Editorial

"Maynooth Community Employment Project" (formerly MCC clg) is the new name for community development in Maynooth and starts a new phase after a review carried out over the past year following the appointment of new management. A new three year contract has been signed with the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection which guarantees the jobs and services



provided to the community and local businesses. Mark Twain said that "success is a journey not a destination. It requires constant effort, vigilance and re-evaluation" His words reflect the history of community development in Maynooth and in particular the history of the many community employment initiatives in the town that can be traced back almost forty years.

The Community Employment (CE) programme is designed to help people who are long-term unemployed (or otherwise disadvantaged) to get back to work by offering part-time and temporary placements in jobs based within local communities. After the placement, participants are encouraged to seek permanent jobs elsewhere, based on the experience and new skills they have gained while on a Community Employment project. Partial Funding for the project is provided by the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection supporting the local Community Employment Sponsoring Committee who also have to raise funding through the activities of the project to cover many of the operational costs. The flip side of this partnership is the advantages for the local community. In the case of Maynooth, the Community Employment project office is deliberately based in the heart of the town at Carton Park next to Maynooth Post Office. Located here since 2008, it serves as a major community resource centre. From here the project staff supports a large number of individuals and community groups with key activities being the publication of the monthly "Maynooth Newsletter" as well as a number of key annual events such as the Maynooth St. Patrick's Day Parade and an Annual Festival.

The Community Employment project has two other centres in the town with staff maintaining and enhancing the Maynooth Harbour area next to Maynooth Train Station as well as maintaining the Maynooth Town Football Club Grounds. The staff also manage the day to day operation of the Maynooth Community Space which is a Community Centre available to not-for-profit community groups to use. The Maynooth Community Space is operated under a partnership arrangement between Maynooth Community Employment Project and Kildare County Council and provided by Tesco Ireland.

The Community Employment Sponsoring Committee was required to establish itself as a legal entity back in 2001 and at that stage a separate structure was put in place which assumed full legal and financial responsibility for the staff and project activities. A further development took place in 2014 when the project merged with the Maynooth Environmental Group which added the responsibility for Maynooth Harbour and Maynooth Town Soccer Club creating a single Community Employment scheme. A number of other groups have also indicated that they would like to join the project and the Sponsoring Committee are considering these requests.

Sherry Anderson the Canadian Curler said that "volunteers don't get paid because they're useless, but because they are priceless" Maynooth Community Employment Project is managed by five voluntary Directors who were appointed by the members of the company. They come from a broad range backgrounds bringing all the necessary skills to support a successful project. The Directors with the involvement of the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection undertook a full review of operations and as in all previous reviews over the thirty five years of the project it was confirmed that the project is run to the highest possible standards.

As mentioned before the Community Employment Sponsoring Committee have to raise funds to cover operating costs and this annual amount is typically close to €25,000. Such funds could not be found without the valuable support that is received from local businesses in Maynooth through their support of the "Maynooth Newsletter" as well as the St. Patrick's Day Parade as these two activities are critical funding streams for Maynooth Community Employment Project.

Thanks to the continued collaboration between the Community Employment Sponsoring Committee and the local community support together with Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection, valuable employment and community services are delivered in Maynooth. Of course none of this would be possible without the hard working and dedicated staff on the scheme. For me a quote from David Bowie best summaries everyone involved "what I like to do is try to make a difference with the work I do."

Proposed Amendment to Maynooth Local Area Plan (LAP)

The proposed Amendment to the Maynooth Local Area Plan (LAP) will go on public display for 6 weeks from Monday 18 June. The Amendment outlines the line of the new ring road from the Blacklion Road/Leixlip Road to the Celbridge Road and new residential re-zoning for 720 -800 houses is also proposed. The Maynooth MD Councillors will make their decision on the Amendment at their meeting on 7 October.

The proposals can be viewed in the Public Library or on the Council's Web Site. There will be a drop-in public information session in the Glenroyal Hotel on 3 July from 2pm -7.30pm. Any submissions must be with the Council before 30 July.

Cllr. McGinley Allocates Funding for the Reconstruction of the Harbour Field Wall and for the Relocation of the Turnstile

Cllr. John McGinley has allocated funding for the re-building of the Harbour Field wall at the Straffan Road side and for the re-location of the turnstile. The re-location of the turnstile has already taken place and the wall will be re-built in the Autumn using the stonework that has been lying for some time at the other side of the Harbour Field.

Cllr. McGinley Submits a Motion to the Maynooth MD to Prevent a Car Park Being Constructed on the Harbour Field

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth Municipal District (MD) at their meeting on 6 July:

"That on foot of the Vote at the Maynooth Health Check Meeting on Thursday June 7th, that The Harbour Field, Maynooth be developed as a Public Space/Park and that there shall be no Car Park at The Harbour Field, Maynooth, that the Council now states categorically that The Harbour Field, Maynooth, shall not be used for a Car Park under any circumstances.'

Cllr. McGinley Seeks Public Lighting to be Installed on the Canal Walk from Bond Bridge to the Harbour

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth Municipal District (MD) at their meeting on 6 July:

"When will public lighting be installed on the canal walk between Bond Bridge and The Harbour, Maynooth, now that the necessary infrastructure is in place?'

Update on the Meadowbrook link Road/Straffan Road Traffic Lights

Cllr. McGinley has been advised by the Council's Director of Services that work on the installation of the new traffic lights at this junction will begin on 1 July and it is expected to take 4/6 weeks to complete.

Cllr. McGinley Calls for the Implementation of Flood Relief Measures in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth Municipal District (MD) at their meeting on 1 June:

"That the Office of Public Works (OPW) proposals for flood alleviation in Maynooth be presented to the Maynooth Municipal District for consideration."

John got the following reply from Council Officials:

"A presentation will be given to full council regarding Flood Risk Management Plans at the June monthly meeting on 25 June 2018"

Cllr. McGinley stated that it was very disappointing that a presentation is not being made to the MD members as agreed last December. He said that discussion at the Full Council on the plans for Maynooth would be limited because the county is being covered and because of the large numbers of members on the Full Council.

The Director of Services said that a presentation would be made to the July MD Meeting if necessary.

Cllr. McGinley Calls for Safety Measures at Celbridge Road Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley has submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth Municipal District (MD) at their meeting on 6 July:

"Can a safety railing be put on the narrow section of footpath, opposite Maxol on the Celbridge Road at the Railpark side?"

Stagg Seeks Design Changes to Mill Street Apartment Proposal

Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg and his colleagues Cllr. John McGinley and Local Labour Area Representative Angela Feeney have lodged a submission with An Bord Pleanala in relation to the proposal to build 135 apartments in

three blocks on Mill Street, Maynooth, adjoining St. Mary's Catholic Church, with a view to seeking changes in the design to ensure the proposal reflects the unique architectural character of Maynooth Town.

Mr. Stagg stated that the Maynooth Local Area Plan 2013-2019 is very clear that the unique character of Maynooth as a University Town steeped in history and heritage must be protected. The site of the proposal for 135 apartments is stated Mr. Stagg zoned Town Centre and the primary objective of this zoning is the protection and enhancement of the special character of Maynooth Town Centre.

The proposal as it stands stated Mr. Stagg is not acceptable and requires modification from a visual point of view.

To reflect the existing historic character of the Town, from a visual point of view Mr. Stagg and his colleagues have suggested the following changes to the development.

(1) To take the blunt and bare look off the apartment blocks, pitched roofs should be provided on each of the three blocks. The previous planning permission on this site (05/2420) included pitched roofs on the blocks of apartments.

(2) To reflect the unique character of Maynooth Town Centre, the Blocks facing onto Mill Street, shall be finished with a mixture of cut stone, plaster/dashing. Modern materials should not be used, and neither shall stone cladding be used as it has been on the ugly Manor Mills Development.

(3) At the Corner of the Blocks, Stone Quoins shall be incorporated to give a defined edge to the buildings.

Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg stated that he hoped An Bord Pleanala would take on board Labour's concerns in relation to the proposal as we do not want a repeat of the disastrous Manor Mills development in Maynooth.

Retendering for Maynooth Education Campus Must be Expedited - Stagg

With the disappointing news that Sammon Contracting Ireland Limited has been placed into Liquidation, Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg has stated that the retendering process for the Maynooth Education Campus must be expedited to ensure that the project is completed as near as possible to the original completion date of May, 2019.

Mr. Stagg stated that the liquidation was dreadful news for the 200 employees of the Company and for the various sub-contractors working with the Sammon Group. Through no fault of their own or of CEO Miceál Sammon they had been brought down by the Carillion Group in the UK. The Sammon Group were one of the premier construction firms in the Country and the liquidation is a devastating blow.

The Maynooth Education Campus is the largest ever school building project undertaken in the State which will see two 1,000 pupil secondary schools and a Shared Sports Facility built on the Moyglare Road in Maynooth. The completion of the project will now have to go for retendering and this should be expedited to ensure there is no great slippage in the completion time.

In conclusion Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg stated that he would contact the Minister for Education and Skills in relation to the retendering process and how we can complete this most important Education Campus in Maynooth.

9 Additional Gardaí Allocated to Kildare Division - Stagg

Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg has been advised by Human Resources at Garda Headquarters that an additional 9 Probationary Gardaí will be assigned to the Kildare Division following their graduation on Friday 15th June.

The probationer Gardaí will take up their posts in early July and two have been assigned to Leixlip Garda Station, 3 have been assigned to Kildare Garda Station and four have been assigned to Naas Garda Station

Welcoming the additional gardai, Mr. Stagg stated that the allocation of 9 Probationary Gardaí will bring Garda Numbers to 374 in the Kildare Division or a ratio of 1 garda for every 594 people in Kildare. The total number of Garda Recruits allocated to the Kildare Division since April 2015 is 96.

Mr. Stagg stated that we must keep the pressure on the Commissioner and the Policing Authority to continue to reduce the unacceptable historical imbalance that existed in the Kildare Division and a concerted campaign to attract in Gardaí from other divisions must be maintained.

In conclusion Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg stated that we are finally seeing dividends in our campaign on Garda Numbers but we must keep up the pressure and ensure that the demands of the people of Kildare are met by an increased strength Garda Force.

Irish Passport Card

Question I am 18 and flying to Spain for a holiday this summer. Can I use a passport card when of your birth certificate, or other evidence of your age, before employing you. travelling to Spain, and how do I apply for one?

Answer

The Irish passport card is a credit-card sized Irish passport. You can use it for travel within the European Union, the European Economic Area (which includes Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway) and Switzerland. So, you will be able to use it when going to Spain this summer.

You must be aged 18 or over to apply for a passport card. You must also hold a valid Irish passport that is not due to expire in the next 3 months. The personal details you provide when applying must be exactly the same as those on your passport book.

The passport card is valid for a maximum of 5 years or until your passport book expires, whichever period is shorter.

If you plan to use your passport card when travelling, you must use the passport card number when checking in online.

The passport card costs €35. If you are applying from outside Ireland, there is an additional delivery cost of \mathfrak{S} .

You can apply for a passport card online on dfa.ie. When making the application you need:

- Your current passport book
- Your digital photograph (see the detailed guidelines on dfa.ie)
- A valid email address
- A debit card or credit card

When you submit your application online, you are issued with an 11-digit application number. You can track your application's progress on the Department's website using the application number.

Young workers

Question

I am 17 years old and I have just finished school. I would like to get a part-time job over the summer. Are there restrictions on the number of hours I can work and will I get the minimum wage?

Answer

The maximum working week for young people aged 16 and 17 is 40 hours, and you cannot work more than 8 hours a day. If you work for more than one employer, your combined daily or weekly hours of work cannot be more than this maximum.

Usually, you are only permitted to work between 6am and 10pm, but in licenced premises (pubs and restaurants) you are legally allowed to work until 11pm at weekends and during school holidays.

The national minimum wage for an experienced adult is currently ⊕.55 per hour. People aged under 18 are only entitled to up to 70% of the experienced adult rate This for the package. is €6.69 per hour. Your employer is free to pay you more than the minimum wage if they wish, but they are not required to do so by law.

You must get a payslip from your employer. A payslip is a statement in writing from the employer that shows your total pay before tax and details of deductions from your pay.

If you get tips from customers there is nothing in law to state you are automatically entitled to these tips. However, the law does not require you to hand these tips to your employer either. Instead, it depends on the custom and practice in your workplace.

These rules are set out in the Protection of Young Persons (Employment) Act 1996. Your employer must give you the official summary of the Act, along with other details of your terms of employment, within one month of your start date.

All employers with employees under 18 must display the official summary of the Act somewhere visible where it can be easily read. Your employer must also see a copy

Home Renovation Incentive Scheme

Ouestion

My partner and I own our home and want to extend it this year. Would we qualify for a tax credit for the work, and if so, how do we apply?

Answer

The Home Renovation Incentive (HRI) scheme lets homeowners, landlords and local authority tenants claim tax relief on the cost of repairs, renovations or improvement works carried out on their main home or rental property.

To qualify for the HRI, you must be paying income tax and be up to date with your Local Property Tax (LPT). The work must be carried out by a contractor who is registered for Value Added Tax (VAT) and is tax-compliant.

Any repair, renovation or improvement work subject to VAT at 13.5% qualifies for the scheme, so your proposed extension would be covered. Work that is subject to VAT at 23% (such as architect's fees) is not covered. Neither are items such as furniture, white goods or carpets.

The HRI is paid as a tax credit at 13.5% of the cost, effectively reducing the rate of VAT on qualifying work to zero. The qualifying work must cost at least €4,405 before VAT at 13.5% (€,000 including VAT). The credit can be claimed up to a maximum of €30,000 (before VAT) of the total cost of works. The work must be carried out and paid for before 31 December 2018. However, this can be extended if you need planning permission. If this is the case, planning permission must be in place by 31 December 2018. You will then have until 31 March 2019 to complete the work.

To apply for the HRI, your contractor(s) must enter details of the work and payments on the HRI online system on revenue.ie. You should access the system to check that these details have been entered correctly. You claim the credit after the end of the tax year in which you have the work done. In general, the tax credit is applied over the two years following the year in which the work is carried out and paid for.

Household Benefits Package

Ouestion

I'm in my 70s and live alone. Is it there any support available to help me with my household running costs?

Answer

The Household Benefits Package may help with the costs of running your household. The package is available to everyone aged over 70 and to some people under 70. It is paid by the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection (DEASP).

The package includes an electricity or gas allowance and a Free Television Licence. The electricity or gas allowance pays €35 per month (€1.15 per day) towards the cost of either your electricity or gas supply (you cannot get an allowance for both). It is paid to your bank or post office account or as a credit on your bill. You can get the Free Television Licence from the next renewal date of your licence after you qualify

Only one person in a household can qualify for the package. You must be living in the State all year round, and you will need to show that you are the registered gas or electricity consumer, for example, by providing a utility bill.

People aged between 66 and 70 may also qualify if they are getting a qualifying payment, such as the State Pension. If they are not getting a qualifying payment, they must satisfy a means test. You qualify if you are getting Carer's Allowance and providing full-time care to a person you are living with. You may also qualify if you are getting certain social welfare payments and living alone or living with certain people, for example, a qualified adult or child or with someone who would qualify for the allowance in their own right.

Greenway Moves to Next Stage

Local Councillors recently passed the required planning for the Greenway to progress from Maynooth all the way to Fingal county boundary at Confey. This 8.5km stretch is the latest stretch due to be completed and is currently being designed. Tenders for this work are due out later this year. The Greenway has proved to be a great success in Kildare North and it's great to see extra work being done from Maynooth towards Dublin.

Passport Office Delays Causing Trouble for Those Booked to Travel

Many constituents have contacted my office with great concern over delays in their passport applications yet the Government do not seem to be doing anything to alleviate this problem. What is being lost in this whole debacle is that Irish citizens have a legal right to a passport to allow them travel, and that they are paying for that privilege.

The target time for first time passport applicants and those seeking to replace a lost, stolen or damaged passport through the An Post Passport Express is 20 days but the reality is far from this. The actual turnaround time is 35+ working days – a full three working weeks behind target.

As we head into the peak holiday season, there will be an additional surge in the number of people applying for a passport. Citizens expect that getting a passport approved and printed can take a relatively short period of time, but waiting longer than seven weeks is simply unacceptable.

The summer holiday season, like clockwork, happens every 12 months. It shouldn't come as a surprise to the Government. There should have been a better plan put in place to address increasing application volumes.

This is not a free service to citizens. Passports cost €80 each – that is a significant cost for citizens and should, I believe, require a more efficient response from the Passport Office.

The Tánaiste needs to get his head out of the sand, look at the entire passport service, and

find ways of speeding up the delivery of this very important service for citizens. One suggestion may be to open a second passport printing unit to alleviate demand during peak periods.

Proposed Amendments to the Maynooth Local Area Plan 2013-2019

There are a number of amendments to the Maynooth Local Area Plan 2013-2019. While many of these amendments are to do with rezoning of lands and technical in nature proposed plans can be viewed in the Glenroyal Hotel on Tuesday July 3rd from 15.00 to 19.30. Residents are also invited to submit their observations on these plans to Kildare County Council on or before July 30th.

Children Waiting 18 Months for Outpatient Consultation Soars Over 10,000

The number of children waiting over 18 months for an outpatient consultation has broken the 10,000 threshold. The latest figures for May reveal that the list has soared to 10,295 - up from 833 in May 2016. That's twelvefold increase in two years.

An analysis of the latest waiting figures published by the National Treatment Purchase Fund for May shows that overall some 54,308 children are waiting for an appointment - 17,308 of them for more than a year and 10,295 for over 18 months.

The three children's hospitals in Dublin account for about 80% of the total number of children on the waiting list, but they also account for almost 99% of the children waiting more than 18 months for an appointment. Temple Street has seen a sixteen fold increase in the number of children waiting over a year and a half to see a doctor in the past 2 years, with Crumlin recording only a marginally smaller rise.

I have said it before but it cannot be emphasised enough – these unacceptably long waiting times have a significant impact on outcomes and on the stress and anxiety levels of the children themselves.

Eighteen months can seem like an infinite amount of time to a child, and having to wait that long to see a doctor in a hospital is like a cloud hanging over their head.

I understand that a draft Outpatient Action Plan for 2018 has been presented to Minister Harris. The fact that an action plan for 2018 is still in draft form in the middle of June is appalling. He must publish it now as a matter of urgency and priority should be given to the 10,000 children waiting since November 2016.

O'Rourke urges Education Minister to take swift action to resolve School **Buildings for Maynooth delays**

Local Fianna Fáil TD, Frank O'Rourke, has urged the Minister for Education, Richard Bruton TD, to come up with a solution for Maynooth Education Campus, which is now at a standstill, due to the contractor being put into liquidation.

Sammon Contracting Ireland Limited has been placed in receivership, with the result that all building works have ground to a halt. The two schools affected, Maynooth Post Primary School and Maynooth Community College, are extremely disappointed at this turn of events.

"I have asked the Minister to engage with all the stakeholders involved - the Board of Management, the principal and teachers and parents - and to communicate updates as they arise."

"I have also asked the Minister to confirm what measures are in place for the retendering process, and what steps are being taken to expedite this tendering process as efficiently as possible, to ensure continuity of the project."

"It is critical that construction of these two permanent school buildings in Maynooth be continued at the earliest, and I will continue to liaise with the Minister for Education & Skills, and with his Department Officials for a positive outcome" concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Cost of Living rises as Government sits on the fence says O'Rourke -**Ireland's competitiveness reduces**

Fianna Fáil's Deputy Finance Spokesperson, Frank O'Rourke, has stated that the Government has not done enough to stop the rising cost of living as Ireland's reduced competitiveness is having a negative impact on the cost of doing business in Ireland.

"The cost of Insurance, rising childcare costs, rising rents, rising costs of fuel, gas, health insurance, and other day-to-day living expenses, are all putting pressure on families. For instance, electricity costs are going up by over 6%, and gas by over 12%. These increases will lead to an increase of nearly €150 for some customers."

"Irish consumer prices in 2017 were 24% above the EU average. Irish Mortgage Rates are higher than the EU average. The average standard variable rate for a mortgage in Ireland is currently 3.26%. This is nearly 1.5% higher than the average Eurozone rate which stands at 1.83%" stated Deputy O'Rourke.

Local Fianna Fáil TD, Frank O'Rourke, has called on the Government to put in place "Over the last ten years, hundreds of thousands of Irish citizens had to leave our country to find employment abroad out of necessity, and not out of choice."

"As our economy improves, we must encourage and facility returning emigrants. We should have a strategy, which has a cross department approach, to enable returning emigrants smoothly reintegrate back into our society and economy. Today, there are disproportionate and unnecessary administrative burdens affecting Irish emigrants wanting to return to live in Ireland."

"Last year, the Central Statistics Office estimates that 27,400 Irish emigrants returned to Ireland. I know from my clinics that emigrants making a return to Ireland There has been a 70 per cent-plus rise in house prices nationally since 2013. For encounter barriers and challenges including; Costly car insurance, access to education for their children, in particular third level, finding employment, and of course finding accommodation."

"The part time initiative 'Back to Business' launched last October is aimed at assisting returning emigrants to start or develop businesses. This has the potential to encourage many back home, but it is just one such measure and more needs to be done."

"We need a cross-departmental strategic response to be put in place to support those willing and eager to return back to Ireland. As Ireland had little opportunities to offer people during the recession, the least we owe our returning emigrants is to make the transition home as seamless as possible."

"From an economic and competitiveness point of view, as we see this week, the country needs the skills that returning Irish emigrants are bringing back home and we must do more to assist them return," concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Kildare TD welcomes additional 40 new Special Needs Assistants for schools in the county

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke has welcomed the additional 44 Special Needs Assistant (SNA) posts to be appointed this year in Kildare, as part of 800 additional special needs assistants nationally.

Deputy O'Rourke has campaigned for increased resources for special needs education over the last number of years.

He said "44 new Special Needs Assistants will be appointed this year to Kildare schools. This brings the total number of SNA posts in Kildare to 629 for the academic year 2018/2019. This is welcome news and it was an issue that I raised coming up to Budget 2018.

We must ensure that children with special educational needs are fully supported so that pupils can participate fully in our schools. Since I entered public life, parents of children with special needs have been in regular contact with me seeking supports, particularly in the educational area. "

Deputy O'Rourke said that he held a public meeting to ensure that Special Needs Education would be captured in the policy frame-work and given priority in Budget negotiations.

"We have a growing population in Kildare. This leads to an increased demands for education, both in terms of teachers and school buildings. Special Needs Education is a priority for our party and for me personally. I will continue to fight to ensure that Kildare receives its fair share of the Education resources and that it's growing population is captured when these resources are being allocated, " concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Top Food Safety Tips for Barbecues



Ensure your friends and neighbours go home with memories of a good time, not a tummy bug to remember you by. To make the most of your barbecue, here are some top food safety tips.

Before you start grilling

If this is your first time barbecuing this year, give your barbecue grill a thorough clean by scrubbing the metal rack with a suitable oven cleaner or a damp brush dipped in bicarbonate of soda. Remember to rinse it thoroughly with warm, soapy water afterwards.

Keep your cool

Food is away from your fridge for a longer period of time when cooking and eating outdoors which can lead to germs multiplying quickly. Keep perishable goods like salads and coleslaw in your fridge until you need them.

Before you start cooking

- Make sure frozen food is fully thawed (preferably in the fridge on the bottom shelf; which may take overnight) before you start cooking them.
- Keep foods you plan to cook properly chilled in the fridge or a cool box until needed.
- Light your barbecue well in advance for charcoal barbecues, the flames should have died down before you start cooking.

Handle with care

- Wash your hands before and after handling food.
- Remember to keep raw meat separate from cooked meat and salads.
- Always use separate utensils for handling raw and cooked meat when cooking.
- Never put cooked food on a dish that has been used for raw meat or poultry (unless it has been thoroughly washed in between.)
- Keep food covered whenever possible.

How to know its cooked

The big issue when barbecuing is making sure your food has been cooked thoroughly, all the way through. The outside may look cooked (and in some cases burnt), the inside can still be raw. When cooking meat that is minced or skewered such as burgers, sausages, kebabs and poultry make sure to turn it regularly and to move it around the barbecue to ensure it is cooked evenly on both sides then run this test:

- Is it piping hot all the way through?
- Is there no pink meat left?
- Do the juices run clear?

Steaks or whole meat joints of beef or lamb can be served rare as long as they are cooked on the outside as any harmful bacteria will be on the outside only, and not in the centre.

Mind the marinade

If you use marinade with your barbecue, make sure any marinade used on raw meat is not then used as a sauce to coat vegetables or cooked meat as it will contain raw meat bacteria! If you want to use marinate as a sauce, be sure to cook it in a sauce pan and bring it to a rolling boil before serving it.

Using leftovers

If you have any leftovers from your barbecue, these should not be left outside where they could be in the sun and where insects and animals could get them. As with all leftovers, cover these foods and allow them to cool down in a cool place (your kitchen) before refrigerating within two hours of cooking and use within three days. If you're reheating leftovers, reheat them only once until pipping hot but if in doubt throw them out.

Essential items

These non-food items are indispensable for a safe barbecue:

- Food thermometer.
- Coolers: one for beverages and one for raw meats.
- Ice or frozen gel packs for coolers.
- Jug of water, soap and paper towels for washing hands.
- Enough plates and utensils to keep raw and cooked food separate.
- Foil or other wrap for leftovers.





- Sports and exercise burn excess energy. Family walks or cycles are great exercise.



- Use a calendar. Kids still need structure in the summer. Why not make a wall planner and let them decorate it.




- Measuring and Baking = Practical Maths. Look up some kid friendly recipes and let your child follow the plan. Sneaky learning that tastes good!



- Make sure they are bored. Yes, being bored occasionally is ok. Kids become more creative when they have to entertain themselves, so leave free time in calendar.

MAYNOOTH CYCLING CAMPAIGN



Bikeweek 2018

The Tour of the Dead to historic graveyards around Maynooth took place on a day with almost perfect weather and we had a lovely cycle to Laraghbryan, Ladychapel and Taghadoe. We were delighted to have the opportunity to show the film Why We Cycle about the Dutch cycling culture and appreciated the attendance of Maynooth MD councillors Padraig McEvoy (Ind), Teresa Murray (Ind) and Tim Durkan (FG) but the general attendance was disappointing. On Bike to Work Day, we gave out chocolates to cyclists on their way to work. We were also involved in organising prizes for a number of the Maynooth primary schools. Some had taken part in a Biodiversity Visit to the Royal Canal with Karen Moore. Presentation Girls school deserves special mention for the way that the school was decorated with fantastic paintings and drawings for Bikeweek. The second weekend saw the Family Cycle to Kilcock with nearly 40 cyclists, young and old, cycling along the Royal Canal Greenway. At Kilcock the children, some young and some not so young, were rewarded with an ice cream. So that was Bikeweek 2018. Roll on next year!

Statement on Cycling from Garda Assistant Commissioner

A less enjoyable aspect of Bikeweek was the disappointing comments on cyclists and cycling from Assistant Commissioner David Sheahan of the Garda National Roads Policing Division. In a statement, he described cycling as a 'pastime' and went on to state that cyclists should have brakes, tyres and chain. For everyday cyclists, cycling is not a pastime - it is a mode of transport and it is doubtful that many cyclists take a bike out without tyres or a chain! The Assistant Commissioner also stated that cyclists should never cycle more than two abreast which demonstrates an ignorance of the Road Traffic legislation as it is not illegal to cycle three abreast. If a senior Garda officer has such a distorted view of cycling, it is hardly surprising that the Gardaí fail to prosecute drivers who park on cycle lanes and who endanger cyclists.

Royal Canal Greenway/EuroVelo Route 2

On 2nd July, Shane Ross, the Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport will be coming to Maynooth to open a section of the Royal Canal/Eurovelo Route 2 between Maynooth and the Westmeath border - another piece of the jig-saw puzzle between Moscow and Galway. Cyclists will then be able to cycle all the way from Maynooth to Athlone. You can find out progress on the rest of the route at http:// www.eurovelo.com/en/eurovelos/eurovelo-2.

On the same day, the Glenroyal Hotel will host a Capacity Building Workshop to explore the opportunities in developing trails on and along the Royal Canal. It promises to be a bright future for north Kildare.

Climate Change

Another report pointed out the failure of government to live up to Irish commitments on reduction of greenhouse gases. In a ranking of EU countries' ambition and progress in fighting climate change by Climate Action Network (CAN), Ireland was ranked 27th out of 28.

Niamh Garvey, head of policy and advocacy with Trócaire (which is a member of CAN), commented "This report reaffirms what we know, that political leadership is urgently needed to turn Ireland's record around on climate change".

Vulnerable Road Users and Anti-Cyclist Bias

The vulnerability of pedestrians and cyclists on Irish roads and the 'normality' of road fatalities was once again demonstrated. In a recent week, nine people were killed including three pedestrians, two of which were hit and run collisions. On The Journal twitter account, eight news reports about the fatal crashes generated 65 comments. However, one article on cyclists generated 272 comments.

Kildare Gardai on Two Wheels

Hopefully, it wasn't just the good weather, but a member of the Gardaí has been recently seen cycling around Maynooth which is welcomed by Maynooth Cycling Campaign. It is proposed that more Gardai will be taking to the streets across Kildare on bike patrol.

Finally Good News on Infrastructure

Finally some good news on cycling infrastructure but not in Kildare. Due to increasing congestion in Dublin City, the National Transport Authority has announced major plans to improve bus services and at the same time to introduce the next generation network of cycling facilities in the capital. In time, this will lead to higher quality cycle infrastructure in Kildare - hopefully sooner rather than later.

And more good news - after their original design met with scathing criticism, consultants for Dublin City have redesigned the Clontarf-Amiens cycle corridor and the revised scheme has been warmly welcomed by cyclist representatives.

Social Democrats Call on Taoiseach to Formally Invite UN Special Rapportuer on Adequate Housing to Ireland

Social Democrats Co-Leader Catherine Murphy has called on Taoiseach Leo Varadkar to extend an official State invitation to the UN Special Rapporteur on Adequate Housing Leilani Farha. Ms Farha visited Ireland this week on an academic visit rather than an official State visit. She explained that without being here in an official capacity she is not permitted to issue specific recommendations regarding the current housing crisis. Deputy Murphy said that Ms Farha had pointed to specific international examples of things that are working well and said it would be useful for Ireland to work with her with a view to adopting similar approaches. In response the Taoiseach said he was open to the idea of inviting Ms Farha and would speak to Housing Minister Eoghan Murphy on it.

Speaking during Leaders Questions in the Dáil Catherine Murphy said that Government's current housing strategy was almost entirely reliant on a private market-led approach and is designed to put the State at arms distance from responsibility. She said the continued refusal of the State to provide either a constitutional or a legislative right to housing was a failure of the State to protect the human rights of citizens.

Deputy Murphy said:

"Eighty one countries internationally have adopted a right to housing approach. There appears to be a misunderstanding regarding the concept of what a right to housing means. It does not mean that every person can demand a house; rather it means that the State is obliged to ensure that it produces housing strategies which ensure the availability of housing that is affordable and accessible to all."

"Extending an official invite to the UN Special Rapporteur Leilani Farha would show a willingness on the part of this Government to meaningfully address the escalating housing emergency in this country. Her work has proven to have produced positive results in countries that were experiencing similar housing issues to Ireland and while she is in office we should use the opportunity to avail of such practical expertise."

Sammon liquidation must not delay important Maynooth post primary schools projects

In the wake of the liquidation of Sammon construction, Social Democrats coleader Catherine Murphy TD has demanded that Minister for Education and Skills Richard Bruton prioritise the completion of the Maynooth Post Primary Schools projects.



Catherine Murphy, Kildare North TD said:

"It is absolutely vital that any delays to the Maynooth Post Primary project are kept to an absolute minimum. This critically important project for Maynooth and North Kildare cannot be allowed to be jeopardised by the collapse of the UK construction company Carillion and the subsequent liquidation of Sammon Contracting.

"The domino effect of schools' projects being halted has impacted far too greatly not only in North Kildare but across Ireland and the education of young people is being hindered because of contractual arrangements between the Department and these private companies and that is unacceptable.

"The Department have a duty to ensure adequate facilities are provided to communities to educate our youngsters. Minister Bruton needs to ensure that the Dutch Infrastructure Fund appoint a new contractor as soon as possible to avoid any undue delays in delivering vital school buildings which communities are relying on."

A recent parliamentary reply to me indicates that 3,102 people in Maynooth are signing on the live register with a further 4,685 people in Newbridge also signing on. While these numbers are quite staggering I also believe they are in fact understated. In my office we have spoken to a lot of people about their experience with JobPath – the Department's socalled job activation scheme. Once registered on JobPath a person is taken off the live register even if they are not in actual employment. A separate reply to me confirms that there are 59,495 people nationwide on the JobPath scheme. There are also other schemes such as SpringBoard and participation on these also removes a person from the liveregister and therefore does not count them as unemployed even if they are not actually in employment.

In addition to this, there are a huge number of people who are under-employed -i.e. in minimal hour part-time employment but who are not entitled to a payment because other family members are working and therefore the means test criteria ensures they are not eligible for a payment in their own right.

While there is a lot of talk from Government about an economy that is now reaching full employment, I question how we can be near full employment when we have not only almost 8,000 people in Maynooth and Newbridge on the live register, but also an understating of the figures based on manipulation of how they are counted. We need to have an honest conversation about what employment actually looks like and what the real levels of employment are nationwide and what full employment actually looks like.

Writers' Corner - Short Stories from our Readers

THE ORIGINAL CUBICLE HAD A STANDING DESK. WHAT HAPPENED?

The original cubicle had a standing desk, a private space and slotted together like lego.

WHAT HAPPENED TO THE CUBICLE?

Before the cubicle, clerical workers sat at small desks in straight rows, often facing the same way. It was a factory production line that produced nothing but paper. It was a classroom without a teacher. Those further up the food chain usually had their own office. The management – usually men – were at the top while the secretarial pool – usually women – were at the bottom.



Inventor Robert Propst called the U.S. office "a wasteland" in 1960. "It saps vitality, blocks talent, frustrates accomplishment. It is the daily scene of unfulfilled intentions and failed effort." Cubicles were actually interior designers' attempt to put some soul back IN! Once released, Propst's "Action Office" received rave reviews from both designers and the popular press. It had a huge desk, a space for making phone calls, a vertical filing system, and partitions, so workers could have privacy. The desk could be set at varying heights so people could stand while they worked.

Robert Propst certainly was way ahead of his time. He even invented a prototype napping pad, an inch and a quarter thick and two feet wide (3cm by 60cm), that could be hung up for storage. "Seeing these designs," Industrial Design wrote, "one wonders why office workers have put up with their incompatible, unproductive, uncomfortable environment for so long."

WHEN THE ACTION OFFICE WAS RELEASED IN 1968, IT FLOPPED. What Propst had failed to take into account was economics. The follow-up to the Action Office (the Action Office 2!) was the cubicle we're more used to.

PROPST CALLED THEM "MONOLITHIC INSANITY", "HELLHOLES", "EGG-CARTON GEOMETRY" AND "BARREN, RAT-HOLE PLACES".

Goodbye adjustable desk, hello cheap "workspace solution". Propst's original angles clipped together at an angle of 120 degrees, allowing workers to choose between privacy and open communication. Managers demanded dividers of 90 degrees, allowing an army of micro-office after micro-office to stretch on and on and on... Businesses found it incredibly useful for cramming people into smaller spaces. A bonus was that the Action Office partitions could be treated as furniture, not walls, putting them in a more generous tax bracket. (Today companies can depreciate office furniture in seven years, whereas permanent structures–that is, offices with walls–are assigned a 39.5-year rate.)

"The dark side of this is that not all organizations are intelligent and progressive," Propst said two years before he died. "Lots are run by crass people who can take the same kind of equipment and create hellholes. They make little bitty cubicles and stuff people in them. Barren, rathole places...I never had any illusions that this was a perfect world."

Chairs and desks are now more adjustable, but the basic layout of many North American offices hasn't changed much in 100 years.

If cubicle dwellers feel the walls closing in on them, they aren't wrong. The average cubicle dropped between 25 and 50 percent in size during the mid-1980s and mid-1990s.

By 2006, half of Americans were complaining that their cubicle was smaller than their home bathroom.






So when he returned to town he took the Country Mouse with him and showed him into a larder containing flour and oatmeal and figs and honey and dates.

The Annual Maynooth Town Football Club soccer blitz took place on the weekend of the 16th and 17th June at the Club grounds on the Rathcoffey/Newtown Road. Open to members and non-members alike, this is one of the biggest sporting events in the Maynooth soccer calendar and showcases the talent that exists in Maynooth and surrounding areas at underage level. The blitz provides younger players with an opportunity to try soccer

in a fun environment and gives other players an opportunity to play with and get to know players that they don't usually play with. Following registration, players were allocated across 3 different age groups: (1) U12 Boys & U13 Girls & Older on Saturday afternoon (2) U10-U11 Boys & U11-U12 Girls on Sunday afternoon and (3) Younger Players on Sunday morning. Summer Recipes

Deep-fried Baby Lemon Calamari Ingredients:

500g baby calamari, cleaned 50g 'oo' Italian flour or plain flour (rice flour also works) 1tsp freshly ground cumin seeds Zest of 1 lemon, very finely grated Salt and freshly ground black pepper Groundnut oil, for deep-frying 2tsp dried oregano 2 quartered lemons, to serve Sliced red and green chillies to serve (optional)

Chopped fresh coriander, to serve (optional) Method:

Slice the calamari into thin rings. In a large bowl, mix together the flour, ground cumin seeds, lemon zest, and a little salt and pepper.

Heat the oil to 180°C/350°F in a medium non-stick saucepan. Toss the calamari in the flour and cumin mixture and shake away any excess.

Deep-fry in batches for around 4 minutes until lightly browned and tender. Remove with a slotted spoon and drain the excess oil on paper towels. Sprinkle the calamari with the oregano. Add a squeeze of lemon juice and a sprinkle of chilli, if desired, and serve scattered with coriander leaves.

Chicken Caesar Salad With Sourdough Croutons Serves: 1 - 2

Ingredients:

Meat from half a roast chicken, in bite-size chunks

2 heads romaine lettuce

100g parmesan cheese, grated

1/2 loaf sourdough bread for croutons, sliced and cubed 50ml extra virgin olive oil

Caesar dressing:

2 anchovies, chopped small

2 egg yolks

1 clove garlic, crushed

2tbs lemon juice

¹/₂tsp English mustard powder

1tbs Worcestershire sauce

¹/₂tbs Tabasco sauce

175ml sunflower oil

50ml extra virgin olive oil

50ml cold water

Method:

Make the dressing by combining the anchovies, egg yolks, garlic, lemon juice, mustard powder, Worcestershire and Tabasco sauces in a bowl. Whisk together with a hand whisk and then gradually add the sunflower and olive oils, a drop at a time to begin with, until all the oil has emulsified. Add the water at the end to thin the consistency. Season to taste.

Preheat the oven to 200°C. Wash and dry the lettuce. Tear into manageable pieces. Toss the cubes of sourdough in olive oil and place on a baking tray. Cook in the oven until golden and crunchy, about 10 minutes.

In a bowl, place the lettuce leaves, chicken, half the croutons and half the parmesan. Add about one-third of the dressing and toss. Arrange the salad on plates and top with the remaining croutons and grated cheese. The leftover dressing will keep in the fridge for a few days. *****

Chocolate Strawberry Slice

Ingredients:

180g dark chocolate 180g cashew butter 225g strawberries Method:



Break the chocolate up and add it to a saucepan on

medium heat with the cashew butter. Let it all melt together slowly. When its melted use a fork to whisk it well until smooth - try to get rid of any lumps of cashew butter. Set it aside to cool a little, while you slice the strawberries into halves and quarters. Add the strawberries to the saucepan and fold them in gently. Line an 8in baking tray with parchment paper. Spread the mixture out evenly in the tin. Pop in the freezer to set for about 2 hours. Then slice into squares. Store in the freezer.







If only July were more predictable in the garden. It doesn't matter how wet the spring was, rain can become very elusive in July. And warmer zones are actually passing out of prime growing conditions into the lethargy of the dog days-the hottest period of the year (reckoned in antiquity from the heliacal rising of Sirius, the Dog Star). So there's no definitive list of gardening chores for the July garden. Gardeners just have to play it by ear. Most importantly, keep a close eye on pests and disease, then sit back and enjoy your garden and all the efforts you put in earlier in the year to get it where it is now.

July is an excellent month for bees and as you probably know already, they are essential for beautiful and productive growth in the garden. Planting colourful and fragrant flowers in your garden will attract them.



Make sure the Birds have enough water during the dry spells. Keep young plants watered during the Summer, not forgetting plants that are growing in containers. Continue deadheading flowers as they fade and prune all your shrubs that flowered in early Summer. Take semi-ripe cuttings from shrubs and trim conifer hedges and take cuttings from them. Now is the time to Summer prune Wisteria and divide bearded Irises. Layer and take cuttings of **Camations** and disbud **Dahlias** to get larger blooms. Plant Autumn flowering bulbs, transplant seedlings of biennials (plant that takes two years to complete its biological life circle) sown earlier. Water vegetables regularly, lift new potatoes,



onions and garlic and pinch out runner beans when they reach the top of their canes. You also need to pinth out outdoor tomatoes when four trusses have formed. Pick raspberries and currents and harvest herbs. Keep greenhouses well ventilated and damp down regularly.

In July there is plenty to harvest from your garden and hopefully you are at home to enjoy the feast. You will have broad beans, dwarf french beans, runner beans, cabbage, courgettes, kohlrabi, lettuce, scallions, peas, early potatoes, radish, spinach, chard and turnips.

You can still sow lettuce, scallions, kohlrabi, turnip, radish, Chinese cabbage and Florence fennel. It's also a good time to start sowing all the oriental salads again as they are now less prone to bolting.

Gardening should be fun, but there is no such thing as totally labour free gardening. Growing plants necessarily involves some work but this can be reduced to a minimum if

the right approach is taken. Plants want to live but too many people fuss over them unnecessarily. Not only do they make extra work for themselves but they also harm their plants in the process and even kill them with kindness. For example, many plants succumb each year through the use of too much fertiliser or too much water. Growth of trees and shrubs is often checked for decades by too deep planting...



Last but not least, weeds are an absolute pain this time of year. No getting away from it. If you have followed our advice in previous months, you will have kept the weed issue to a minimum by hoeing, hoeing, hoeing them out as they spring up. But those weeds which have escaped your eagle eye will now be happily shooting up and going to seed to



preserve their survival for next year. How dare they?! Damage limitation measures now required - get out there and get cracking to remove them before the seeds scatter everywhere and settle themselves into the soil, ready to pop up and blight your life again next year. All that work that you put in earlier in the year will finally start to show.

Now it's time to enjoy it! If you have a vegetable garden you'll probably find that by the end of the month you'll have some gorgeous home-grown goodies to eat. Plus, your flowers will be starting to bloom and a beautiful display will be on show. So, you'll be spending as much of your spare time as possible out there - barbecues, family time, and a good bit of relaxation are all on the cards.

Outlander is one of **RTE**'s best kept secrets. Despite being in its third year of broadcast on **RTE2**, it is shamefully lacking in promotion. A scheduling slot after midnight is decidedly not viewer–friendly. In fact, most Irish people have never heard of it. So here's the deal. **Outlander** is one of the most under-rated shows in Ireland and the UK, despite having a massive global fan base to rival the likes of **Game of Thrones** and **The Walking Dead**. It boasts one of the best screen couples ever, whose incredible love, bond, loyalty and sacrifice, transcends space and time itself. **Outlander** began its life as a series of books by Diana Gabaldon in the 1990s.



Diana Gabaldon

American academic, Diana Gabaldon decided to try her hand at writing a novel. Purely for fun, for 'practice, just to learn how'. Gabaldon happened to see an old TV episode of **Doctor Who** and was fascinated by the Doctor's companion. A tall Scottish Highlander from the 1740s called Jamie McCrimmon. The image of the young man in the kilt, struck a chord with Diana. An idea for a historical, time-travelling, fantasy romance was born. The initial title for Gabaldon's debut novel was **Cross Stitch**. Her American publishers changed it to **Outlander** for wider appeal. Diana has, to date, produced eight novels in the **Outlander** series. She is currently writing her ninth story. Her novels has been phenomenally successful in several countries and consistently on bestseller lists.

Outlander TV Series Sing Me & Song.....

A 16-part TV series based on Gabaldon's first novel was commissioned by Sony Pictures in collaboration with Starz in 2013. Ronald D Moore (**Battlestar Galactica**, **Star Trek**) came on board as the show's developer and producer. An intriguing premise, **Outlander** follows the adventures of an English WW2 army combat nurse, who finds herself hurtled back in time to the Scotland of 1743. Claire Randall encounters the young, dashing Highlander Jamie Fraser, and soon becomes embroiled in intrigue, danger, romance and the Jacobite uprisings. Despite American financial backing and production teams, **Outlander** is primarily filmed in the U.K. with a predominately British cast. What sets it apart from the rest is its unique blend of fantasy, mysticism, sci-fi, action, history and a strong, passionate central love story.



Another quirky feature of the show is its use of Scots-Gaelic language and a beautiful, haunting soundtrack by American composer Bear McCreary. The use of Scottish instrumentation and folk music make for a striking score. Fiddles, bagpipes, accordions and bodhrans all feature heavily. 'The Skye Boat Song' heard over the opening credits is especially memorable and sets the atmosphere for each episode. You won't stop humming it!

Production Values

Outlander is steeped in history. While this is a fantasy series, its also very much a historical drama set in a turbulent period. You get a real sense of being immersed in the times. This is helped in no small measure by its stunning production values. **Outlander** really is gorgeous to look at. On a par with **Game of Thrones**. The show is filmed with the glorious, sweeping and endless landscapes of the Scottish Highlands as a backdrop. Exquisite tartans, beautiful costumes and lush scenery draws you into the magical world of **Outlander**.



The whole series is a virtual love-letter to the Scottish tourist industry. Fans worldwide make pilgrimages to **Outlander** filming locations on an annual basis. Castles, Standing Stones sites, Stately Homes, and the historical battlefield of Culloden have become favourites haunts of fans of the show.

Jamie Fraser (Sam Heughan) "King of Men"

Diana Gabaldon's swoon-worthy, kilt-wearing character, Jamie Fraser is possibly the main reason to watch **Outlander**. Her tall, copper haired, blue-eyed Highlander warrior, in love with a fiery, time-travelling "Sassenach", has been capturing the hearts of female book readers for nearly thirty years now. The charismatic Scot boasts a highly developed sense of humour, strong social intelligence and a fierce sense of duty.

When Scottish actor Sam Heughan was first cast in this pivotal role, Gabaldon enthused, "That man is a Scot to the bone and Jamie Fraser to the heart". She had found her Jamie Fraser incarnate!




This is a breakthrough role for the relatively unknown Heughan. The handsome actor does a terrific job of bringing the romantic, intelligent and brave Highlander to vibrant life. His expressive face and sexy Scottish accent is a definite highlight of the Outlander experience. The only quibble being the muting of his character's disarming sense of humour in this production. Heughan is also not best served by the writers at times, with some of his best scenes ending up on the cutting room floor.

Claire Fraser (Caitriona Balfe)

"J'm not the meek and obedient type" The search to find the actress to play Gabaldon's timetravelling nurse (Claire Randall Fraser) was akin to the search for Scarlett O'Hara in **Gone with the Wind**. When former Irish model/actress Caitriona Balfe stepped in to the **Outlander** audition room in 2013, the production found their feisty Englishwoman heroine. Her 'chemistry test' with Sam Heughan was off-the-charts in its intensity. As the first person narrator of **Outlander**, the character of Claire has a stubborn aversion to taking orders and a sharp tongue that gets her into trouble a lot! She's also compassionate and a woman clearly ahead of both the time periods she inhabits. There is much fun to be had in her modern 'smart-ass' comments to the dinosaur kilted Highlanders from the 18th century.

Caitriona Balfe has received widespread critical acclaim for her leading performance in **Outlander.** The elegant actress has scooped up several **BAFTA** and **IFTA** awards. It helps that Balfe is such an engaging actress who brings many layers of depth to her role. She makes Claire a spirited, funny, principled and heroic match to Heughan's magnetic Jamie Fraser.
