The Start of Heritage Week at Maynooth Castle: Sharing stories and making connections (by Moira Devery, OPW guide at the Castle)

Heritage Week got off to a flying start at Maynooth Castle on Saturday, August 18, 2018.

OPW guide Alan set the pace at 12 noon with a very informative and exciting recount of Silken Thomas' rebellion against the English crown in 1534. More than 25 people listened attentively as he recounted how cannon balls fired from Crew Hill damaged the castle roof but that the castle actually fell because of the bribe offered to the Castle Constable who got the garrison drunk on the FitzGerald family's Spanish wine stored in the undercroft.



At 2pm 12 musicians and singers from the local session group Push for Porter set themselves up at the sheltered base of the granite plinth to play. With their lively traditional reels, jigs, polkas and slides they drew the crowds in like the Pied Piper of Hamelin. Chairs were carried out of the Keep to seat the ever-increasing numbers of families and other visitors. With their fiddles, flutes, tin whistles, banjos,

mandolins, bodhráns, guitars and songs, the very talented musicians played for two hours non-stop while the sun shone down gently and the clouds overhead remained benignly white and fluffy. A warm breeze meant everyone could enjoy the good weather without the help of umbrellas and galoshes. Yiha!

Tunes like the Belltable Waltz, An Gaoth Aneas and songs like The Black Velvet Band, The Wild Rover, The Rose of Allendale and many more rang out in the grounds of the Castle and were enjoyed by many of the 666 visitors to the Castle

that day between 10 and 6pm. Some were locals while others came from as far away as France, the USA and Australia. Two of the musicians, inspired by the music and relaxed atmosphere, ventured a waltz cum jive and entertained the spectators with their spontaneous choreography. Little Karolina, however, the daughter of one of the musicians, stole the show with her recitation of "Lámh, lámh eile" and her Irish dancing skills.

The tours offered by the OPW guiding staff during Heritage Week are different to those normally offered. Katherine's costumed tour on Medieval medicine and sickness is entitled "A spoonful of medieval medicine: lotions, potions and cures" while Mary's tour is about "Daily Life in the Castle" and focuses on aspects of social history, in particular the important role of the women in running the castle and smuggling the 11th Earl off to the Medici in Florence.

Moira's tour is an Irish-language tour for those who would like to hear the basic history of the castle as Gaeilge in honour of Bliain na Gaeilge and our native

language which was spoken in Ireland when the Normans arrived here. Joe's tour focuses on "The Demise of the Castle" with particular reference to Richard Boyle, the Earl of Cork, and his reconstruction of the castle in the 17th century. 





Cllr. McGinley Calls for a New Footpath to the Maynooth Playground

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD meeting on 7 September: "That a footpath be constructed from the new footpath/cycle path at the bottom of the Harbour Field to where the footpath ends at the Adult Exercise equipment, so that parents don't have to push buggies through the grass."

Cllr. McGinley Calls for Reduced Speed Limits in Parklands and Silken Vale

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD meeting on 7 September: "That 30 kph "Slow Zone" signs be erected at the entrances to Parklands/Castlebridge and Silken Vale/The Arches estates, similar to those already erected in other Maynooth Housing Estates."

Cllr. McGinley Calls for the Bad Corner on the Dunboyne Road, Maynooth, to be Removed

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD meeting on 7 September: "In light of the decision by An Bord Pleanala to grant planning permission for 462 dwellings and student accommodation at Mariaville/Moyglare Road and Dunboyne Road, Maynooth, and given the increased traffic that the development will generate on the Dunboyne Road, Maynooth, what plans do the Council have to remove the bad corner on the Dunboyne Road, Maynooth, near Pebble Hill House, as it constitutes a serious traffic hazard if the road is not straightened at this point."

Cllr. McGinley Calls for the Provision of More Creches in Maynooth

Cllr. John McGinley submitted the following Motion for the consideration of the Maynooth MD meeting on 7 September: "What developments in Maynooth in the Past 10 years have failed to provide creches as per their planning permission and what enforcement action are the Council going to take on the matter?"

Cllr. McGinley and His Colleagues Emmet Stagg and Angela Feeney have Made the Following Submission on Planning Application Ref: 18/762 (Revision of 16/1153), Kelston Properties Ltd. At Carton Court/Greenfield Drive/Maynooth Park, Maynooth

"We wish to make the following submission on this Planning Application:

- 1. The land adjacent to Maynooth Park and Greenfield Drive floods every year. It floods the back gardens of houses 54 and 55 Maynooth Park. Also, the land in the centre of the public Open Space, opposite House No.74 Carton Court, becomes a lake at heavy rain times. Construction of the new dwellings will add seriously to this flooding. It is therefore imperative that site attenuation of surface water be a condition of planning in order to counter destructive storm water charges.
- 2. That a 2m high block wall capped and rendered be erected between Greenfield Drive and the public open space, to replace the existing barb wire fence. This wall should be similar to the new boundary wall that the Applicant proposes to replace the existing boundary wall with Carton Court on the western side of the public open space.
- That the provision for a pedestrian and cycle access from the site to Greenfield Drive at house 61Greenfield Drive and at house 74 Carton Court be removed, as residents are of the firm belief that such connections lead to antisocial behaviour. Greenfield Drive has been a quiet cul de sac for the last 45 years and so has the cul-de-sac at Carton Court.
- That the 2.2ha Public Open Space be handed over to Kildare County Council when it has been landscaped.
- 5. That it be made a condition of Planning that the Distributor Road from Straffan Road to Griffin Rath/Celbridge Road be fully completed and handed over to Kildare County Council before any dwellings are occupied.
- 6. That all spoil from the site be used to create a mound between the houses and the M4 in order to act as a noise barrier. Also, in addition to a 2.5m high noise barrier that

a forest of evergreen trees be planted in the 91m Motorway Exclusion Zone to help reduce traffic noise and in order to prevent it from becoming an overgrown wilderness."

Stagg Calls For Additional Gardaí for Kildare

Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg has renewed his call for additional Gardaí to be assigned to the Kildare Division in forthcoming allocations of probationer gardai and also through the transfer of Gardaí from other Divisions to Kildare. Mr. Stagg stated that 14 probationer Gardaí have been assigned to the Kildare Division so far this year with additional probationer Gardaí to be assigned following the next graduation in September.

However, to reduce the historical under-manning of the Gardaí in Kildare, there must also be a concerted campaign to transfer Gardaí from other divisions into Kildare. In the first 6 months of 2018 the net gain for Kildare from Transfers In and Out of the Division was only 4 gardaí, made up of 5 additional gardaí transferred in and a reduction in the number of sergeants in the division by 1. The Chief Superintendent, Brian Sutton, is already on record stating that he has a list as long as his arm of experienced members looking to transfer to the Kildare Division.

The numbers, stated Mr. Stagg, being transferred from other Divisions, is paltry and must be ramped up. We are making progress on Garda Numbers but more needs to be done. Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg stated that he would contact the Garda Commissioner to impress on him the importance of not only assigning probationer gardaí to the Kildare Division but to also sanction the transfer of Gardaí from other Divisions to improve policing in Kildare.

Stagg Critical of Further Delay in State Funding for North Kildare Swimming Pool

Following the publication of the National Sports Policy by the Sports Minister on Wednesday July 25th, Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg has criticised the fact that a new Local Authority Swimming Pool Programme of grants was not announced as part of the National Sports Policy, and instead we have to await for a new National Strategy for Swimming to be drawn up.

Prior to the publication of the New Sports Policy, stated Mr. Stagg, it was the clear understanding that the issue of future funding of swimming pools would be specifically dealt with. Now we have to await this new National Strategy for Swimming. We also, stated Mr. Stagg, have to await a review of the provision of swimming pools, whether publicly or privately owned, across the country to identify where gaps in provision for schools and communities can be met, and where sufficient potential demand exists, both among children and adults, to justify the building of a new pool.

The only positive message from the policy, stated Mr. Stagg, is a recognition that the grants of €3.8 Million in the last Programme are not sufficient to cover potential new swimming pool projects, and that consideration will be given in the future to allow Local Authorities to apply for funding under the Large Scale Sport Infrastructure Fund. That though will have to await the National Strategy for Swimming and the Audit of current Swimming Pools. Mr. Stagg stated that an audit was not required to show clearly that a Swimming Pool was required in North Kildare.

In conclusion Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg stated that it was imperative that the National Strategy for Swimming was completed quickly as well as the audit of current swimming pools so we could get a dedicated team in Kildare Co. Council to seek funding for the Swimming Pool for North Kildare and he vowed to apply pressure on the Minister to ensure further delays were minimised.

Stagg Welcomes Sanctioning of Pre-Qualification of Contractors for New Maynooth Boy's NS

Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg has again been in contact with the Minister for Education in relation to progressing the construction of the New St. Mary's Boys' National School on the Moyglare Road, Maynooth.

The Minister advised Mr. Stagg that the project was currently at Detailed Design Stage and with planning permission, fire certificates and disability access certificates now in place, the Department has recently authorised the New School to proceed to pre-qualification of contractors. The Minister further advised Mr. Stagg that the Pre-Qualification process normally takes between 8 and 12 weeks to complete and once completed the project can then proceed to Tender Stage.

Welcoming this further progress Mr. Stagg stated that the New Maynooth Boys' NS was granted planning permission by Kildare Co. Council on August 1st last and it comprises the replacement of the existing school and the construction of a new 3 storey National School with 24 classrooms including a Special Needs Unit and Multipurpose Hall. 3 Ballcourts and a Junior Play area will also be provided as part of the project.

The school currently has 530 pupils and when completed the new school will cater for just under 700 pupils. Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg stated that he would continue to press the Minister until the go-ahead to invite tenders issued to the school.

Contract Awarded for Construction of New Maynooth Educate Together School - Stagg

Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg has welcomed confirmation from the Department of Education that the Contract for the construction of the New Maynooth Educate Together School has been awarded.

Mr. Stagg stated that MEIC Limited were awarded the contract on Friday 17th August following the issuing of a Letter of Acceptance by the Department of Education.

Mr. Stagg stated that this was great news for the pupils, teachers and parents of the school who along with their Board of Management have campaigned for the new permanent building for the school over the years. Mr. Stagg stated that he wanted to congratulate all those involved in the successful campaign. The New school, stated Mr. Stagg, will comprise a 2 storey 16 classroom school and will replace the existing temporary accommodation.

In conclusion Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg stated that he looked forward to the construction of the new school commencing soon and its completion within the expected 10 month construction timeframe.

Tenders Sought for Detailed Ground Investigation for Maynooth Eastern Relief Road - Stagg

Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg has welcomed the invitation of tenders for Detailed Ground Investigation Works for the Maynooth Eastern Ring Road.

Mr. Stagg stated that Kildare Co. Council are continuing to work with Consulting Engineers Roughan & O'Donovan in the design of the Maynooth Eastern Relief Road which will link the Leixlip Road at Blacklion and the Celbridge Road. The project will also include the construction of a bridge over the railway and Royal Canal and €14.5 Million is the amount available for the project under the Local Infrastructure Housing Activation

The Tenders sought for the Detailed Ground Investigation have to be returned to Kildare Co. Council by September 5th. The Ground Investigation is required before the final design of the road can be completed and involves an examination of the ground conditions which helps in the analysis of engineering and environmental considerations in relation to the project. It is an essential part of civil engineering and informs the engineers of the distribution of materials in the ground and their behaviour during construction and when the project is completed.

Kildare North Labour General Election Candidate Emmet Stagg stated that it was important that Kildare Co. Council officials continued to press ahead with the detailed work on the Maynooth Eastern Relief Road as it will assist in relieving the chronic traffic congestion in Maynooth Main Street.

Appealing your Leaving Cert results Ouestion

I am unhappy with the result in one of my Leaving Cert subjects and think that I should have got a higher grade. How can I get the grade checked?

Answer

If you are not satisfied with the mark you got in a Leaving Certificate subject, you can appeal this result to the State Examinations Commission (SEC).

Before you decide to appeal, you can view your examination script at the school where you sat the exam. When you get your exam results, your school will get a personalised application form for you. If you want to view your exam script, you must complete this form and return it to your school by **21 August 2018**.

The Organising Superintendent appointed by the SEC will assign you to one of the viewing sessions, on either 31 August or 1 September. You can only view your scripts from the written examinations – not the results of oral examinations or marks for practical examinations.

If you decide to appeal your result, you can use the <u>online Appeals Application Service</u>. This service will be available from 12 noon on 20 August 2018. You need your examination number and PIN to access this service.

When you apply online and pay the fee, you will get an Appeal Confirmation Form, which you must print and bring to the Organising Superintendent in your school **no later** than 3 September 2018.

If you stay on your One-Parent Family Payment and are studying full-time on an approved course, you can apply for both the maintenance and fee components of

If you cannot use the online service, you must contact the SEC for a personalised appeal application form, pay the appeal fee in a bank and get the bank to stamp the form to confirm payment. Bring the stamped form to the Organising Superintendent in your school **no later than 3 September 2018.**

Your script will then be <u>sent to an appeal examiner for re-marking</u>. The appeal fee is €40 per subject for the <u>Established Leaving Certificate</u>. The appeal fee for the <u>Applied Leaving Certificate</u> is €15.50 per subject. You will get this fee back if your result is upgraded.

Renting out a room in your home Ouestion

I have an extra room in my home and I would like to rent it out. Will I have to pay tax on this rental income?

Answer

If you rent out a room in your home, the rental income you earn is exempt from income tax, PRSI and the Universal Social Charge – provided it is less than €14,000 in a tax year (1 January to 31 December). This is called <u>rent-a-room relief</u>. Rental income includes the total rent and any money that the tenant pays directly to you for food, utilities, laundry or similar services. The income you get must be under the exemption limit of €14,000. If it is over this limit, you are taxed on the total amount.

Your home must be in the State and you must occupy it as your sole residence during the year of assessment. This means that it is your home for most of the year and is where people would normally expect to make contact with you.

Some self-contained units qualify for this relief but they must be attached to your home, for example, a basement flat in your home.

You do not have to own the property to get rent-a-room relief – you can be a tenant sub-letting to someone else. In this case, you should check with your landlord that sub-letting is allowed.

The rent-a-room relief applies only to residential tenancies, not to short-term guest arrangements, and tenants must use the room on a long-term basis. So, renting a room to a student for the academic year or for a one-month course is covered, but providing accommodation to occasional visitors for short periods, for example, through an online accommodation booking site, is not.

You cannot claim the relief if you are renting a room to your civil partner, son or

daughter, or if you are an employee and your company pays you to allow clients to use the room on an occasional basis.

One-Parent Family Payment and going back to education Ouestion

I am parenting alone and getting a One-Parent Family Payment. I would like to go back to college. What are my options?

Answer

Your options depend on your circumstances. You can go back to education and transfer onto the Back to Education Allowance (BTEA) or you can choose to keep your One-Parent Family payment. You will need to assess whether it is more beneficial for you to transfer to the BTEA when you go back to education or to remain on your One-Parent Family Payment and apply for a student grant.

If you go onto the BTEA, you will not be eligible for the maintenance component of the student grant. However, you can apply under the student grant scheme for a fee grant to cover the student contribution and course fees/field trip costs (where appropriate). You can also keep your Rent Supplement, medical card and other secondary benefits you may have.

If you qualify for the BTEA, you are also entitled to an annual Cost of Education Allowance of €500 as you have a dependent child.

If you stay on your One-Parent Family Payment and are studying full-time on an approved course, you can apply for both the maintenance and fee components of the student grant. If you study part-time, you may be able to keep your Rent Supplement. However if you go back to full-time education and stay on your One-Parent Family Payment, you will no longer be eligible for Rent Supplement.

If you are on the Rental Accommodation Scheme or living in local authority housing, you continue to pay your differential rent. However, this may be affected by the student grant, depending on your other sources of income.

Jobseeker's Allowance for younger jobseekers Question

I am 23 years of age and I live with my partner (aged 25) who is currently unemployed and getting Jobseeker's Allowance. I am now also looking for work. How much Jobseeker's Allowance am I entitled to?

Answer

In general, people aged under 26 get a reduced rate of Jobseeker's Allowance.

As you are cohabiting, you have two payment options. Your partner could claim for you as a dependent adult on their Jobseeker's Allowance claim. They would be paid their personal payment of €152.80 and €131.40 for you each week. This would give you a total household weekly payment of €284.20.

Alternatively, if you claim Jobseeker's Allowance in your own right, the maximum personal amount you are eligible for is €107.70 a week. Even though the rate paid is less, it might be more beneficial for you because, as a claimant in your own right, you may be eligible for a range of training and employment schemes to help you into employment.

If you take up a place on a course of education or training or on an employment support scheme, you get a higher rate of payment. For example, all Back to Education Allowance (BTEA) participants aged under 26 who were getting a reduced age-related Jobseeker's Allowance payment, get a maximum BTEA rate of €198 per week.

Maynooth Commuter line capacity must increase as new station added.

The need for additional carriages on the Maynooth commuter service has gained urgency as updated planning permission was granted for a new station at Pelletstown, between Ashtown and Boombridge train stations.

The news emerging from Dublin City Council that updated planning has been approved for a new station on the Maynooth commuter line will not be welcomed by any train users so long as the Government allow over crowded trains on a daily basis. It does not make sense that a new station be added to the line while the rail fleet serving this line is already at capacity.

This commuter line, which travels through the Taoiseach's own constituency, has been neglected by the Government. The last time I raised the capacity issues with the Minister for Transport I was told that enlargement of the rail fleet would happen in 2022. That is four more years of overcrowding with a growing work force commuting to Dublin and now an additional station to add to the numbers.

The Government must treat this as a special case. It is unique that a new train station is added to a busy rail line so a unique resolution to the capacity issues must be found.

HSE appoints almost six hundred managers in six years

Figures recently released to Fianna Fáil by the HSE show that the numbers of managers at Grade VIII and above in the HSE now stands at 1,329. This compares to 744 six years ago.

Anytime a Dáil Deputy stands up in Leinster House inquiring about waiting lists or service provision we are constantly told about the difficulties in recruiting front line staff and the shortage of personnel.

This clearly does not apply in the managerial grades where there has been an almost 80% increase since 2012. Certainly we have not seen an 80% increase in nurses or doctors during that time. If we had there would be nearly 5,000 extra doctors and 20,000 more nurses.

Many people will wonder exactly what these additional managers have brought to the health service. The HSE has previously claimed that improved management and governance leads to better patient outcomes. Certainly in terms of emergency department overcrowding and waiting lists, things are much worse now than they were in 2012.

Bus Connects will host a public consultation afternoon in advance of the proposed new redesign of Dublin Bus services to the greater Dublin area, including Maynooth. Business competitiveness under attack from unrelenting pressure on wages from rent inflation

Business competitiveness is under attack from rocketing rent costs and a lack of affordable housing. New figures show an unrelenting pressure on private rental costs across the country, but especially in cities and large urban areas.

As rents continue to rocket and private home building remains sub-demand, this crisis is only going to get worse. Employees are seeing their wages being swallowed by up fixed costs such as rent and insurance costs.

With rents continuing to rise, workers will require pay rises just to pay rent and live. This will depress the competitiveness of Irish businesses, and businesses located in Ireland. We have seen queues of students, young couples and overseas workers outside apartments and home to rent. The craziness has started again, and unless we nip it in the bud, we risk damaging our competitiveness even further.

This cannot continue. The housing crisis is risking our economy's very viability, and unless the Government accepts the basic economic principle that until supply matches demand, rents will continue to rocket.

There is simply a lack of capacity in all areas of the residential housing market. Until more units are built for rent or for sale, we will continue to see queues of people clambering to get a foot on the housing ladder.

The process of building housing in this country is simply too bureaucratic. We need to actively look at the planning process to speed up the delivery of housing. It's true that the Irish economy is growing.

However, unless the lack of availability of affordable housing is addressed, it will stop growing. It's time we got on top of it. Otherwise, we risk losing jobs and thereby limiting the ability of our State to invest in vital public services.

Outright ban on exploration of Oil and Gas would be counterproductive says O'Rourke

Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, has stated that having an outright ban on exploring Oil and Gas in Ireland would be counterproductive. Deputy O'Rourke was speaking after a presentation was given by the Irish Offshore Operators' Association to the Oireachtas Climate Change Committee.

"An outright ban on exploring Oil and Gas would be counterproductive to Ireland's competitiveness, to Ireland's Energy security, to our ability to attract Foreign Direct Investment, would negatively affect our balance of payments and has the potential to increase the cost of living for our citizens."

"I fully subscribe to the principle of seeking sustainable and low carbon energy sources. Indeed, Ireland has made significant progress in relation to having a more sustainable energy mix. However, this does not mean that we stop all current methods of securing our energy source and developing our own indigenous energy supplies." "Around 90% of Ireland Energy requirement is supplied by Fossil Fuels, with over 70% of our requirement being imported. The balance is provided by sustainable mode of energy supply which is increasing but in no way will meet the growing demand of the country's energy requirements (electricity, heating, transport) in the future."

"Currently Corrib Gas provides over half of our gas needs and has resulted in our energy import bill dropping from €4.6 billion to €3.4 billion in 2016. This indigenous gas source provides protection to Ireland against interruption to the supply of imported gas. A replacement for Corrib will be required in the coming years as production declines in order to retain our energy independence and security of supply."

"Banning exploration in Ireland would significantly increase the risk around energy security."

"Energy security is a key enabler to attracting FDI, where Kildare has been very successful. It also has the potential to ensure that we have a competitive cost base from the perspective of energy cost.

"Recently the cost of energy has increased and we need to ensure that our future energy mix is balanced to provide Ireland with a competitive and secure supply of energy. An outright ban on Gas and Oil exploration would negatively impact that objective." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Public Consultation on new Bus Routes extended says O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, has confirmed that the public consultation period on the proposed new Dublin Bus routes has been extended to 28th of September. Deputy O'Rourke confirmed the extension following a meeting he had with the CEO of Dublin Bus Mr. Ray Coyne.

"Public Consultation on the proposals to change the Dublin Bus Routes commences on Monday 16th July next and has been extended to the 28th of September."

"The National Transport Authority (NTA) have published their proposals to redesign the Dublin Area Bus Network. Existing bus numbers, servicing the most popular routes into the city centre, are to be replaced with seven superfrequent spines routes (A to G). These spine routes are to be supplemented with orbital routes that stay out of the city centre, but link up with the spines."

"Route 66 Bus Service from Maynooth will be replaced by Route C3 Service, which will provide 12 services between 7am and 9 am up from 9 currently."

"Similarly Route 67 Bus Service, servicing Celbridge, will

be replaced by Route C4, with increased frequency linking into Leixlip and Lucan. The C4 service will provide an increase to 12 services between 7am and 9am. Their will also be 3 direct links from Celbridge to Dublin at peak times."

"There is going to be a better service and connectivity from Celbridge and Leixlip to Loiusa Bridge and Hazelhatch Train stations. In addition, a new Orbital route, linking Moyglare Road in Maynooth to Celbridge town, Hazelhatch Train Station, to Newcastle then to Citywest and onto Tallaght."

"Commuters that have made contact with me have highlighted disappointment with the dropping of some direct service from Celbridge and Leixlip to the city centre. As I have said before, we need improved public transport with increased frequency and improved travel times and I asked the CEO of Dublin Bus to minimize the change to the direct services."

"Full details of the proposals is on www.busconnects.ie. The NTA will be arranging a series of local information sessions at various venues and I have requested again that North Kildare be a location for one of the sessions and I encourage all commuters to have their say." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Waiting list for homecare packages adversely impacting on older people - O'Rourke

Fianna Fáil TD for Kildare North Frank O'Rourke has criticised the Government for failing to properly resource the Home Care Scheme.

Deputy O'Rourke made the comments after obtaining information which shows that 724 people in the CHO 7 Hospital Group, which includes Kildare, West Wicklow and parts of Dublin, are currently waiting for home care supports.

Deputy O'Rourke said, "It's unacceptable that so many older people are waiting for access to vital home care supports. These people have already been assessed by the HSE and it has been determined that they need additional home care supports. It's perfectly clear for all to see that the Government simply isn't providing the necessary resources to ensure people get access to the home care supports that they need.

"I have raised this issue directly with HSE management and have asked for details on how the waiting list for home care supports will be cleared. The replies that I have received to date leave a lot to be desired as the HSE have made it clear that they do not have the funding needed to meet demand. HSE management have said that the matter is in the hands of the Minister for Health Simon Harris for consideration.

"It makes little sense to delay giving home care supports to people that need them. It goes against the Government's stated aim of ensuring people can continue living in their home if they so choose to do so. It is also leading to unnecessary overcrowding in our hospitals. There are many older people in hospitals that are ready to be discharged but are unable to return home as the necessary home care supports have not been put in place.

"Minister Harris and his Government colleagues need to ensure that the Home Care Support Scheme is properly resourced. We all know that there are limited resources, but the current situation is only leading to increases costs in the long run due to overcrowding in hospitals and a scarcity of beds in nursing homes," concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

O'Rourke Raises Requirement for extra Gardaí with Minister

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, has discussed the

need for extra Gardaí in North Kildare with the Minister for Justice in the Dáil again before the summer recess.

"Recently, under topical issues in Dáil Éireann, I pressed the Minister for Justice for extra Gardaí for North Kildare and in particular Celbridge and Maynooth. I have also recently met with Assistant Commissioner Fanning, Chief Superintendent Brian Sutton and Superintendent Gerry Wall, to press for extra Garda resources."

"I appreciate that we have secured extra Gardaí in North Kildare this year which are in place in Celbridge, Maynooth and Leixlip with further additional Gardaí to be in place before the end of the year in Celbridge. However, Maynooth and other areas needs extra Gardaí as the population base grows and Maynooth being a university town. As with Public Transport, Education and Health facilities, we need to provide adequate numbers of Gardaí as the population grows in North Kildare."

"Kildare has one of the lowest proportion of Gardaí per capita and we need to address this issue. The Minister did agree to keep the matter under review, in particular the case I made for Celbridge, Maynooth, Leixlip and Kilcock all in the proximity of the University which leads to a large increase in population. He promised to keep me informed of developments and will look positively on putting more resources in place."

"Celbridge Garda numbers are now being increased and it is a step in the right direction. I will continue to press for additional resources for all the surrounding areas." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke

New Bus Route linking Maynooth, Celbridge and Tallaght on the way says O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fail TD, Frank O'Rourke, has welcomed the inclusion of a Bus service linking Maynooth, Celbridge and Tallaght in the Bus Connect proposals, put forward by the National Transport Authority in the proposed redesign of the Dublin Area Bus Network.

"The National Transport Authority (NTA) has published its proposals to redesign the Dublin Area Bus Network. The proposals include an orbital Bus Service linking Maynooth, Celbridge and Tallaght."

"The new route will be known as W8 route. It is an orbital route between Maynooth and Tallaght, via Celbridge. It will commence in Moyglare, Maynooth and will run through Celbridge, connecting to the train at Hazelhatch. It continues on through Newcastle, Rathcoole, Saggart (connecting with Luas) and on to Tallaght town centre. It will operate at 30 minute intervals each weekday from 6am to 11pm."

"I have campaigned for this service over the last number of years and earlier this year, I received a commitment from the NTA that it would consider this service. I am delighted that it is now included in the Bus Connects proposals." Stated Deputy O'Rourke.

Public consultation on the proposed changes to Dublin Bus network has started earlier in July and all submissions must be in before the 28th of September."

"We are making progress on improving our public transport. We have an orbital route in place linking Naas to Blanchardstown, via Clane, Rathcoffey, Maynooth and Leixlip. Construction of the Park and Ride in Kilcock has started and the bus timetable for Kilcock is set for improvement."

"Many residents in Maynooth and Celbridge need to travel to Tallaght for work, attend hospital or go to college. I welcome the inclusion of this route on the proposed Dublin Bus Routes in Bus Connects. I believe it will attract

support and I urge the public to support the proposal during public consultation stage.'

"I will continue to engage with the NTA and Public Transport providers to ensure that we make further progress on public transport services." Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Contract for National Broadband Plan has still not been signed - O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fáil TD, Frank O'Rourke, has called on the Minister for Communications, Climate Action & Environment to intervene and bring clarity to the roll out of the National Broadband Plan as delays persist in the roll out of broadband connections in rural areas in County Kildare.

"It is time for the Government to outline a timeline for the signing of the contract for the National Broadband Plan, as there is only one company - Enet - left in the running after Eir pulled out of the process earlier this year."

The delay in the roll out and the signing of the contract is having a serious impact on the hundreds of thousands of homes and businesses who are still waiting to be connected to the network."

"My understanding is that more than 13,000 homes and businesses, or 15% of the total, across the County of Kildare fall under "State led intervention" category for roll

out of Broadband. Some of these homes and businesses are quality of life of hundreds of thousands of individuals and within a few kilometres of major IT Multinational companies and could face waits for another 3 to 5 years to secure high speed broadband."

"The Government's record on broadband provision is disgraceful. The National Broadband Plan was launched in 2012 and it was due to be completed by 2016. We now hear from the Minister that it could be 2023 before it is fully rolled out nationally."

"The current impasse cannot be allowed to continue. The Minister needs to announce a date for the contract to be signed so that the scheme can be rolled out to the areas which need it most". Concluded Deputy O'Rourke.

Irish Rip Off mortgages now at €2,200 a year -O'Rourke

Local Fianna Fail TD Frank O'Rourke, has stated that Mortgage interest rates charged in Ireland are entirely unjustifiable and the banks must be tackled to ensure that fairer mortgage rates are available to Irish home owners.

"Recent statistics, published by the Central Bank, show that the average interest rate on all new Irish mortgages in June stood at 3.23%, slightly higher than in May. The equivalent average for the euro area is only 1.8%. Ireland is the only country in the euro area with an average rate above 3%.

"This massive differential is impacting negatively on the

families around our country and depriving local economy of much needed stimulus.'

"An Irish borrower, with a 30 year mortgage of €250,000, is paying €1085 per month. This is around €188 per month, equivalent to €2,200 per year and €68,000 over the lifetime of the mortgage, more than they would be paying in the average Euro area country."

"Over the last 10 years, people's wages have increased very little and we need to focus on reducing the cost of living to ease the pressure on wage inflation. Reducing people's mortgage repayments is one mechanism to reduce the cost of living.'

"We have been campaigning for mortgage holders, and particularly those in mortgage arrears, for some time now. Since I got elected to the Dáil, I have worked with our Finance Spokesperson, Michael McGrath TD, to keep a focus on their concerns. All of the instruments available to the Government and the Central Bank must be used to ensure that Irish mortgage holders receive fair treatment when compared to other EU countries."

"The government must reconsider its opposition to legislation giving more power to the Central Bank to tackle high mortgage rates in light of the most recent statistics."

"A delegation from the Oireachtas Finance Committee will be meeting officials from the ECB next month and we have placed the issue of high mortgage interest rates on the agenda for discussion." concluded Deputy O'Rourke.



Recycle – put old school notices in the recycle bin. If you still get a lot of paper notices from your school, maybe you could ask them to look into emailing the information instead. If you are buying new school supplies, look for items with recycled content to close the recycling cycle.

Rot – remember to use your brown bin or compost heap for any left over lunch scraps. Food in landfill produces methane which is more than 20 times as potent as CO2.



Maynooth Community First Responders CPR Demo – Supervalu 8th September

A group of people from Maynooth have volunteered to set up and provide a fully functioning Community First Responders Unit in Maynooth with the objective of providing a 24/7 service to the town and its surroundings.

In the past years we have seen many communities with a fully trained Community First Responders Unit, registered with and supported by the National Ambulance Service and providing 24/7 support to their communities. A Cardiac First Responder Unit has members who are trained to a level of basic life support in CPR and the use of an AED/defibrillator, who can assist in a life-threatening emergency such as a cardiac arrest, heart attack, stroke or choking. Maynooth does not have this service YET.

Having Community First Responders in your community means that within minutes crucial assistance can be provided to a member of the community until an ambulance arrives.


To provide this service to the community we have started with the registration of our Unit, we are in the process of carrying out administrative requirements, we have elected a chairperson and committee, we have also had several meetings. To progress this initiative further we need to buy equipment. The most urgent is to have defibrillators, replacement pads, gloves, a mobile phone, masks, first aid bags, and Hi Vis responder jackets.





MAYNOOTH CYCLING CAMPAIGN



Amendment No. 1 to **Maynooth LAP**

Maynooth Cycling Campaign supports Amendment No. 1 to Local Area Plan as it will allow for development of the ring road between the Celbridge and the Dublin Roads and facilitate the

development of housing which is badly needed by many families. However, we made a number of points in a submission, two of which may not be universally supported.

One was in relation to 'decoupling' of the modes which in plain English means increasing the safety of vulnerable road users on the Straffan Road by diverting motorised traffic onto the Ring Road. It would also have the effect of improving Main Street by reducing motorised traffic and creating a more pleasant environment there for pedestrians and cyclists. Such traffic management has been part of the road safety strategy in the Netherlands since the 1970s.

The second point was that Maynooth Cycling Campaign strongly supported the proposed permeable walking and cycling links between the Railpark area and the existing Rockfield and Parklands residential estates. Streets were historically developed which would allow direct routes for pedestrians. The proposed permeable links complement the existing links of estates in Maynooth such as Parklands/ Rockfield and Kingsbry/Beaufield. Maynooth is fortunate as many estates elsewhere in Kildare are completely segregated from one another as a result of pro-car layouts ie cul-de-sacs.

Dublin CyclingWorks

Last year, there was protests by some small business owners about the reallocation of road space from car parking to the provision of cycling facilities in Naas town centre. Coincidentally, the Dublin CyclingWorks website (https:// dublin.cyclingworks.org/) was recently set up so that business leaders could show their support for the provision of high quality cycling infrastructure by calling for greater government investment in the Greater Dublin Cycle Network which includes Kildare. To date more than fifty businesses have come out in support including Trinity College Dublin, Dublin Institute of Technology, Goodbody, Workday, Siemens, CRBE, CPE and Dublin Chamber. This was to reinforce the message that cycling is good for business and that most businesses, large and small, support increased cycling.

Velo-City 2019

Velo-City 2018 which took place in Rio de Janeiro is over. Next year the international bike conference is coming back to Ireland. Planning has already started and the organisers of Velo-City 2019, the European Cycling Federation and Dublin City Council, has issued a call for submissions on the

theme of Cycling for the Ages by October 22nd. So if anyone has ideas about promoting cycling, more information is available at https://www.velocity2019.com/abstract.

Climate Change

The Climate Change Advisory Council's (CCAC) Annual Report 2018 was published at the end of July. The CCAC's role is to advise the government rather than to specify detailed policy decisions but there was explicit mention of the contribution of increased cycling to reduce the effects of climate change. Chairperson John Fitzgerald speaking at the launch of the report said -"Emissions are rising...we need major policy changes...government has not laid out pathways to decarbonise."



All About September

September is the ninth month of the year in the Gregorian Calendar and one of four Gregorian months with 30 days



September begins in western astrology with the sun in the sign of Virgo and ends in the sign of Libra. Astronomically speaking, the sun actually begins in the constellation of Leo and ends in the constellation of Virgo.

How to choose and grow the best Clematis Varieties Colourful climbers for your garden

If plants are like people, then clematis are comparable with the Hollywood movie stars of the Technicolor era, combining cinematic good looks with high-wattage charm. Used to cloak a

wall, pergola, obelisk or arbour, to scramble through the branches of a companion plant, or as container specimens, clematis add great swathes of colour to gardens, while some varieties also offer scent and/or evergreen foliage.

In April, as the soil finally begins to warm up, is one of the best times to plant them. But with several thousand different varieties in cultivation, the problem for many gardeners has been the abundance of choice. Step forward the Royal Horticultural Society's Award of Garden Merit (AGM), the equivalent of an Oscar for luminaries of the plant kingdom, given only to plants of exceptional quality and sturdy constitution that are vigorous, easily cultivated, disease-resistant and readily obtainable.

The big difference between an Oscar and an RHS AGM, however, is that the latter is not for life. Once-prized cultivars are ruthlessly demoted if they no longer make the grade or are superseded by better varieties, which is what happened this spring when the society unveiled its newly revised list of more than 7,000 AGM plants, its first comprehensive review in 10 years.

Of those clematis which had held the coveted AGM in 2011, 15 were deleted, and six new varieties were added. A total of 79 clematis now hold the award, a testimony to the great variety of different garden-worthy plants. Some of these such as the evergreen early-flowering Clematis cirrhosa 'Freckles' C. Wisley Cream' and Clematis armandii 'Apple Blossom' have a new RHS hardiness rating of H4, making them suitable only for warmer gardens.

Tougher by far are the many varieties of C. alpina and C. macropetala. Hardy and floriferous, these will happily tolerate a shady north or east-facing spot as long as the soil is free-draining, while their small, bell-shaped flowers, which appear

in April-May, have a discreet beauty a world away from that of the flashier, large-flowering types. Look out for the award-winning 'Frances Rivis', 'Constance' and

'White Columbine' amongst others.



Clematis montana is one of the clematis that Irish gardeners know best, with pink/white flowers that are often seen festooned through the branches of trees or draped along the roofs of garden sheds in late spring/early summer. Of the various cultivars available, the RHS singles out five – C. 'Mayleen', C. 'Elizabeth', C. 'Freda', C. montana var. grandiflora and C. montana var. rubens 'Tetrarose'. With the

exception of the relatively well-behaved 'Freda' (cherry-pink flowers), the rest of these shade-tolerant clematis varieties will romp through any garden, so beware of planting in a confined space . Neither, with a hardiness rating of only H4, are they suitable for cold or exposed gardens.

By May, clematis belonging to what's known as the early large flowered group will take centre stage. Gone from the RHS list are 'Henryi', 'Josephine', 'Miss Bateman', 'Mrs Chalmondeley' and 'Royalty' but plenty of other old favourites still make the grade including the candy-striped 'Nelly Moser', 'Niobe' (red) and 'The President' (purple). Compact and colourful, this group make wonderful wall or container-grown specimens.

Summer marks the peak of the clematis season, beginning with a wealth of large, late flowering cultivars (LLs) such as the ever-popular C. 'Jackmanii' (purple),

'Comtesse de Bouchaud' (pale pink), 'Ernest Markham' (crimson-red) and the freshly-AGM-anointed C. 'Aotoroa' (purple). These are joined by varieties of Clematis texensis (the pink-flowering 'Princess Diana' is the only AGM variety), C. tangutica and orientalis cultivars as well as the herbaceous integrifolia and diversifolia types. And then, in early autumn comes the spreading, sun-loving C. rehderiana, with its elegant clusters of small, creamy-yellow flowers that smell like cowslips.

But if I had to grow only one clematis, I would choose a variety from the hardy viticella group, probably the longest-flowering (July-September), most floriferous, vigorous, versatile and garden-worthy of all the categories. Many feature in the RHS's updated list (see rhs.org.uk), with classics such as C. 'Purpurea Plena Elegans' (double, magenta), C. 'Etoile Violette' (blue-purple), 'Mme Julia Correvon (red) and 'C. Venosa Violacea' (purple-white) included alongside new additions such C. 'Poldice' (violet-blue, white centre) and C. 'Walenburg' (red-purple) . Viticellas belong to Group 3 of the clematis genus and along with so many of the other plants in this category, they look wonderful growing through or up a vigorous companion plant to extend or add to its season of interest.

How to plant clematis

Before planting, soak the plant's rootball in a bucket of water. Dig a hole 45-60cm deep and wide (45-60cm away from the base of a wall, 60cm away from the base of a host tree). Fork over the base of the hole, then cover with a layer of well-rotted organic matter (compost, manure) followed by a thin layer of soil (clematis don't like manure touching their roots or stems). Mix homemade garden compost/John Innes compost and a couple of handfuls of slow-release fertiliser with the remaining loose soil, then take the soaked rootball and gently loosen some of the coiled roots before placing the plant in the hole. Excluding herbaceous and evergreen types, the traditional advice is to plant deeply to avoid clematis wilt, ensuring the top of the rootball is roughly eight centimetres below the finished level of the soil. If it's a dry spot, consider placing an open-ended pipe (7.5cm diameter) in the hole, which will allow you to water the plant effectively until

established. Backfill, water, and protect against slugs. Continue to water regularly until well established. If growing against a wall/support, plants will need to be tied to horizontal wires, or a trellis fixed on battens. All clematis should be hard-pruned at some point within the first year of planting.

For Group 1, prune immediate after flowering while for Group 2 and Group 3 types, prune in February/March the following spring. Mulch established plants with manure in early spring, making sure that it doesn't rest against the stems. To ensure good flower production, add a handful of sulphate of potash to the surrounding soil in April and water in.

Pruning

For ease of cultivation, clematis are divided into three main groups. Group 1 comprises the earliest flowering types. These plants should only be pruned to tidy them up/restrict their size, immediately after flowering has finished.

Group 2 comprises the early-large-flowered types that flower on last year's growth. Lightly prune in February and again after flowering to encourage a second flush. The final category, Group 3, encompasses the late large-flowered hybrids as well as the viticella, texensis and orientalis types that flower on new growth. Each stem should be hard pruned back to 45cm above ground and a pair of strong buds.

The only other time to prune clematis is if they are struck with the fungal disease known as clematis wilt, which mainly affects the early-large-flowered types. If this happens, cut growth to the ground and dispose carefully of the pruned material.

BusConnects

As a member of the Oireachtas Transport Committee, I recently had an opportunity to raise issues and concerns regarding the full implications of the recently announced BusConnects plan. People in North Kildare have been expressing concerns regarding what the changes would mean for commuters in the area and it appears that the changes may well make the use of public transport less attractive and therefore generate more car traffic on roads.

I relayed these concerns to the officials present and made the point that there is a lot of confusion surrounding the Bus Connects proposals and what they might mean for commuters.

While there are positives and negatives in the plan there are still lots of questions to be answered to fully understand the scope of the changes. However one positive change for residents in Maynooth is the proposed new bus route between Maynooth and Tallaght which will be a major asset to the town.

I don't think enough consideration has been given to the areas on the fringe of the bus network – including in relation to traffic management and the ability of some of the junctions to deal with feeder buses etc.

The upcoming information sessions will be crucial to ensure that people's concerns are heard and that the detail of the plan is fleshed out so that when people are making submissions to the public consultation they can do so with the benefit of the detail of all the proposals in the plan and how it might affect them.

The information session for North Kildare will be held on Thursday the

30th of August in Tesco on the Maynooth Road in Celbridge from 2pm to 8pm. You can access the full detail and maps of the proposed routes on www.busconnects.ie The public consultation process is open until 29th September and I would encourage people to engage with the process.

Rail Updates:

I recently asked the Minister for Transport Shane Ross if he has any plans to increase capacity on commuter trains for the regions surrounding Dublin. I also asked if he was satisfied that Irish Rail are using their full complement of rolling stock at peak times and if he has any plans to increase the amount of rolling stock available to Irish Rail.

Anyone who travels on the commuter lines from Kildare to Dublin and return during peak times will be well aware of the significant crowding and the very obvious need for increased capacity.

I believe the Minister for Transport should take a proactive approach to ensuring that public transport works for the public.

However, having submitted queries to Irish Rail directly on the matter, it has been revealed to me that it is proposed to introduce an hourly off peak service between Hazelhatch & Grand Canal Dock in December 2018 and it is proposed to introduce weekend services on the route at the end of 2019/start of 2020.

On the Maynooth line, it is proposed to increase weekday off peak and weekend services to a half-hourly frequency between Maynooth & Connolly from December 2018 onwards.

EDITORIAL

Unlike 1979 the visit of Pope Francis last month to Ireland did not include a stop in Maynooth. However, Maynooth did play a part as a transport hub for people going to the mass in the Phoenix Park in Dublin to avail of car parking in St. Patrick's Seminary/Maynooth University and to take trains and buses to Dublin. 





Children's Healthy Lunch Box

This is the time of the year when most parents think of what to put in their children's lunch boxes, and when you're a busy working parent it can be hard to get it right. We all know that lunch should be healthy, but if you have a fussy child it becomes a very big problem.

Things to Consider for September

This is harvest season so if you have had a good year of growth then now is about the time that you find you have far too much fruit and vegetables and are no doubt lost for ideas on what to do with it all!! Learn how to prepare vegetables for freezing if you want to avoid waste.





Even though Summer is behind us, flowers still continue to bloom right up until the first frost so there is no reason why you won't have a garden of colour in September. Day lengths really narrow in by the end of the month with sunset at around 7pm. To extend the use of your garden into the evenings consider investing in a chimenea, firepit, garden lighting or patio heater.

September is an ideal time to re-seed or to sow a new lawn using lawn seed. Kill the early stages of moss on patios and paving areas with <u>Patio Magic</u>. Continue to feed summer bedding plants with **One Plant Food liquid** fertiliser to prolong colour until mid winter. Take cuttings from popular herbs including Thyme, Rosemary, Lavender and Bay Leaf. Use <u>mooting powder</u> to encourage strong new roots. Sow Sweet Pea plants from seed now for larger blooms next summer.



Early autumn is the ideal time to plant a new hedge in your garden for shelter and privacy. Plant Daffodil, Tulip and Snowdrop bulbs out of doors for a splash of colour next spring. Replace dead or damaged hedging plants with frost hardy varieties. Cherry Laurel, green and golden Privet and Boxwood are all excellent varieties to see you through the winter. For seaside areas, choose Silver Elaegnus. For colour in your patio pots and window boxes plant winter flowering Pansies, Violas, Heather and Aconites.

Plant evergreen climbers this month. Climbers with both foliage and flowers look best. Try Virginia Creeper, evergreen Hydrangeas or evergreen Honeysuckles, or choose from a wide range of ivies. Remember to add a good compost when planting. If you like to grow your own vegetables, plant autumn and winter vegetable plants - winter and spring Cabbage, purple sprouting Broccoli, Little Gem Lettuce, Iceberg lettuce and Chinese Cabbage are all especially tasty when you grow them yourself.



September remains one of the best months to plant berrying broad leaved trees. One of my favourites are the beautiful Malus trees. Start feeding birds now before the onslaught of winter. Wild bird feeds and protein high peanuts should be offered to all garden birds from now until spring. Kill Mare's Tail with Neudorff weedkiller, which is specially formulated for the pesky weed. Weed Free 360 is an excellent product for all other weeds. Apply in dry weather and watch weeds die away quickly. Plant Hydrangeas, Snowdrops and Winter Aconites now for lots of colour in December and January.

September is a good time of the year to plant **perennials** and **hardy annuals**. **Your hanging baskets** also need maintenance. Deadheading, watering and feeding can keep them going until mid-Autumn. Cut back Perennials that are fading and dying down. Divide clumps of Alpines and herbaceous perennials such as **Crocosmias** to improve flowering next year. Take cuttings of tender perennials. Bring inside any tender perennials before frost.



One final tip about bulbs, If you are not sure which end of the bulb is the top, plant it on its side. The stem will always grow upright.

Planting, seasoned vegetable and flower gardeners will know that two weeks prior to planting that the beds need to be prepared. Existing beds will need amending (larger or smaller), rotovating or digging over and fertilizing like crazy.

Some examples of winter crops are, beetroot, cauliflower, brussels sprouts, cabbage, broccoli, chives, celery, onions, parsley, parsnips, peas, radish, spinach, lettuce, and turnips, the list just continues.

New beds will need to be dug and left over the winter to let nature do what it does best, cold frost and water breaking down the rough soil.

Quick healthy lunchbox ideas

It's back to school time as parents think about the prospect of school lunchboxes once again. Here are easy-to-eat, healthy choices they'll love this September.

Ham, Carrot and Houmous Rolls

Ingredients:

50g carrots, grated 1 tbsp reduced fat houmous 4 slices lean ham 1 large handful of rocket leaves Pinch of sea salt

Freshly ground black pepper

Method:

Place the carrots and rocket leaves in a bowl, season with sea salt and black pepper and mix well. Spread each slice of ham with some houmous, add some carrot mixture in to the middle of the slice of ham, then wrap around the filling to make a roll. Secure with a cocktail stick or simply pop straight into the segmented lunchbox.



Mini Cheese Quiches

Ingredients:

320g ready rolled all butter short crust pastry 35g cooked ham, chopped 3 medium free range eggs 150g crème fraîche 40g low-fat cheese, grated 75g broccoli, cut into bite-size pieces



Method:

Preheat the oven to gas 6, 200°C, fan 180°C. Roll the pastry out with a rolling pin so that it is a little thinner and wider. Then divide it into 6 pieces and use it to line 6 x 10cm individual fluted loose-bottomed tart cases. Leave 1cm hanging over the edge. Prick the base with a fork and chill for at least 10 minutes or until the pastry is firm. Fill the tarts with a small circle of non-stick baking paper and baking beans and then bake for 15 minutes. Remove the baking paper and bake for another 5 minutes or until golden brown and the pastry is crisp. Remove from the oven and leave to cool for 5 minutes before carefully trimming the cases.

Blanch the broccoli florets in boiling water for 2-3 minutes, drain and refresh in cold water. Whisk together the eggs, crème fraîche and half the cheese and season a little. Divide the blanched broccoli and cooked ham pieces between the tart cases and then pour over the egg and crème fraîche mix. Scatter over the remaining cheese and then bake for 15-20 minutes or until puffed up, golden on top and cooked through. The tart cases can be cooked in advance, left to cool, and then stored in a cool place for 24 hours. The raw tart cases can also be frozen for up to a month and then blind baked from frozen. Add 2-3 minutes extra to the blind baking and then continue.

Flapjacks

Ingredients:

225g/8oz porridge oats 125g/4oz butter or margarine 125g/4oz demerara sugar 75g/3oz golden syrup



Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas4. Grease and line an 8"/20cm square tin. Melt the butter/margarine with the sugar and syrup. Stir in the oats. Turn into the prepared tin. Smooth top and press down well. Bake for 20-30 minutes. When baked, cool in tin for 5 minutes. Cut into fingers. Cool completely before removing from tin.

White Cheese Scones

Ingredients:

225g/8oz self raising flour 150ml/¼ pt milk (approx) 25g/1oz golden caster sugar (optional) 25g/1oz butter or margarine 50g/2oz grated cheddar cheese 1tsp mustard



Method:

Preheat oven 425°F/220°C/Gas 8. Sieve flour and salt into a bowl, stir in sugar, if used. Rub in butter/margarine until mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Add grated cheddar cheese and mustard. Then add sufficient milk to make a soft dough. Turn onto a floured board and gently knead to remove any cracks. Roll out lightly to 1" in thickness. Cut out scones with a cutter dipped in flour. Place on a floured preheated baking tray. Bake on an upper shelf position for 10-12 minutes. Cool on a wire tray.

FILM/DVD MONTHLY BY BERNIE CLAXTO THE BEST ALFRED HITCHOCK THRILL



THE 39 STEPS (1935)



The 39 Steps is the ultimate Hitchcock classic. In his pre -Hollywood phase, the director pulls out all the stops in this exciting, black and white British thriller. The set-up of the film is typical Hitchcock territory: an innocent man on the run, Richard Hannay (Robert Donat) hooks up, literally, with an attractive blonde (Madeline Carroll) for a story of danger and intrigue. Hitchcock had a penchant for blonde heroines throughout his directing career. Carroll was the first prototype blonde. Striking set-pieces abound, from the tension filled spectacle of a music-hall murder to high-jinks on a moving train. The English actor, Robert Donat is in his element here: whether hamming up a speech about someone he doesn't know or playfully teasing his female companion, There is much fun to be had and sexual tension in the famous extended handcuffing sequence involving Donat and Carroll. Hitchcock milks it for all its worth. There have been almost as many adaptations of John Buchan's novel as there are steps. However, none have equalled or mastered this 1935 screen gem.

NOTORIOUS (1946)



Notorious partners Ingrid Bergman and Cary Grant as American agents, infiltrating a ring of Nazis in South America post WW2. Notorious is in the realm of film noir but not of it. This is one of Hitchcock's darker films, a cruel, twisted exercise in manipulation of audience response. A convicted traitor's daughter (the luminous Bergman) becomes a US Government spy, accepting an assignment that requires her to marry her father's Nazi friend (Claude Rains). Finger-cracking suspense, intrigue and romance are stylishly combined in one of Hitchcock's best films.

Hitchcock's striking trademark visual style is in evidence: the long one-shot kissing sequence and crane shot into a door key are justly famous. Yet the film's real power lies in its subtle and detailed portrayal of perverse relationships. Grant and Bergman were never better, displaying intense

their faces are shot in electric close-up. Subline direction from Hitchcock and wonderful performances from Bergman and Grant make Notorious a sure-fire classic.

REAR WINDOW (1954)



Some claim Rear Window as the greatest film Hitchcock ever made. It's undoubtedly the most Hitchcockian film in his canon of work. Laid up with a broken leg, bored photojournalist L.B. Jefferies (James Stewart) occupies his time staring through his rear window at the going-ons of his neighbours. Virtually the entire feature is shot from Stewart' gaze peeping through binoculars into the open courtyard and the many windows of its residents. It's a fascinating concept with each apartment virtually a set and story in itself. Although we are presented with something more akin to a giant board game than a set, and Hitchcock's obvious pleasure in playing with it and us leaps off the screen.

Hitchcock turns the lens on his audience. "We have become a race of peeping toms" as commented by one of the characters in the film. Beneath sharp dialogue, perceptive character development and tense plot twists, the film slowly builds nerve-tingling suspense. The experience of watching Rear Window involves titillation, clammy thrills, increasing horror and disturbing voyeurism. James Stewart is exceptionally good as the wheel-chair bound photographer caught up in a cat-and-mouse game with a murderous neighbour. His scenes with the beautiful Grace Kelly (as his model girlfriend) fairly crackles with sexual chemistry.

With few exceptions, the camera never leaves the confines of Stewart's apartment. The setting can get a bit claustrophobic. Nevertheless it's a brilliantly assembled theatrical piece filled with mystery, paranoia, thrills, black comedy and voyeuristic suspense right down to the heartpounding climax.

VERTIGO (1958)



Alfred Hitchcock is a cinematic tour de force when it comes to crafting some of the most memorable and exhilarating suspense thrillers ever to grace the screen. As befits its title, **Vertigo** is a dizzying screen experience. chemistry, moody emotions conveyed through their eyes as The storyline is intriguing enough. A retired policeman

suffering from vertigo (James Stewart) is given the job of trailing an old college friend's wife (Kim Novak). This initial premise sets a disturbing chain of events in motion. Vertigo's tempo may be slow but it is never boring. The gorgeous widescreen camera work, shot on location in San Francisco, (making use of its famous landmarks) is very effective at creating atmosphere, character and a sense of eeriness.

James Stewart upends his nice-guy persona in the central role of tormented cop Scottie Ferguson. His descent into near madness and fetishized, romantic obsession is quite shocking to behold. Hitchcock regular, Bernard Herrmann's score for **Vertigo** is striking and unforgettable. The score was actually repeated for the Oscar-winning film The Artist in 2011.



In the pivotal role of Madeline Elster, Kim Novak is surprisingly good as another Hitchcockian icy blonde. Her scenes with Stewart are erotic and sensational. It's probably Novak's best role on screen.

Hitchcock demonstrates total mastery of the cinematic point-of-view shot and his editing technique is second to none. Vertigo is Hitchcock's most powerful, personal, haunting and stunningly beautiful film. His twisty, psychological thriller is far more involving and memorable than most Hollywood films of its kind.

It is true to say that **Vertigo** is one of the greatest surreal movies ever made and Hitchcock's most disturbing masterpiece.


