth must only be used for improvement works in Maynooth Town, as previously agreed with the Area Committee."

The Council replied as follows:

"This is for the discussion and agreement of the members." Cllr. McGinley made the following points in support of his Motion:

- Maynooth, being a University Town needs special attention, especially in the Town Centre Area.
- Funding is needed to implement the Public Realm Strategy identified in the Maynooth Local Area Plan, which includes the Re-Vamp of the Square and the enhancement of the Lanes off the Main Street.
- The surplus funds from the Maynooth Pay Parking will help in achieving the objectives of the Local Area Plan
- That was the thinking of the Area Committee when they unanimously agreed that any surplus form Pay Parking in Maynooth must only be used for improvement works in the town

Cllr. McGinley's Motion was agreed unanimously despite the strong objections of the Director of Services.

The MD engineer advised the Councilor's that a scheme is currently being designed for the refurbishment of The Square and that it will be brought to the MD members prior to public consultation.

Cllr. McGinley Again Calls for the Extension of the 67 Bus Route to the New Schools on the Moyglare Road:

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD meeting on 13 September: "That Dublin Bus be asked to outline their plans for extending the 67 bus route to Moyglare Hall in order to cater for the needs of the eight hundred houses on the Moyglare Road, as well as the two new secondary schools at Moyglare Hall and the sixty plus individuals attending the St. John of God's services."

John got the following unacceptable reply from the Council: "The National Transportation Authority (NTA) has commenced a process to fundamentally transform Dublin's bus system - BusConnects will include Dublin Bus services to Maynooth and other towns in the county. The bus network redesign is underway and a public consultation process will commence in early 2018. Information can be obtained from www.busconnects.ie"

John pointed out that Dublin Bus had agreed to the Route extension in February 2014, subject to NTA approval. He asked that the Council now write to Dublin Bus and the NTA asking them to proceed with the Route extension to facilite the two new schools, the 800 houses and the sixty plus individuals attending the St. John of Gods Services. This was agreed.

Backward Step in Providing a Bus Turning Point for the 66 Route at Crinnstown Nursing Home.

Councillors were advised at the Maynooth MD meeting on 13 September that the owner of the Nursing Home at Crinnstown has requested the Council to suspend this project.

Double Yellow Lines to be Provided at Silken Vale/ The Arches

Maynooth MD Councillors unanimously agreed at the MD meeting on 13 September to the Councils proposal for double yellow lines/parking restrictions at Silken Vale/The Arches.

Update on the Greenway from Kilcock to Maynooth:

Councillors were given the following update at the MD meeting on 13 September:

"As part of the Chambers Bridge to Maynooth Harbour project, which is due to commence on 11 September 2017, underground ducting will be laid along this section of the canal to facilitate potential lighting of the greenway. No commitment is in place as yet, for the provision of these lights."

Cllr. McGinley asked that as a minimum public lighting should be provided from Bond Bridge to the Harbour.

Prevention of Parking of Caravans at the Entrance to the Harbour, Maynooth

Following on from Cllr. McGinleys motion the MD engineer advised the September MD meeting as follows:

"As part of the North/South Corridor, we intend to landscape this portion of land and incorporate it into the Public Realm element of this project."

Update on the Taking in Charge of Castle Dawson and Meadowbrook:

Councillors were given the following update at the Maynooth MD meeting on 13 September:

"Castle Dawson has not been taken in charge to date. The pump station that serves Castle Dawson is now in the control of the developer of Newtown Hall. He had indicated some time ago that he had no objection to the council taking the pump station in charge in advance of the remainder of Newtown Hall. We provided him with a list of remedial works that were required to bring the pump station up to taking in charge standard but to date these works have only been partially completed. Given that all of the houses are now substantially completed in Newtown Hall, the developer may want us to take that estate in charge along with the pump station and Castle Dawson. Building and Development Control staff will contact the developer to clarify and will keep the members informed of progress. When the taking in charge of Castledawson has been finalised, the Municipal District Engineer can consider maintenance works to the roads in the estate."

"We have included Meadowbrook on the agenda for our next meeting with Irish Water. No date for our next meeting as yet though."

Examination of Accommodation Options for North Kildare Gaelcholaiste Still Ongoing - Stagg

Kildare North Labour Representative Emmet Stagg has again raised with the Minister for Education the issue of the securing of accommodation for the North Kildare Gaelcholaiste in Maynooth, which is due to open in 2019.

The Minister advised Mr. Stagg that Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board are continuing to examine options for accommodation for the school which will involve consideration of the timing and availability of appropriate infrastructure in the area. The Minister reiterated to Mr. Stagg that his Department would continue to work closely with KWETB and An Foras Patrunachta in relation to the provision of appropriate accommodation for the establishment of the school.

The Maynooth Education Campus stated Mr. Stagg is due for completion in May, 2019, so the old Maynooth Post Primary School is an obvious choice for the Gaelcholaiste.

In conclusion Kildare North Labour Representative Emmet Stagg stated that he would continue to press the Minister on this issue to ensure that the Gaelcholaiste opens on time in 2019.

Construction of New Maynooth Educate Together School to Commence in Early 2018 - Stagg

Emmet Stagg has been in contact with the Minister for Education and Skills in relation to progressing the Tender Stage of the New Maynooth Educate Together School on the Celbridge Road, Maynooth, and the commencement of construction of the New School.

The Minister has advised Mr. Stagg that the initial grant of planning permission for the new permanent school was received on 27th July last and that the final grant of permission is awaited. The Minister further advised Mr. Stagg that when the final grant of permission is received the project will then proceed to tender stage in the final quarter of 2017 and that construction will commence in early 2018.

Welcoming this positive news that construction should commence in early 2018 Kildare North Labour Representative Emmet Stagg congratulated the Board of Management of the school on progressing the project to this stage. The school he stated recently celebrated their 10 anniversary. Kildare North Labour Representative Emmet Stagg looks forward to work commencing on the new 2 storey 16 classroom school in early 2018.

IDA Actively Promoting HP Inc Maufacturing Plant at Leixlip – Stagg

Following the decision by Hewlett Packard to close their Hp Inc Business Manufacturing Plant at Leixlip last February, Kildare North Labour Representative Emmet Stagg has been pressing the Tanaiste and Minister for Business, Enterprise and Innovation in relation to progress in securing a replacement manufacturing industry for the site.

The Tanaiste advised Mr. Stagg that since HP Inc. made the regrettable decision to close its facility in Leixlip, the IDA has been actively promoting the site to existing clients and potential investors and will continue to do so in the time ahead. The Tanaiste stated she was hopeful that a new investor will be identified in due course and that further employment opportunities will in turn be created for the people of Leixlip and the surrounding area.

The Tanaiste added that while HP Inc's decision is very disappointing, there remain over 20 other multinational companies in Kildare that employ 10,139 people in total across a broad range of sectors. IDA Ireland continues to work with this client base to both sustain and grow employment further in the County.

Commenting on the Tanaiste's response Kildare North Labour Representative Emmet Stagg stated that he welcomed the fact that the IDA were actively promoting the site and he expressed the hope that an alternative manufacturing operation would be secured for the Leixlip site.

Fuel Allowance Ouestion

Who qualifies for Fuel Allowance

Fuel Allowance is paid under the National Fuel Scheme, operated by the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection. It is intended to help people who are dependent on long-term social welfare payments and who are unable to meet their heating needs. The fuel season for 2017-2018 starts on Monday 2 October 2017.

Under the scheme, a Fuel Allowance of €22.50 per week is generally paid with your social welfare payment. For the 2017-2018 fuel season, the total allowance of €585 can be paid in two equal lump sums, one at the start of the season in October and the second in January. To avail of this payment option, you must complete the form FA CPF 1 which is available from your local post office or social welfare office. You can also get this form by texting FORM FUELCHANGE, followed by your name and address, to 51909. To get the lump sum in October 2017, you must submit your completed form before 15 September 2017. If you submit your form after this date there is no guarantee that you will receive the lump sum in October, but your weekly payment will continue until the January lump sum is issued.

Fuel Allowance is a means-tested payment. If you are getting a non-contributory social welfare payment, you are accepted as satisfying the means test.

You must live alone or with someone who also qualifies for the allowance - you cannot get the allowance if you live with someone who does not qualify. Where two or more people living in the same household qualify for the allowance, only one allowance is paid. If your heating needs are met in other ways (for example, if you live in local authority housing where heating is provided), you do not qualify for Fuel Allowance.

If you think you are eligible, you should apply immediately because the allowance will not be backdated after the start of the fuel season in October. The application form for Fuel Allowance (NFS1) is available at your post office or social welfare office, or by texting FORM FUEL followed by your name and address to 51909.

Student grant appeals **Ouestion**

I've applied for a student grant to start a college course this year but I didn't get the grant I was expecting. What can I do?

Applications for the Student Grant Scheme are processed by Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI). If you are not happy with the outcome of your application, you can ask SUSI to review the decision if there has been a change in your circumstances or if you think your household income wasn't assessed correctly. You can also request a review if you think you should get a special rate of grant or if you think there was an error in assessing the distance between your home and college (which affects whether you get an adjacent or non-adjacent rate).

You can request a review by using the online form on house and will have to pay for someone else to finish the website susi.ie.

You can also make an appeal to SUSI if you are not happy with your final grant decision or if you request a review and are not satisfied with the outcome. You must make the appeal within 30 days of the original grant decision. This deadline may be extended by a further 30 days if the Appeals Officer accepts that you have reasonable cause.

To appeal, you complete the form, available at susi.ie, explaining why you think SUSI applied the rules incorrectly. The Appeals Officer will notify you of the outcome within 30 days.

If your appeal is turned down you can submit a further appeal to the independent Student Grants Appeals Board, outlining why you believe the scheme has not been interpreted correctly in your case. When you get the written decision of the SUSI Appeals Officer it will include information on how to submit an appeal to the Student Grants Appeals Board.

The Board has 60 days to decide on your appeal and will write to you to let you know its decision. An appeal of this decision on a specific point of law is possible and can be made to the High Court.

Lost or stolen passport **Question**

What happens if my Irish passport is lost or stolen while I am travelling abroad?

If you lose your Irish passport abroad, you should immediately report the loss to the local police and to the nearest Irish Embassy or Consulate. You will be asked to confirm the loss in writing or, if you are applying for a replacement, to include the details of the loss in your passport application.

You must also ask the local police for a written statement that you have reported the loss of your passport. A member of the police authority in the country in which the passport went missing must witness this statement.

You will need this police report to get a replacement passport or Emergency Travel Document from an Irish embassy or consulate.

If there is no Irish embassy or consulate in the country where you are, contact the embassy of any EU member state and they will get in touch with the nearest Irish embassy on your behalf. An embassy of another EU member state cannot issue you with a new Irish passport, but can, in some cases, issue an EU Emergency Travel Document for a single journey back to your country of permanent residence in the

It may be useful to carry a photocopy of the personal data page of your passport with you when travelling, or to scan an image of that page and email it to yourself. Any passport reported as lost or stolen is no longer a valid travel document. You should not try to travel on a passport that has been reported as lost or stolen.

Small Claims Procedure Ouestion

I am not happy with work that a builder did on my

the job properly. What can I do to recoup the additional expense?

Answer

If your original builder is unwilling to compensate you, you may be able to pursue a claim against the builder through the Small Claims Procedure. The aim of this procedure is to provide an inexpensive, fast and easy way for consumers to resolve disputes without needing to employ a solicitor. The maximum amount you can claim is €2,000. The small claims service is provided through local District Court

Anyone who has purchased goods or services for private use from someone selling them in the course of business may submit a claim using the Small Claims Procedure. You can make claims for faulty goods or bad workmanship, for minor damage to property, and for the non-return of rent deposits for certain kinds of rented properties, for example, a holiday home. Businesses involved in disputes with other businesses can also use the Small Claims Procedure.

To make a claim, you complete an application form which you can download from the Small Claims Procedure section of courts.ie or get from the Small Claims Registrar at the District Court office. Make sure you use the correct name and address of the person or company you want to make the claim against. The completed form and a fee of €25 should be lodged with the Small Claims Registrar. You can also apply online at the Courts Service Online website, csol.ie.

The Registrar sends a copy of your application to the person you are making the claim against. If the other party does not reply within 15 days of receiving your application, your claim will be automatically treated as undisputed and you can apply for a court order in your favour. If your claim is disputed, the Registrar will contact you and let you have a copy of the reasons why the other party is disputing your claim. The Registrar will try to negotiate a settlement to the dispute. If no settlement can be reached, the matter is then set for a court hearing in the District Court.

Additional transport services as GoCar launches in Maynooth

I am delighted to be able to welcome GoCar to Kildare North. I have had correspondence with GoCar lobbying to extend services to Irish Rail stations where many commuters had contacted me on the same. I am delighted to confirm this is now the case. Since the 16th of September commuters have had the option of using GoCar vehicles in Kildare North.

GoCar is a car sharing membership based program where, once you join, you can rent a car or van 24/7, 365 days a year. I understand each GoCar is estimated to replace up to 15 private cars which will only serve to ease congestion and make commuting to work that bit quicker.

I have long advocated and lobbied for better transport links for Kildare North, including increased bus routes, restructuring of train fares, and road improvements. I will continue to work on these various transport projects to ensure better transportation links for our towns.

Local Improvement Scheme for rural roads

I was very keen to help residents on rural, private roads to apply for funding to have their roads improved following the reopening of the Local Improvement Scheme from the Department of Rural and Community Development. The scheme has been restored for the remainder of the calendar year following pressure from Fianna Fáil.

This is a great opportunity to have rural roads resurfaced where the council have not taken these roads in charge. It is estimated that residents on these private lanes are asked to cover 10% to 15% of the cost while the Department will cover the remaining 90%.

Applications had to have been submitted into the Department via Kildare County Council by the 14th of September. I was delighted to assist with some residents on rural roads on the outskirts of Maynooth and elsewhere in Kildare North.

Expansion of Trading Online Voucher Scheme vital for small businesses

The Government must examine possibilities to expand the Trading Online Voucher Scheme. The scheme was put in place to support small and local businesses in getting a foothold in the online marketplace. The

vouchers are available from local enterprise offices. New information revealed that just over 1,100 vouchers were availed of in both 2015 and 2016. €m has been allocated to the scheme for 2017.

Nearly 70% of Ireland's online consumer spending currently goes overseas according to the European Commission. The online marketplace is expected to grow significantly in the years ahead so there is a need to ensure that Irish businesses have a presence online to take advantage of this.

Greater supports are urgently needed to assist businesses in securing a high profile presence online. This can be achieved by expanding the Trading Online Voucher Scheme in order to give Irish businesses in all regions increased market share as online consumption grows. This is now more important than ever with Brexit on the

High speed broadband is a must for small businesses to compete in e-commerce. It connects small businesses to a global market so they need to be able to utilise the latest digital technologies to enable their enterprises to grow and prosper.

In the Dáil I recently introduced a bill to improve and speed up the provision of rural broadband. The overall goal of this Bill is to make it quicker and easier for providers to roll out broadband services. Ireland has a poor track record in this area in recent years, as is demonstrated by the ongoing problems with the National Broadband Plan.

The roll out of the National Broadband Plan has been haphazard with over 500,000 homes and businesses still waiting for information on when they will be able to access high speed broadband. The National Competitiveness Council has said that regional jobs growth is being stunted due to the sluggish roll out of the Housing, Eoghan Murphy in its design. National Broadband Plan.

High speed broadband is also needed for the development of online e-commerce opportunities for Irish SMEs. It is essential that SME businesses, which employ over 900,000 people nationwide, are given every support to diversify their sales platform.

Affordable Housing Scheme must be a core part of Government policy

The Government must take real action on its

commitment to launch a new affordable housing initiative. The Taoiseach made another announcement about utilising Nama to help with providing housing but unfortunately this announcement lacked any specific details on how it was going to be used to deliver more affordable and social housing.

Fianna Fáil pledged to use NAMA to build affordable homes in our election manifesto in February 2016. The Government must make up its mind and outline the plan they have for NAMA.

An explicit commitment of the Confidence and Supply arrangement is the establishment of an affordable housing scheme. We believe that NAMA should be used for this explicit purpose of helping increase supply and open up home ownership to working families currently squeezed out of the market.

NAMA can and should be used to launch affordable housing schemes in Dublin and other urban areas where supply is weakest and where prices are highest.

This will help ensure that working families are not priced out of the market and have a chance to own their own home. This was originally outlined in our manifesto and would be financed by a new national home building bond, on an off balance sheet basis, and through funds from the Strategic Investment Fund and the credit union

I am deeply concerned that this is another one of his Government's kite flying exercises rather than a substantive policy proposal.

Establishing an affordable housing scheme is a core part of the Confidence and Supply arrangement between Fine Gael. Using NAMA and accessing off balance sheet finance makes sense to help deliver the housing units we need, and I look forward to engaging with Minister for

O'Rourke Presses For Increased Rail services for Kilcock

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, is pressing for increased frequency of service for Kilcock rail commuters, given the increased level of commuters living in Kilcock and using the train service.

"Since getting elected, I have campaigned hard for better public transport services for North Kildare. Kilcock is a growing area and is a commuter town. We must improve the public transport servicing the town."

"A Park and Ride location for Bus and Rail Commuters, which I worked hard to deliver, has now been agreed for Kilcock, Kilcock is now included in the Shop Hop Zone for Rail commuters which had the effect of reducing the fares for commuters, the Leap reader is now installed at the Kilcock Rail Station and our Bus Service for Kilcock commuters has improved and plans are in place to improve it further."

"Given the increased number of people using the train from Kilcock, we must now improve the capacity on the line at peak times. We need extra capacity in the morning and in the evening. I have made specific representations to Irish Rail and the National Transport Authority to improve the rail service to Kilcock."

"As I have said in the Dail and elsewhere, having a regular and reliable public transport service will increase the attractiveness of public transport. I will continue my work to improve the public transport services for North Kildare." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Irish mortgage rates remain dramatically out of line with EU norms – O'Rourke

Recent Retail Interest Rate statistics published by the Central Bank show that mortgage rates are falling in Ireland. However, they are not falling at the same pace that deposit rates are falling, and mortgage rates in Ireland remain dramatically out of line with rates charged elsewhere in Europe, according to Fianna Fáil's Deputy Finance Spokesperson, Frank O'Rourke.

"These statistics published by the Central Bank recently show that despite modest reductions in mortgage rates, Irish mortgage holders are continuing to pay dramatically more than consumers elsewhere in Europe."

"For example, In Ireland, the interest rate on all new mortgages, fixed and variable, stood at 3.3% in June compared to a euro area rate of 1.83%. This means that a borrower with a mortgage of €200,000 is paying €250 per month more than they would be paying in the average Euro area country. That is €250 a month, each and every month, which could be spent by families on other household necessities. There has yet to be a credible explanation for such a dramatic difference in the rates charges and it is depriving our economy of much needed money which could be spent more productively in our economy." stated Deputy O'Rourke.

"In May 2016, a Fianna Fáil Bill designed to give the Central Bank powers to tackle excessive variable mortgage rates passed second stage in the Dáil. The progress of the Bill through the legislative process has been tortuous and painfully slow. Despite not opposing the Bill at second stage, it is abundantly clear the Government does not want the Bill to become law."

"As I have said in the Dáil on a number of occasions, we must focus on reducing the cost of living as well as reducing the burden of taxation. There is little point in reducing tax rates, if the banks are continuing to charge excessively high variable mortgage rates or insurance companies are continuing to increase their rates, take back a multiple of any reduction in taxation."

"However, key elements of our Bill on mortgage rates will proceed when the Dail returns next month which will be of help in relation to securing farer mortgage rates in the Irish market." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Traffic Lights to be installed at Meadowbrook Link Road says O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, has been informed that works to install traffic lights at the junction of Meadowbrook Link Road and the Straffan Road will commence shortly.

"Traffic lights, with safe crossing facilities for pedestrians and cyclists, will be installed at the junction of Meadowbrook Link Road and the Straffan Road. Works are to commence shortly."

"I have asked Kildare Co Co, the National Transport Authority (NTA) and Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) to assess the overall traffic management issues along the Straffan Road, including the traffic exiting the Maynooth Business Park. Traffic volumes are increasing at these junctions and we need to see if we can alleviate the situation."

"Earlier this year the Department of Local Government confirmed to me that funds have been allocated to enable the construction of a section of the Maynooth Ring Road linking the old Dublin Road to the Celbridge Road." "I welcome that works will commence shortly at the Meadowbrook Link Road / Straffan Road junction and this will assist traffic entering Straffan Road from the Meadowbrook Link Road." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Maynooth needs extra Park and Ride places says O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, has called for further investment to increase the capacity of the car park at Maynooth Rail station. Deputy O'Rourke made the call following representations he made to the National Transport Authority (NTA) seeking increased park and ride places for Maynooth rail commuters.

"The Maynooth Rail Car Park is full at around 7.30am or 7.45am in the morning. Driving to city centre is becoming increasingly difficult and we need to encourage more people to use public transport. However, we must provide facilities which encourage the use of public transport, and one such facility is adequate park and ride facilities at our rail stations." Stated Deputy O'Rourke.

"Leixlip Louisa Bridge and Hazelhatch Rail stations have seen investments in Park and Ride facilities. I, with others, have succeeded in securing a park and ride for Kilcock commuters, both bus and rail commuters. Plans are in place to have a park and ride for bus commuters adjacent to Junction 5 on the M4, beside Celbridge, as part of the Bus Connects project. The NTA are considering an option to increase the number of car parking spaces at the Naas/Sallins station, which I hope will be completed shortly. I have been successful in getting Kildare Co Co and the NTA to consider a modest bus park and ride for Clane based bus commuters."

"The NTA have examined options for increasing the number of car parking places in Maynooth. It would cost €327,000 to provide just over 30 additional places in Maynooth and would cost €3m to provide a significant additional number of places as property acquisition would be required."

"I have written to the Department of Transport seeking support for additional park and ride places at Maynooth. We must encourage people to use public transport and providing adequate park and ride places is key to attracting more public transport commuters." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Focus on widening Tax Bands rather than reducing Tax Rates in Budget – says O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fail TD, and Deputy Spokesperson on Finance, Frank O'Rourke, has called on the Minister for Finance to focus on widening the tax bands rather than on reducing the tax rates in the forthcoming budget. "At present the standard rate tax band for a single person is €33,800. PAYE employees pay the higher rate of tax of 41% once they earn over this amount. In my view, we should increase the standard rate tax band to €40,000 in the

forthcoming budget, enabling more workers to be taxed at the lower rate and incentivising work."

"Reducing the higher tax rate would disproportionately assist the better off. Widening the tax bands is a fairer way of reducing the overall tax burden, but it is less headline friendly. This Government seems more focussed on spin and getting headlines rather than on substance and delivery, so could favour reducing tax rates rather than widening the tax bands."

"We are seeing the cost of living increasing, with increases in motor insurance, fuel, in public transport costs, in rents, medical expenses and back to school costs. Workers, particularly those that are earning modest incomes need their tax burden reduced."

"Widening the tax bands is much fairer than reducing the higher rate of tax and we must focus on reducing the tax burden where lower income families derive the most benefit. I will continue my work in relation to keeping the Government to account in relation to rising cost of motor insurance, so that what people get in one hand is not taken by the insurance companies in the other hand." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke

Reduction in Motor Insurance costs welcomed – but battle not over says O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, has welcomed the reduction in motor insurance costs by 14% over the last 12 months. However, the campaign to reduce the cost of motor insurance must continue as they increased by over 70% in the last three years.

"The latest Central Statistics Office figures show that the cost of motor insurance has reduced by 14% in the last 12 months. This is welcome news but we must keep the campaign in place to reduce premiums further as the reduction is only a fraction of the increase that has taken place in recent years."

"Since getting elected last year, I have campaigned to have the cost of motor insurance reduced. In the Dail, I called for the Competition Authority to investigate the activities of insurance companies and also to have a quarterly review of the implementation of the Oireachtas action plan to reduce Motor Insurance. I have also called for increased competition in the sector."

"The latest Central Statistics Office figures are published just a month after European Commission competition carried out dawn raids on insurers, brokers and Insurance Ireland. The latest figures now show the biggest annual drop in motor insurance costs since the insurance crisis hit, months after the dawn raid."

"Officials from the EU's Competitive Directorate are investigating the possibility that an insurance cartel is operating within the Irish motor insurance industry. The Government is publishing regularly the progress on the implementation of the action plan on motor insurance. However, a 70% rise in motor insurance over the last three years was unacceptable and action was needed. For the first time in a number of years, we are seeing a small first step in the right direction, but we must continue to campaign for more reductions." stated Deputy O'Rourke.

"The battle is not over yet. Irish Motorists are paying too much for their motor insurance. We must continue with our campaign. The Government needs to get their priorities right and urgently work to complete all the recommendations from the working group on Motor Insurance."

"The message must go out to all that we are determined to get fairer motor insurance premiums for Irish motorists. Many Kildare motorists have made contact with me over the last 18 months in relation to their rising costs and I am determined to keep a focus on this important issue for Kildare motorists." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Those Magnificent Women in their Flying Machines

Recently, I attended an interesting talk by Ronan Jackson on the life and work of Captain Darby Kennedy late of Weston Aerodrome and Aer Lingus. Captain Kennedy died in Spain on 15 May 2016 at 101 years of age.



That got me thinking of 'Those Magnificent Men in their Flying Machines; Or, How I Flew from London to Paris in 25 Hours 11 Minutes'. This was a 1965 British comedy film, based on a screenplay entitled 'Flying Crazy' which was a work of fiction set in 1910. For those who are interested, excerpts and its catchy theme song are available on YouTube. Then that got me thinking again. What about 'Those Magnificent Women in their Flying Machines?'

Writing in 2014 the journalist Mary Kenny noted that in the pioneering days of flight 'the sky was the limit for an élite group of highflying Irish women who let nothing stand in the way of dreams'. One young woman who appears to have fulfilled her dream was Sicele Julia Mary Annette O'Brien. Sicele was the daughter of Sir Timothy Carew O'Brien, 3rd Baronet (1861-1948) and Gundrede Annette Teresa de Trafford (1860-1952). They had ten children, two sons and eight daughters, many of whom died young.

Their eldest son and heir, Lieut Timothy John Aloysius O'Brien (Royal Field Artillery), was killed in August 1916 during World War One. His body was interred at Quarry Cemetery, Montauban in Picardy (Somme) in France. He was 24 years of age. The O'Brien ancestral home was at Lohort Castle, Fermoy in Co. Cork, however, at that time members of the O'Brien family were living at Grangewilliam, Maynooth in Co Kildare.

Tragedy struck the family again that same year when their daughter Hilda Moira Clare died the following month at a private nursing home in Leeson Street in Dublin. The cause of her death was complications which arose from appendicitis. She was 20 years of age. Her body was interred at Donaghmore Cemetery on 8 September 1916 after Mass at Saint Mary's Catholic Church at Maynooth.

What happened to our 'aviatrix'? Sicele, although she had raced her fellow Irish women earlier, went on to win the first women's air race ever held in the UK. In 1927 she became the second woman in the UK to receive a commercial licence. She accompanied Lady Mary Heath (born at Knockaderry, Co Limerick in 1896 – died

London 1939) when she set a British altitude record of 13,400ft in 1928. Afterwards Lady Heath noted that: 'It took me over 90 minutes [to reach that height]. The machine behaved splendidly, but the air got colder as we ascended until it was nearly freezing. The visibility was wonderful. We could see for 25/30 miles. I shall attempt to establish a record for speed and distance on the same light seaplane in the near future.' Following an air crash that same year near London, Sicele had part of one of her lower limbs amputated. However, having fully recovered and with an artificial leg, our determined pioneer got her licence renewed and was soon back flying. But flying was a dangerous occupation. Up to June 1931 alone, there were nine fatal air crashes in England or to British airmen abroad and the civilian death toll for that six month period stood at seventeen. Unfortunately, two of the fatalities that June included 'airwomen' Miss Sicele O'Brien and a Mrs. Gordon Gallien.

On 18 June their two-seater biplane made a good landing for refueling at the de Havilland flying school near Hatfield in Hertfordshire. Before they set off, the two women enjoyed a cup of tea in the clubroom. With Sicele in the pilot's seat, eyewitnesses stated that within a short time of taking off and when the plane had reached a height of c. 100 feet it suddenly stalled and spun around once or twice before crashing headlong into the ground and immediately bursting into flames. People rushed forward but it was impossible to do anything due to the intense heat. The bodies were charred beyond recognition. Sicele's remains were subsequently identified by her father, Sir Timothy because he recognised a ring on her finger and the second body was identified by a set of keys. An inquest was held and having heard the evidence the Coroner said that 'he did not think there could be any blame attached to the pilot or the passenger.' A verdict of accidental death was returned. Burial took place following Requiem Mass at Brompton Oratory at St Thomas's Cemetery at Fulham in West London. Sicele was 44 years of age.

But to end on a positive note. For various reasons, it took some time for women to be accepted as full-time commercial pilots. It was not until 1977 that the first woman pilot was recruited by Aer Lingus, the second airline in Europe after Scandinavian Airlines to do so. This was Captain Gráinne Cronin, a native of Malahide in Co Dublin and the daughter of an Aer Lingus captain, Felim Cronin. Flying must be in the Cronin genes because Grainne's sister Caroline is a commercial pilot, her husband is a pilot and their two daughters Alana and Louisa Johnston both hold private pilot's licenses.

Gráinne recently retired after 33 years' service. Aer Lingus now employs 40 women pilots – 'those magnificent women in their flying machines' – taking to the air no longer being a prerogative of the élite.

filled with mystery, magic and superstition. It began as a Celtic end-of-summer festival during which people felt especially close to deceased relatives and friends. For these friendly spirits, they set places at the dinner table, left treats on doorsteps and along the side of the road and lit candles to help loved ones find their way back to the spirit world.

Today's Halloween ghosts are often depicted as more fearsome and malevolent, and our customs and superstitions are scarier too. We avoid crossing paths with black cats, afraid that they might bring us bad luck. This idea has its roots in the Middle Ages, when many people believed that witches avoided detection by turning themselves into cats. We try not to walk under ladders for the same reason.

This superstition may have come from the ancient Egyptians, who believed that triangles were sacred; it also may have something to do with the fact that walking under a leaning ladder tends to be fairly unsafe. And around Halloween, especially, we try to avoid breaking mirrors, stepping on cracks in the road or spilling salt.



But what about the Halloween traditions and beliefs that today's trick-or-treaters have forgotten all about? Many of these obsolete rituals focused on the future instead of the past and the living instead of the dead. In particular, many had to do with helping young women identify their future husbands and reassuring them that they would someday - with luck, by next Halloween - be married. In 18th-century

Ireland, a matchmaking cook might bury a ring in her mashed potatoes on Halloween night, hoping to bring true love to the diner who found it. In Scotland, fortune-tellers recommended that an eligible young woman name a hazelnut for each of her suitors and then toss the nuts into the rather than popping or exploding, the story went, represented the girl's future husband. (In some versions of this legend, confusingly, the opposite was true: The nut that burned away symbolized a love that would not last.) Another tale had it that if a young woman ate a sugary concoction made out of walnuts, hazelnuts and nutmeg before bed on Halloween night she would dream about her future husband.

Young women tossed apple-peels over their shoulders, hoping that the peels would fall on the floor in the shape of their future husbands' initials; tried to learn about their futures by peering at egg yolks floating in a bowl of water; and stood in front of mirrors in darkened rooms, holding candles and looking over their shoulders for their husbands' faces. Other rituals were more competitive. At some Halloween parties, the first guest to find a burr on a chestnuthunt would be the first to marry; at others, the first successful apple-bobber would be the first down the aisle.

Of course, whether we're asking for romantic advice or trying to avoid seven years of bad luck, each one of these Halloween superstitions relies on the good will of the very same "spirits" whose presence the early Celts felt so keenly about.



Rock a Skeletal Style Halloween Wreath



Give a plastic skeleton a fresh take on the afterlife as a minimalist wreath. Disassemble the skeleton by removing the thread, wire or string used to hold the pieces together. Next, attach bones to a wire wreath form using craft wire, overlapping and interlacing the bones. As a creepy finishing touch, wire the skull to the wreath's bottom so its sockets are approximately eye-level with trick-or-treaters.

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

Editorial

October 1st marked the sixth anniversary of the formal signing of the town twinning agreement between Maynooth and the French town of Canet-en-Roussillon. In both places there is physical evidence of the relationship with signage and logos. Even on this monthly publication and on our office window we proudly display the formal crest of Canet-en-Roussillon. When you visit our twinning partner the Maynooth Crest and the Kildare flag will also greet you. There are many ongoing connections between the two towns and these links were spearheaded by the students of Maynooth Post-Primary School who arranged student exchanges from the beginning. Also Maynooth University made connections in both swimming and rugby. A number of people have made lifelong friendships.

Aside from a number of formal visits from the twinning committee especially from Canet -en-Roussillon to Maynooth over the past few years there has been a steady flow of individual and family visits also. Each year our office in the Tesco Shopping Centre receives a number of people who have travelled from Canet-en-Roussillon. A number of people in Maynooth have visited Canet-en-Roussillon on my and other recommendations and have enjoyed their visits there. So is there more that can happen? Of course, Canet-en-Roussillon boasts over three hundred days of sunshine a year. There are opportunities for people who have retired from work and for other reasons, with their families

reared, to travel to Canet-en-Roussillon out of peak season and still have a sunny break there. While the two hotels in Maynooth and other holiday accommodation have supported the twinning and Community Council clg is a not for profit company would always be recommended to visitors, we are also unique in that we have a lot of rented houses and apartments used by students in Maynooth University in college term that are free during the summer months. We should try to market these extra places to people from Canet-en-Roussillon who might need larger places to stay when here.

Similarly when people from here travel to Canet-en-Roussillon they do not limit their travel to the area only. We also can offer Kildare, Meath and Dublin attractions with ease to our visitors. I have given a number of guided tours around Maynooth over the years but it is always good to recommend other places to visit. Maynooth Community Council CLG is actively considering how to provide greater support to the twinning agreement. With our office located in the centre of the town and the experience of welcoming visitors from Canet-en-Roussillon our thoughts are on how we could support all visitors to Maynooth. One suggestion being considered is to put in place a number of tourism ambassadors who would be available to give tours of the town during the summer months.

However, the possibility of providing a tourism desk in our office should also be evaluated. As it stands the office is usually the first place that people are directed to when they need to get local information. Maynooth supported with part funding from the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection with the remit to provide services and supports to the community of Maynooth. Census 2016 & Travel to School

The CSO continues to publish the results of Census 2016. The report on commuting revealed more information on current travel patterns in Kildare and Ireland generally. One of the key statistics is that despite nearly twenty years of central government and Kildare County Council 'promoting' walking and cycling and health authorities drawing attention to rising childhood obesity, more children than ever are being driven to school. The effect of this on areas around schools continues to worsen and school wardens in Dublin have had to call the police over behaviour by boorish drivers who have no consideration for the safety of other children or their parents.

In the Canadian city of Ottwa, police authorities issued 294 notices in five days in a targeted road safety campaign when schools reopened after the summer. Maynooth Gardaí could do worse than follow their example.

Increased Funding Required for Cycling from €12M to €147M

It is the policy of Irish cycling campaign groups that 10% of the transport budget should be dedicated to cycling which is in line with government targets that by 2020, 10% of trips should be by bicycle. Current levels of investment are approximately €12 Million per annum which is equivalent to an approximate expenditure of €2.50 per person per head per annum. With a Department of Transport annual expenditure of €1470 Million, Ireland should be allocating €147 Million per annum for cycling which would be equivalent to €30.87 per person per head which is broadly in line with what Dutch politicians have allocated for the last forty years.

As pointed out in a previous Newsletter, Ireland will not achieve the target of 10% of trips by bicycle at current rates of progress for another thirty years due to low standards and low levels of investment. Minister Ross has stated that his Department is unable to provide an overall figure of investment in cycling as some facilities, for example greenways are

the inability to carry out basic 90 mathematical functions which has affected the Garda Siochana has now spread to the Department of Transport, Tourism & Sport. The Minister stated that he will looked for increased funding under the mid-term Capital Expenditure Review, the results of which are expected before the end of the year. However, we shall wait to see the scale of any increase and see whether or not cycling will continue to get crumbs from the Transport budget.

Bike Share

Bike sharing is where people make a typically short cycle journey in a town or city centre on a rented bike, rather than one owned. It began in the Netherlands in the 1960s so is now more than fifty years old. Bike sharing came to Ireland with the launch of Dublin Bikes and has now spread to Cork, Limerick and Galway. These are known as Third Generation bike systems and are based around a number of 'Hubs' where you can collect and return a bike. Fourth Generation Bike Sharing does not involve hubs and instead relies on Smart phones and the internet to access and leave bikes. Bleeperbikes in conjunction with South Dublin County Council has introduced Fourth Generation bike sharing on a pilot basis to Lucan, Clondalkin and Tallaght. A number of Fourth Generation operators are also keen to set up in Dublin City. How this will affect Dublin Bikes is unclear at this time. We wish them well.

WHO calls for Active Travel to be **Prioritised**

The World Health Organisation (WHO) has published a draft Global Action Plan within which increased cycling and walking is flagged as a priority for authorities in order to minimise deaths related to physical inactivity.

Dubbed the Global Action Plan for the promotion of Physical Activity (GAPPA) 2018 -2030, the plan cross references a wealth of UN documents in order to draw its conclusions. Topics are wide ranging – detailing everything

used by both walkers and cyclists. It seems that from sports and education to urban planning – but transport and health are heavily linked themes within which building exercise into our existing daily routine is recommended. Four objectives are laid out within the draft, each of which have potential to drive active travel:

- Creating an active society
- Creating active environments
- Creating active lives
- Creating active systems

Progress on reducing car dependency has been slow in most countries when it comes to achieving goals set previously. WHO has described as 'challenging' progress on a 2013 voluntary goal set by the World Health Assembly to increase physical activity by 10% by 2025.

There are good financial reasons for changing our mode of transport to active travel. The European Cycling Federation estimates healthcare savings tied to cycling to be worth €191.27 billion a year. Health Authorities across the world are under increasing pressure to reduce costs. In response to an epidemic in diabetes and other inactivity related illness the World Health Organisation has before now said that Governments should build active travel into our lives. Cycling has been proven to reduce some of the enormous burdens on health services, notably Type 2 Diabetes and even "risk of death from 'any' cause".







Halloween Recipes

Pumpkin Crisps Ingredients:

1/4 small pumpkin, deseeded and peeled Ground nut oil Flour for dusting





Cut pumpkin into very thin slices with a vegetable peeler. Pour oil to a depth of four inches into a large saucepan and heat up on a medium heat. Pust the pumpkin slices in flour and fry in batches for about 3 minutes or until crisp. Remove with a slotted spoon onto kitchen paper and sprinkle with salt.

Creepy Chocolate Eyeballs Ingredients:

400g of bourbon biscuits 300g of white chocolate 115g of cream cheese


For decoration:

Red, green and black writing icing Skinny paint brush

Method:

Whizz biscuits in a food processor until you have small crumbs. Add ergam cheese to biscuit crumbs, mix with a wooden spoon until a dough comes together. Using your hands roll 30 little balls and place them on a baking tray lined with parchment paper. Pop in the fridge.

Melt chocolate until smooth. Toss the balls in the melted white chocolate until they are completely covered then lift out using a fork and place on a lined baking tray. Allow to set in fridge and decorate the eyeballs with food colouring. Allow to dry and then place in a large jar. The eyeballs with keep for about a week.



20z sugar 20z icing sugar Black food colouring

Method:

Preheat your oven to 120°C, gas mark 4. Prepare 2 baking trays, either with baking parchment or lightly oil. Place your two egg whites into a non -plastic bowl and whisk until light and fluffy. While still mixing add your granulated sugar, a little at a time until it has been all incorporated, leaving a few seconds between each addition to ensure the sugar is well mixed and you can see stiff peaks when you remove the whisk. Sieve the icing sugar into your meringue mixture and then whisk just until it is combined and the mixture looks shiney. Place the mixture into a piping bag fitted with a round nozzle. Holding your piping bag totally vertically, squeeze a ball shaped meringue onto your prepared piping sheet, then lessen the pressure on the bag and pull straight up so that you get a clean point on the top of the meringue shape.

Place your baking trays into the oven and allow to cook slowly for about 1 hour and 15 minutes. Keep an eye to make sure they aren't going too brown. You will know they are done when they lift easily off the baking parchment. Allow to cool and then using black food colouring and a paint brush, add any eyes, mouths or any other effect you like.

Spooky Biscuits Ingredients:

50z white flour 30z sugar 2oz coconut 10z cornflakes 60z butter 1tbs of cocoa powder Itsp of baking powder



Method:

Mix flour, sugar, eoconut and cornflakes together in a bowl. Melt butter in a pan then add the cocoa powder and baking powder. When mixed together add to the dry ingredients.

Spoon the mixture onto a lined greased tray. Bake at 150°C for 40

Decorate with liquorice, chocolate and sweets to create spooky spider cookies!



October Gardening



Autumn is approaching. While there are still sunny days to enjoy, there is also a crisp in the air that is the herald of the changing seasons. The wild growth evident during the heyday of summer is over now. Although the weather in autumn is often drier than some of the summer months, it is important to remember that winter is

While the grass is still growing, keep mowing once a fortnight with the blades on high for the final few cuts. Carry out an autumn lawn care programme - scarify (rake out the old dead grass and moss) the lawn, spike to improve drainage again either by hand with a garden fork, add a top dressing of soil/sand/compost mixed according to your soil type (ask for advice at your garden



centre) and feed with autumn weed and moss killer. This low-nitrogen preparation strengthens grass for winter.



Clear any debris and diseased material from your garden. Fallen leaves can be left to rot down or collected for leaf mould, but be sure to remove any diseased material. Pests and diseases that overwinter in your garden will reappear next spring with a vengeance so get rid of them now. If your soil is heavy clay, start digging it over now add plenty of organic matter to improve the quality and pea shingle to improve the drainage.

Your soil has had a lot taken out of it during the busy growing season, and now is the best time to replace that goodness by digging in a lot of organic matter. The earlier you start, the better, especially if your soil is heavy. It can be left in a pretty rough state over the winter when the cold will break the lumps down, making spring planting infinitely easier. Resist the temptation to do a thorough cleaning of the garden until spring, though, and try to leave some winter cover for wildlife as the weather starts to cool. Our feathered friends will be starting to build their reserves for winter, so do please put out food and fresh water for them.

Don't waste fallen leaves – given time they decompose into fabulously rich leaf mould, the best natural soil conditioner there is. Rake up fallen leaves and dump them into a simple frame to make leaf mould (black bin liners spiked with air holes will also do if you can bear the visual offense, but remember to dampen the leaves first). If leaves are left lingering on the lawn, the grass will turn yellow. Leaf mould takes about a year to mature (2 in the case of oak leaves), makes a great top dressing for woodland plants such as rhododendrons



and is an excellent and free home-grown substitute for peat.



Remove any diseased, spindly, old and unproductive stems from roses and remember to burn any diseased material. Tie new shoots onto some form of support to prevent their thrashing about in autumn winds. Trim your lavender if you haven't already done so. Prune tall shrubs such as lavatera and buddleja by about half to protect them against wind rock. Trim

conifers again if necessary, making sure you do not cut into the old wood. With the ideal planting conditions of autumn (warm moist soil), now is the time to plant container-grown shrubs, trees, fruit bushes, perennials and bulbs. Even in damp conditions, it is worth checking that the rootballs of shrubs and trees are adequately moist when planting - heavy rain will not necessarily penetrate a rootball that has been allowed to dry out. If it feels light, plunge into a bucket of water before

Finish planting spring bulbs such as narcissi and crocuses; tulips can wait until November. Plant hardy perennials so their roots have a chance to become established before winter. Replace summer bedding with winter and spring bedding. Plant out violas, wallflowers and primulas now for cheery colour in the coming months. Winter colour comes in all shapes and sizes; hardy cyclamen and heathers dwarf conifers, winter pansies, violas and trailing ivy all make wonderful displays.




